### Men Speaking From God

The Prophet Jonah — First Chapter

The Book of Jonah is one of the most instructive of the shorter books in the Old Testament. The name Jonah is not very common, but it fits millions. For proof, read the Book often. Perhaps no book of the Bible has been critized more than this one. A perplexing and irrational procedure is often used by rationalistic critics of the Bible. The palace of faith erected there, they first tear apart. Then, realizing that man is in need of something, they proceed to nail together a shack of the pieces.

There are men of the highest scholastic attainments on both sides of the question of the historicity of the Book of Jonah. Both groups have the same facts; both have evidently not the same faith. One side chooses to believe; the other side chooses not to believe. In each instance belief is a result of an action of the will, a choice. Back of that choice and of that will is the kind of life a person wants to live. That is the motivating and moving power.

There are greater miracles in the Bible than the one about Jonah and the fish. Incidentally, that is not the only miracle in the Book of Jonah. Think, for instance, of such miracles as the crossing of the Red Sea. Recall the experience of Daniel in the lion's den. The fish opened its mouth and swallowed Jonah. The lions closed their mouths and did Daniel no harm. Both were commanded to do so by God. It was also a greater miracle that God preserved the three friends of Daniel in the fiery furnace, than that He preserved Jonah inside the fish. And the resurrection of our Lord Jesus was a far greater miracle. Jesus was dead and was raised to new life; Jonah was not dead, but only in "solitary confinement" and was let out again. Personally, I believed that the

experience of Jonah was true before I became a minister, and I have had no reason to change since.

We might write as a heading over the first chapter: "FROM THE PRESENCE OF THE LORD," see verse 3. Jonah might be called the prodigal prophet. He wanted to get away from God, as the prodigal son wanted to get away from home, though not for the same reason. Why did Jonah expose himself to the dangers of the sea? Why did he leave his country? He was not in danger of a concentration camp or of the "gestapo" if he stayed. His doctor had likely not ordered a change of climate. Why do others try to escape "from the presence of God?" In this connection read Psalm 139. See Obadiah, verse 4.

When Jonah entered the most secluded cabin of the ship, he probably said to himself, "Well, here I am," and the voice of God replied, "And here I am."

Jonah was taking refuge in a city "from the presence of the Lord." The attempt would be amusing if there were not millions who follow his example today. Convince yourself that you can't hide from God. If your way of life is like that of Jonah, that is, in the opposite direction from the way God has pointed out to you, learn the lesson from Jonah and turn back. That applies to you if you are a prophet (Jonah was) or a peddler. Jonah was sailing on a neutral ship, but the hand of God reached down and took him off, and there was no protest. The road having the marker, "From The Presence of the Lord" is very, very dangerous. Turn back at once.

The city of Nineveh, the capital of the Assyrian Empire was likewise away "from the presence of the Lord." It was a great and wicked city. But God is aware of the life of cities as well as of nations. The individual as well as the group is held accountable on Him.

Another thought in the chapter might be expressed by the words: INTO THE PRESENCE OF THE LORD. The crew of the ship on which Jonah sailed seems to have been, what such crews at times are, a motley collection of people. Each man cried to his own god for help. They urged Jonah to follow their example, but

the would have to reply that he was not on speaking terms with his God. His was not a child-like fear of God but fear of punishment. —They were not the only sailors who have prayed in their difficulties. The following is a quotation from the diary of one of the men on board the flagship of Admiral Byrd, sailing toward the South Pole in 1934: "7 p.m.—Away goes a piece of the ship's railing, ventilators and boat covers. Heavy seas sweep the ship. Only God can save the ship now. The men are falling down praying. They are asking divine protection . . . 9 p.m. The barometer is rising at last. The gale is slacking to 85 miles per hour. Thank God. Our prayers have been answered."

In the course of Jonah fleeing "from the presence of the Lord," these sailors came into the presence of the Lord—God can make even stubborn and disobedient men serve His purpose. So for this time we leave Jonah, a self-willed sinner, as the sailors left him, in the hands of a disciplinary God.



OBITUARY OF A. HOFGAARD

The Rev. Arthur Hofgaard was born in Chicago, Illinois, March 17, 1880, to Andrew Hofgaard and Helene Hadeler Hofgaard. He came to Kearney, Nebr., in 1880 and moved to a farm west of Ravenna in 1884 and attended country school. He was baptized and confirmed in the Lutheran Church.

In 1902 he entered Dana College and graduated from Trinity Seminary in 1908. He was ordained into the holy ministry on June 14, 1908, at Waupaca, Wisc.

He served a parish in West Branch, Ia., from 1908 to 1911, in Owatonna, Minn., 1911 to 1918, in Kenmare, N. D., 1918 to 1926 and

has lived in Minden since 1926. He served the Bethany Lutheran Church of Minden from 1926 to 1938 and Ebenezer Lutheran Church at Curtis from 1939 to 1947 and from 1948 to 1950. He served as the superintendent of the Bethany Home from 1926 to 1956 and for a short time during 1958 and has been retired since that time.

On June 3, 1908, he was united in marriage to Anna Larsen of Hampton, Nebr., and to this union three children were born.

Pastor Hofgaard was preceded in death by his parents, three brothers, Albert, Walter and Henry and two sisters, Cecile Hofgaard and Sophia Reinertson.

He passed away quietly at his home at the age of 80 years, five months and three days.

He leaves to mourn his passing his devoted wife, Anna, a sister, Mrs. Hattie Hice, Minden, a daughter, Mrs. Elna Petersen of Oregon, Wisc., two sons, Alvin of Omaha and Ethan of Tacoma, Wash., nine grandchildren, nephews and nieces and many friends.

He is remembered as a loving husband, father and friend. Blessed be the memory of Pastor Arthur Hofgaard.

Funeral services were held Friday afternoon, Sept. 23, at the Bethany Lutheran Church, Minden, with clergymen Rev. Walter Kirkegaard, Rev. James W. Olsen and Rev. K. R. Jensen conducting the services. Interment was in the Minden Cemetery. The Layton Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Board members of the Bethany Home were pallbearers. They were Ed Petersen, Emerald Nielsen, Martin Christensen, Jim Pedersen, Harold Paulson and Paul Nelson. Visiting clergy were honorary pallbearers.

#### THE PASSING OF PASTOR HOFGAARD

"He was not, for God took him." This became literally true about Pastor Hofgaard. He was taken away in his sleep. No one knows the moment. He was a great man and a great Christian. It took much planning and work to build up Bethany Home from one small house to what it is today. And it took a large measure of humility and patience and energy to direct the affairs of the Home during these many years.

Pastor Hofgaard relinquished direction of Bethany Home four years ago, but he never really retired. He continued to do odd jobs at the Home such as delivering the mail, help paint a room, and fixing this and that. He also continued to serve as a member of the Bethany Home Board. As such he gave valuable advice. The one thing continually in his mind to the end was the New Nursing Home. Shortly before he passed away the Board in his

presence voted that the New Home shall be called the Hofgaard Memorial.

It seems strange not to see him around any more. It is as though one meets his presence everywhere around here—on the grounds, in the halls, and in the rooms. Many people are grateful for the care given parents, brothers and sisters under his supervision. I am confident that he has heard or will hear the commendation of our Lord: "well done, good and faithful servant: thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will set thee over many things; enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

And afterward an informal social hour. The ladies also brought us a generous pantry shower. May their tribe increase! Thank you very much. We shall look for you again next Fall.
