Dr. Nielsen was born in Denmark, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Peter Nielsen. His father was a carpenter. When J. P. was 18-months old his parents moved to the United States. They located on a farm 12 miles northeast of Council Bluffs, Ia.

He attended rural schools and high school at Elk Horn, Ia., before attending Dana College in the fall of 1897.

There was only one building on the campus at that time, Old Main. Even that building wasn't completed as the south wing was not added until 1905.

There were between 20 and 25 students at the college, which was known as a Preparatory School. After completing this course he entered Trinity Seminary, graduating in 1904.

Dr. J. P. Nielsen slutter en lang Dags Tjeneste. Fra Good Shepherd Alderdomshjem i Blair meddeles, at dets Bestyrer, Dr. J. P. Nielsen, har indgivet sin Resignation og agter at fratræde til 1. Juni d.A. Han har tjent som saadan siden 1. Marts 1949, da han valgtes dertil efter den første Bestyrer, Mr. K. F. Johansens Død. Mrs. Johansen fortsatte som Hjemmets Husmoder og er der fremdeles. Dr. Nielsen var Sjælen i Arbejdet med at faa den nye Hovedbygning opført og det smukke Anlæg udlagt, og han har tjent Anstalten utrættelig baade som Administratør og Chaplain i de svundne 7 Aar. Nu er hans Helbred og Syn ikke længere stærk nok dertil, og med 78 Aar bag sig er det vist ogsaa Tid at spænde fra. Faa har tjent, og faar Anledning til at tjene, vor Kirke saa længe og saa værdigt som Pastor Jør-

gen P. Nielsen. Født i Sørbylille paa Sjælland kom han som aarsgammelt Barn med sine Forældre, Peter Nielsens, til Pottawattamie County, Iowa, i 1879, hvor han opvoksede paa deres Farm og fik sin kristelige Opdragelse i deres troende Hjem og i St. Pauli Menighed vest for Neola. Hans aandelige Vækkelse eller Overbevisning tillægger han den nidkære Pastor Laurits Mathiasen, hvis eneste Konfirmand han var i 1892, og det ledte ham ind paa Tanken om at blive Præst og Missionær. Han var en Vinter paa Elk Horn Højskole, saa syv Aar paa Skolen i Blair og eet Aar paa Mt. Airy Seminarium i Philadelphia. Her betjente han vor St. Johannes Mgh. og fik Kald til at være dens Præst, hvorpaa han blev ordineret d. 18. Juni 1905 som eneste Kandidat under Aarsmødet i Cedar Falls, Ia. Han virkede i Philadelphia et Par Aar, blev saa Forstander for Brorson Højskole ved Kenmare, N. D., indtil han fik Kald fra Samfundet til at blive Pastor Winthers Medarbejder i vor Japanmission, hvortil han og hans første Hustru udrejste i Dec. 1909. Her udførte de et dygtigt Arbejde, og Nielsen blev senere Forstander for det fælleslutherske Seminar i Japan en Aarrække, indtil han i 1929 modtog Kald fra vor Kirke til Bestyrerposten for Trinitatis Seminarium i Blair. Som saadan tjente han indtil 1946, da hans Syn svækkedes og han bad om Afsked for at tage Aldershvile, som altsaa ikke helt realiseredes. Han hvilar hadet wed sit Arheide og Gud har velsignet det i
