Pastor encourages neighborliness between sync

Not long after coming to Northfield as pastor of St. Peter's Lutheran Church, the Rev. Kenneth H. Petersen was called upon to speak at the closing session of the annual convention of the United Evangelical Lutheran Church, according to a story in the Oct. 9, 1947, Northfield News — 50 years ago.

The convention was held at Owatonna. Several members of the local congregation attended sessions, according to the story. Mrs. C.N. Olson and Mrs. Mary Mikkelsen were the official delegates.

This was during Petersen's first residence in Northfield. For he returned here in retirement and only died four years ago.

He was born in August of 1918 at Coral, Mich., growing up on the family farm near Trufant, Mich. He graduated from high school at Coral and attended Lutheran Bible Institute in Minneapolis and Dana College at Blair, Neb. He received his bachelor's degree from Capitol University, Columbus, Ohio, and graduated from Trinity Seminary at Blair in 1944. He was ordained in June of that year.

That same month he married Ruth Hansen at Coulter, Iowa,

and they immediately moved to South Dakota. His first parish consisted of two rural churches, Spring Valley and Turkey Valley churches near Viborg.

At the beginning of December of 1946, he assumed new duties as pastor of two churches here — St. Peter's and a rural church that was closed several years ago, Immanuel Lutheran Church at Hazelwood. That church existed throughout the years of Petersen's ministry.

The six years and three months he served became, according to The News story upon Petersen's departure, the longest ministry in the history of the parish. He and his family left for Luverne, N.D., at the end of February, 1953.

During the farewell party at St. Peter's, the Rev. Boral R. Biorn, pastor of St. John's Lutheran Church, was among the speakers. Biorn revealed that this was the first time he had participated in a farewell party for a pastor outside his synod. A message from the St. John's board of deacons was also read during the program, thanking the Rev. Petersen for his share in the cooperation and neighborliness that had existed between the two

Lutheran churches. This was, of course, several years before the two churches — because of mergers — became members of the same synod.

At Luverne, Petersen served two churches that were members of two different synods. Luverne Lutheran Church was a member of the United Evangelical Lutheran synod in which he had been working, and the rural Hofva Lutheran Church, 12 miles away, was a member of the Augustana Synod. The churches were about 80 miles from Fargo.

Next Petersen served Shelby Lutheran Church in Iowa. From August of 1959 to November of 1966 he was pastor of Our Savior's Lutheran Church at Owatonna.

There were still more moves for the pastor and his wife:
Trinity and Thompson Valley
Lutheran churches near Mondovi,
Wis., from December of 1966 to
September of 1969; Grace
Lutheran Church at Marshfield,
Wis., until May 1975; Bethel and
St. John's churches at Marion,
Wis., until his retirement in
August of 1982.

The couple then moved to Northfield where a News story said, they enjoyed renewing old

friendships and making new ones.

Petersen's obituary said
briefly, "He enjoyed
woodworking as a hobby." A
feature story that appeared in The
News in 1951 proves that his
woodworking was much more
sophisticated that what is done by
many. He was pictured with a
handsome grandfather clock he
had just concluded making. He

had built the mahogany case between September and early November in his basement workshop.


He was quoted, "I don't hunt or fish, or even swim.

Woodworking is my hobby." He added that he had started working with wood when he was in high school even though the little school he attended in Michigan did not offer a course in manual training.

The News reporter looked at some other pieces around the house that the pastor had made. There were, for instance, a walnut kneehole desk with Duncan Phyfe desk chair; an oak cabinet; a table lamp of polished wood blocks and brass tubing; a cedar chest.

The grandfather clock case was 6 feet 4-1/2 inches tall ("taller by far than the old man himself," the pastor quoted a long-time favorite song about a grandfather clock). It was 19 inches wide and 13 inches deep. It was made Georgian style with broken pediments and a finial. Petersen decided on a glass door rather than paneling in front because he said that half of the joy of such a clock to him was being able to see the pendulum and the weights.

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The pastor revealed that a neighbor, Melvin Widman of the St. Olaf music faculty had joked that he was going to sing a dedicatory song upon the clock's completion. It was to go like this:

Bless this clock This day we pray; Keep me chiming Day by day.

"When my friend, Pastor Biorn, heard about that he said he might give a dedicatory speech," said Pastor Petersen. "But the other night we just lugged it up out of the basement without any fanfare."

Petersen died May 28, 1993, at Northfield Retirement Center. The funeral service was at St. Peter's and burial was in Northfield Cemetery. He was survived by Mrs. Petersen, two daughters, a son and seven grandchildren.

His obituary stated that he had often said he wanted to be known as one, who like Christ, "washed the feet" of those in need.
