## Brother of Blair Woman Given A Military Funeral Aubrey J. Sullivan, a brother

of Mrs. Herman Kuhl, of Blair, was buried April 4 at Enterprise, Alabama with military rites. He was a retired Army Officer and a Vice President of the Arkansas Aviation Sales Corp. at Little Rock, Arkansas. He had seen military action in China, the African campaign, Germany and Korea. He distinguished himself dur-

ing his last months by permitting doctors to administer a new drug to combat cancer, of which he was afflicted. The drug had been termed a "kill or cure" attempt to save his life. Although he lost his life, medical men attending him regarded his sacrifice as beneficial in the fight to learn more about cancer.

Mr. Sullivan was not known here, his only connection with this community being his sister, Mrs. Kuhl. He is survived by his widow and three sons.
