Nelle Lazure, One-Time Flood Hero, Is Dead

Nelle Lazure, well known Blair woman died at Memorial Community Hospital Monday, Although she had lived a quiet life during her declining years, she had at one time been very much in the news and brought honor to herself and to the company for which she worked.

Nelle Gertrude Lazure was born at Seymour, Iowa October 28, 1881 and was 86 years of age at the time of her death. She had come to Blair as a young woman and had been associated with friends and relatives here all of the time.

She was widowed when but a young woman and for a time she was employed as a clerk in Blair stores. Many years ago she became a telephone operator before the days of automatic dialing when operators were the "hub" of all telephone activity.

Mrs. Lazure won acclaim for herself in 1940 when she was working as a switchboard operator at Winnebago, Nebraska for the Northeastern Nebraska Telephone Company. It was in May of 1940 when heavy rains and finally a cloudburst sent the big Omaha creek on a rampage through the valley. The creek, which goes through the heart of Winnebago, suddenly swelled to the size of a raging river and the entire valley was flooded. Mrs. Lazure, sensing the danger which there was to residents in the farms up and down the valley, stuck to her post at the switchboard, methodically Continued On Page 1 Of Section 3

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calling family after family through the night warning them to leave their homes and flee. She stayed at the switchboard while water ran in across the floor, then became ankle deep and finally knee deep. She stayed on until the water put the switchboard out of commission.

Later in the night, with all lights out in the village and water swirling across the lawns and streets, Mrs. Lazure was taken out of the telephone building by several of the younger Indians of the reservation who had come to rescue her.

It was realized, after the flood, that her warnings had saved several families whose homes had been washed away and she was acclaimed a hero of the catastrophy.

On June of 1941 in special ceremonies attended by state officials and many notables, Mrs. Lazure was given the coveted Vail gold medal and a check for \$1,000 for her bravery. The Telephone Company was given a plaque attesting the incident and the plaque is in the lobby of the Blair telephone company offices today.

Mrs. Lazure is survived only by her brother, John Strode, of Norfolk, Nebraska.

Services were held at St. Francis Borgia Catholic Church Wednesday morning, April 10th with burial in Holy Cross Catholic Cemetery in Blair under the direction of the Campbell Mortuary.
