According to State Patrolman Fay Robeson of Fremont, an eastbound car driven by Woodcock was in collision with the rear end of a semi-trailer cattle truck driven by Thomas L. Herrboldt of rural Scotland, S. D.

Robeson said Herrboldt did not apply his brakes immediately after the collision for fear of wedging Woodcock's auto further under his truck. As a result, the Woodcock auto was dragged "some distance," according to the patrolman. He estimated that the Woodcock auto was totally destroyed.

The accident occurred about 1:30 a.m. Saturday. The Fremont rescue squad was called to take Woodcock to the hospital.

Former Blair Man Buried At Magnolia, Iowa
