## GENERAL STATEMENT.

### Origin and Aim.

Blair College and Trinity Theological Seminary was founded by the third annual convention of "The United Danish Evangelical Lutheran Church in America" resolving at Hutchinson, Minn., June 1899, to unite its two official schools,—the College founded in 1878 at Elk Horn, Iowa, and Trinity Seminary dedicated in 1886 at Blair, Nebraska. By virtue of the unanimous action at Hutchinson, Blair College and Trinity Theological Seminary is no private or self constituted institution, but it is the official interstate, national College of, and amenable to, "The United Danish Evangelical Lutheran Church in America," or in other words it is the child and servant, the work and pride, of the four hundred thousand Danish Americans, who like their parents in the fatherland, are an educated and an educating people.

What the University of Copenhagen is to the Danes in Denmark, that the Institution at Blair aims to be in some degree at least to the Danes in America by offering them all that can be found in an American College, with one great advantage in addition, which cannot be offered by any American school, namely; a thorough knowledge of the Danish language, spirit, life and literature, without crossing the ocean to Copenhagen University. Parents and the young people themselves upon reflection will easily understand all that is embraced in this last statement. Why go to College to learn foreign languages where you will forget your mother tongue and never learn its beauties and treasures? As it is universally acknowledged that the highest scholarship of the world is that of the Lutheran Church in Scandinavia and Germany, Lutherans prefer to attend Lutheran Schools.

In order to maintain and develop a College that will give our youth the best of the old as well as the best of the new world, four things are absolutely necessary. First, an able and experienced faculty; second, the most thorough and comprehensive course of study; third,

a large attendance of bright and hard-working students; fourth, liberal financial support. To secure these is the aim of the Institution.

### Location.

The College is located at Blair, Nebr., a thrifty little city of 3—4000 inhabitants, on the main lines of the C., St. P., M. and O. and the F. E. and M. V. R. R's., which intersect the city, thus affording excellent facilities for travel from every point of the compass. Blair lies only twenty-five miles north of the metropolis of Omaha, and has direct connection with Sioux City, Minneapolis, Chicago and other large cities of the East, West and Northwest.

The School is beautifully situated on the picturesque heights to the northwest of the city. It commands a splendid view of the city at its feet, and the broad Missouri valley with its "Big Muddy," and the rugged bluffs of Iowa in the far back-ground. The campus comprises three acres planted in ornamental and shade trees; it is cut by walks and drives, and dotted with flower beds and shrubbery.

### Buildings.

The College Hall, or main building, is a fine brick structure 110 feet long, 64 feet wide, and about 65 feet high, containing four stories. The first story contains the library, dining hall and recitation rooms. The second story contains the chapel, commercial hall, President's office, music room, and several spacious recitation rooms. The third and fourth stories are used as dormitories for the young men and the laboratory.

The Ladies' Hall is a neat three story brick building completed during the Fall of 1899. The first floor is occupied by the President and family; the second and third floors are used exclusively by the lady students. These rooms are all bright and cosy, heated by steam. A preceptress has charge of the building.

### Requirements for Admission.

No examination is required for admission to the Preparatory Class of the Academic School.

Applicants for admission to the Academic School must, however, pass a satisfactory examination in Arithmetic, U. S. History, Geography, English Grammar, Reading, and Composition. This examination will be as exhaustive as the case justifies.

Applicants for admission to the College must have completed the course prescribed in the Academic School or an equivalent course in some recognized school.

Theological students may enter the Seminary on completing the studies of the Seminary Preparatory School.

Certificates and diplomas from other schools will be accepted at their actual value.

## Trinitatis teologiske Seminarium.

## The Academic School.

This department offers a course of thorough preparatory training, and aims to fit students for college and to lay the foundation for future growth and attainments.

Students who have completed the prescribed course of study to the satisfaction of the Faculty are admitted to the Freshman Class of Blair College without further examination. A Certificate of Scholarship is granted all who pass the final examinations in this department.

Three years are required to complete the course. The middle and last year answer, in part, to the ordinary High School; the Preparatory Year is added for unclassified students, who have not the necessary requirements for admission to the Academic School, or who are hampered in their work by a too limited knowledge of the English language.



## The Normal Department.

In conformity with the design of this department, the courses of study have been planned with special reference to practicability and thoroughness. Three courses are offered.

*The Professional Course*, which embraces four years, prepares young men and women for all grades of public school work. An absolute mastery of all common branches is acquired before the professional branches are.

The three-year *First Grade Certificate Course* is very comprehensive, embracing all branches required in Nebraska and most other states in the Union for first grade certificate.

Special attention is called to the Danish Normal Course of two years. The rapidly increasing demand for trained teachers in the Lutheran parochial schools of the Danish settlements has made this course a necessity. It includes all branches taught in schools of this nature. A teacher proficient both in English and Danish will have no difficulty in securing work as teacher all the year round.

## Observations on the Professional Work.

## PHYSIOLOGY.

Physiology is studied because the teacher should know fully as much about the child's mental make-up as the functions of his body. Patrick's Physiology is used in a briefer course, and Sully's Hand-Book in Physiology, in the advanced course. The text books are supplemented by experiments and lectures.

## HISTORY OF EDUCATION.

The educational systems of this and other countries are studied and compared. The writings of the philosophers, such, as Plato, Bacon and Spencer are used, as are also the life-works of Froebel, Pestalozzi, and Mann.

## METHODS OF TEACHING AND SCHOOL MANAGEMENT.

These branches are illustrated from actual experience by a practical teacher of long professional standing. Raub, White and other good authorities are used.

## The Commercial Department.

Our aim is to develop *thorough* and *practical* business men and women. New classes including all the branches taught in the department are organized at the beginning of each term. The excellent *Ellis System of Actual Business* is used in the exclusion of all the text-book systems.
