The Langland Awards for creative writing were won this year by Carol Mengers, Blair, Nebr., for poetry, and Herbert Hjortsvang, Chicago, Ill., for prose. Both students are seniors at Dana College.

The prize-winning work appears in **The Sower** for 1949, just published. This fourth volume of Dana's literary anthology contains the work of twenty student authors and includes short stories, poetry, essays, and character sketches. Coming from all parts of the nation, these students present ideas from all points of view.

The Langland Awards of \$25 each are made annually by Joseph T. Langland, assistant professor of creative writing at the University of Wyoming.

Rural Education Workshop at Summer Session

Board Votes to Grant Scholarships Totaling \$5,000 for 1949-1950

A most significant and attractive scholarship plan for high school graduates has just been adopted by the Board of Trustees of Dana College. Under this new plan, high school graduates who plan to attend Dana may apply for a Board of Trustees Scholarship which is worth \$125. The Board desires to encourage worthy young men and women to attend a Christian college like Dana, and to achieve this objective, these forty scholarships are made available.

Any high school senior or graduate who plans to attend Dana next September, or any September hereafter, may write to the President of Dana College and ask for an application blank for one of these scholarships. The deadline for filing applications for these scholarships is August 1st. The scholarships will be awarded on a competitive basis, and the general qualifications require the student to have an excellent scholastic record from high school; to have participated in extra-curricular activities where he has given evidence of leadership; to be of good, sound Christian character; and finally—and very important—to be in need of assistance in order to attend college.

The Board of Trustees has given ten fifty-dollar

scholarships a year for many years. The Board wants to encourage young people to have the advantage of a college education at Dana, and it has therefore inaugurated this new plan. The general plan of distribution of these scholarships is by districts in the United Evangelical Lutheran Church as follows:

In addition to the twenty scholarships awarded to young people who are members of the United Evangelical Lutheran Church, twenty scholarships are being awarded to high school students who are graduating from high schools in Iowa and Nebraska communities within commuting distance of Blair. Awards of these scholarships, assigned to high schools on the basis of enrollment, are made by superintendents of the schools concerned.

The value of the scholarships totals \$5000 as compared with the \$500 worth of scholarships previously granted by the Board of Trustees.

Dana College Choir Wins New Friends on Western Tour



For the Dana College Choir the 1949 tour through western states brought new expressions of praise and appreciation. Nineteen full concerts were presented and the choir sang half-hour radio programs in Oregon, California, and Utah. One of the broadcasts was from KSL, Salt Lake City's 50,000-watt clear-channel station affiliated with CBS.

The Salt Lake Telegram said, "The choir is one of those rare examples of a 'live group.' This program of sacred choral music certainly deserves the

highest praises. The collegians brought a message of Christian love which is so needed at this time and the audience was in rapt attention."

Following a recent concert in Council Bluffs, Ia., Kathleen Shaw Miller, music critic of the *Nonpareil*, wrote "Under the direction of Paul E. Neve for the past six years, there has been a steady growth in the choir performance, which this year shows a high degree of perfection."

Victorious Vikings Are N.I.A.A. Champions



To bring home the N.I.A.A. conference trophy the Vikings won eleven out of the twelve contests. The only loss was handed to them by the Concordia Teachers of Seward, in an overtime battle. In conference play, the Vikings averaged 58.1 points per game, and held the opposition to 44.8 points per game.

In establishing the overall season record of 15-3, the Dana hoopsters began the season with a twelve game winning streak. This included double victories over McCook, Norfolk, and Fairbury, and single conquests of Midland, Tarkio, Milford, Con-

cordia, Nebraska Central, and Luther. Then came a three game losing streak, with losses to Tarkio, Concordia, and Midland. Coming out of the slump, the Red and White resumed their pace taking the last three games of the season, with victories over Milford, Nebraska Central, and Luther.

Bud Robinson led the Vikings in scoring, for the second consecutive year, with 228 points. Jim "Shorty" Youmans was second high man with a total of 220 points. The scoring for the other first stringers is as follows: Bob Nelson 190, Paul Laur- sen 185, and Wilbur Clements 107.
