GIFTS WELCOMED BY LIBRARY

The College Library received a fifty dollar gift for the purchase of additional books from Walter B. Hansen, '10, of Arlington Heights, Illinois. Mr. Hansen has for several years given the library subscriptions for the Chicago Tribune as well as Vital Speeches, and has remembered the library on many other occasions by sending other books.

Shortly before Christmas there came a letter from a gentleman asking if the Dana College Library could make use of some books from his library. In response to the affirmative answer which he received, there has come to the library from Charles A. Heinze of Chicago, a number of books of fiction, travel, biography, and business—welcome additions, indeed.

TRAVELLING ABROAD

Dr. H. F. Swansen, Dean of the Faculty, and Professor of History, is spending the entire summer vacation period travelling in Europe as manager of three separate travel tours. One tour will be taken to the capitals of northern European countries—England, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, The Netherlands, Belgium, and France. Then he will make two tours (pilgrimages) to Rome, via several of the most interesting and historical cities of France, including Nice on the French Riviera, and also cities in northern Italy.

It is certain that the members of the three groups will receive much interesting information along the way from Dr. Swansen, as he is a keen student of European History, and also has travelled much of the same territory a few years prior to World War II. And his classes in European History in the fall will benefit greatly from his current travels and observations in post-war Europe.

ALUMNI LANDSCAPING PROJECT STARTED

The first installment of the long-range landscaping project has been completed. Trees, shrubs, and ivy have been planted on three sides of "Old Main," and a beautiful 25-foot oak is now growing in the courtyard formed by the western extension of the north and south wings of "Old Main."

The Association has voted to set aside \$500 annually for the landscaping of the campus, and the major effort for the next two or three years will be placed in the area surrounding the old administration building. Following the completion of this, the middle and lower campus sections will be completed. If the funds become available more quickly than presumed, there is the suggestion of continuing onto the new athletic area.

CHANGES IN FACULTY FOR 1950-1951 SCHOOL YEAR ANNOUNCED

A number of changes in faculty personnel will be noticeable when the fall term begins. Two of the present professors, Frank Hengeveld (Chemistry), and Arthur Lindberg (Math, Physics), have been granted a year's leave of absence to carry on graduate work at the University of Nebraska. They will return to Dana in September, 1951. On the Trinity Seminary staff, Professor Paul Nyholm has been granted a semester's leave of absence to do research work to complete requirements for his Ph.D. degree at the University of Chicago.

Three of the present faculty members will not return to Dana next fall: Miss Cordelia Alderson (Latin, Greek), Melvin Widman (Voice), and Robert Jones (Sociology).

Professor Clifford Hanson will teach Greek, and Mr. Richard Videbeck, D48,

CHOIR PLANS TOUR OF EASTERN STATES

Deviating from tradition, the Dana College A Cappella Choir will make its 27th annual concert tour in November of this year, rather than in the spring of 1951. A tentative schedule has been made which includes concert appearances in Iowa, Illinois, Missouri, Indiana, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Washington, D.C., New York, Massachusetts, Maine, Michigan, and Canada.

The schedule calls for the choir leaving College Hill on November 9, and returning November 29, and again the tour will be made in two buses. Not since 1935 has the Dana Choir been in the eastern section of the country, and it is hoping to extend its reputation to this area from where many of our students come.

ATHLETIC AREA NEARS COMPLETION

During the Easter vacation, work on the athletic area progressed rapidly with the assistance of donated labor and equipment. The Hancock Farm Implement Co. of Herman, Nebraska, donated grass seed and gave technical suggestions for the best method of seeding the area. The Tyson-Long Company of Blair loaned equipment, as did Merton Jensen, D34. Mr. Carl Jensen loaned his tractor and donated a day's labor. Mr. Simon Korshoj, 27-29, owner of the Korshoj Construction Co. of Blair, and builder of Pioneer Memorial, presented a gift of \$1,000 to the athletic area fund. The contributions of these individuals and companies has enabled the work to progress speedily, and it is hoped that the tennis courts will be completed for use in the fall, together with the football practice field.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEET

Members of the College Board of Trustees held their semi-annual meeting in April here on the campus, at which time approval of application for North Central accreditation in the fall of 1951 was given the administration. Also it was the Board's recommendation that no large sum be spent to completely modernize and renovate Old Main. It was decided that sufficient funds be used to maintain Old Main in good operating condition, but that

in the long run it would be wiser to construct new facilities and therefore concentrate funds for that purpose.

ENTRANCE SCHOLARSHIPS AVAILABLE TO GRADUATES

sound Christian character; and finally—and very important—to be in need of assistance in order to attend college.

FACULTY STUDY PLAN OUTLINED

A graduate study plan for the members of the College faculty has been outlined. Under the plan the faculty members will receive a stipend from the college for graduate work during the summer months. The program is in line with the Aid To Growth plan of the North Central Association, and in formulating the plan, the suggestions made by Dr. Neal in his N.C. A. report of last year are being acted upon. A similar program is being considered for Seminary faculty members whereby they would receive aid during the school year for graduate study.

The Nebraska Association of Church Colleges held their annual meeting Saturday, April 15, on the Dana Campus. The Association, to which Dana was host, is an organization of long standing, composed of the twelve church colleges in the state. Governor Val Peterson addressed the assembly at the morning session. The 880-yard Relay was won by John Hansen, Jim Hansen, Bill Hansen, and Roland Seegers in 1:33.4. The 880-yard Relay team also ran the 440-yard Relay and won in 4:47. In the distance medley Concordia won in a close finish when Bob Coffey, trailing 35 yards at the pass, nearly beat out the Concordia anchor man. In the field events Tug Allen broke his own record in the shot put, heaving it 40 feet to beat his old record of 38 feet, 1 7/8 inches.
