## Melchior Presents Concert Here

Wednesday evening, October 25, was a memorable one for 1025 people who heard a concert by Mr. Lauritz Melchior, star of stage, screen, radio, television, and opera. A member of the Metropolitan Opera for twenty years, Mr. Melchior came to be known as the greatest of all Wagnerian tenors.

Each number presented was a thrill for the entire audience—the largest ever assembled in the auditorium. And he was very gracious in presenting encores after each group of numbers.

Perhaps the most wonderful moments of the entire evening came when Mr. Melchior sang "Den Store Hvide Flok" with the Dana choir. There is good reason to believe that this number has never been done more beautifully than it was at that time on the stage of our own auditorium.



Mr. Melchior's program ranged from the heaviest of operatic selections, to semi-classical, to popular, and to a small child's song which he had learned as a boy, and which he sang in his native tongue.

After the concert, a "kaffebord" was held in the Dining Room, at which occasion both Mr. and Mrs. Melchior proved to be most congenial, and each having a great sense of humor.

It is sincerely hoped that Mr. Melchior will return in the near future and present another program in our auditorium.

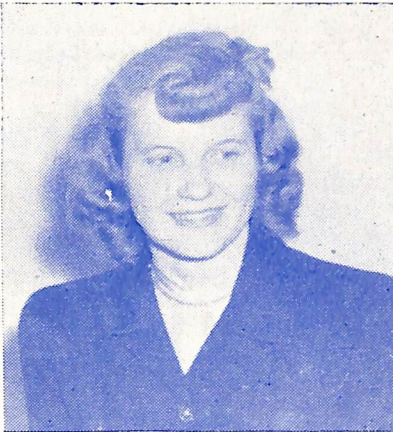

## Dana Choir Enjoys Successful Tour



The Dana College A Cappella Choir has returned from its 27th annual concert tour which took the 48 singers through 4500 miles of 12 Eastern Coast states and Canada in three weeks. Seventeen complete concerts were sung besides numerous appearances in which the choir sang only part of its program. Prof. Paul E. Neve conducted the choir for his 8th season.

Impressive comments and praises from music critics, civic music conductors, and appreciative audiences again emphasize the fact that the Dana Choir is one of the nation's first rank choirs. Mr. Otis C. Williams, Jr., eminent music critic of the Portland, Maine, **Press Herald**, summarized the expressions of many music lovers who heard the Dana Choir when he wrote, "The Dana Choir is an excellent one, as good or better than any chorus to appear here in recent years. There was not a single unmusical moment during the program. The choir sings with a fresh liquid tone which is a credit to both their voices and their director. It is a strongly-balanced organization with good soloists and everything that it did vocally was clearly executed. Neve directs with precision and feeling and his choir is exceptionally well disciplined for one which sings with such

freedom of expression and apparent lack of effort."

Conductors of college choirs at Capital University and Augustana College were amazed at the ability of the Dana Choir to take a tour so early in the school year. Because of the high degree of success attained on this autumn tour, the Dana Choir is planning next year to again take its tour in the fall of the year rather than in the spring as has been the custom in the past, according to conductor Paul E. Neve.

The head of the department of organ at Butler University, Indianapolis, and the director of the civic men's chorus of Indianapolis expressed highest praises for the choir. Especially striking to them was the good diction and phrasing with which the choir sings. Neve's own number included on the program, "Hold High the Torch," was greatly lauded by these critics.

A Lutheran pastor expressed his opinion in this way: "People will forget a sermon in a few days or weeks, but a concert like the one given by the Dana Choir will last for years."

"From the standpoint of the people reached, this tour was one of the most

successful tours and it has been a real pleasure to accompany such a fine group," stated James R. Hansen, tour manager.

Conductor Paul E. Neve expressed that, "From the musical standpoint, this Dana Choir is the best musical representation Dana has ever had in my time. The choir displayed the best singing throughout the tour of any Dana Choir I have directed."

In Chicago, recordings were made by the Dana Choir for RCA Victor Records. These records will be released in an album at a time to be announced later. The recording engineer at RCA commented that the choir has one of the finest young soprano and alto sections he has heard. He felt that their ability to blend is unusual.

The choir appeared personally over several radio broadcasts originating from St. Louis, Chicago, and New York City. The St. Louis station (KFUD), a leading music station in St. Louis requested recordings of the choir to be used in further broadcasting after hearing the choir sing. The New York City appearance was over the American Broadcasting Company (ABC) network and was released over a nationwide hookup on Thanksgiving Day.

In addition to the concerts, the choir enjoyed escorted tours in Washington, D.C., and New York City. Highlights of the tour also were the visits and concerts at sister Lutheran Colleges in Columbus, Ohio (Capital University), Oneonta, N.Y. (Hartwick College), Rock Island, Ill. (Augustana College), and Des Moines, Ia. (Grand View College).

Other concerts are being planned for Omaha, Council Bluffs, and other points in the midwest early next spring.

### **CONTRACT LET FOR '51 DANIAN**

The contract for the publication of the 1951 DANIAN has been let to the Nonpareil Photo Engraving Company of Council Bluffs, Iowa. The annual will be printed by a process entirely different from what has been used in previous years—the photo-offset or lithographic process. According to the editor, the use of this method will make it possible to have more and larger pictures in the DANIAN.

### **SCHOLARSHIP AWARDED DANA SENIOR**

Beginning this year, the Lutheran Brotherhood Life Insurance Society will award, annually, a \$300.00 scholarship to one student from each of the 28 Lutheran colleges in the United States. Recipients of the award are chosen by a committee at each school. Qualities such as religious leadership and scholastic standing will be considered in making the selection. The student will be named during the last part of his Junior year and the scholarship will be awarded at the beginning of his senior year. This year, however, the award was made to a senior student, and the selection of the committee at Dana College was Lyle Jacobsen of Coon Rapids, Iowa. Mr. Jacobsen has a grade point average, for the past three years, of 2.47. He has been a member of the College choir for three years, and is again a member this year. He has also been a member of the College band for one and one-half years. He was elected editor of the 1950-1951 "Danian"—the college year-book. His major subject is Business Administration, and his minor is Accounting. During the past summer he worked at the Washington County Bank in Blair.

### **LIBRARY PROGRESS**

New books added to the Dana College and Trinity Seminary library during the past summer totaled 386. Since the 1950-51 school term began, a total of 680 new books have been added, which makes a grand total of 1066. However, this does not mean that the library is not in need of books and publications. There are many volumes and sets which are very necessary for qualification for North Central accreditation, a few of which were listed in the Foundation issue of the Dana College Bulletin, which you received earlier this month.

The books which have been added are related to the fields of fine arts, literature, sociology, history, science, language, philosophy, psychology, and religion, plus volumes of biography, reference, fiction, and general works. Numerous volumes of current magazines, and back issues of magazines have been bound in book form.

## **FIVE DANA SENIORS CHOSEN FOR '50-'51 EDITION OF "WHO'S WHO"**

Five Dana seniors will receive recognition in the 1950-51 edition of "Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges." 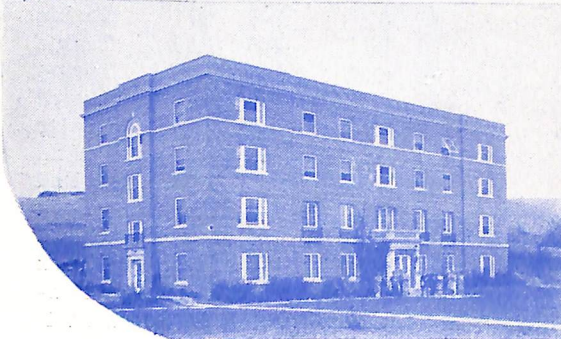
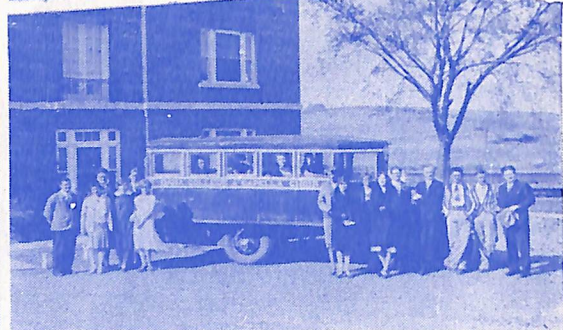
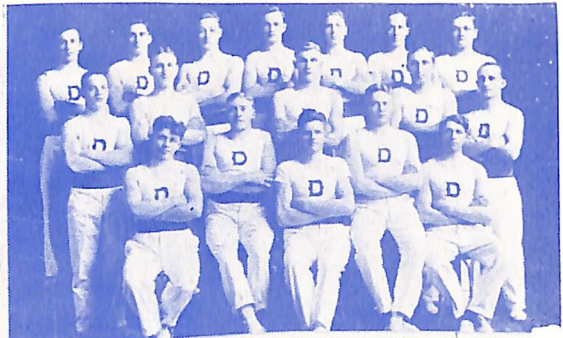
