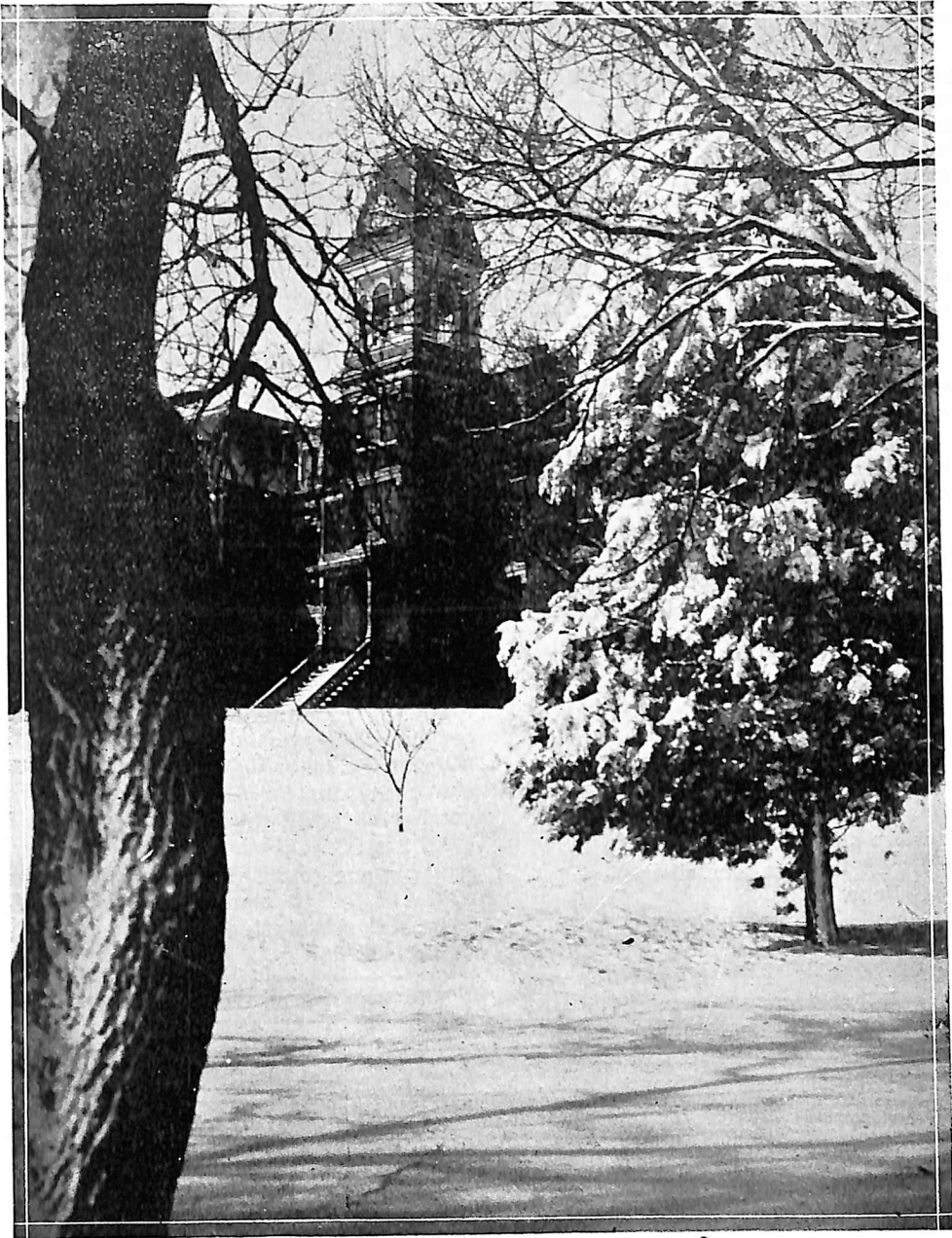

HOW TO AVOID A CRISIS

Many are approaching another of the roadblocks encountered in life. Some fellow-alumni are now serving our country in the armed forces. Others will be doing so in the near future. Many present-day Dana students, and potential Dana students will not be permitted to continue their education next autumn or for a few autumns to come, because of this requirement. In the meantime, what is to happen to Dana? It has survived crises before, but can it stand another? If the alumni say YES, then we know it can. And there is a strong surge of feeling which denotes confidence that the answer will be YES.

What does it mean to say YES in this situation? It means honest, sincere, and whole-hearted cooperation in supporting the work of student recruitment. The clerical alumni are doing an excellent work in giving information about potential students. Superintendent- and teacher-alumni are doing the same. But one thing more: continue to promote Dana in conversation with these prospects. If you desire catalogs, scholarship or other information, contact this office.

It means financial support—strong financial support. It costs \$263,560 (1950-51 budget) to operate for one year on the basis of 250 students. Of this amount, \$50,000 has been subscribed by the UELC, and the balance comes from all other sources. In the event of an emergency arising, it means red ink.

Three possibilities arise as to methods of financial aid:

1. More students.
2. Direct financial contribution to Dana College.
3. Membership in the Dana College Foundation.

Some alumni are supporting Dana through all three of these methods, many are doing so through two, and a great many through one. Every particle of aid and assistance is received in most sincere gratefulness, and yet, as though it were not enough, more is being asked. All through the nation the alarm has gone out to alumni, because alumni loyalty

Paul Simon, 46-48, of Troy, Illinois, the vice-president of our Alumni Association, has recently gained prominence in the national political scene. He is waging a battle against gambling and all other forms of corruption in Madison County, Illinois, located just east of St. Louis, Missouri. On February 23, he was called to testify before the Kefauver Committee, which is investigating crime throughout the nation.



Paul, now 22, left Dana at the end of his junior years to become the publisher and editor of the weekly "Troy Tribune," and has been featured in several articles appearing in the St. Louis "Post-Dispatch," and more recently in the February 12th

issue of "Newsweek" magazine.

One of his recent successful crusades was to petition the State's Attorney for a grand jury investigation of law officers whom Paul had accused of knowingly tolerating gambling-law violations. Then he immediately asked that the state's bar association take disciplinary action against the State's Attorney himself for not having taken action previously.

As a student, Paul was active in various campus activities. He was associate editor of the "Danian" in his sophomore year, and president of the student body while a junior.

NEW STUDENT LOUNGE

It isn't every day that a college or seminary professor earns the distinction of having taught for twenty-five years at one institution, but when the present school year is completed May 27, two members of the college and seminary faculties will have taught here at our Alma Mater for that length of time.



It was in 1910 that a new teacher came to Dana Hill and began to teach English. Miss Nellie Falk struggled with the young hopefuls of that day, which included many an immigrant lad who wanted to "get on" in the new country. From 1910 to 1932, with three years of work and study elsewhere, Miss Falk filled her place nobly in the ranks of Dana teachers. In 1944 Miss Falk came back to Dana and has been an inspiration to her students again as she was up to 1932.

Dr. C. B. Larsen joined the faculty of Dana and Trinity in 1925, and when he hangs away his doctoral robes after the annual commencement exercises next May 27, he, too, will have taught twenty-

five years at Dana and Trinity. From 1925 to 1945 Dr. Larsen taught the courses in the New Testament department in the seminary as well as philosophy and Greek in the college. Following the seminary recess in 1945-46 Dr. Larsen has taught exclusively in the seminary.

Alumni and friends of Dana and Trinity are grateful for the inspiration and leadership these two loved and respected teachers have shown us, and they will be honored at testimonial dinners April 4 and 11. The college dining hall will be the scene of the dinner for Miss Falk April 4 at 6:00 p.m., and on April 11 at 5:30 p.m. a dinner in Dr. Larsen's honor will be held in the parlors of First Lutheran Church in Blair. Friends of Miss Falk and Dr. Larsen and alumni of Dana College and Trinity Seminary are invited to attend either or both of these dinners. Cost of the testimonial dinner tickets is \$1.25.



We salute Miss Falk and Dr. Larsen, grateful to God and to them for the ministry of twenty-five years and we look forward to many additional years of leadership and inspiration from these consecrated Christian teachers.

"HERMES" TO BE TRANSFORMED

During most of the 32 years in which the **Hermes** has been "the messenger from Dana," it has been published in the familiar 12x18inch, 5-column format. Beginning with the next issue, however, a transformation will take place. The new **Hermes** will be smaller in size—4-column, 9x12 inches—but will be published bi-weekly instead of tri-weekly. More pictures and new features will be added. This new size and makeup will be in keeping with modern trends in college newspaper journalism.

"STAFF AND NOTES"

Seventeen students make up the cast of the Dana student body exchange program, "Staff and Notes," which is the first attempt at a program designed primarily as an exchange evening with other colleges. The program consists of two vocal solos, mixed quartet, three piano solos, violin solo, humorous chalk talk, ballet number, male quartet, duet, play, and a chorus consisting of the entire cast. The feature of the program is an original song composed by Carl Nielsen, Blair senior, with words by Lois Girtz, senior from Albert Lea, Minnesota.

The other colleges which are cooperating in this project are Concordia Teachers in Seward, Nebraska, Nebraska Wesleyan in Lincoln, Nebraska, and Grand Ciew in Des Moines, Iowa.

SERVICE ALUMNI TO BE CONTACTED

The student body has instituted plans to make and retain contact with Dana alumni serving in the armed forces. Present plans include mailing the **Hermes**, sending individual letters from students, and keeping an up-to-date file of service addresses.

FIRE ALARM SYSTEM INSTALLED

Four years ago on Easter Sunday morning, President Mortno began climbing the front steps of "Old Main" on his way to make final preparations for the sunrise service. Casually glancing toward the south, he noticed, through the cracks in the doorway into the south wing, a gleam of crimson light. In making a closer inspection, he found flames reaching to the ceiling of the first floor. A few moments later, however, the Blair Fire Department had extinguished the blaze. Since that time, there has been a fear of the devastating effect a fire would have on "Old Main" if given but a few moments' start.

During the Christmas vacation, at a cost of \$1,538, insurance against more than a very few moments' start of a fire was installed in the form of a fire alarm system. A small instrument, very sensitive to heat, was installed in each room, and this instrument sets off the alarms both inside and outside the building.

PHYSICAL PLANT COMPLETELY GAS-HEATED

The strikes of the coal miners and the resultant shortage of coal will no more affect the operation of scholastic endeavors nor the physical comfort of those living and working in the buildings on the campus because of the recent installation of gas conversion units in the boilers and the laying of gas mains to "Old Main" and to both dormitories. At a total cost of \$6,328.40 the entire physical plant is now heated by gas.

WASH FOR A QUARTER

Two new Maytag automatic washing machines have recently been installed in the Ladies Dormitory. The cost of doing one wash is a small amount of soap plus twenty-five cents, which is used to help defray the initial cost of the machines, plus maintenance and water. The men are envious and live in hopes that two machines will be installed in their dormitory as soon as possible.

STUDENT LOUNGE RECEIVES WELCOMED ADDITION

The student body recently received a most appealing and entertaining gift in the form of a new television and radio-phonograph combination for the newly decorated and furnished student lounge in the Men's Dormitory. The set, which is housed in a blonde mahogany cabinet, contains a 17-inch television screen, a three-speed record player, a record cabinet, and a radio.

The set is a gift from Mrs. T. C. Hansen and Miss Mildred Jepsen, of Cedar Falls, Iowa, and it was given with the intention of providing hours of good entertainment in a Christian, home-like atmosphere. From all indications, the set and the lounge have been in constant use since the redecorating project was completed.

CANTEEN GETS "FLOOR-LIFTING"

After many years of faithful service, the floor in the College Canteen is being replaced with new and modern asphalt tile. The color of the tile floor will be black with a white marble effect, and a red border will be placed around the edges in the two rooms. Work began last week with the laying of a sub-floor in preparation for the tile, and it is hoped that the job will be completed in two weeks.

OLD MAIN LOOTED

Burglars made a daring entry into "Old Main" early Wednesday morning, March 7, and looted cash, checks, and merchandise valued at \$763.85. Every classroom, faculty office, and storeroom on the first two floors was entered, including the book store and canteen. In addition to cash and checks, the intruders took pens, pencils, cigarettes, "T" and sweat shirts, and briefcase, personal items belonging to employees, and three galvanometer telescopes from the office of Milton Brostrum, math and physics instructor.

EXCLUSIVE

The Sociology Department is offering an evening course this semester in Group Dynamics. The course is oriented toward helping classroom teachers understand their classes as groups and the effects of group factors on their teaching. Twenty-one teachers from Burt, Douglas, and Washington Counties are enrolled. Professor Richard Videbeck, D48, the instructor, studied under the staff of the Research Center for Group Dynamics at the University of Michigan. It is believed that this is the first such course to be offered in any educational institution in the state of Nebraska.

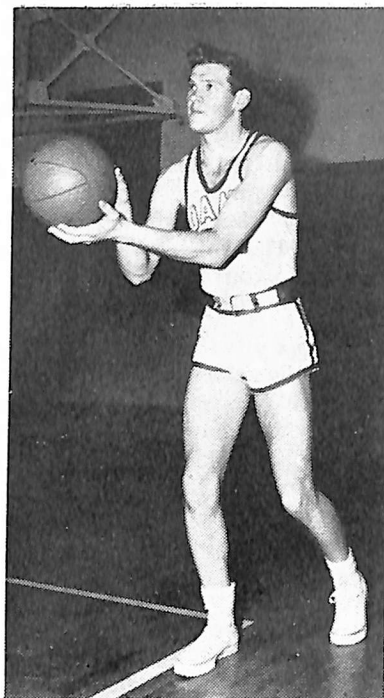

**INDIVIDUAL SCORING TITLE TO

STRAIGHT YEAR**

Lloyd Lorensen, junior from Brush, Colorado, copped the individual scoring title for the second straight year as he tallied 257 points for the Viking cagers. Lorensen registered 100 field goals and 57 free throws.

Bob Nelson, junior from Racine, Wisconsin, captured runnerup honors just as he did last year by totaling 228 points. Paul Laursen, senior from Ord, Nebraska, took over third place by virtue of his 19 points scored in the final game against Tarkio College. Laursen scored 201 points to 191 for Harold McKercher, Blair junior, who was unable to participate in the Tarkio contest due to injuries.

Lorensen also set the season's single game record with 29 points against Tarkio there. It was just three points short of the Viking record set by Ray Olsen, 35-37, against Nebraska Central.



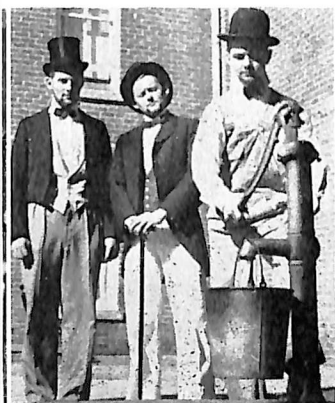
