**DOUGLAS FOR PRESIDENT  
CLUB ORGANIZED**

"Paul Douglas for President" was the central motive of a meeting which was held on April 6th on the Dana campus. Inspired by Paul Simon, editor of the Troy (Ill.) Tribune and vice-president of the Alumni Association, a large group of students gathered to hear the inside life story of the Senator from Illinois and then agreed to organize a club to further his cause in the state of Nebraska.

John Nielsen was elected president of the club and Bob Hemingson, secretary. According to the new leaders, it is the hope of the club to place the name of Senator Douglas on the primary ballot in Nebraska next spring. It takes one hundred signatures of electors in each of the four Congressional districts to place a name on the ballot. The club intends to form teams to accomplish this.

John Nielsen stated, "In all fairness we would like to make it clear that this club is organized by a group of students and does not necessarily reflect the views of the administration or faculty."

**SUMMER SESSIONS**

Dana again this summer offered two sessions of summer school. The regular session was conducted from June 4th through July 27th and the post session was from July 30th through August 17th. Professor Ranheim of the Education Department was the Director of both sessions.

**"FACELIFTING"**

Renovation of the south wing of "Old Main" is being undertaken. The canteen, on the ground floor, has received a new tile floor, and has been partially repainted. The hall flooring, outside the canteen, is to be replaced. All the music practice rooms are being remodeled and sound-proofed with the use of fir-tex and masonite board.

The interior of the men's dormitory—halls, washrooms, and student rooms have been repaired and painted. A variety of colors—pleasing and bright pastels—was used in the dormitory rooms.

**SENIORS RANK HIGH**

On the Graduate Record Examination, a nationwide test for graduating seniors, Dana College seniors of 1951 averaged in the 63rd percentile, or higher than almost two of every three college seniors.

Dana College has made use of these General Education Tests for the past three years, requiring all graduating seniors to take them. The test battery, which takes three half-days to complete, measures the student's background in the following areas: mathematics, physical sciences, biological sciences, social sciences, literature, the arts, effectiveness of expression, and vocabulary, plus an added advanced test in the student's major area of study. A general education index, which is an average of all these tests combined determined the 63rd percentile ranking of the Dana seniors.

Because of its interest in the quality of work of its students, Dana College makes use of the Graduate Record Examination for measuring its seniors. As a group, the Dana seniors ranked above average in every one of the areas in the Tests of Gen-

eral Education, ranging from the 51st to the 75th percentile.

Dana College is included in the group of approximately one out of every five degree-granting institutions of higher education giving these tests.

### LUTHERAN BROTHERHOOD AWARD

"The Lutheran Brotherhood of Minneapolis, Minnesota, awards at Commencement a cash scholarship to a Junior Lutheran student, who, in the opinion of the college committee, deserves such recognition, taking into consideration the religious leadership of the student, his scholastic standing, and other qualities, as the committee may determine. The amount of the scholarship is \$300.00, and this sum is presented the winner in the fall term upon his return to college."

The above paragraph is quoted from the Dana College Catalog and describes the award which went to Paul V. Hansen, Jr., of Blair, for the school year of 1951-52. Paul is a senior and is majoring in chemistry. During his three years at Dana he has been very active in the science club, band, and more recently, as school photographer.

### VIKINGS LOSE OPENER, 6-0

A spectacular catch by a Midland end amid two Dana defenders spoiled the Viking's opener at Vet's Field, September 15, 6-0.

The 21-yard aerial settled the evenly fought issue in the third quarter. The Warrior drive started on their own 38-yard line.

Mark Thomsen, Dana's triple-threatener, was carried from the field early in the fourth quarter with a broken leg. He will be lost for the season.

Most of the first quarter was played in Midland territory with Dana driving to the Warrior 30 and 15-yard lines but failing to score.

Late in the period a Midland back gathered in a Dana lateral from Leonard Jackson intended for Jim Kruse and ran 47 yards to the Viking seven. Thomsen nailed him from behind to save a touchdown. Dana stiffened and threw Midland back to the 16 and took over on downs.

Midland drove to the Dana 24-yard line in the second quarter but a pass intercepted by Jackson intervened.

In the fourth Dana drove to Midland's 19-yard line and later to the 28 but both drives fizzled.

Dana's line performed well on defense with notable performances being turned in by Bud Johnson, Bun Lorensen and Vernon Svendsen. Offensively, the Dana line didn't produce the blocks.

On one occasion Thomsen appeared touchdown bound on a reverse but stumbled.

## Our Library and its Needs

The Dana College and Trinity Seminary library has its own quarters in the Pioneer Memorial building. It consists of a librarian's office, a large workroom, four fireproof tiers (floors) of book and magazine stacks, a large and extremely well-lighted reading room, and a room planned as a "browsing" room, but currently used by students as a library typing room. Enough stack shelving was placed for two full tiers, but the shelves have been temporarily spread over three tiers. Tier one houses the text-book collection, Trinity Seminary magazines, and a large number of valuable editions. Tier two houses the college book collection, to which additions are being made as rapidly as possible. Tier three contains Trinity Seminary books and bound and unbound volumes of current magazines. Tier four contains the Danish collection, the government publications, out-of-circulation magazines,

and the elementary text-books, latest editions of magazines and newspapers, and several selections of books for "browsing" purposes. Interest and color has been added to the room by the display of the Art Department. The Library Committee hopes to add items of Danish handicraft and Danish Americana, to be displayed above the book shelves, and will appreciate presentations of such items from Dana friends.

Many of the volumes in the library have come as gifts from alumni and friends of Dana and Trinity, presented either in the form of books or of financial contributions. Through these gifts a large amount of valuable and necessary material has been added to the library. The book collection is growing, but there is still a pressing need for volumes in various areas, such as these listed below:

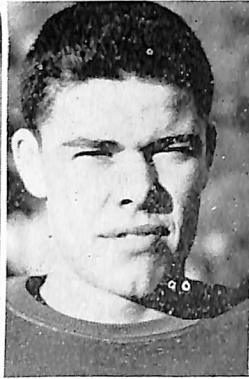

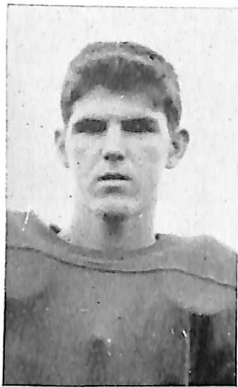

## ANNUAL REPORT OF DANA FOUNDATION ACTIVITIES

The Dana College Foundation is a new organization among the alumni and friends of Dana College, having been organized and put into operation less than two years ago. In this short period it has become an asset in financing Christian Higher Education at Dana College, and it can become an even greater aid in this undertaking.

Members of the Dana Foundation have contributed \$6,134.60 to the Foundation's work during the period June 6, 1950 to August 31, 1951. These gifts were given in the following manner ;

Of these contributions, \$4,924.65 came from individual members of the Foundation, making the average contribution \$18.17. Thirty-four business firms, church organizations and societies, Dana Clubs, the Iowa District of the U. E. L. C., etc., contributed \$1,209.95.

Since the Foundation was first approved by the 1949 convention of the U. E. L. C. and its launching in December of that year, its members have contributed a total of \$10,850.60.

From this report it can be seen that Foundation members have been a good help this past year in the operation of Dana College. The contribution to the general budget of \$4,200 has meant that the Church, which is contributing heavily to Christian Higher Education already, has been relieved of that load.
