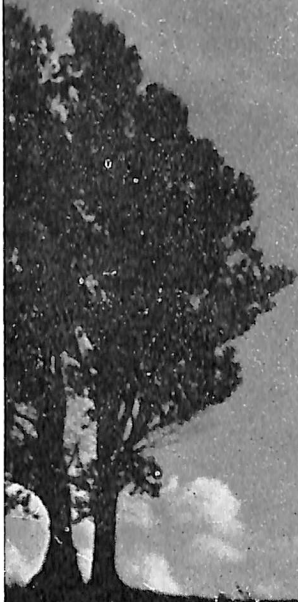

97 cards returned with 117 names. (In addition many alumni sent letters and post cards each containing several names.)

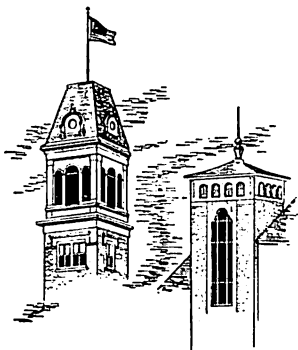
Prospective Student Cards

FACULTY MEMBER RECEIVES DOCTORATE

Elmer Rasmussen, dean of Dana College, was awarded the doctor of Philosophy degree by the Graduate College of the University of Nebraska at the conclusion of the first semester of the 1951-52 year. The subject of Dr. Rasmussen's major was educational psychology and measurements, with school administration as his minor.

Dr. Rasmussen graduated from Dana College with a bachelor of arts degree in 1939 and received his M. A. from the teachers College of Columbia University in 1940. He has been studying at the University of Nebraska since 1949, taking leave of absence from the college staff for the 1948-49 school year.



Upon his graduation from Columbia University, Dr. Rasmussen served on the faculty of Talladega College, a negro college at Talladega, Alabama, for one year. He had been on the Dana faculty from 1941 through 1948 as professor of education and came back in 1949 to assume the position of Dean of the College.

P. E. FRAT FORMED AT DANA

The physical education majors at Dana have organized into a society under the name, Phi Epsilon Delta. Officers elected in the new organization are K. L. Christensen, Tekamah, Nebr., president; Douglas Johnson, Duluth, Minn., Vice-President; Jack Allen, Greenville, Mich., Secretary-Treasurer; and Bill Hansen, Cedar Falls, Ia., Referee. The faculty representative and sponsor is Coach Keith Skogman.

Organized as a service group, the Phi Epsilon Delta has as its main objectives the development of themselves professionally and socially, and the development of Dana College in every way possible. In the fulfillment of these objectives the frat is working on a number of projects.

One of these projects is the publishing of a pamphlet to be sent to various superintendents in the area with the purpose of assisting graduates in locating jobs. The organization sponsored a seven-match amateur boxing event in the auditorium Thursday, March 27, with several of the Midwest Golden Gloves Champions participating.

BLAIR CIVIC CONCERT ASSOCIATION FORMED

Announcement was recently made of the organization of the Blair Mutual Concert Association. The association will work in cooperation with the college in sponsoring concert artists. All concerts will be held in the Dana College auditorium.

The association has been formed for the purpose of bringing quality entertainment to the Blair area. In the past the college has booked and underwritten all artists as a part of its lyceum program. Such a set-up, however, places a heavy burden of expense on the college.

Memberships in the association are now being sold in the Blair area at \$5 for a season of at least three concerts. Students will automatically become members of the association as part of their activity fee.

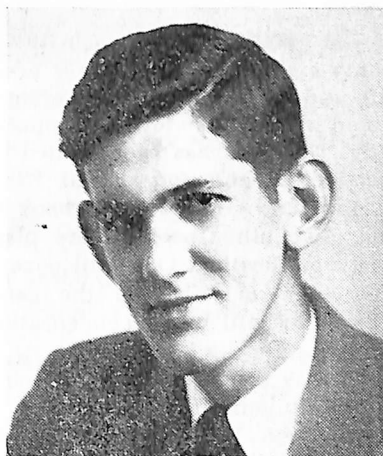
SOIL TESTING LAB ESTABLISHED AT DANA

FOUR-YEAR SCHOLARSHIP PLAN ESTABLISHED BY TRUSTEES

Four-year \$500 Honor Scholarships have been established by the board of trustees of Dana College for entering freshman students. These new scholarships are available to students in selected high schools within a radius of 100 miles of Blair and in high schools where young people who are members of U. E. L. C. churches are in attendance.

The scholarship qualifications are: 1. Rank scholastically in the upper 25 per cent of the graduating class. 2. Have above average record of participations in extra-curricular activities. 3. Be of good sound moral character. 4. Recommended by competent persons, normally by high school officials. In the large metropolitan areas the highest ranking high school senior in a U. E. L. C. congregation, if he qualifies, will be awarded a scholarship since the churches have such a small representation in these large schools.

The recipients will receive \$125 tuition credit in the second semester of their freshman year and of each succeeding year in which they qualify. To qualify for this scholarship each year the student must achieve at least a 1.50 grade point average (of a possible 3.00) in his freshman year, a 1.75 in his sophomore and a 2.00 in his junior year.

Madsen led the memorial service held for these students in the Pioneer Memorial chapel, Sunday, Jan. 13, at which Dr. R. E. Morton and John Nielsen, Trinity seminary student who was at the scene of the accident spoke.

MEMORIAL FUND ESTABLISHED FOR THREE DANA STUDENTS

Memorial gifts totaling \$654 have thus far been received in memory of three Dana students involved in the tragic accident last Christmas. The money has been given for memorial shelves of books in the library reading room.

DANA JOINS NEW BASEBALL LEAGUE

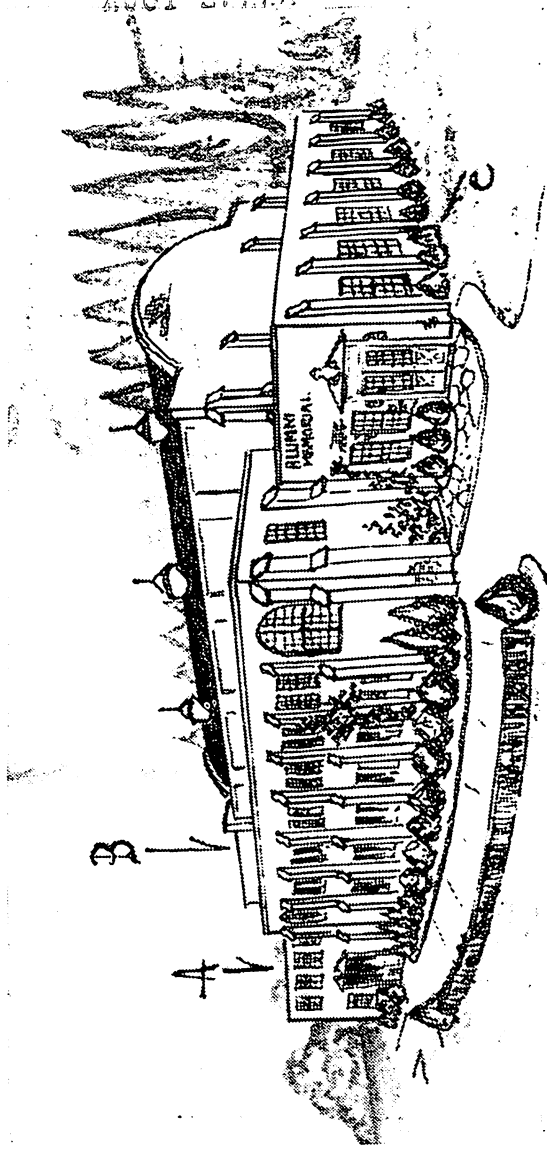
