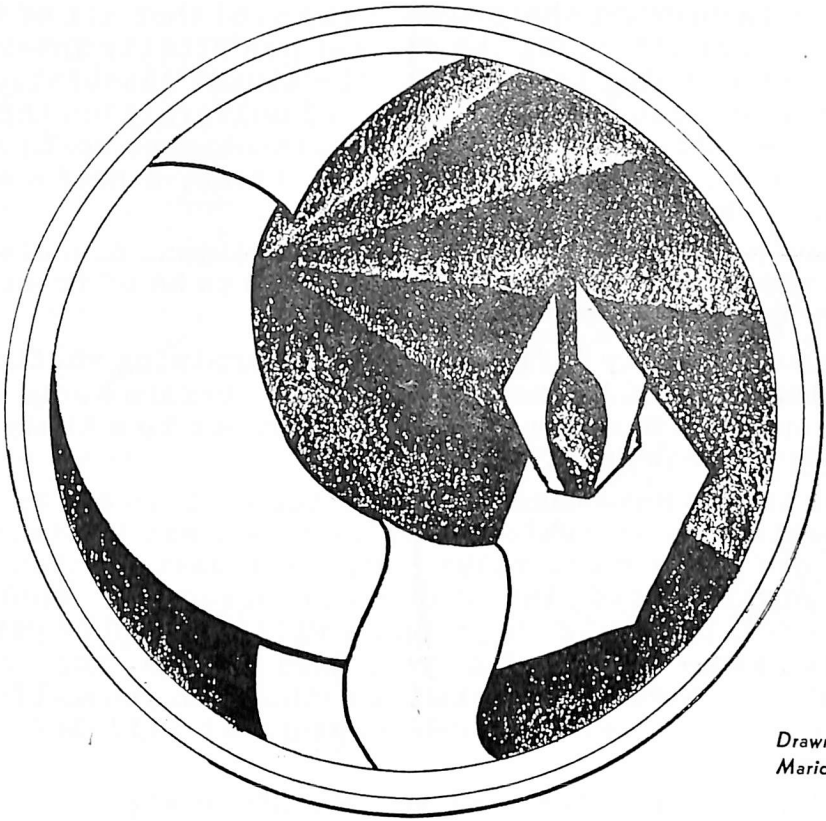

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

The 1952 and 1953 Homecoming meetings are going to have a tremendous bearing on the future activities of the Alumni Association.

Some meetings already have been held by your new officers with the administration; I have met personally with spokesmen for the board of trustees.

There is no doubt whatsoever in my mind that all of the forces now directing the college are vitally interested in what is going to become of the Alumni Association. At the present time, colleges and universities throughout the nation are facing a dilemma—higher costs of operation against dropping enrollment, a nationwide trend due to natural circumstances.

Nevertheless, we, as members of the Alumni Association, past Dana students, are in a position to be of tremendous help to the college.

We can be highly influential in determining whether the college will slip back to what it was before World War Two or continue its postwar development to a truly "greater, new Dana."

Many things have been discussed toward this end by your executive board, which traveled to and met in Blair at its own expense recently. Only the most outstanding and crystallized plans are on the Homecoming agenda at this writing, but more probably will be added by Oct. 11. I urge you — think back on your days at Dana, regardless of when they were. Recall the enthusiasm you had for the college in those days — and let yourself be filled with it again.

The spirit among the faculty, administration and board of trustees is wonderful. Many of the faculty members have rejected far larger salaries at other schools to remain at Dana. They have done work far over and beyond their contracted duties.

All they need now is our help.

We who have been educated at Dana owe them, and most certainly ourselves, to make Dana an ever stronger Christian institution of higher learning.

REPORT ON THE EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING OF THE DANA COLLEGE ALUMNI ASSOCIATION, HELD AT BLAIR, NEBRASKA, AUG. 29-30, 1952

Greater anticipation in Homecoming, possibilities of establishing a student loan fund and widespread plans to increase the overall effectiveness of the Alumni Association in its support of Dana College were thoroughly discussed during the first meeting of the new Dana College Alumni Association executive board held at Dana Aug. 29-30.

Meeting were the three new officers elected in Albert Lea, Minn., in June—President Don Poh, Vice President James Hansen and Secretary-Treasurer Lee Daggett—along with Executive Secretary Homer Nielsen.

Legal advice and sound business recommendations will be obtained by the executive board before a concrete and complete plan for a proposed student loan fund is presented to the association. Discussion of the project centered around the funds as being an opportunity for investment by those interested in the college and who may have children of their own attending Dana at a later date, plus those who would desire to make outright contributions to such a fund.

Homecoming activities received major consideration during the meetings. A special session with A. J. Snowbeck, Dana professor and faculty advisor to the student Homecoming committee, was held and resulted in a complete investigation of the current Homecoming setup to determine where greater attention could be given to the alumni.

Earlier, and partly on the basis of preliminary talks of the annual celebration, a special luncheon exclusively for alumni was planned for the 1952 Homecoming. The luncheon will be served at the Metho-

dist church in Blair during the regular noon hour and following the morning business session. This, the board pointed out, will be only the beginning of what should be a greater program for alumni at Homecoming in future years. Extensive plans aimed at getting alumni to the 1953 Homecoming and then having activities planned for them were introduced and will be given further study.

The board at the same time passed a recommendation that serious consideration should be given to professional men other than pastors when seeking a speaker for the Homecoming banquet. A second motion by the board called for representation of the Alumni Association on the student Homecoming committee.

Pertaining to the proposed gymnasium project, the board recommended active support to any move designed to improve the physical facilities of Dana College. It also resolved to send a letter to the Dana College student body president, commending the action of the 1951-52 student body in its pledge of funds toward the proposed project. It was pointed out that similar action by the 1946-47 student body was taken before construction of the new Pioneer Memorial building.

Active support of Dana clubs and promotion of new organizations was studied by the executive board. The board decided to definitely commit itself to form a concrete and complete plan for the nationwide formation of Dana clubs and their continued support, meanwhile locating presently existing clubs. The plan will be ready and announced at the 1953 Homecoming celebration, if at all possible.

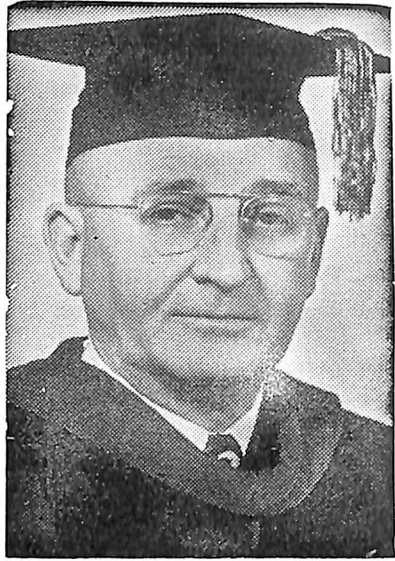

Dr. Granskou, a former China missionary, has served Waldorf Junior College, Forest City, Ia.; Augustana College, Sioux Falls, South Dak.; and St. Olaf College as president. An outstanding Lutheran educator, Dr. Granskou was awarded the Commander of St. Olaf honor by King Haakon of Norway in 1948.

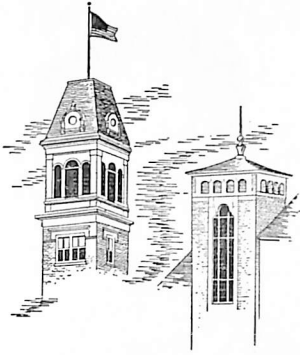

M. G. CHRISTENSEN ADDRESSES CONVOCATION. . .

President M. G. Christensen of the Nebraska District and pastor of Pella Lutheran church, Omaha, challenged a crowd of 400 attending the annual opening convocation of Dana college and Trinity seminary Sunday, September 7, to accept the call of God and become a citizen of His kingdom.

Rev. Christensen, speaking in the college auditorium, forcefully acknowledged the presence of idols in America today, and denounced them as "captivators of young men and women." He further stated the need for youth to accept the guidance of Jesus Christ,, and thereby resist the temptatious idols of our world.

At the evening vesper service Rev. T. I. Jensen, Dean of Trinity seminary, officiated. The event climaxed a week of freshman examinations and registration.

GERALD HATT, D49, JOINS FACULTY . . .

We are happy to welcome back an alumnus this year. Mr. Gerald Hatt, class of '49, has been added to the faculty roster as a music instructor.

After leaving Dana, Mr. Hatt did a year of graduate work in music at the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, N.Y. THE THOMSENS AND A TOUGH BREAK. . .

Mark Thomsen, senior from Denmark, Wis., and one of Dana's star gridders, has been showing his little brother, freshman Jim Thomsen, how Danians play football. Both were on the team and both starred in the Dana-Midland tilt at Fremont until senior Mark suffered a fractured collarbone.

Mark, as you may recall, was ninth high scorer among the nation's college footballers in 1950. Last year he suffered a broken leg in the first game and remained out of action for the rest of the season.

WARRIORS DOWN VIKES. . .

A combination of tough breaks and intercepted passes spelled defeat for Dana as they fell before the Midland Warriors 20-13 on a rain-soaked Bell Street field at Fremont, September 13th.

Early in the initial period, Dana drove deep into Warrior territory on pass interception by Neil Moore. Working out of spread formation, Mark Thomsen scored around left end. Mark kicked the extra point and the score stood 7-0.

Dana fans were again brought to their feet when Neil Moore broke through scrimmage and raced back over the goal line. The try for the extra point failed, and Dana led 13-0.

Minutes before the quarter ended, Marion Hudson stole a Warrior pass and squirmed his way over the goal line. However, clipping was charged and the TD was not counted.

In the second quarter, aided by infractions charged against the Red and White, Midland rolled to a touchdown. The kick

was good and Dana's lead was shortened to 13-7 at halftime.

After a scoreless third quarter Midland scored on a 50-yard pass. Fans held their breath as the try for the extra point was attempted, but the kick was low, leaving the score knotted at 13-13.

With about seven minutes remaining and the Vikes down on the 20-yard line, disaster struck as Midland intercepted a Dana aerial. On fourth down and ten yards away from paydirt, the hosts tossed another pass for the winning margin. The kick was converted and Dana went down 20-13.
