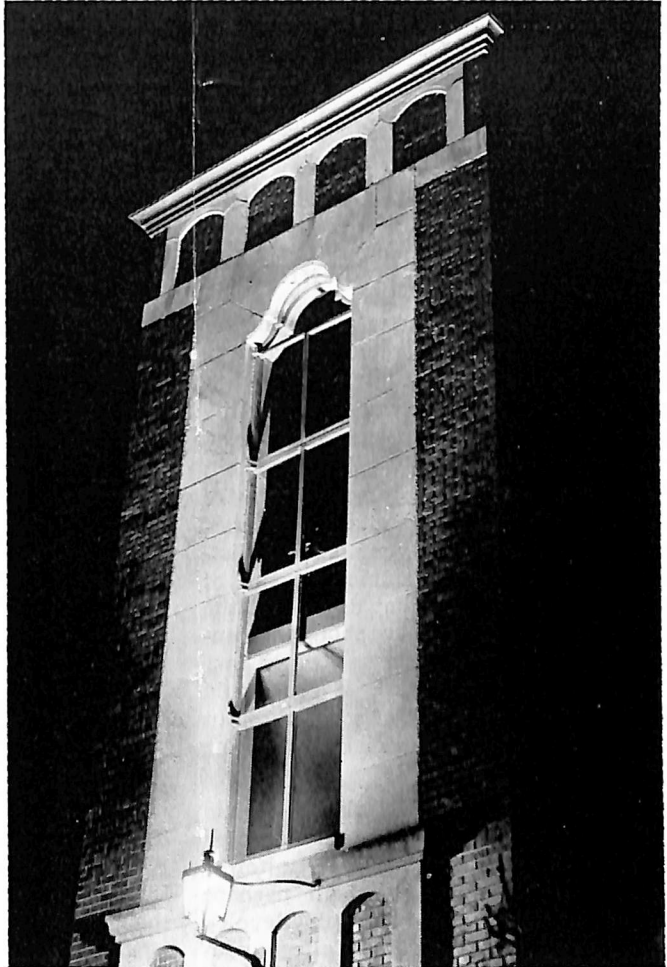

Homecoming Proves Success; Alumni Vote \$4,000 Budget

"Homecoming was a success." These were the words upon the lips of many alumni this year. Apparently this enthusiasm carried itself into the annual Alumni Association meeting as the group voted the largest budget in its history of \$4000—\$2000 of this to go to a special project.

Pictured above you see the Dana band as it appeared in the Homecoming parade—a fine group of musicians but lacking one thing to make a fine-looking organ-

ization—band uniforms. So in a unanimous vote the Association decided to raise the money to provide the band with uniforms by September, 1955. Association president James Hansen stated that every member would be contacted to help reach the goal on this, our project, as a group. It is an excellent opportunity for alumni to show in a practical way their interest in the advancement of the College.

With fine weather prevailing, Homecoming proved to be a success in other ways except for the score of the football game which Dana dropped to Tarkio.

The banquet was the high point, with Dr. Walter H. Judd as speaker. With a keen analysis of the world situation, Judd spoke on the topic "Fulfilling Our American Heritage In Today's World." He pointed out "that" no one can escape the effects of the world situation today. We are all involved in the war of ideas and minds with our Communist enemy. Compromise with the principles of Communism cannot be the solution since they are completely opposite from our ideals. But though the future may appear dismal, we must try to live the Christian principles upon which our nation was founded, believing that when they are seen in action the world will accept these principles rather than those of the Communists.

Association Holds Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of the Alumni Association led by the president, James Hansen, was held Saturday, October 23.

The president's report was given. His report included these items. "In the past year we have collected about 45% more dues than we did in the previous year. The Alumni Association cooperated again with the Foundation in sponsoring a dinner for the graduating seniors in both the College and Seminary. A coffee hour was sponsored by the Association at the convention in Audubon attended by about 60 persons. Thirty dollars was raised at this get-together which was given to the Athletic Department. The Alumni

Association invited representatives of the Board of Trustees, Board of Education, Foundation and the Administration to a joint meeting in Des Moines, Iowa in September to discuss our activities to avoid overlapping as much as possible and strive to make every effort on behalf of Dana worth more. The Alumni Association made contacts with and gave financial help in choosing the speaker for the Homecoming banquet."

At the annual meeting in 1953 a motion was made that we amend the constitution so that the term of office for the President, Vice-President and Secretary-Treasurer be for three years, and that the term be staggered so that one officer is elected each year. This motion was brought up for its final passing. It was passed.

A motion was made that we amend Article 4 of the constitution so that the office of Secretary-Treasurer be split into two separate offices of Secretary and Treasurer and that the Treasurer and the V. Pres. would then be elected on the same years, so that their terms would coincide. The motion was passed. The final vote will be taken at the annual meeting in 1955.

The decision was made to select an Alumni Advisory Council of five, three of whom would be elected at the annual meeting and two appointed by the Executive Committee to govern the affairs of the Association. The members elected by ballot were: Boas Weisman, Omaha, Nebr.; Ann Harms, Lincoln, Nebr.; and C. N. Robinson, Blair, Nebr. Appointed to the Board were Robert Hogzett, Oakland, Ia., and Walter Christensen, Chicago, Ill. Luella Nielsen, Blair, Nebr., has been appointed Acting Secretary of the Association.

A motion was made and passed that the Executive Board appoint a committee to work out a revision of the constitution and bring recommended changes to our next annual meeting.

A resolution was passed to urge the college to take immediate steps to employ a field man.

The report by the nominating committee for the election of officers was read as

Attended Dana 1892-94

Long long ago, back in the early 90's, the name Dana had not yet blossomed forth. At this time the official name of our school was Trinity Seminary. The name Dana does not appear to have had official sanction until 1903. Trinity Seminary was primarily planned to serve young men who intended to study for the ministry. However, the preseminary course was open to anyone and the studies could be made optional and selective if desired.

As a youth of 18 I arrived in Blair in the fall of 1892 to attend Trinity Seminary. My principal objective was to reinforce my neglected education. The duration of my attendance was from the fall of 1892 to the spring of 1894.

The task that has been assigned to me is to tell something about this period at our school. The physical aspects of the institution could hardly evoke any serious desire for praise or boasting. At this time the school building consisted merely of the square central unit of the present "Old Main." The north wing was added during the summer of 1893. Electric lights, plumbing and central heating were conspicuous by their absence. Each room had a table lamp and a small coal stove. In subzero weather it was a tough experience to get up in the morning and build a fire. Woe to the boy who had forgotten to get kindling and coal carried up in the evening. If you had a northwest room, as I did, you would find after such a cold night that the room temperature would be 15 or 20 degrees below freezing, and of course the water in the water bucket would be frozen solid, or nearly so.

Board Not Provided by College

The college did not provide board, but a kitchen equipped with a coal stove and the necessary cooking utensils and a dining room with an adequate seating capacity were at our disposal.

The student body organized promptly at the beginning of each year. This body elected one of their number to take charge of the dining department. He was called Boarding Boss and acted as a purchasing agent of provisions and hired the cook and other kitchen help as needed. He ap-

The writer of the article printed here should need no introduction. N. T. Lund has been connected with and lived in the vicinity of Dana since before the turn of the century. He attended Dana as a student from 1892-94. Teaching at various places for a few years, Mr. Lund returned again to his alma mater in 1905 as a professor of history remaining in this post until 1915.

He then served as County Superintendent of Schools in the Blair area for six years. Finally he entered the insurance and real estate business in Blair and continued this work until his retirement in 1944. His Dana connections also include serving for 12 years as a member of the School Board.

Pointed two students each week to assist in the kitchen and dining room. Their duties were to wait on tables, pare potatoes, wash dishes, etc.

We had an excellent cook. She had learned the art of preparing wholesome and tasty dishes, always a variety and always economical. The boarding boss was reputed to be a sharp buyer of provisions and a good manager. The cook and the boarding boss made a good team. Everything went smoothly in the kitchen, in fact the two worked so well together that they decided they could never do better than to form a permanent partnership, and so they were married and have lived happily together to this very day. At the end of each month the boarding boss would call a meeting of all of the students. He reported the total of all of the expense for the month, including kitchen expense and cost of provisions bought, and finally, the part we dreaded as we were always short of money—an exact amount each student would have to pay, which was generally in the neighborhood of \$9.00.

The Reverend G. B. Christiansen was president. No student worked harder than

he did. As a teacher his greatest asset was his tremendous enthusiasm for any subject he undertook to teach. He was very highly respected by the students. Let the following incident serve as an illustration.

Decision to See the President

We were three boys in my class, Darum, C. Hansen and myself. We had a class in Danish under a certain professor who did not appear to take any interest in the subject, read letters during class and talked about everything else instead of our lesson. Since we made no progress at all we decided to appeal to the president for redress of our grievances. We decided to wait until class time and then instead of going to class we would march down to the president's office and tell him in plain words what kind of a Danish teacher we had to put up with. Of course we planned to proceed in a proper and dignified manner. As Darum was the oldest he was selected to tell the story. I was to follow with a few additional remarks and Hansen was to nod his head vigorously to show his assent. Our rehearsal went off exactly as planned. It was perfect. We could hardly wait for the bell to ring so we could make our appearance before the president.

"Three Grenadiers" Speechless

Finally, when the bell sounded, the "three grenadiers" marched down the stairs in perfect order, assuming that our stern demeanor would impress the president and cause him to realize that he was dealing with a group of determined men, shrewd and highly intelligent. When we entered the office, "G. B.," as we generally called him, was seated at his desk with his back toward us, he turned around, looked at us with that earnest benign countenance of his and said, "Well boys, what is on your minds?" His earnest, pleasant and yet firm expression caused us to completely lose our self-possession. We stood there as if we were deaf and dumb, not being able to utter a word. The president was really enjoying the scene, and

after a minute or two he said as he looked at the clock, "It is now your class time and I think you had better go to your class room so you will not keep the professor waiting, but if there is anything else you wish to see me about, come in any time." We went to class and that was both the first and the last time we tried to make a complaint.

At this time the school was open to students of male persuasion only. Co-education was not introduced until 1899 when Elk Horn College was united with Trinity Seminary, and the school was then called Blair College and Trinity Seminary.

The seminary students were all foreign born. Mr. C. Hansen of my class entered the seminary a year or two later and became the first native born minister in our synod.

When I look out of my window and see student cars parked side by side around the campus, I wonder how we students managed to get around in the early days. Of course there were no automobiles then but there were plenty of bicycles to get if you could afford the cost. However, I do not remember a single student who owned one. It is quite common for students of today to enjoy a snack between meals. In my day such luxuries were not in our book. I never saw a single instance of a student going into a restaurant to buy a cup of coffee, a coke or a dish of ice cream. Money was the one thing we had so little of, and every nickel was earmarked for the necessary college expenses.

Sports Activity Limited

The glamorous sports of today were unknown to us, but we did have a lot of fun playing "pom-pom-pull-away" when the weather permitted and "fox and geese" when there was snow on the ground.

The spiritual side of life was strongly emphasized. Prayer meetings and personal conferences were frequent. We had some good voices, and on Sunday evenings after church we would sometimes hear one of our songbirds playing his guitar and singing songs of praise and gladness. It was only a matter of minutes until he had an audience. Our evangelistic procedure seems to have changed since

Each method has its merit, but a combination of the two would seem to be more Biblical and is undoubtedly the type that is used in some congregations. The above is only a generalization. There are and were exceptions.

Life Really Not Dull

It would work a terrific hardship on Dana students of today if they were suddenly deprived of conveniences, sports, snacks and means of quick transportation, as we were, but let no one get the impression that our life at the college was dreary, drab and dull. On the contrary, we were a happy group, and I doubt if the advantages the students enjoy today spell more real happiness than we possessed.

Traditional Christmas Festivities Find Their Origin In Earlier Years At Dana

Reverent voices singing Christmas carols on a frosty night, busy hands clipping silver snowflakes for Christmas banquet decorations—this is all a part of Christmas at Dana.

The last few weeks before vacation are filled with Christmas festivities, many of which are traditions that have evolved during the history of Dana.

For example, Dana's annual Christmas banquet has its origin in the all-school Christmas parties which also served as farewell occasions for the students who were going home for the holidays. Many Danians, however, remained on the campus during vacation; and to them the cook often "called for extra help in the kitchen to the delightful task of making candy and pebberrnodder." . . . **Hermes** Christmas issue, 1926.

The all-school parties were first held in the dining hall, and later in the girls' reception room and then in the gym. Sponsored by the Luther League, which corresponds to today's L. S. A., until the last decade, the parties were then presented by the W.A.A., and the Home Economics club has sponsored the Christmas banquet for the last two years.

Christmas vacation at Dana has always consisted of approximately two weeks

with the exception of the Christmas in 1928. That year, according to a **Hermes** issue, "the college closed its doors Dec. 14 because of the influenza epidemic which had gripped the school." Danians had a vacation period of almost three weeks, from Dec. 14 to Jan. 3.

In 1930 an ensemble of various Blair choirs and the Dana choir presented what is believed to be the first "Messiah" in Blair's history. Since that time, it has been traditional for the Dana choir to present the "Messiah" or some other musical program at Christmas time.

The first record of a history club program is in 1934. Dicken's "**Christmas Carol**" was initially sponsored by the club in 1937. The presentation of the "**Carol**" every Christmas has been a Dana tradition up until a few years ago.

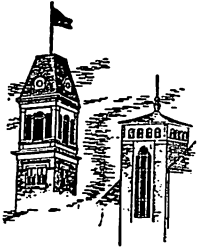

DANA ACCREDITATION PROGRESSES AS COMMITTEE EXAMINES . . .

Accreditation of Dana with the North Central Association went into the final stages on Nov. 30 and Dec. 1. On those dates Deans Donald M. Mackenzie of Blackburn college, Carlinville, Ill., and E. M. Fleming of Park college, Parkville, Mo., made a first-hand examination of the College in connection with the application for membership in the Association.

Conferences were held with administrative personnel, with faculty members and with students in an effort to obtain an opinion of the quality of instruction and the educational program at Dana.

With a favorable report from this committee the announcement of accreditation would be made when the NCA meets in Chicago, March 21-25, 1955.

ASSOCIATION DUES TO BE INCREASED TO \$5 PER MEMBER . . .

Alumni Association dues will be increased for the coming year to \$5.00 per person. James Hansen, Association president, stated that a constitution ruling provides for this. The extra money is needed this year to meet our budgetary plans which include the special band project. (See story elsewhere.) Alumni are asked to pay their dues as soon as possible to the treasurer, Lee Daggett.

PLANS TO REVIVE DEBATE SOCIETY BEING FORMULATED . . .

Plans to revive the Alpha chapter of Alpha Sigma Phi, national debate society, are presently being formulated by a group of students interested in debating, along with their advisor Prof. J. F. Bensen, head of the speech department.

Meeting informally, the group has also begun preparations for competition with other colleges. The first meet in which they expect to enter a team will be at Kansas State Teachers college, Emporia, Kansas, January 14-15, according to Prof. Bensen.

Invitations to other meets have also been received, but as of yet no definite schedule is available, Bensen stated.

Founded here in 1930, the Alpha chapter of the national forensic society remained active five years before suspending its activities. In succeeding years other chapters were formed at other colleges and universities.

During the years in which debating was active on the campus, Dana teams captured several honors. Chief among them was the number three rating received in the 1927 state college championship meet.

FOUR SENIORS NAMED FOR COLLEGE "WHO'S WHO" PUBLICATION . . .

Four senior Dana students, Shirley Andersen, McNabb, Ill.; Bette Miller, West Branch, Ia.; James Nelson, Racine, Wis.; and Orvan Peterson, Underwood, Ia., have been elected by the faculty for inclusion in **Who's Who Among College Students**.

Finalists from a list of nine nominees, these students were chosen for their scholarship, participation in extra-curricular activities and leadership ability.

Each year the publication lists the leading students from campuses across the nation. Dana has participated in the awarding of this honor for many years.

T. C. HANSEN, BOARD MEMBER, SUCCUMBS ON NOVEMBER 15 . . .

Mr. T. C. Hansen of Cedar Falls, Iowa, who was a member of the Board of Trustees, died Nov. 15 after a heart attack. His present term as trustee was to expire in 1955.

Mr. Hansen attended Dana in 1910-11. His two sons, James and Willard, also attended Dana. James graduated in 1950 and entered the insurance and real estate business with his father. Willard graduated in 1952 and is head coach at Gretna, Nebr.

Memorial gifts given in memory of Mr. Hansen have been received by the Dana Foundation. To date they amount to \$510. Foundation officers plan to use the memorial for some specific gift to the college after conferring with members of Mr. Hansen's family.

REV. WILLIAM THOMSEN ACCEPTS FULL TIME TEACHING POSITION . . .

Rev. William Thomsen, who has served for 15 years as part-time art instructor, will become a full-time assistant professor of art next September. His election to the faculty was approved by the Board of Trustees last October. In addition to teaching art, Rev. Thomsen may also serve in the Christianity department. He plans to resign his congregation at Moorhead, Ia. in the near future.

BASKETBALL WELL UNDERWAY AFTER ROUGH FOOTBALL SEASON . . .

The Viking football squad had a disheartening season winning one, tying one and losing five. Plagued by injuries, the squad could not seem to come out on top in their contests. However, several players did outstanding work, with Russ Moseman, Decatur, Nebr., and Dean Rasmussen, Selma, Calif., being named to the CCCC All-Conference team. Dean Rasmussen was also nominated for the Nebraska State Athlete of the Year award, and given honorable mention on the Little All-American team.

In basketball the Vikings hope to achieve a better record. Under the guidance of Coach Paul Peterson, now in his 14th year at Dana, they have won 4 and lost 2 thus far. Potentially, the club has fine possibilities and appears to have depth this year. The Vikings, of course, will be working for the Conference championship which they shared in a three-way tie last year. However, the competition will not be easy. Several returning lettermen form the nucleus of the squad.

Girls' basketball is also well underway again this season, coached by Wayne Armer. Several other schools have added this sport to their athletic program so competition should be keen. Dana's team includes several girls with high school experience, who may help bring the team to victory.
