

Efforts By Daggett Result In Present Active Association

Since he has recently completed his term of office as treasurer of the Alumni Association, the *Alumni Quarterly* would like to give recognition to Mr. Lee Daggett.

Probably few people realize that it was largely through the efforts of Lee that we now have an active Alumni Association. Shortly after his graduation from Dana in 1941, Lee became aware of the importance of an active Alumni Association.

In the fall of 1942 Lee and his wife, the former Rhoda Hansen, compiled a list of more than 1500 names of persons who had attended Dana. They then sent out letters to these people asking them for support to reorganize the association and for contributions for scholarships.

Lee came from Falmouth, Maine, in 1936 to attend Dana. While at Dana he majored in chemistry and mathematics. Lee also attended the University of Chicago Night School, after graduating from Dana.

After his graduation, Lee taught school for three years, he then did organic chemistry research work for the Sinclair Oil Company in their East Chicago laboratory. He left Sinclair Oil Company to work as a feed salesman for two years, after which he went into the retail hardware business. He then had the opportunity to return to Nebraska to work for the Paxton and Gallagher Company in Omaha, where he is employed at the present time. Lee was the head of the Order and Billing Department at the Paxton and Gallagher Company for the last four years. On January 1 of this year he was promoted to Hardware Buyer for the company in Omaha.

Lee does not regret having attended a

small college. He believes that the individual attention which he received was very worth while. When he attended the University of Chicago Night School he found that his background was equal to or better than that of the majority of the students.

"I have always felt that any Alumnus owes something to their Alma Mater," states Lee. "If they did not get something from that institution it was the fault of the individual and not the college."

The Daggetts have three children Roger, age eleven; Gloria, age nine; and Keith, age two.

Lee is interested in photography and stamp collecting. He is also active in his local church congregation and at the present time is the president of the Lutheran Men of First Lutheran Church, Blair, Nebraska.

This and That

A few weeks ago I was in Blair and had the privilege of sitting in on a meeting of the Alumni Association Advisory Council. Details of the decisions made at the meeting will be presented in the next issue of the Alumni Quarterly; however, since in a few weeks time the association will begin its annual drive for contributions, I would like to say that from what I heard at the meeting, your contributions will be put to good use.

Several weeks ago I received a personal letter from a fellow alumnus. I will quote a portion of the letter here since others were probably as observant and desire an explanation.

"I had intended to terminate this letter on the previous page but I noticed something which needs an explanation. On the front page of your most recent **Quarterly** (December 1956) appears the picture of a young girl who apparently is singing reverently. Precisely in the location of her stomach appears the word "mave" printed in dark black letters. This is the Danish word for stomach, but at the moment I cannot grasp the subtle symbolism of this suggestion. If it is merely to mean that children gorge themselves in food at Christmas or other

Participation By More Alumni Sought

Nineteen-hundred and fifty-seven could prove to be an important year in the development of the Association. At the annual meeting at Homecoming an ambitious program of activities in many new areas was adopted.

Development Is Goal of Project

The project for this year will be two-fold. As in the past there will be a fund-raising drive. All contributions received in 1957 above expenses of operating the Association are to be used toward the capital expansion and development of Dana. No specific amount has been established as a goal, but rather each alumnus will be encouraged to give to the fullest degree that he is able. The exact area of development in which this money is to be spent has not yet been determined. It is felt that this fund-raising project will allow more flexibility in directing alumni funds into the most useful channels of need as expressed by the College. Many alumni are anxious to aid the College in its vital areas of need and this fund-raising program will make that possible. Methods of raising funds will also be extensively altered, and alumni will receive information on this in the near future.

Student Recruitment to Be Promoted

The second aspect of our project this year is a student recruitment program. Increased enrollment is essential to Dana's future, and alumni could do much in making this possible. Each alumnus is asked to recruit at least one student by September, 1957. In order that such prospective students may receive information from Dana, their names are to be sent to the College. However, most important will be the encouragement of the student, supplied directly by each alumnus. Basic information about Dana and this program will be sent to all alumni soon. In connection with this program the Association hopes to encourage the establishment of scholarships for students by individuals and groups.

Organizational Improvements Planned

Improvements in the organization of

the Association were also presented at the annual meeting. One of these was an area representative system. Individuals in areas of alumni concentration will be asked to contact personally a specific list of alumni in the area. Such area representatives will attempt to promote interest in the alumni program and projects, check and correct alumni addresses, supply information about alumni to the *Quarterly* and provide any desired information to alumni.

The Association has also undertaken a program designed to foster Alumni-College and Seminary relations. It is felt that as alumni we should be more closely concerned with the activities of Dana and Trinity and express this interest actively. Closer contacts with the administration, faculty and students will be promoted.

Alumni Work to Be Dispersed

Subdivision of the work of the Association is also being attempted. Alumni are being asked to be responsible for the various aspects of the program. It is hoped that through such dispersion a

Presenting New Council Members

Danish Composer Presents Program

Niels Viggo Bentzon, one of Denmark's leading contemporary composers, will present a piano recital with commentary in Alumni Memorial Auditorium at Dana on Friday evening, March 22, at 8:15 o'clock. Bentzon, who is in this country for the premiere and recording of one of his works by the Louisville Symphony Orchestra, is known throughout Europe as a virtuoso pianist and critic as well as an outstanding composer. He has been invited to attend the American premiere of his *Variazioni Breve* in May by the New York Philharmonic Orchestra, Dimitri Mitropolous conducting.

The Blair recital and a Chicago recital are the composer's only appearances in the central Midwest. His other appearances in this country include recitals at Columbia, Harvard, the University of Texas and the University of Southern California.

Poems By Langland Included In Book

Poet Joseph Langland, who taught English at Dana just before World War II and advised the staff of the first *Sower*, is one of three American poets included in *Poets of Today III*, published late in 1956 by Charles Scribner's Sons. Langland's work in this three-in-one book is entitled *The Green Town: Poems*. The three young writers represented in this book have been termed by the publisher "poets of integrity and distinction." Although Langland's poems have appeared in leading periodicals, this is the first time they have come out in book form.

Professor Langland, now director of the Creative Writer's Workshop at the University of Wyoming, received the Amy Lowell Traveling Scholarship in 1955 and resided in Italy for a year. For several years he has presented annual awards for the best poetry and prose appearing in the *Dana Sower*.

Alumnus Writes Poetry, Studies Astronomy

Recently the Alumni Association received a recording of an original song written by one of its oldest members. Eighty-three-year-old Andreas P. Sontum, who now lives in Petaluma, California, has been able, since his retirement 17 years ago, to devote his time to the hobbies of collecting stamps, studying astronomy, and writing poetry. The song he sent the Alumni Board is entitled "On Love" and has as its theme the thought that "God Is Love." The music was composed by L. Leslie Loth. Mr. Sontum holds an honorary certificate in the Eugene Field Society, a National Association of Authors and Journalists.

Born in Sollerup, Schleswig-Holstein, in 1875, Mr. Sontum came to the United States at the age of 13. His family settled in the Eel River Valley in California, where they engaged in dairy farming. In 1900 Mr. Sontum enrolled in the school at Elk Horn, Iowa, where Dr. P. S. Vig was principal, and later attended Dana College during the year of 1902-1903. He remembers attending classes with Theodore Beck, Henry Bondo, J. P. Nielsen, and J. Fred Petersen.

Upon leaving Dana, Mr. Sontum married Anna Andraesen of Kennard, Nebraska, with Dr. N. C. Carlsen serving as best man. For two years the Sontums conducted a grocery business in Kennard; then they emigrated to Canada where they homesteaded and assisted in the settling of the town of Dickson. After ten years of childless marriage, they adopted a three-weeks-old baby and moved to Bruce, Wisconsin, where Mr. Sontum engaged in farming.

Four years later, in August 1913, Mrs. Sontum passed away. Mr. Sontum sold his home and proceeded to Ferndale, California, hoping to have one of his sisters care for his four-year-old child, but an operation for appendicitis revealed that little Bertha had tubercular glands. Upon the advice of the doctors who had operated, Mr. Sontum took her to Brush,

Colorado; there he asked a widow, Mrs. P. Iversen, to take his orphan daughter into her motherly care. "In 1914," writes Mr. Sontum, "we joined in marriage which enabled us to keep the child in

our care until the age of eight when she passed away into her heavenly home."
