Zimmerman New Coach

Darrell Zimmerman, of Farmington, Minn., has been named head football and track coach.

He will replace Bruce Rolloff who resigned to continue graduate study.

Rolloff's football teams saw both ends of the standings during his two years at Dana. His 1957 squad won the Central Church College Conference title and dominated the Omaha World-Herald's all-conference selections.

Last in '58

Last fall when the Vikings moved into the tougher NCC competition his squad was winless, finished last.

Zimmerman is a former South Dakota State athlete. He was football and track coach at Farmington High School four years.

The new coach inherits second division squads in both sports. But he will start work with a new football field and track and possibly the largest football squad in Dana's history.

Only two players were lost by graduation—center Jack Linahan and quarterback Terry Wichert.

Athletic Director Paul Peterson said advance indications are that more than 50 candidates will turn out this fall.

On Grads and Giving

One of the privileges of the college graduate is to be periodically tapped by the old alma mater for funds. The alumnus who hasn't griped about the persistence of these perennial appeals is pretty rare.

Nevertheless, graduates of our colleges have become increasingly serious about their responsibilities. Contributions by individuals to alumni fund-raising campaigns have almost doubled in the last four years, increasing from 77 million dollars in 1955 to 143 million dollars in 1958.

Alumni willingness to help their old schools has a double-barreled effect. Not only do alumni fund drives provide colleges with much-needed funds; they also provide industry with a check on alumni loyalty, which has a bearing on a corporation's willingness to contribute.

In awarding Texas A&M highest honors in the recent American Alumni Council's first Alumni Incentive Awards Program, Dr. William W. Whitehouse, president of Albion College and of the Association of American Colleges, said, "If our own graduates do not believe in their colleges and back up that belief with their gifts, why should business and industry be asked to contribute?"

Significantly, the United States Steel Foundation donated the funds that made the Alumni Incentive Awards possible this year. For some time corporation grants have been based to a considerable degree on alumni support, but this is the first instance in which national attention has been focused specifically on the importance to the future of American education of the alumni-industry relationship.

As the vast private fortunes that used to endow our educational institutions have dwindled and the necessity for Government aid threatens the independence of many institutions, it is heartening that private industry and private citizens are taking positive steps to meet the challenge of the times.

Double-Capacity Cafeteria Planned in Summer Work

Growing enrollment will crowd out an old Dana custom next fall.

A cafeteria will replace "family style" meals. The dining hall already filled to capacity won't be able to handle expected enrollment increases, college officials said.

A single-line cafeteria will allow five hundred to six hundred students to use the room during a meal, according to Dave Bidstrup, supervisor of buildings and grounds.

Several Projects

The six-place tables served by waiters and waitresses used

until now can handle less than half that.

A 25-by-30-foot addition to the kitchen will be constructed to accommodate the conversion.

The construction heads a list of "minor" projects for the summer, Mr. Bidstrup said. Others: rewiring of the Women's Dorm and repair of the gymnasium ceiling.

Well Drilled

The summer's two big projects—a new dorm and a new football field and track—are under way.

400 in '59?

Frosh Flock Could Bring New Record

Dana's enrollment may skyrocket to a record, dormitory-busting four hundred students this fall.

Indicators:

—A flood of advance registrations from prospective freshmen.

—Possible return in large numbers of last year's students.

So far 158 have completed application for their freshman year, compared with 114 for the same date last year.

Class rolls in 1958-59 totaled 330 full-time students. Records show an average of 80 per cent of the lower three classes return to Dana.

That 80-per-cent return plus the heavy influx of freshmen promise the record crop.

Five additional housing units will be used.

They are the Kline House, some sections of the veterans housing units, the former Ethan Mengers residence and the A. C. Lindberg and Bruce Jensen residences.

Freshmen from 14 states and two foreign countries have enrolled for the fall semester. Nebraska leads in numbers with 61. Iowa, Wisconsin, California and Minnesota follow.

Committee of New Church at College

The Stewardship Training Committee of the new TALC met at Dana in June to train sector leaders in anticipation of the Lutheran merger.

One of four nationwide church music institutes was held at the same time. Church

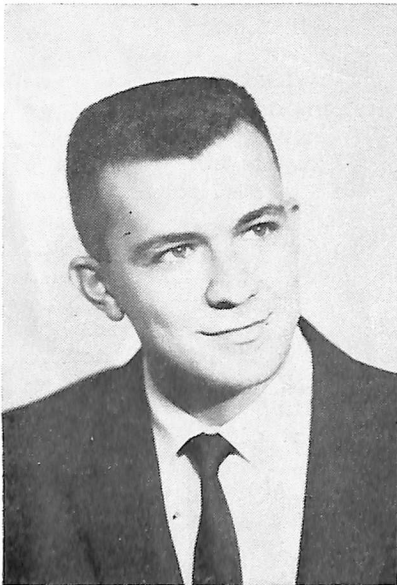

Pagel Named PR Director

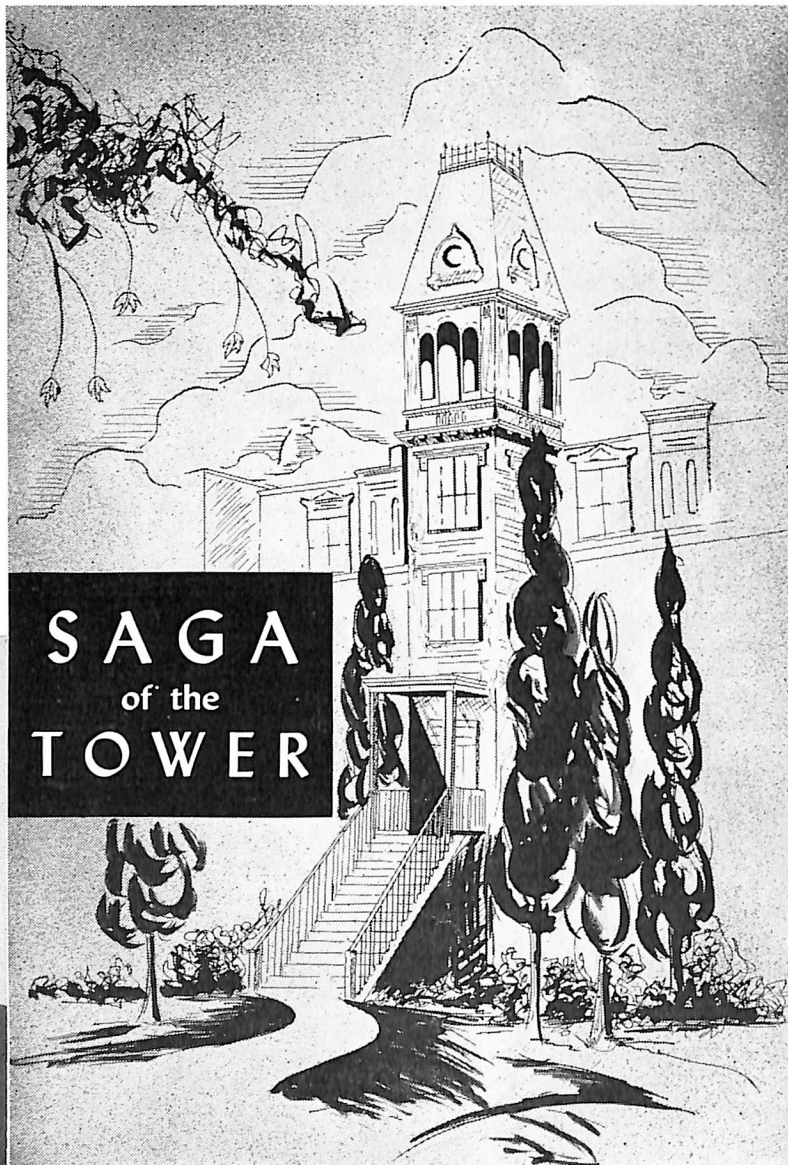
Phillip A. Pagel, a 1956 graduate of Dana, has been appointed Director of Public Relations for the college.

Miss Mac to Go Aloha; Summer Tour to Hawaii

Dana will be holding class in the fiftieth state this summer.

Elja McCullough, assistant professor in education, will take her education-vacation tour to Hawaii July 23-August 12.

About 14 will make the trip, she said.

They will fly from San Francisco, Calif., and live in bungalows in a coconut grove on Waikiki Beach.

The choice of Hawaii had nothing to do with its new statehood. "We had already decided to go there," Miss McCullough said.

The travelers can earn three hours of credit for the trip if they take a study course along with it.

Other summer tours have gone to Alaska, Mexico, Europe, Cuba and Canada.

It is Miss McCullough's fourteenth tour.

Freshmen Shine But Dana is 8th

The record performance of freshman kept Dana off the bottom of the Nebraska College Conference Track Meet in May.

John Shelton, muscular pole vaulter, cleared 12 feet six inches to tie for first place. His performance gave Dana seven points and eighth place.

It gave Shelton a school record by half a yard. (The pre-Shelton mark: 11 feet.)

Concordia and Doane failed to score. Kearney State Teachers College's 80-man squad topped the 10-school field.

Two other Dana record holders, Tom Nielsen (440) and Paul Christensen (two-mile) failed to place.

Don Jorgensen, defending NCC broad jump champion, was injured in a power mower accident a few days before the meet.

He lost two toes when his right foot slipped into the mower. Doctors who operated on the foot have told Jorgensen the injury probably will not keep him from jumping next year. He jumps from his left foot.

Jorgensen is also expected to be fit for basketball. He will be a senior and team captain next winter.

1959 Teachers Like Big Schools

A wall map in the Dana Placement Office shows graphically the trend away from small schools in Nebraska.

It also shows future location of Dana's 1959 graduates who will be teaching in the Midwest.

Only one of 26 Danians will teach in a rural school. Eight accepted posts in Omaha, five in Norfolk, three in Fremont, three in Blair, two in Tekamah, one each in Sargent, Oxford, Cook and Clearwater and one in a county school.

Other education students will teach in Iowa, California and Oregon. Those with degrees will average \$4,060 a year, those without will average \$3,030.

Board Says:

Consolidate Fund Drives, Modify Dana Foundation, Strengthen Alumni Group

Careful appraisal of fund raising and other college-alumni activities resulted this spring in a new, streamlined program.

In brief, the sometimes-duplicated fund-raising efforts of the Dana Foundation and the Alumni Association are to be merged under supervision of the Development Office.

The Board of Trustees voted to:

—Go ahead with all but the fund-raising functions of the Foundation and the alumni group.

—Eliminate alumni dues after May 31, 1959.

—Include the Alumni Association's operating budget with that of the college.

The board's decisions were based on recommendations drawn up by the joint executive committees of the Foundation and the Association.

Development Director Boas Weismann, reporting the board's action, said the Association should "strengthen its organization through renewed efforts in the formation of new Dana Clubs and assistance to those already in existence in order to expand their activities."

He said the present Dana Foundation emphasis on continuous annual giving will be continued with more stress on expansion, strengthening and promotion of "an annual giving program worthy of the name."

"This will be accomplished," Mr. Weismann said, "through the direction of the Development Office, with the assistance of the Alumni Association through its officers, executive secretary, class agents and area representatives."

The new plan for the annual drive for gifts to the college is basically the same as it has been for the Foundation: one substantial gift annually.

Travel and further study will take faculty and staff members more than 18 thousand miles from the campus this summer.

Four will travel overseas and to Canada.
