

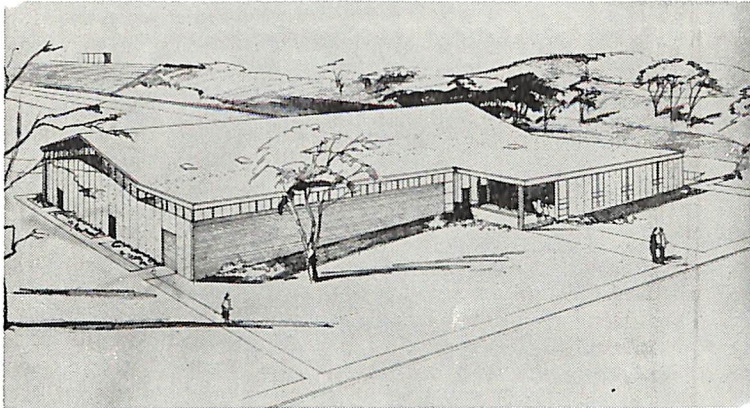

Plans Move Ahead

A new physical education-student activities building for the Dana campus grows nearer reality. Revision of some structural plans for the Borup Building was made necessary when the Board of Regents postponed acceptance of bids, but a spring construction start is still envisioned. A student campaign to raise 100 thousand dollars for a swimming pool in the building was approved by the board.

TV CLASSROOM IS OFFERED AGAIN

Dana last month started the second in a series of educational television courses.

Home students were offered a three-hour TV class in probability and statistics. Classes are broadcast three mornings a week over KMTV, Omaha.

Dana also offered a class in modern algebra, the second in the TV classroom series.

Four other Nebraska colleges also participate in the Continental Classroom program.

Another special educational program began with the second-semester evening classes. Night courses for college credit include art, business administration, literature, psychology, religion, history, languages, physical education and mathematics.

Another special in the series is a course in "conversational Danish," offered for Dana students who will tour Denmark this summer with the choir.

The Board of Regents has postponed acceptance of bids on the Borup Building, the student activities-physical education plant to be built at the north end of Viking Field.

Dr. C. C. Madsen said bids were received from 10 contractors. Each was considerably higher than the approved construction figure, he said.

First Issue Of Monthly Publication

This is the first issue of a new monthly publication, the Dana Review.

It combines features of the old Alumnus and Bulletin into one paper which will be published every month except July and August.

The Review is seen as an improvement over both former publications. It will be more timely than either and able to present news of the college and its friends while it is still news.

Alumni will, in effect, have a monthly instead of a quarterly sheet. The Review will carry some alumni news in each edition. Every third issue will be an "alumni special" including an inserted section for the traditional "Destiny's Deep Sea" and other items of special interest to former students.

The Review will be a four-page paper, with extra pages added for special editions on Homecoming and other events.

The circulation list will include alumni, former Bulletin recipients, parts of the church constituency and other friends of Dana.

Publication will be sponsored by the college's Department of Publicity and Public Relations. The editorial board includes Public Relations Director Phillip A. Pagel and alumni James Clemon and Thomas Langenfeld, members of the news staff of The Omaha World-Herald.

The board instructed the Kearney, Neb., architectural firm of Helleberg and Helleberg to revise present plans for the building in order to cut costs. Board members stressed that revisions being planned will not affect the usefulness of the building.

The architect was directed to re-negotiate with contractors in second bids after revised plans are completed.

A spring construction start is planned.

The board approved inclusion of a swimming pool in the building. Members voted unanimously to continue plans for the 100-thousand-dollar pool.

Dana students have raised about 65 thousand dollars of the total through four-percent loans. The board voted to raise the interest rate to five per cent in order to attract more investors.

Board members said they are confident the students can raise the remaining 35 thousand dollars.

Pete Petersen Heads Students

Army veteran Pete Petersen, senior from Botna, Ia., took office February 1 as president of the Dana student body.

He moved up from vice-president when President Myrvin Christopherson resigned at mid-year. Mr. Christopherson, a mid-year graduate, was appointed to the college admissions staff.

'61 Homecoming Dates Announced

The weekend of October 27-29 has been designated as the annual Homecoming weekend on campus according to information released by the Committee.

No definite plans have been made as yet for the weekend however, we have been assured that more time will be allotted to Alumni coffee hours.

Athletic Director, Paul Peterson, has announced the Vikings will meet the Doane College Tigers in the annual Homecoming game on Saturday afternoon.

ALUMNUS TO FACE DIRKSEN?

Alumnus Paul Simon is being promoted by Illinois Democrats as a potential 1962 campaign foe of Republican Senator Everett Dirksen.

According to Chicago newspaper reports, the move to pit Mr. Simon against Senator Dirksen was started by powerful North Shore partisans and members of the Democratic Federation of Illinois.

Mr. Simon now is a state representative. He is a newspaper publisher in Troy, Ill.

He gained attention as a legislator by waging reform campaigns to clean out underworld and gambling elements in Madison County, his home base, as well as neighboring St. Clair County.

He won his fourth Illinois House term in the 1960 general election.

Should he throw his hat in the ring in a move to unseat the powerful Senator Dirksen, news accounts said, Democratic supporters would make it an age versus youth contest. The Republican is 64. Mr. Simon is 32.

Senator Dirksen is serving his second six-year term in Washington.

New Name For Board; Five Added

The men who guide Dana's policies and programs got five new colleagues and a new name recently.

In an official change, the Board of Trustees became the Board of Regents.

New members: Dr. E. H. Goldenstein, Lincoln, Neb., a faculty member of the University of Nebraska Graduate School; Hans Schwartz, Minneapolis, head of retail sales division of Augsburg Publishing House, Norman Williams, an official of Station KMTV, Omaha; Dr. Richard Riensche, Loveland, Colo., and Pastor Ralph Radloff, Bird City, Kan.

The board now has 15 members. It was enlarged to give more representation to the larger church constituency formed by the recent Lutheran merger.

In addition to other actions noted in this edition of the Review, the Regents:

—Approved preliminary architect's sketches of the Charles A. Dana Hall of Science to be started during the last half of 1961.

—Adopted a college operating budget of \$742,645 for the 1961-62 school year, an increase of over 100 thousand dollars.

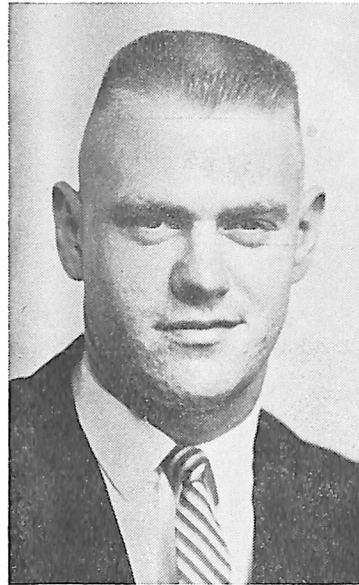
A Dana delegation attended the annual midwinter conference of the Midwest Region, Lutheran Student Association, held at Midland College, Fremont, Neb., February 17-19.

SAM Drive Pays Off

A book drive by a hustling campus organization, the Society for Advancement of Management, has netted nearly 250 dollars.

Student members of the club seek books on business and economics or donations to buy such books for the library.

The Dana chapter of the national society is new, founded February 1, 1960. Its membership in one year has increased from 28 to 39.

Meetings so far have featured speakers from the Blair, Omaha and Lincoln business communities. Club members hope to engage a Wall Street Journal representative as a speaker next year.

Lincoln Pastor Takes Post As College Official

Pastor James Olsen took office February 1 as the college's Vice-President for Church Relations and Development.

In this office, Pastor Olsen will work with the administration and faculty in developing future plans and programs for Dana. He will also serve as coordinator of activities in the areas of alumni affairs, public relations, student recruitment and fund raising. The specific field of his activities will emphasize the relationships of the College with the Church and alumni.

The appointment of a vice-president comes at an important time in the expansion program of the college.

The Board of Regents has approved a three-million-dollar program which includes a new science hall, student apartments, dormitories, student union and campus renovation.

Pastor Olsen served Our Saviour's Lutheran Church, Lincoln, Neb., the past seven years.

Dana, Other Schools In Conference Plan Leaders Organization

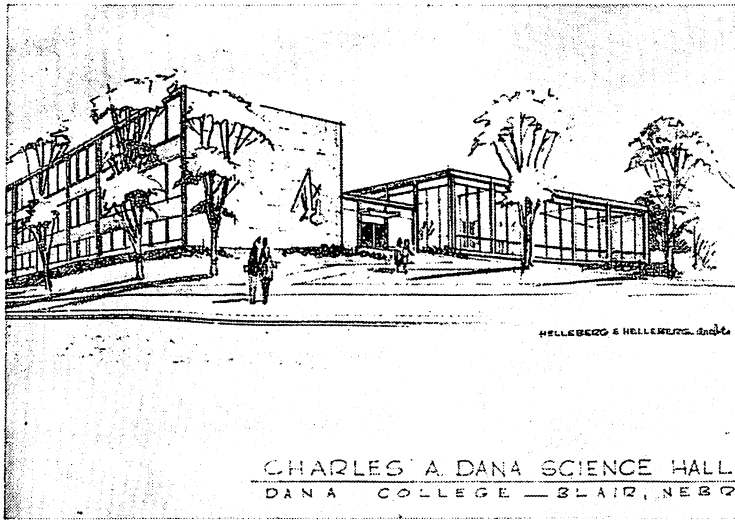
A "leaders conference" is being set up among Dana and other members of the Tri-State Conference.

News Notes

College players are rehearsing for presentation March 11-12 of "Ghosts," a social drama by Scandinavian playwright Henrik Ibsen.

The Dana library last year added several important works to its collection on religion. Included: "Christian Faith and the Liberal Arts," "Luther and Culture" and Homeward to Zion: The Mormon Immigration from Scandinavia."

A recent chapel program featured a discussion on the National Conference of Christians and Jews.

Students attended Omaha concerts of two Lutheran college choirs—St. Olaf and Augustana of Sioux Falls.

President C. C. Madsen delivered a major address before the Danish Luncheon Club of Greater New York on February 15.

A total of 42 students were named to the first semester honor roll. A grade point of 7.50 or above is necessary for this honor.

Student Drive Gets Editorial Encouragement

Dana students' efforts to finance construction of a swimming pool for the new activities building sparked favorable response among editors of The Omaha World-Herald. They said in a recent editorial:

"Perhaps the students of Dana College at Blair, Neb., aren't wise to the ways of the New Education. If they were, why in the world would they offer to pay for the construction of a 100-thousand-dollar swimming pool in a new Physical Education-Student Activities Building which the college plans to build next year?"

"The very latest technique in such a matter involves an application for a Federal grant. When the grant is approved, it is added to the national debt, and individual obligations cease.

"But the Dana students formed a corporation, and they voted to pay \$7.50 each per semester to pay for the pool. To get the ready cash, they're asking for loans, and agreeing to repay the loans, at four per cent interest, from the pool revenue. They're asking the lenders to trust their word that the money will be paid back. To date, they've raised approximately half of the 100 thousand dollars.

"We imagine that some people will regard such goings on as a mighty old-fashioned way of doing business. But we also imagine the Dana students regard their undertaking with a great deal of satisfaction and self-respect."

Viking Wrestlers Outpoint Midland

Dana's first win in its new intercollegiate wrestling program was posted over Midland College of Fremont, Neb.

Viking matmen ran up a total of 24 points to Midland's 12 in the eight matches. Dana won five and lost one. Two matches were draws.

NEW AWARDS ANNOUNCED BY REGENTS

The Board of Regents has announced plans for two new Dana scholarships.

The Board of Regents Scholarship and the Dana College Merit Awards, as they will be known, will be available to deserving students for the 1961-62 college year.

The Regents scholarship will be granted automatically to high school valedictorians and/or individuals in the top two per cent of their graduating classes.

Each scholarship will be in the amount of half tuition and can be renewed if recipients maintain honor-roll standing.

Merit Awards will be given students in the top quarter of their high school graduating classes in the amount of 125 dollars a year. They also will be renewable on a scholarship qualification basis. Factors other than grade averages will be taken into consideration, the board said.

The board also approved a 10-thousand-dollar grant-in-aid program for students outstanding in a particular field or who have a definite need for financial aid.

Dana will continue to participate in the Federal Aid to Education loan program under which students receive educational loans at low interest rates.
