Loans Total \$90,000 In Pool Drive

\$10,000 Needed By Month's End

Dana students' attempt to finance their own swimming pool by soliciting loans has been 90 per cent successful, the Development Office reported this month.

They have raised 90 thousand dollars of the 100-thousand-dollar goal, hope to raise the remainder by the end of the month.

However, only \$56,064 in cash has actually been received, according to the Rev. James Olsen, vice-president for church relations and development. Of this \$7,284 was in gifts.

"Those who have indicated they are willing to loan money are requested to make their remittance by December 31," he said. "They will receive a note bearing four per cent interest, payable from the yearly income from student fees for use of the pool."

Records will be handled by the college business office. Correspondence should be addressed to Dana College Students, Inc., Dana College, Blair, Neb.

"All that is needed is one hundred persons willing to loan one hundred dollars each, or 20 willing to loan five hundred dollars," Pastor Olsen said. "If your money is invested elsewhere, and if you can make a comparable investment in Dana College students, please give this consideration.

Illinois Senate Race: Adlai Out, Alumnus In

Recent speculation on Adlai Stevenson's political plans held more than passing interest for one Dana alumnus.

Paul Simon of Troy, Ill., former Dana student body president and present member of the Illinois legislature, has announced in the Democratic primary for United States Senator from Illinois.

This is the post which Chicago Mayor Daley urged Mr. Stevenson to seek. Mr. Simon said he would withdraw in

favor of Mr. Stevenson if the former Presidential candidate wished to run.

However, after nearly a week of speculation, Mr. Stevenson announced he would continue to serve as ambassador to the United Nations.

Mr. Simon, if nominated, presumably would face the formidable Republican Senate Minority Leader, Everett Dirksen.

Mr. Simon will step down at the end of this year as a member of the Alumni Council.
