Alumni Homecoming Edition

10 Per Cent Of Graduates Contribute

Alumni Appeal Brings \$5,000

Only 10.7 per cent of Dana's graduates have contributed to the Annual Alumni Appeal, Executive Secretary Calvin Jorgensen reported this month.

But, he said, the gifts total five thousand dollars, 12.5 per cent of the 40-thousand-dollar goal.

The drive will end May 31. Gifts have averaged \$28.93, Mr. Jorgensen said.

The Class of 1923 had the highest participation: 35.7 per cent. The Class of 1933 had the largest gift average: 515 dollars per contributing member.

The Alumni Association voted for the Annual Appeal at its meeting last fall and designated the funds for "faculty enrichment."

The Rev. James W. Olsen, Vice-President for Church Relations and Development, stressed the importance of obtaining gifts from as many alumni as possible, even if most of the gifts are small.

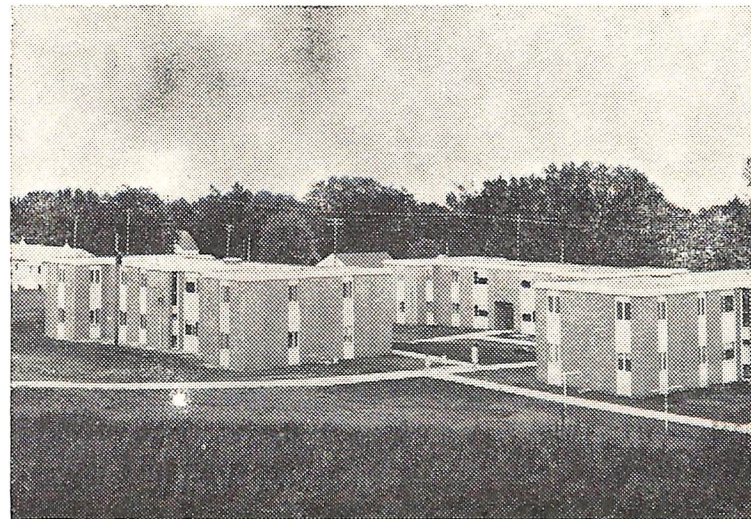
Very welcome, he said, was the gift of one dollar from an alumnus who has been generous in his support of the college.

The alumnus had already given a substantial gift to the college through other channels, but wanted to add his support to the Alumni Appeal.

"I feel encouraged," Pastor Olsen said. "We're laying a good foundation for the appeal."

More New Housing Means Room for All This Fall

Enrollment has jammed Dana's housing facilities to capacity again this fall. But for the first time in several years all students living on campus are housed in dormitories or college apartments, officials said.

The largest senior class in history—91—and a total enrollment of 528 was reported by the public relations office during the first week of registration.

There were 206 freshmen, 128 sophomores, 86 juniors, five special students and 12 part-time students.

with the veterans' housing units have been named Omaha Village. Some single students are living in the apartments this fall because of the large enrollment. Story on page 3.

The college's housing capacity was markedly increased with the addition of the new student apartments. Until this year some students lived in privately owned homes on College Hill.

The college will be able to handle larger enrollments when Holling Hall, a new dormitory for men, is completed. Construction is planned for 1963.

Classes began September 7.

Science Hall, Apartments Are Added

The Kline House is gone, having yielded to the Charles A. Dana Hall of Science.

Three new student apartment buildings now stand on the old football practice field below the Alumni Memorial Auditorium.

And the auditorium—"the gym" to most Danians—has been transformed into the campus chapel.

—"Best of the Faculty Follies," a one-hour program drawn from the 1962 faculty talent show, following the coronation Friday night.

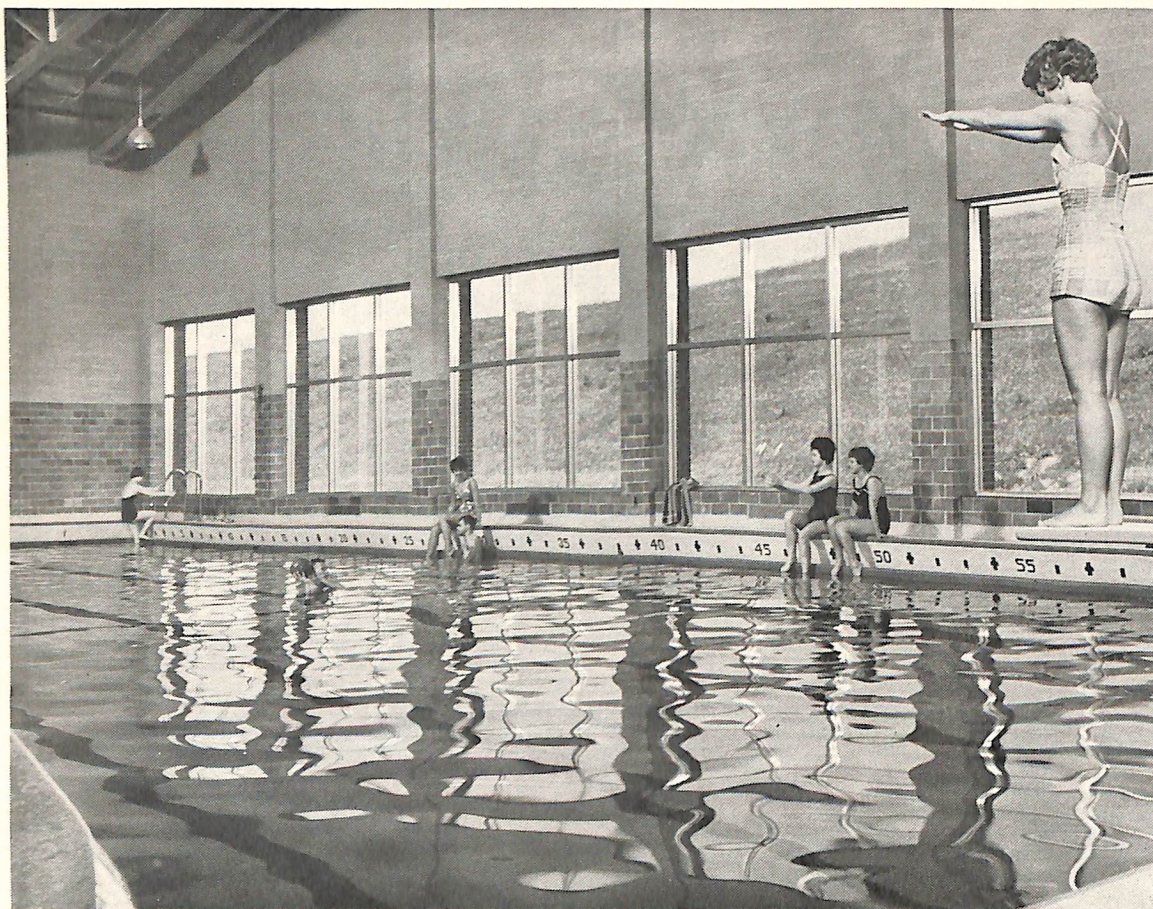
—Football with Westmar College at 2 p.m. Saturday.

College Glad to Have 'Mom' Back

Mom Hurdum is back.

News that the twinkling 4-foot 10-inch mite of an Irish woman is back at Dana College to stay brought delight to the campus.

The long-legged boy who dried dishes for her 30 years ago in the college kitchen strode down the hill to make sure.

President C. C. Madsen puffed back to his executive desk beaming.

"She's certainly a wonderful woman and we are delighted to have her back," he said.

Mom, more formally known as Mrs. Marie Hurdum, said:

"I just love this place. Maybe I should graduate eventually."

Taking delight in a freshman beanie and being dubbed the "cutest freshman girl,"

Mom is at Dana for the third time.

Now she's housemother for the 54 girl residents in the college's new Omaha Village apartments.

Although she has been gone 13 years she is known to generations of Vikings.

Scores like President Madsen worked in her college kitchen during her other stays on the hill.

She came first in 1931 with her first husband, a former Great Lakes tug cook.

"The cook had quit just before Homecoming," Mom recalled. The dean of women was my husband's cousin and called for help. We came. I remember Dr. Madsen was student Homecoming chairman.

"My, when I think of that old coal stove we'd start with corncobs in the morning!

"But we had lots of help

and lots of food. It was depression days and a lot of the kids paid tuition with hogs and chickens."

Mom left five years later when her husband died. She ran a cafe and grocery in Blair. But she left her heart on the hill. Six years later she was back as dietitian.

"That meant I was still the cook," she said.

Six years later she remarried and left to keep house in Blair. After the death of her second husband she was invited back.

"This time I'm going to stay," she said. "I was so pleased to think that after all these years they'd invite me back.

"Say, you know what they did? They asked me to speak at a convocation. I told them the only public speaking I ever had at college was screaming at the kids in the

New Council Will Counsel

Aid for the Dana Foundation is being enlisted in the form of a Development Council which will serve in an advisory capacity to President Madsen and the Board of Regents.

The Council will assist in co-ordinating the many activities relating to the fulfillment of the long-range development plans for the college.

It will consist of the chairmen of 12 committees, with Pastor James W. Olsen, Vice-President for Church Relations and Development, serving as executive secretary.

Alumni and other supporters of the college were invited to serve. Membership will be expanded as needed.

In announcing formation of the Council, Dr Madsen said:

"The objectives of the Dana College Foundation will be realized only as increasing numbers of the friends of Dana become active participants through their counsel, their prayerful support and their financial contributions."

He noted that the purpose of the Foundation is to "inform and challenge a growing circle of friends concerning the objectives, program and needs of Dana College, and to challenge these friends with opportunities for service and gift support."

These committees were established:

Publicity, Students, Alumni, Parents, Blair, Omaha, Church, Estates, Foundations and Corporations, Danish Americans, Viking Club and Faculty.

The first Council meeting was scheduled for September 29 on the campus.

Science Hall, Apartments Newest Campus Additions

Dedication of the Charles A. Dana Hall of Science has been tentatively set for November 4, college officials said.

The 500-thousand-dollar building is nearly completed. Classes may begin meeting there by mid-October.

The building is named for New York industrialist Charles A. Dana whose challenge gift of 200 thousand dollars made the project possible.

Mr. Dana is to attend the dedication as guest of honor.

Workmen are now installing laboratory equipment in the four-story hall. It will have a lecture auditorium equipped with closed-circuit television.

The hall will house the chemistry, physics, mathematics and biology departments.

It stands just north of the parking lot of Alumni Memorial Auditorium.

Korshoj Construction Company is the contractor.

More than one hundred fortunate Dana students are enjoying all the comforts of home this fall in a new kind of campus housing with an unusual name.

Three new apartment buildings have been completed just south of the old veterans' housing units.

The new buildings provide a total of 24 apartments that are being used by several married couples and 50 selected coeds.

The veterans' units were renovated this summer and are being used by single men students this fall.

The six buildings have been named Omaha Village. College officials decided upon the name as a tribute to the Omaha Indians who occupied the area during the 1800's—"the first settlers of College Hill."

In all the "village" contains 34 apartments and provides quarters for 11 married couples and one hundred single students.

Additional units are planned.

Dana Shares Kellogg Gift

Dana is one of the five Nebraska colleges sharing a 10-thousand-dollar grant from the W. K. Kellogg Foundation, Battle Creek, Mich.

The money was presented to purchase library books of benefit to departments participating in teacher education.

Other colleges sharing the grant are Midland, College of St. Mary, Hastings and Union.

A four-thousand-dollar grant from the Standard Oil Foundation, Inc., has been received by the Nebraska Independent College Foundation.

Dana is one of eight colleges that will share the gift. President Madsen accepted the grant for the NICEF.

"The Standard Oil Foundation was among the first contributors when the NICEF was formed in 1953, and it has made an annual contribution to our member Nebraska colleges without interruption since that time," he said.

Evening Program Has 12 Courses

Dana is offering 12 college-credit courses in its program of evening classes this fall.

Included are classes in art, business, education, mathematics, religion and social science. Classes meet Tuesday and Wednesday evenings.

A special feature of this year's program is a public affairs seminar on the history and nature of communism.

The seminar, which began September 17, is being conducted by Donald Warman and D. J. Tweton of the history department to acquaint the public with the development and threat of communism. Sessions of the seminar are on Monday evenings.

Mr. Dornacker, formerly of Blair, received training at George Washington University for his assignment as a vocational agriculture instructor.

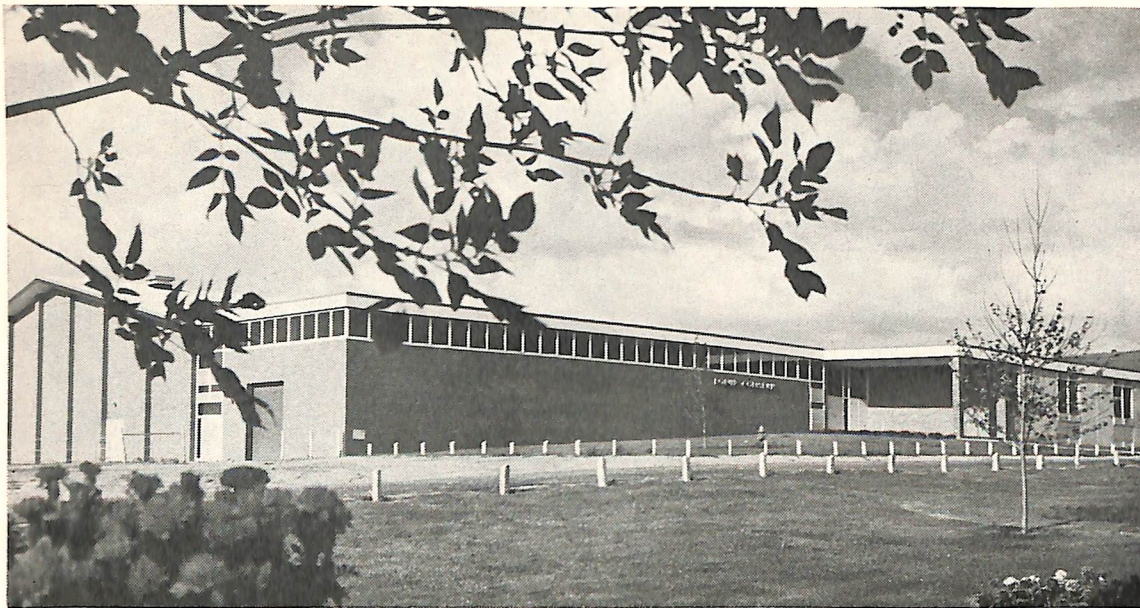
He prepared for Nepal's mountainous terrain with mountain climbing training in Colorado.

Dana Rated Title 'Contender'

With a squad of 47—including 24 lettermen—the Vikings are rated a contender this fall for their first Tri-State conference football title.

Dana finished second in the league last year, compiling its first winning record (5-3 overall) in seven years.

Chief offensive threat is Roger Beck, junior quarterback, who guided the Vikings to wins in four of their first five games last year before he was sidelined by a broken hand.

Three all-conference linemen are back: John Templeton, 215-pound center and guard; Stan Erlandsen, 215-pound tackle, and Bob Stegmaier, 240-pound defensive specialist.

Dana had trouble stopping the Tarkio passing attack at times, but was usually able to thwart the visitors once they moved into Dana territory. Back John Laughhunn stopped one Tarkio drive with an interception on the Dana 10-yard line.

Beck passed only 11 times, but completed five of the aeriels.

Tuck Rydell, 220-pound lineman, made The Omaha World-Herald's "Star-of-the-Week" list for his play against Tarkio.

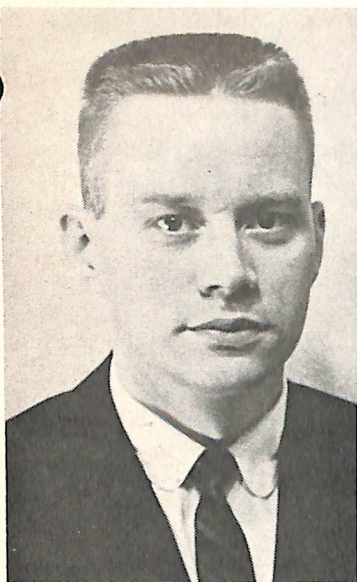
Rydell, a sophomore, was given special credit for recovering a Tarkio fumble on the Viking 10-yard line to help preserve the victory.

The meeting July 30 through August 11 will be attended by delegates from Lutheran bodies throughout the world.

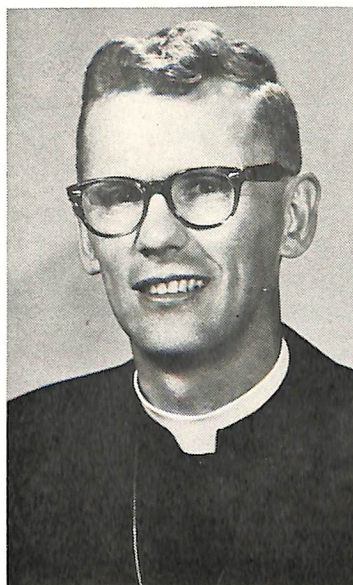
It will be the fourth assembly of the Federation and will deal with international theological problems.



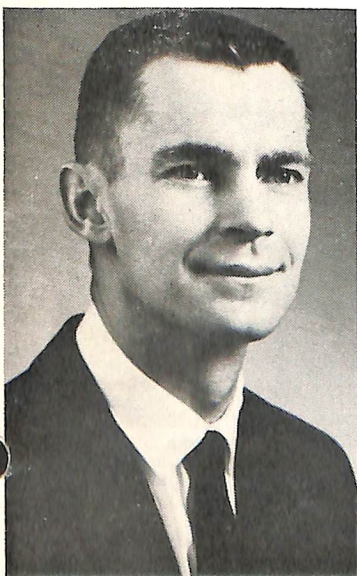

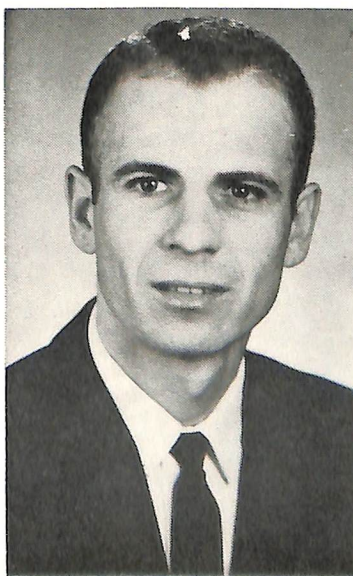

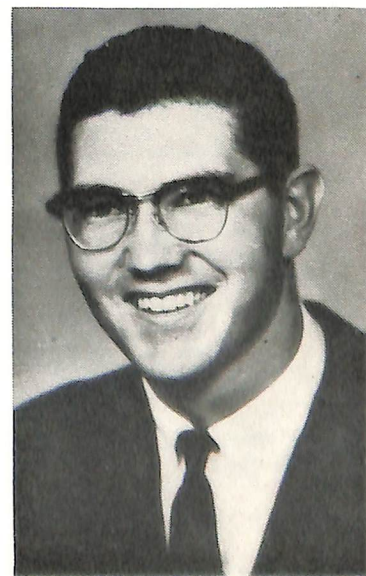

At Homecoming . . . New Constitution to Be Presented to Alumni

Alumni will get their first look at the revised constitution at the annual Alumni Association meeting during Homecoming.

Adoption of the revision must come in two steps.

First the proposed constitution must be presented at the coming meeting. Then it must be approved by a two-thirds majority at the 1963 meeting.

The revision, authorized at the meeting last October, would change the name from "the Alumni Association of Dana College and Trinity Seminary" to "Alumni Association of Dana College."

It would permit mail balloting in elections.

Requirements for membership are unchanged.

Dave Parrish, member of the revision committee, said portions of the constitution subject to occasional changes have been placed in a by-laws section.

Included in the by-laws are rules covering contributions, disbursements, publications and meetings, he said.

Another change would allow the constitution to be amended by a two-thirds majority vote at any annual meeting if

Grants For Grads Asked

An alumni graduate scholarship program suggested by Dr. Clifford Hanson is being considered by the Alumni Council.

Dr. Hanson, chairman of the alumni scholarship committee, has proposed that the Alumni Association award scholarships to allow Dana graduates of exceptional ability to attend "prestige" graduate schools.

Said Dr. Hanson of such scholarships:

"They should help establish for Dana College at top-ranking schools a reputation of high academic achievement. These institutions may then be encouraged to grant some of their own academic awards to Dana graduates.

"In some instances persons receiving these scholarships may be encouraged to return to Dana College as faculty members. In this way the quality of the Dana faculty could be improved."

Dr. Hanson proposed that the scholarship "should be not less than one thousand dollars and not more than three thousand dollars."

He specified that it should be awarded only to a student who was graduated from Dana with honors and has been admitted to a top-ranking graduate school.

The proposal will be presented at the annual association meeting October 20, council members indicated.
