

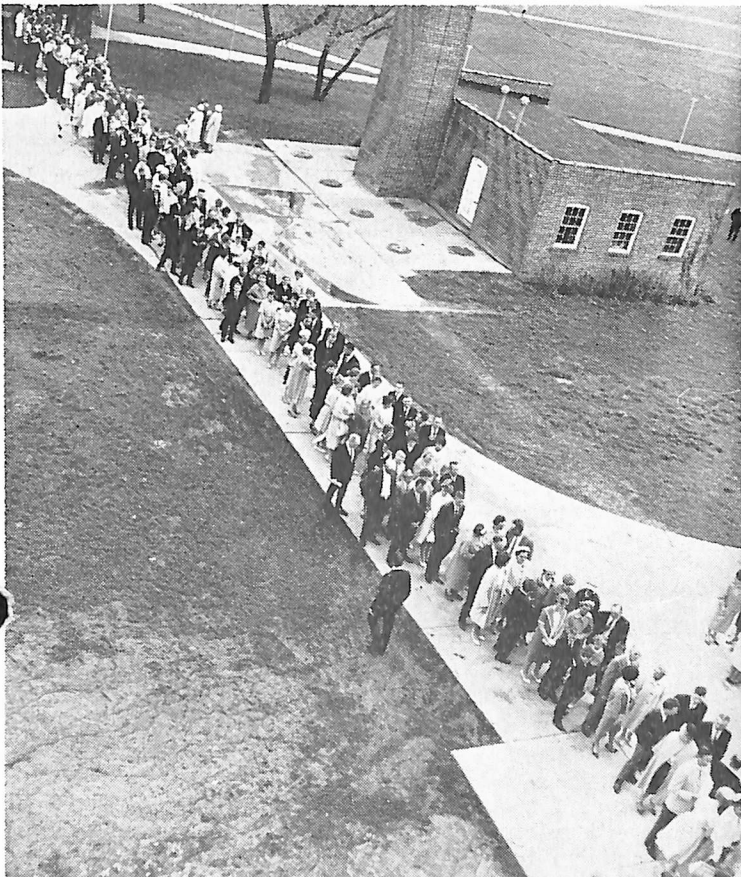

Annual Alumni Appeal Now Has \$23,333 Goal

Drive Changed to Match Calendar; 1963 Drive to End in Dec.

To make the Annual Alumni Appeal more appealing, officials this month eliminated one source of confusion.

The Alumni Council voted to have the Appeal coincide with the calendar year, rather than the fiscal year.

This means the yearly drive will begin in January and end in December of the same year instead of being split between two years. Previously the drive had begun June 1, spanning the last seven months of that year and the first five months of the next.

The Alumni Association set a 40-thousand-dollar goal for the 1963-64 Appeal at its Homecoming meeting last fall.

However, instead of continuing through May, 1964, the drive will end this December under the new system.

As a result the goal has been cut to \$23,333.

The 1964 Alumni Appeal will begin January 1.

The 1962-63 Alumni Appeal, begun one year ago under the old system, has brought in

more than six thousand dollars, the Rev. James W. Olsen, vice-president for Church Relations and Development, reported to the council. That is twice as much as previous drives have raised, he said.

Beginning on Page 2 is a series of questions prepared by officials to explain the annual fund drive.

The question-and-answer feature was included in The Review to save the expense of a separate mailing.

Alumni Appeal Questions Answered

1. WHAT IS MEANT BY THE ANNUAL ALUMNI APPEAL?

The Annual Alumni Appeal is the solicitation of an annual gift from the alumni of Dana College. Since students do not pay the entire cost of their education, there is a gap which can be closed only through annual gifts from alumni and friends in addition to the grant from The American Lutheran Church.

2. HOW IS THE APPEAL RELATED TO THE DANA COLLEGE FOUNDATION AND THE ADD PROGRAM?

You may contribute to the Dana College Foundation in a variety of ways: 1) An annual gift to The ADD (Assure Dana's Destiny) program, 2) a capital gift to the building fund, and 3) a special gift such as a bequest, annuity, or memorial.

When you give to the Annual Alumni Appeal you are giving to the Dana College Foundation through the ADD Program. You are contributing annual gift support which has the effect of providing income which would result from a larger endowment fund. All contributions other than capital and special gifts are part of the ADD program.

A gift to the Annual Alumni Appeal qualifies one for membership in the ADD Program according to the following categories: Associate, under \$100 per year; Affiliate, \$100 per year; Sponsor, \$250 per year; Patron, \$500 per year, and Fellow, \$1,000 per year.

3. WHAT IS THE GOAL FOR 1963?

At the last meeting of the Alumni Association held during the 1962 Homecoming, the Association itself adopted the challenging goal of \$40,000 for the fiscal year 1963-64 thus raising considerably the goal suggested by the Alumni Executive Committee. This is equivalent to the income from a million dollar endowment fund yielding 4 per cent. The importance of this appeal can be seen from the fact that our present endowment fund is less than \$200,000. Since the fiscal year is June 1 to May 31, the goal for the calendar year 1963 is \$23,333.

4. SPECIFICALLY, HOW WILL THE MONEY BE USED?

The members of the Alumni Association in accepting this ambitious goal suggested that it be earmarked "for the improvement of academic excellence with emphasis on faculty enrichment." This fund will assist the College in providing for additional faculty and salary increases where needed most.

5. HOW HAVE ALUMNI CONTRIBUTED IN THE PAST?

There have been appeals in the past for contributions to the alumni fund. Often the gifts have been earmarked for special projects. Until a few years ago, these gifts were received in the form of dues which have now been discontinued. Thus far, the 1962-63 Annual Alumni Appeal has resulted in gifts from 262 alumni totaling \$5,695.50.

6. WILL CAPITAL GIFTS STILL BE SOLICITED FROM ALUMNI?

Alumni responded in the past to appeals for capital funds for the erection of buildings on the campus. These needs still continue, and it is assumed that alumni will still contribute gifts to be used for capital expansion. It is hoped, however, that every alumnus of Dana will contribute to the Annual Alumni Appeal to provide this much-needed year after year support.

7. IS IT NECESSARY TO MAKE A PLEDGE FOR CONTINUED ANNUAL SUPPORT?

Alumni are encouraged to make an annual commitment, that is, give an indication that it is their intention to contribute a certain amount year after year. Such a commitment may be increased or decreased as conditions change. It is extremely helpful to the College administration in

budgeting income for the coming year to have the assurance that the alumni will contribute a certain amount. If you feel you cannot commit yourself to such a statement of intention, then give what you can each year as the Annual Alumni Appeal is made.

8. IF YOUR GIFT IS GIVEN ON AN ANNUAL BASIS, HOW MUCH IS EXPECTED?

This is entirely up to the individual alumnus. Some like to give a certain percentage of their income to the work in the Kingdom of God, with part of this designated for Christian Higher Education. Each Christian is challenged to give in proportion to the way God has blessed him. If each of some 3000 alumni were to give \$25 per year, the goal could almost be doubled. Remember, no gift is too small and no gift is insignificant when added to all other alumni gifts.

9. SHOULD I MAKE MY GIFT NOW?

Yes, if possible. However, if you wish you may make a commitment which may be honored at your convenience; monthly, quarterly, or semi-annually anytime during the calendar year, 1963.

10. WHAT ABOUT MATCHING GIFTS FROM AN EMPLOYER?

If you are employed by a company which matches the gifts of alumni to their alma mater, you will be credited with the total amount. You are urged to inquire about the policy of your employer in this matter.

11. ARE GIFTS DEDUCTIBLE FROM INCOME TAXES?

Yes, they are. The government allows an individual a deduction of up to 30 percent for charitable, religious, and educational contributions.

12. WHY SHOULD I AS AN ALUMNUS GIVE?

You should give because participation by as many alumni as possible in the Annual Alumni Appeal is important to Dana in seeking gifts from foundations and corporations which sometimes base their giving on the percentage of alumni participation in the annual alumni giving program.

You should give because the College and others have made an investment in you. Your education was subsidized through gifts from alumni, friends, and the Church body which supports Dana. Your contribution to the Annual Alumni Appeal will enable you to demonstrate your appreciation to your alma mater. It will be the measure of your devotion and loyalty as well as an investment in the future even as others have invested in you.

We appeal for your interest, support, and investment in the future. If you do your part we can go "over the top," and show a significant gain in alumni financial support over previous years.

On Destiny's Deep Sea

Dana Alumnus Elected Mayor of Lincoln, Neb.

Dana alumnus DEAN H. PETERSEN (20-23) was elected Mayor of Lincoln, Neb., this month.

He is the capital city's first full-time Mayor and will serve a four-year term.

Mr. Petersen, 59, is the owner of Dean H. Petersen & Son, Inc., Bulk Milk Transportation. He is vice-president and director of the Nebraska-Iowa Milk Carriers Association and a former director of Nebraska Mid-State Public Power & Irrigation District.

His victory was considered an upset. He defeated former State Tax Commissioner Fred Herrington, 11,224 to 10,368.

The total vote was a record for a general city election in Lincoln.

Mr. Herrington had been expected to win because of his showing in the primary. He had a 2-to-1 margin over Mr. Petersen then, although Mr. Petersen's total exceeded the combined totals of the four other candidates.

Dr. Pedersen, a Navy doctor, and his family will remain stationed in Yokohama for another year.

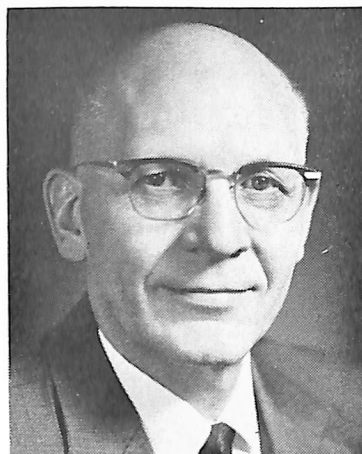
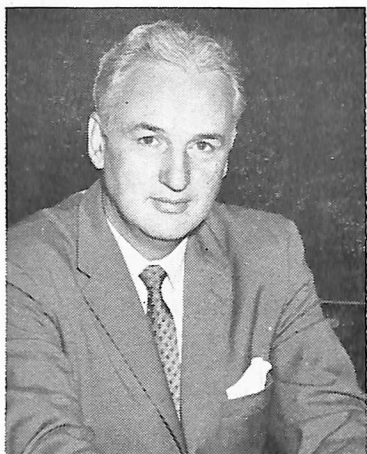
Pastor Johnsen reported the group has been meeting for the past two years in Tokyo.

Dana finished a strong second in the Westmar Invitational Track Meet May 1.

Wayne State College won with 76 points, Dana had 57 and Morningside College had 40 in the seven-team meet.

Dana's Tom Frank rambled the 120-yard high hurdles in 15 seconds flat, a school record. Other Dana victories were turned in by Dean Hendrickson in the high jump and Owen Vasby in the pole vault.

Dana won 11 of 16 events to whip the Concordia track squad 81½ to 50½ at Seward May 7.
