300 'Rise Up and Sing Thy Song'

The largest all-Dana choral group ever assembled on the campus rang Borup Coliseum at Homecoming with voices of 50 years of musical history.

In small groups and finally in a mass choir estimated at three hundred voices, the members past and present of Dana's a cappella choirs joined in a Golden Jubilee reunion program marking the fiftieth anniversary of the founding of the first formal choral group at the college.

Three directors took part in the presentation of several traditional choir favorites. They are Waldo B. Nielsen, Gunnar Malmin and Paul E. Neve.

Former directors who took part in the program but who did not conduct music: Mrs. Silas Andersen, Mrs. Hans Jersild, Mrs. Selmer Olson and Miss Mildred Brannon.

All of the directors received the college's Distinguished Service Award from President C. C. Madsen.

Mrs. Andersen, who founded the choir in 1914, recalled

the difficulties she had with the Dana Choral Union, as it was then called.

There were few singers to begin with, she said, and the men singers were forever being stolen by the athletic department.

Mrs. Andersen congratulated Mr. Neve on the quality of present-day Dana choirs. She told the audience how she heard the choir in Denmark in 1961.

Mr. Neve paid tribute to former directors.

They dedicated their lives and set standards which led to the development of the choir as one of Dana's most respected institutions, he said.

Citing the message and contributions of the choir, Mr. Neve said:

"It is for the choir member himself that the real inspiration has come."

Also honored was Magnus Christensen of Denver, who with Waldo B. Nielsen composed "Hail Dana."

Alumni Meeting Launches Appeal With \$4,000 Initial Contribution

Dana alumni did more than set a goal for their Annual Appeal when they met at Homecoming October 12.

They donated four thousand dollars of it on the spot.

The unprecedented action was in response to a new idea for alumni fund raising: the "check-a-month plan."

Phil Pagel, the association's executive director, proposed the plan to the 185

persons who attended the luncheon meeting at First Lutheran Church.

He asked each alumnus to make out 12 post-dated checks to the Dana College Foundation—one for each month of 1964. Each was given a packet of check blanks.

Alumni officials said they were very pleased by the response.

Contributions ranged from 12 one-dollar checks

to 12 one-hundred-dollar checks.

Mr. Pagel said the entire Alumni Association will be asked to participate in the plan.

He said the plan will be especially helpful to the college because officials will have a better idea of how much money they can expect from alumni contributors each month. The checks will be waiting to be cashed.

Byron Jensen, an all-conference end on the 1962 football team, is an assistant coach this year.

Dana's newest alumnus is a United States Senator.

At its Homecoming meeting October 12, the Alumni Association voted an honorary membership to Senator Roman Hruska of Nebraska.

It was the first action under a constitution that was ratified at the session.

The meeting was held in a new setting—a luncheon in the basement of First Lutheran Church. It attracted 185 persons, a record for an alumni meeting.

"Blessing"

Senator Hruska had been invited to send a written Homecoming greeting. But he offered instead to make the greeting in person.

He told the alumni that the role of the small college is increasing in importance. He said this was emphasized to him recently when he visited a university with an enrollment of 13 thousand.

"What a blessing it is," he said, "to have refuges in this complex world, islands of intellect, culture and education, such as we have here in Blair."

He presented the college with a three-volume scholarly work, "Scandinavia, Past and Present."

Standing Vote

Later, the moment the new alumni constitution was approved, President Madsen moved to grant honorary membership to the Senator. There was a chorus of seconds, and the association passed the motion with a standing vote.

Senator Hruska was scheduled to speak at half-time of the Homecoming football game, but the talk was cancelled when the public address system failed.

Dr. Lawrence Siersbeck, former president of the college, gave the invocation at the luncheon.

'Realistic' '64 Goal Voted

The Alumni Association set "a realistic goal of 15 thousand dollars" for the 1964 Alumni Appeal at the annual meeting.

The figure was recommended by the Alumni Council.

The association had set 40-thousand-dollar goals the past two years, falling far short each time.

136 Gifts

Treasurer Earl Pace reported that since May 31 the current drive had brought in 136 gifts totaling \$2,650.50.

The Rev. Fredric Youra, Alumni Association president, said the council felt that it would be better to set an attainable goal and "go over the top" than to set an extremely high goal and fall embarrassingly short.

Budget

The association approved an operating budget for 1964 of \$3,250. It provides 250 dollars for supplies, six hundred dollars for travel expenses, 650 dollars for the senior banquet and Homecoming, 750 dollars for scholarships and grants and one thousand dollars for *The Review*.

The association also gave final approval to its new constitution. Copies may be obtained from the college public relations office.

Senior Singer Chosen To Join National Choir

Richard Jorgensen, a senior from Des Moines, Ia., was a member of the National Lutheran College Choir which was featured in Minneapolis at the Third Annual Church Seminar sponsored by Lutheran Brotherhood.

Singers were chosen from all of the 33 Lutheran senior colleges in the United States and Canada.

Safari, Cruise . . .

Part of Job for Alumnus

An African safari. A one-thousand-mile ocean trip. A week of sight-seeing on the Continent. A visit to historic spots in London.

Those are some of the experiences logged by alumnus Ron Siersbeck on his job as a programming technician for the missile division of Lockheed Aircraft Corporation.

The travels came in August, when the 1959 mathematics-and-history grad was chosen by Lockheed to visit a satellite and missile tracking station on the tiny,

primitive island of Mahe in the Seychelles group off the African coast.

Camera Safari

Ron left his home at 959 Rich Avenue in Mount View, Cal., on August 12 and flew to New York.

From there he flew to London, where he spent a short time visiting such places as Buckingham Palace and the Tower of London. He also attended services at Westminster Abbey.

From London the Danian flew to Mombasa, Kenya, with short stopovers in

Libya and in Nairobi, the capital of Kenya.

While waiting for a ship, Ron went on safari from Mombasa. He went four hundred miles into the interior, shooting—with camera, not gun—a variety of wild animals.

Seven-Day Cruise

Ron has an aunt in Africa—Miss Gertrude Bluemel, who is a medical missionary for a Lutheran hospital at Eket, Nigeria.

At Mombasa on August 19, Ron boarded a 167-foot freighter with seven other passengers for the last leg of his journey to Mahe.

The voyage took a full week, and Ron reported that he would rather swim than take the same ship again.

The island of Mahe is only about 11 miles long and four miles wide. It has about 40 thousand residents.

Native Built

Ron reported that the mode and pace of life on the island is comparable to that of the United States in pre-Civil War days.

However, it was possible to complete the entire job of erecting the complex tracking facility with native labor.

Ron spent about two weeks inspecting the station before returning home by way of Continental Europe, where he spent another week sight-seeing.

The alumnus is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Anker Siersbeck of Indianapolis.

Homecoming Loss Started Sad Trend

Homecomers who watched Northwestern College upset Dana 28 to 13, saw the beginning of a disastrous four-game losing streak for the Vikings.

Dana finished the season with a record of two wins and six losses.

The Vikings had won two of four games going into the Homecoming contest. But the team's defense developed holes after Les Pederson, 220-pound linebacker, was lost for the season with a back injury.

The Vikings were strong offensively, scoring at least twice in every game but one.

The last win came October 5 at Yankton College, 13 to 0. Halfback Bryce

Olson picked up 91 yards rushing and ran 80 yards with an intercepted pass for one Dana touchdown.

Against Northwestern the following week Olson provided some bright moments for Homecomers with touchdown runs of eight and 39 yards.

On October 19 Dana scored 21 points against a strong Westmar team. But Westmar scored 47. Olson scored on a 95-yard kick-off return and on a 58-yard sprint from scrimmage.

Concordia, which shared the Tri-State Conference Championship with Dana last year, toppled the Vikings, 33 to 13, October 26. Quarterback Roger Beck passed for both Dana touchdowns, one of them a 30-yarder to Olson.

Dana challenged Nebraska Wesleyan, Great Plains Association champs, in the final game, November 2. Dana scored first and held an edge in first downs, but lost, 34 to 13.

Appointed

President Madsen has been named to the Governor's Committee on Higher Education in Nebraska. The group met for the first time September 14, in Lincoln.

Pub House Being Sold

Dana will sell one of its newest assets.

The Board of Regents at its November meeting authorized college officials to put up for sale the modern building downtown which formerly housed the Blair branch of the Augsburg Publishing Company.

Once the Lutheran Publishing House, the business was closed as a consolidation move by the parent company in Minneapolis.

The building was given to the college with the stipulation that it not be used as a printing plant.

The Regents decided not to attempt to use the structure in connection with any college activity.

Dana's printing business has been scattered since the publishing facility shut down.

The Review and many other college publications are prepared at the Nebraska Farmer Company in Omaha.

Hermes, the student newspaper, is being printed by the Enterprise Company in Blair.
