1964 Dana Fund Goal Is Sought

As of March 1, one-fourth of the way through 1964, the Alumni Association has realized five thousand dollars toward the goal of 15 thousand dollars set for the current Annual Appeal.

We reported in the November issue of the Review that a realistic goal of 15 thousand dollars had been set by alumni at the annual meeting held during Homecoming. Those in attendance set the goal, but they also started the appeal moving by contributing four thousand dollars the same day.

Although the total now on hand is somewhat encouraging considering we have nearly nine months to raise the additional 10 thousand dollars, the number of individual alumni participating in the appeal is disappointing.

The five thousand dollars now on hand has been contributed by 106 alumni, giving them an average gift of 47 dollars a year or four dollars a month.

If this four dollars a month were to be adopted by each alumnus, we would have no difficulty at all in realizing our goal.

But why is it so difficult to raise 15 thousand dollars for Dana College from her four thousand alumni?

Alumnus in Mission Field Writes to College Friends

Here are excerpts from a letter sent to many of their Dana friends by the Rev. Richard Jensen, Class of 1956, and his wife, Bonnie, from their Lutheran mission in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia.

Dick had a very good trip down to South Africa, Southern Rhodesia—where he attended a four-week refresher course—and Tanganyika. He got a good look at the racial discrimination in South Africa. It was hard to believe, but he only had to walk off the plane and look at the air terminal to see it. The entrances were marked "Whites" and "Blacks."

Our new seminary chapel is about finished. We have just received word from a Lutheran church in the States that they will give our seminary their old pipe organ. We answered an ad in the Lutheran Standard, figuring there was little hope of getting it, since we get the Standard six to eight weeks late.

But we were fortunate and now we are just looking for some money in order to get the organ shipped over here.

In connection with our chapel, an artist from Germany has given drawings for a mosaic of the risen Christ for the wall over the altar and also for a colored window showing the coming of the Holy Spirit . . .

During the past year, the Lord has led us in many ways, and shown us how mightily He deals with His people. Only recently we gathered with friends, on two separate occasions, to pray for and lay hands on the sick, and now both of these people seem to be well on their way to normal health.

One man had an extraordinary experience during the night after we left. He woke up with a terrific burning in his chest. He actually thought he was dying. However, the next morning when the doctor visited him, his blood pressure was normal for the first time in many weeks. We have read of healings being accompanied by burning sensations and it was a real joy to have such a wonderful thing happen so nearby.

Recently one of our doctors cast an evil spirit out of a teen-age boy, who had been crawling on his knees and behaving much like an animal for three years.

We certainly have come to realize that evil spirits and the devil himself are objective realities and not just figments of the mind. How idly we have sat by and failed to realize the power that God has to do these things in our day.

"Heal the sick, cast out evil spirits in My name," Christ said. And where is our faith? To step out and act as if God can do such things takes a sort of helpless expectation on our part. We will never feel ready to do this. We can only venture—believing!

Our family is fine. Dick continues his seminary teaching, co-pastoring a congregation, and a little preaching for the LWF radio station.

Doron is five and Dodie is three. Derek is one and walking around everything, pulling end tables over, knocking down lamps and such . . .

We heard an interesting bit of information from a Peace Corps teacher. Her high school students here can't quite accept that the earth is round. They will write it on the tests, but they don't really believe it. They say it is round, like a pancake.

Well, we guess a modern society isn't made overnight . . .

Pow . . .

Swinging from his heels, the student aimed a punch at the professor's jaw. The professor went limp and crashed to the floor.

One of the guinea pigs for Beck's trick punches is Prof. Rod Whitaker, chairman of Dana's Speech and Drama Department. He and Athletic Director Paul F. Peterson are guiding the project.

Another student taking part is Dick Moosmann of Aurora, Colo.

Tricks such as receiving a blow on the palm of a hand and rolling with a fake punch make the practice arena look like Pier 19 at the height of a waterfront brawl.

But it's all for Art, even if there is an occasional wince of real pain. As Mr. Whitaker says:

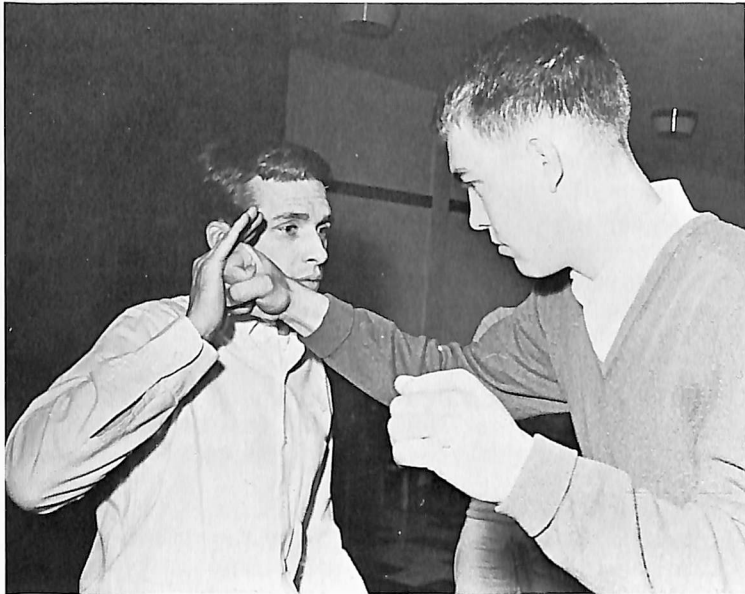
"No matter how good an actor you are, there is just no way to fake so perfectly that it doesn't hurt some."

Alumni Can Buy New Choir Disc

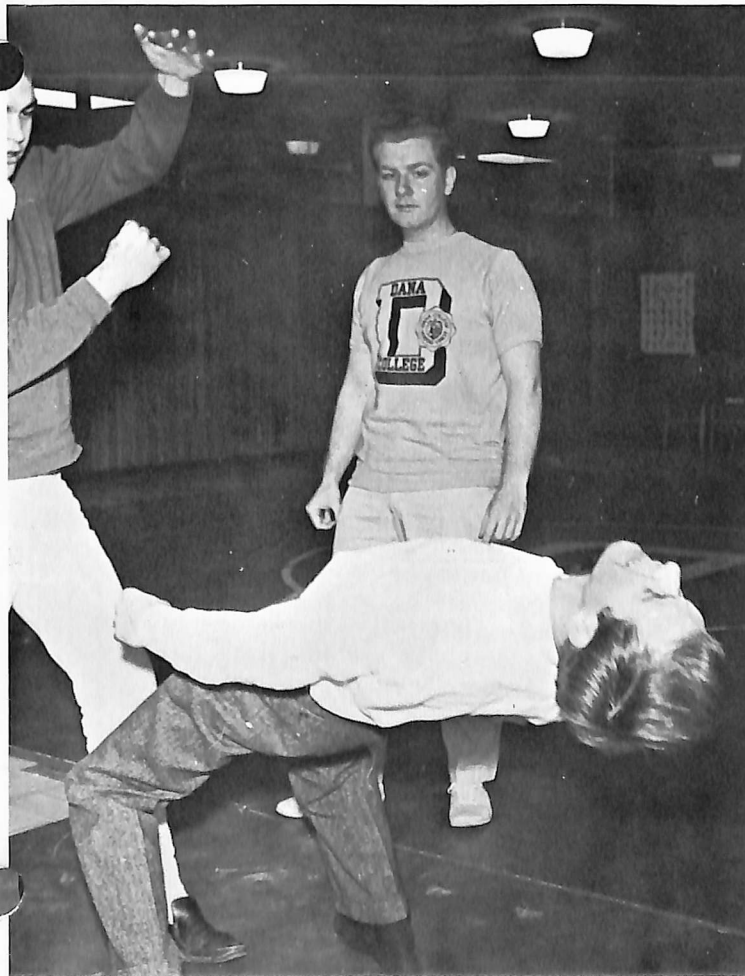
A new recording by the Dana choir is now available at the public relations office. Price is four dollars.

Selections are from this year's choir program. There also is a variety of favorite hymns.

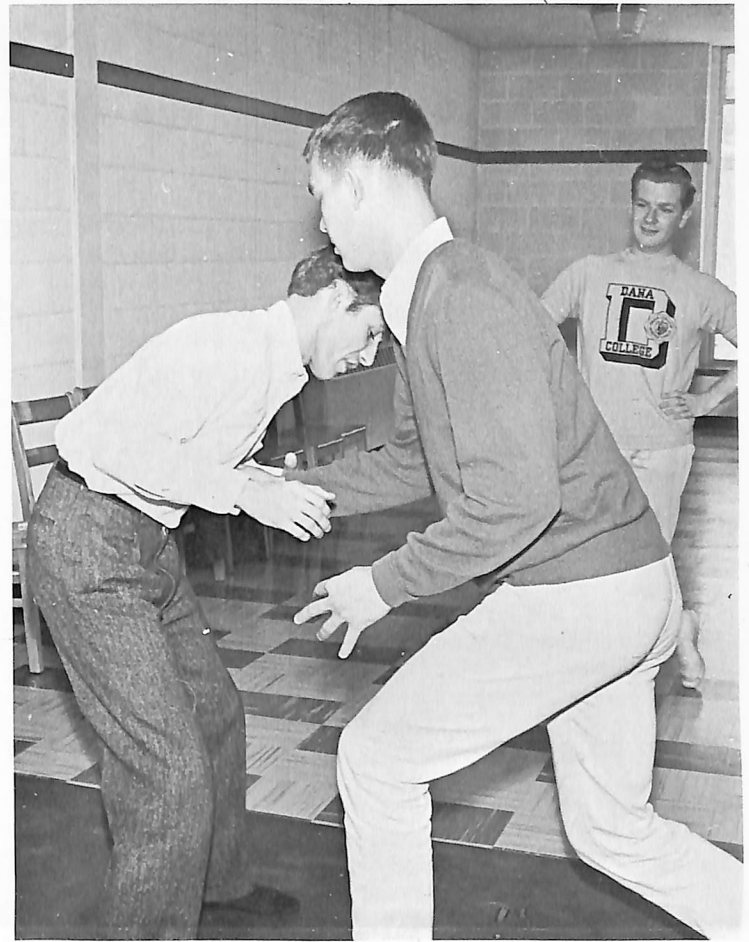

In slow motion, a punch in the jaw for Whitaker becomes a harmless poke in the palm.

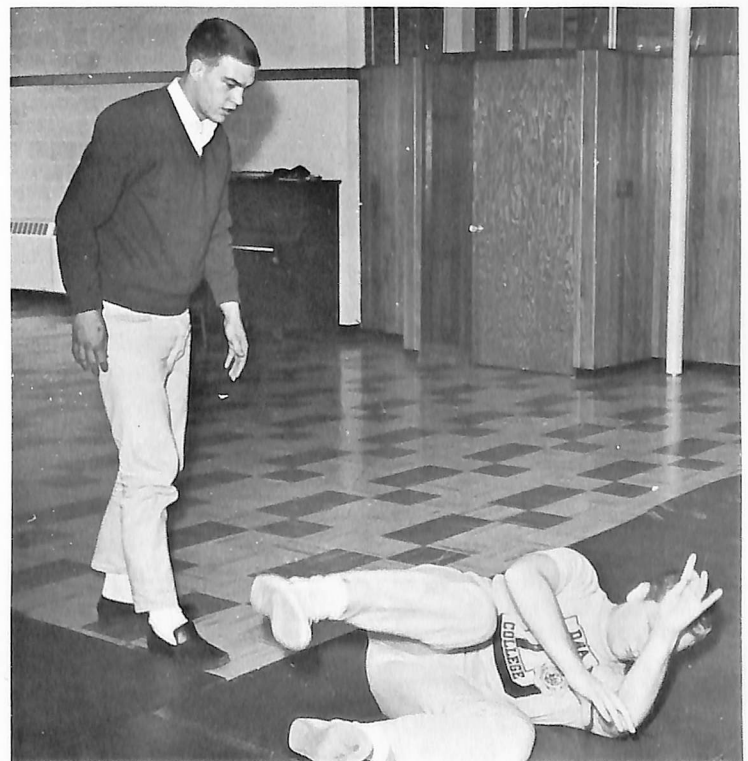


Whitaker is decked by Beck, with appropriate grimace. Moosmann looks on; it's his turn next.

Poetry Honor to Former Prof.

A former Dana professor now at the University of Massachusetts has been awarded the five-hundred-dollar Melville Cane Award from the Poetry Society of America for the outstanding book of poems published in 1963.

The coveted award went to Joseph Langland for his second collection of poems, "The Wheel of Summer," published by Dial Press.

Professor Langland, who went to the University of Massachusetts in 1959 from

the University of Wyoming, is also the author of "The Green Town," published in 1956 by Scribners in its "Poets of Today" series. This collection was among the final nominees for the National Book Award.

He is co-editor with Paul Engle of "Poet's Choice," a book including the favorite poem of each of 103 contemporary poets.

Mr. Langland's poems have appeared in several anthologies and have been recorded for Folkways Rec-

ords and the Library of Congress.

A native of Spring Grove, Minn., Professor Langland was educated at the State University of Iowa, Bread Loaf, Harvard and Columbia Universities.

He has taught at SUI and at Dana and has been guest lecturer at the University of British Columbia and San Francisco State College.

He is poetry editor of "The Massachusetts Review," a professional magazine of the arts and literature.

A former Viking football standout is head wrestling coach at the University of Omaha.

He's Don Benning, 27, one of the few Negroes in America, if not the only one, to coach a major sports team exclusive of an all-Negro school.

Don's assignment came last fall. At the same time he was named O.U.'s assistant football coach and an instructor in the Department of Physical Education.

Of his promotion from assistant to head coach, he says:

"That little step creates a little bit more pressure than you would think. The whole success of the program lies directly in your lap."

Don's athletic career goes back to North High School in Omaha, where he earned six varsity letters; two each in football, wrestling and baseball.

Wrestling at 155 pounds, he was second in the Nebraska state meet in 1954. That year he hit .436 while playing baseball on North's American Legion team.

After his graduation from North in 1954, Don enrolled

at Dana.

During his one season of play for the Red and White, he was the squad's leading rusher in football.

He transferred to O.U. the next year and was graduated in 1958. He has served in the Marine Reserve, been executive secretary of the North Side YMCA in Omaha and earned a master's degree at O.U.

Don is married to the former Marcidene Williams and they have a daughter, Victoria, one. The Bennings live at 3355 North Fortieth Street, Omaha.

Accreditation Nod to Dana

Dana is one of 28 schools across the country that have been accepted as members by the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education.

Dana was the only Nebraska college to be accepted at the membership meeting in Chicago.

Professor Raymond Weckmuller, head of the Education Department, accepted the membership on behalf of the college.

AACTE is an autonomous department of the National Education Association. It was formed in 1948 as a union of several organizations. Its goal is the continued improvement of the quality of education of teachers.

There are 662 members, ranging from small liberal arts colleges such as Dana to the largest universities.

Madsen On Federal Aid Commission

President Madsen has been named by Nebraska Governor Frank Morrison to a seven-man state commission to determine priorities of Federal funds allocated to building programs of colleges and universities.

The appointments were made in connection with the Federal Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963.

Governor Morrison said the commission will determine which public and private, non-profit institutions of higher education will have sufficient priority to receive Federal funds for construction.

In addition to setting the priority of construction projects among the schools, the commission will determine whether a school should receive a Federal grant of one-third or a smaller portion of the cost of the project.

In the case of public community colleges and public technical institutes, the new law sets the Federal share at 40 per cent of the cost.

Dr. Madsen will represent church and private schools. Other commission members:

E. K. Yanney, Lodgepole, Neb., state colleges; Vice-Chancellor Joseph Soshnik of the University of Nebraska; Don MacLay, Norfolk, Neb., junior colleges; Kirk Naylor, University of Omaha; and Mrs. Irene Bystrom and John J. Powers, representing the public at large.
