## October 22-24 Is the Week End for a Homecoming With a Touch of Tivoli

### Two New Buildings Started

Dana will have some more new construction to show Homecomers this fall.

Work has started on two more major campus buildings—a campus center and a new men's dormitory. Together they will cost \$1,246,216.

Among those on hand to turn a shovel of dirt at ground-breaking ceremonies August 6 was Dr. R. E. Morton, former Dana president now living in Lodi, Cal.

President Madsen took a turn at the controls of a giant earth-moving machine during the ceremonies. He said he expected this fall's enrollment to reach seven hundred, and he added:

"We haven't been able to accept more applications because we haven't room."

The new dormitory should relieve the enrollment pinch. Both it and the campus center are to be completed by September, 1966.

Three hundred persons attended the ground-breaking, including a large number of young people enrolled in an American Lutheran Church leadership training school on the campus.

The contract is the sixth awarded to the Korshoj Construction Company. The two new buildings are the sixth and seventh major building projects undertaken by the college since 1959.

Homecoming this year offers an entertainment idea imported from Denmark—plus a program packed with both new events and old favorites.

The dates are October 22-24; the theme: "Homecoming in Tivoli."

The campus is to be transformed into a smaller but titillating version of Denmark's famous Tivoli Gardens. Sidewalk cafes, fireworks and music are planned.

The week end's main feature will be a special program honoring former students and faculty of Trinity Seminary Saturday at 8:15 p.m. in Alumni Memorial Auditorium.

Dr. William Larsen, secretary of the American Lutheran Church, will speak. Dr. R. E. Morton, former Dana president, will be master of ceremonies. The event is planned as a major reunion for all who were connected with Trinity. The annual

choir reunion will close the program.

Perhaps the freshest idea for the week end is the first annual Alumni Men's Golf Tournament to be held at the Blair Country Club Friday beginning at noon. There'll be a trophy for the winner. Greens fee is \$2.50.

The 1965 Homecoming Queen and her court will be named at the traditional coronation ceremony at 8 p.m. Friday. The entertainment attraction this year will be Peter Palmer, his Voices and Orchestra.

## New Football Coach Named

Dana's new football coach is Grant Walls, Jr., a former Big Ten football player whose credentials include three years as a member of one of the most successful college coaching staffs in the country.

A 1961 graduate of the University of Michigan, he did his football playing as a guard for the Wolverines, first under Coach Bennie Oosterbaan and later under Bump Elliot. Among his teammates was speedster Bennie McRae, now a defensive back for the Chicago Bears.

Walls received his Master's Degree from Wittenberg University, Springfield, O., where from 1961 through 1963 he was an assistant under Coach Bill Edwards. During that period Wittenberg lost only one football game, and Coach Edwards was named Small College Coach of the Year in both 1962 and 1963 by the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

Walls spent one season as head track coach at Wittenberg before taking a coaching post at Northeastern High School in Springfield.

At Dana he inherits a squad that has finished near the bottom of the Tri-State Conference standings the past two seasons. But the new coach said he was encouraged after issuing equipment to more than 50 candidates at opening drills.

Included were 18 lettermen and seven other members of last year's squad.

Walls said that Greg Mitchell, senior running back from Berlin, Wis., who was out most of last season with a leg injury, is expected to be back in action this year. Also returning are Knight Wynn, a swift halfback from Lyons, Nebr., who was the leading Viking rusher last year, and Gerald Quirk, an end from Racine, Wis., the leading pass-receiver and scorer.

Veteran quarterback Ron Anderson of Evan, Minn., is back, along with tackle Robert Longacre, a 230-pounder from Omaha, who showed promise last year as a freshman.

Although the Vikings seem to have strength in the backfield and at the ends, Walls may have manpower shortages at some of the other positions.

"The interior line looks a little weak," he said. "We shouldn't have any problem putting one group out there, but beyond that we may be pretty thin."

Facing a rebuilding period without

a stack of football scholarships to offer, Walls appealed to alumni for scouting help.

"We're going to try to do a little more with recruiting," he said. "It's tough for us, of course. We can't give athletes a free ride. All we can do is try to make them feel Dana is the school they should attend.

"I'd like to get the alumni to help us. If they'll drop us a line when they see a boy who might be a prospect, we'll follow it up."

Assisting Walls this fall are Athletic Director Paul Peterson and Dean of Men Kieth Skogman, who shared football coaching duties since 1961 when Darrell Zimmerman resigned to become head track coach at Valparaiso University.

## Dana in Plans for Centennial

Dana will help sponsor a Scandinavian Week festival in Omaha either next year or as part of the Nebraska Centennial Year celebrations in 1967.

The idea behind the celebration, according to chairman Henry F. Pedersen, Jr., a state senator and president of the Danish Brotherhood in Nebraska, is "to start a traditional festival in Nebraska to recognize contributions of Scandinavians."

Val Peterson of Hastings, Neb., former Ambassador to Denmark, has mentioned the possibility of inviting Scandinavian royalty to Nebraska for the festival.

Dana personnel involved in the planning are President Madsen, Philip A. Pagel, Norman Bansen and Paul Strand.

Originally the group intended to plan a "Danish Days" festival, but the idea broadened to include all Scandinavian countries.

Among the planners are the mayors of Nebraska's two largest cities—Omaha's A. V. Sorensen and Lincoln's Dean Petersen, a Dana alumnus. Both mayors are of Danish descent.

Danians and members of Lutheran churches at Ferndale and Fortuna, Cal., joined to present a Christian college program with an accent on Dana August 8 at Fortuna.

The Rev. George Demant (50), pastor of the Fortuna church, opened the program with devotions.

The Rev. Darol Valder (57), pastor of the Waterloo (Neb.) Presbyterian Church, was master of ceremonies. He introduced the guest speaker, Norman C. Bansen (47) of the Dana faculty, a violin soloist and prospective Dana student, Brigitte Greve of Loleta, and an alumni sextet consisting of LaVerne Chandler Hackett (51-53), Shirley Chandler Valder (53-54), Ann Jessen Bansen (52-54), Elna Nielsen Demant (47-48), Lloyd Bansen (53) and Pastor Demant.

Dana was the site this past summer for a three-day workshop on the practices and theology of confirmation conducted by the American Lutheran Church.

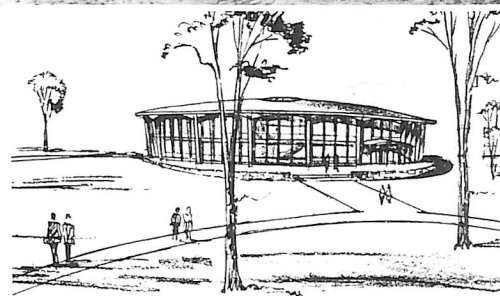
# Ground Broken for Dorm, Center

## Summer Session Enrollment—228

Enrollment at the regular summer session was 228, Director Ray Weckmuller reported.

Mr. Weckmuller predicted that the general character of Dana summer sessions probably will undergo considerable change in the next few years.

In the past, he said, summer sessions have primarily served elementary teachers who were still working toward degrees. Now, however, very few new teachers are entering the profession without degrees, and each year the number of teachers without degrees grows smaller.

Air conditioned facilities and broader course offerings have been suggested as ways of encouraging more regular college students to attend summer sessions. Also projected are family "retreats" on the campus which will enable entire families to use vacation periods to broaden educational horizons.

## Alumnus Slain in Bank Holdup

Andreas Kjeldgaard, 77, one of three persons slain in the June 4 holdup of the Farmers State Bank at Big Springs, Neb., was a Dana alumnus.

The holdup, described as the bloodiest bank robbery in modern times, attracted national attention. The bandit forced Mr. Kjeldgaard, bank president, and three other officials to lie face down on the floor, then shot each of them in the back. One survived.

Charged with the crime was Duane Pope, 22, who had graduated from McPherson (Kans.) College a few days earlier.

## New Zealander Sees Old Main—

### It's Just Like Dad's Photo

A glimpse of the Dana College campus—a mere photograph that had hung for years over the mantelpiece in a cottage 10 thousand miles away—became a reality this week for a young New Zealander.

Seeing the real thing completed a sentimental journey for Ivan Christensen, 32, of Palmerston, North Island, N. Z.

Ivan's father, the late Rev. Ansjar Christensen, was graduated from Dana in 1927 and had returned to his native land to become pastor of a Danish Lutheran church.

He sustained the memories of his old college days by keeping a picture of the student body grouped before Dana's Old Main.

"I grew up looking at that picture and hearing Dad tell of the wonderful four years he spent here," Ivan said. "I wanted to come and see it for myself."

Ivan, a postoffice telegrapher, and a

friend, Allan Pratt, 35, a Waganui school teacher, began a journey to Europe this summer. A visit to the United States was a must to fulfill Ivan's desire to see his father's old college.

The pair took a bus tour from Miami, arrived in Omaha at 4 a.m., "caught a couple of hours of shuteye," and showed up on the campus in time to bump into President Madsen arriving at his office.

The major building program at the college had changed the face of the campus as Ivan's father would have remembered it. But Old Main, although built in 1886 and although renovated inside, remains as it was in the old photo above the mantel.

Dr. Madsen, a student here after Ivan's father, arranged for a surprise. Boas Wiseman, college development officer and a classmate of Ivan's father, and Mrs. J. P. Nielsen, widow of Dr. J. P. Nielsen, a faculty member, were introduced to the visitors.

Later in the day the New Zealanders headed for New York and an ocean trip to England where they hope to get jobs for a year.

But before he left Ivan mused:

"This makes the trip complete. My mother never visited here. She was engaged to my father when he began looking for a Danish Lutheran college. At that time this was the closest and he chose to come here. They were married on his return.

"Now I can write her and tell her Dana is even better than in that old photograph and in those stories of Dad's."

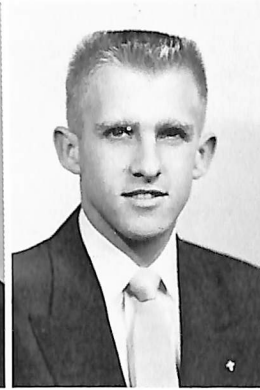
