



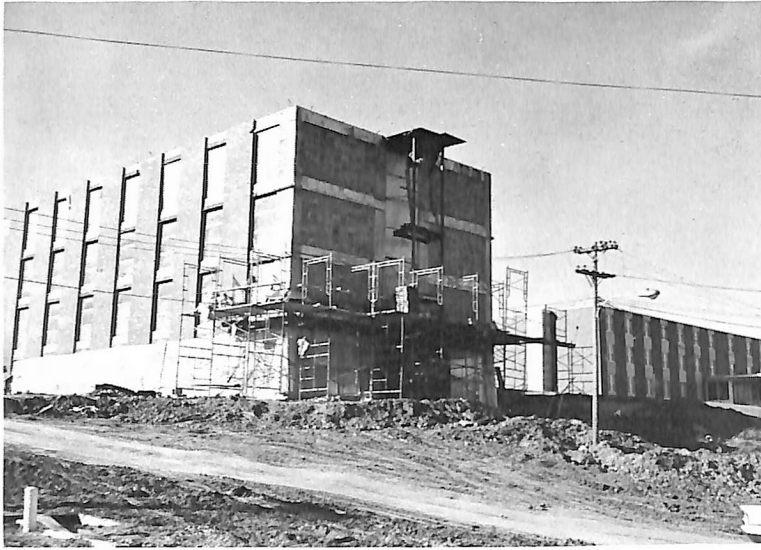

What New Dana Center Offers:



Dormitory Resembles Its Neighbor

Winter or not, builders are making giant strides toward completion of Dana's two latest projects, the Campus Center and the men's dormitory.

When the photo on the front page was taken only the steel had been put in place for the Campus Center, a round building. Now, as the accompanying photos show, roofing, flooring and some concrete block areas are in shape. In addition much of the exterior work on the dorm has been completed.

Construction of the student center building marks a significant milestone in the college's development program.

Previous projects in the building program have emphasized "basics"—classroom and living.

The activities building is the first attempt on a large scale to improve student services. In this competitive age of college recruitment, Dana must offer expanded facilities for recreation, relaxation and a well-rounded program of extracurricular activities.

One feature of the building will be The Presidents' Room, a special area set aside to pay tribute to all who have served as president of the college. It will be used for board meetings, some receptions, special dinners and other functions.

The main lounge will be called the Linden Room and will be equipped with lounge furniture, music listening equipment and probably television.

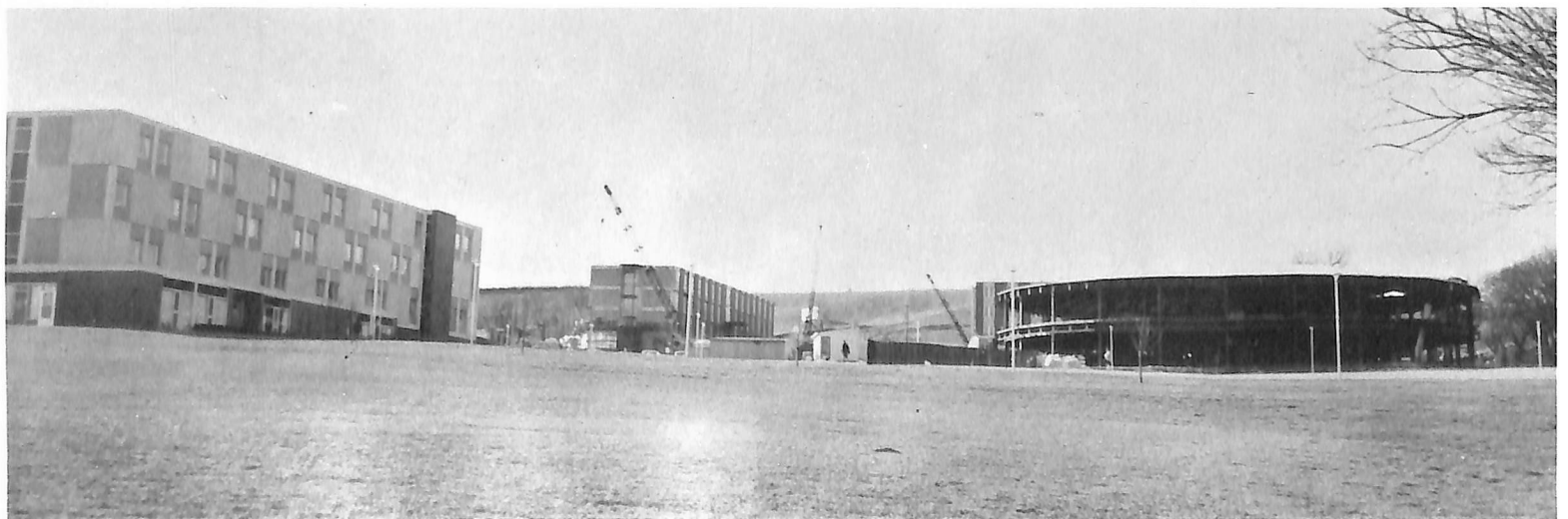
A coffee shop on the first floor may be decorated in the style of an old inn, with quarry tile floor, heavy tables and captain's chairs. It will be open longer hours than the present Canteen and offer a more extensive menu. Next door will be a game room.

Student government and publications offices and a Student Council meeting room also will be on the first floor, next to the new bookstore. Postoffice space for one thousand also will be included.

Campus Center Shows Its Ribs, Soon To Be Covered



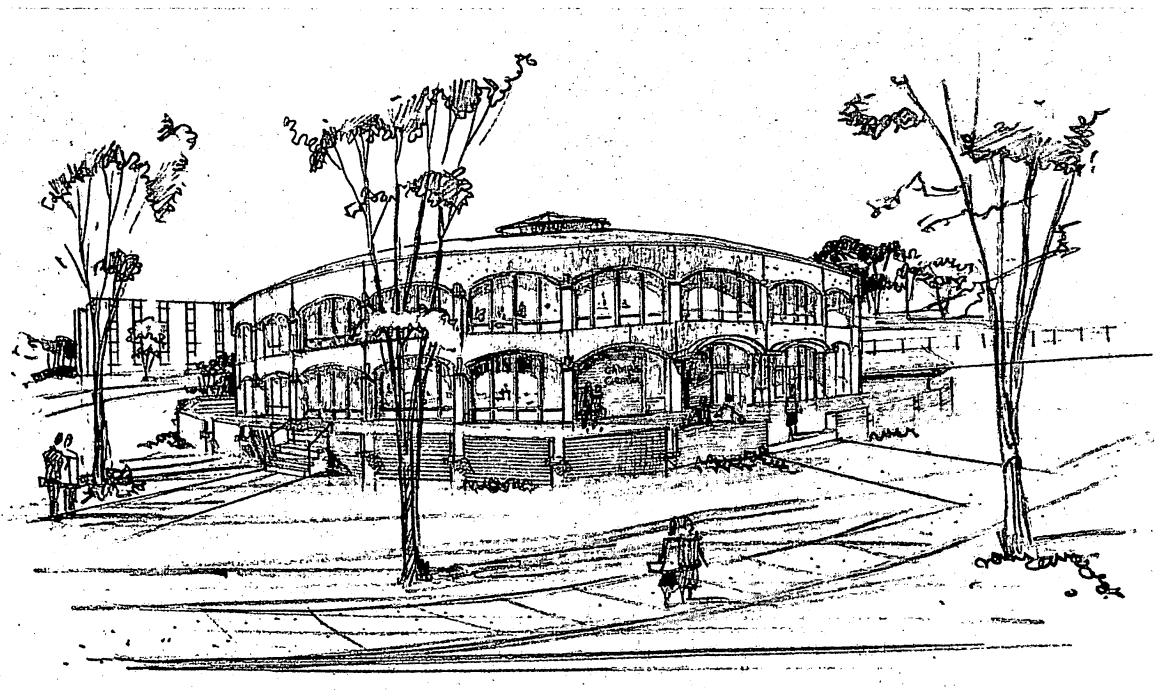

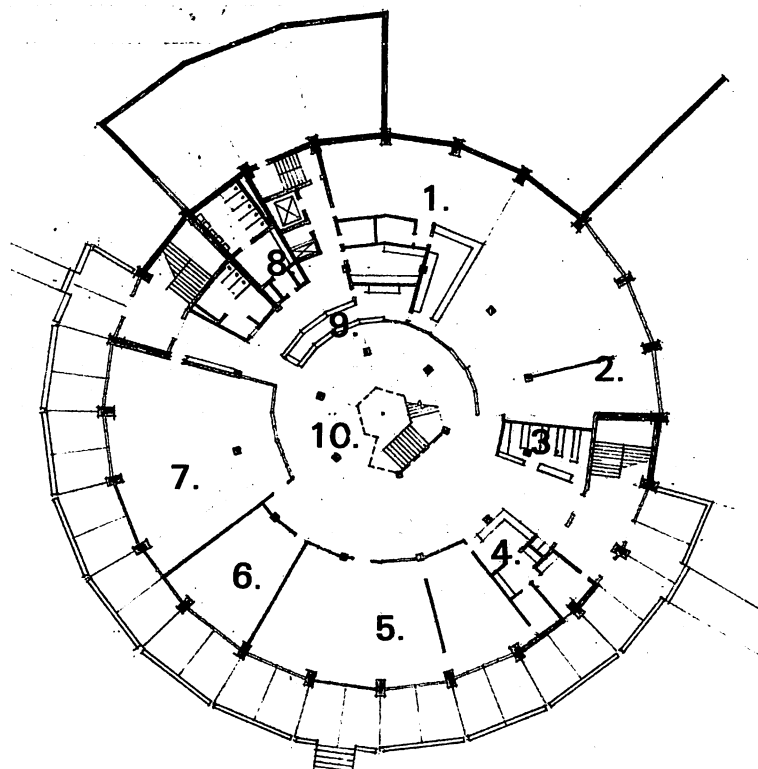
the second floor will overlook the entire campus and provide seating for about five hundred at a time. This is about twice the size of the present dining hall. The room will be serviced by two cafeteria lines and have large folding partitions so that portions may be closed off for conferences or other special events.

Donations to the Campus Center project may be general in nature or earmarked for specific projects. Some specific needs:

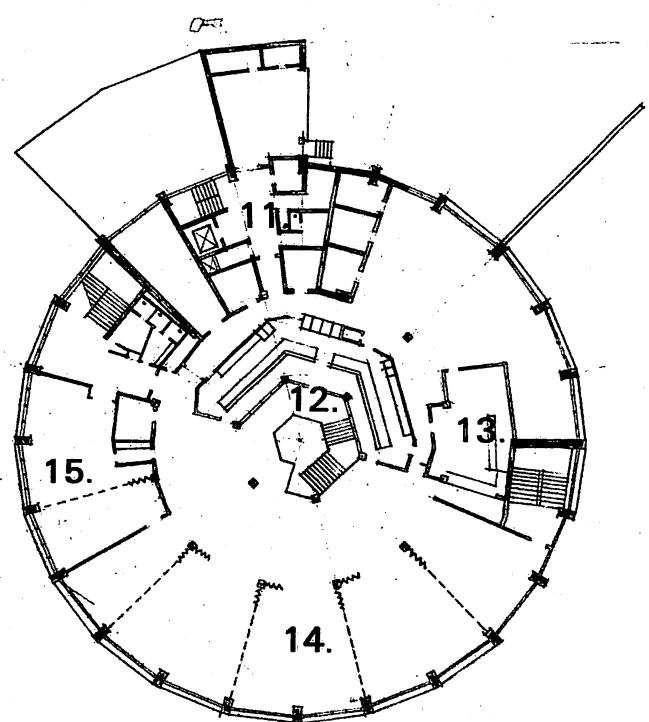

New Post to Alumnus

Kenneth Anderson, a 1963 Dana graduate, has been named an associate in the Office of Church-Relations and Development.

The appointment will become effective July 1, President Madsen said.

"As a part of the upcoming drive for funds of the American Lutheran Church, we must contribute two fulltime men to assist in the campaign," Dr. Madsen said. "Boas Weismann, who has been directing our development program since 1959, will participate in this new program, assisted by Mr. Anderson.

"It is also our plan to have Mr. Anderson assume active leadership in directing the affairs of the Alumni Association—an area which has needed fulltime personnel for a number of years."

Since the ALC campaign is not scheduled to begin until next January, Mr. Anderson will focus his efforts on alumni affairs until then, Dr. Madsen said.

Mr. Anderson is completing requirements for a Master's Degree at Boston University.

Reinhardt Gift to Dana Includes Cash, Stamps

President Madsen has announced the receipt of a bequest from the estate of George and Alvina Reinhardt, Albuquerque, N.M., which may total as high as eight thousand dollars.

Part of the gift was three thousand dollars in cash. The other part was a stamp collection. Although no evaluation has been made, attorneys for the Reinhardt estate placed its worth at five thousand dollars.

The college is being assisted in the assessment of the col-

lection by Jim Jensen, 1610 North Fifty-ninth Street, Omaha, a long-time friend of Dana and an experienced stamp collector.

Editorial Post to Dana Grad

James A. Clemon, a 1956 Dana graduate and member of the Dana Review editorial board, has been named city editor of *The Omaha World-Herald*.

He succeeds Louis Gerdes, who becomes the newspaper's executive editor.
