

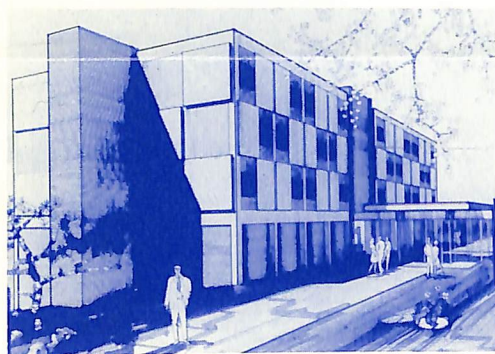

DORM AND LIBRARY DEDICATION SET FOR HOMECOMING WEEKEND

Two new campus facilities, Blair Hall and the C. A. Dana-LIFE Library will be formally dedicated as a part of the 1969 Homecoming weekend festivities. The actual ceremony is set for 3 p.m., Sunday, October 26.

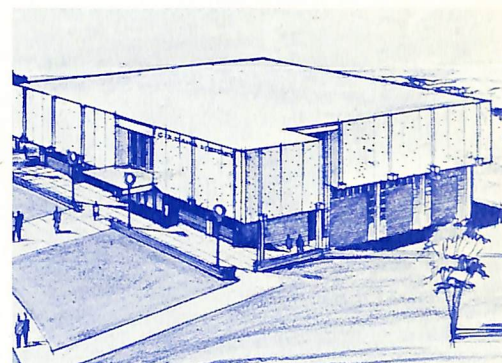
Blair Hall, named in tribute and gratitude to the city of Blair on the occasion of its centennial anniversary, is a five-story structure similar in design to Mickelsen Hall. It is accessible from Mickelsen through a glassed-in enclosure; provides living space for 148 women and contains several non-assigned rooms which eventually will become available as guest rooms. As with other new dormitories on campus, a small meditation chapel is included in Blair Hall. The chapel is a memorial to the late Therkild Nielsen of Southfield, Mich.

The new library, to be officially known as the C. A. Dana-LIFE Library, features the names of the two major sources of financial support given to the project—Dr. Charles A. Dana and LIFE, Lutheran Ingathering for Education. Cost of the building is placed at one million dollars.

Several areas within the Library have been marked for special distinction. The Heritage Room, an area in

which to display the College's collection of artifacts and rare books, will be dedicated in memory of a beloved former Dana professor, Dr. H. F. Swansen. The curriculum laboratory will be named for Miss Elja McCullough, also a former Dana professor, who was instrumental in creating the first such area as a part of the Library's holdings.

Two pieces of sculpture have been created for the Library by James Olsen of the College Art department. One is a brushed bronze bust of Dr. Dana and the other is a modernistic piece, based on a theme from the Song of Solomon, "His banner over me was love," commissioned by the family of the late Pastor and Mrs. N. P. Nielsen as a memorial to them.

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IT'S A RECORD

Dr. S. K.
