Christmas Plate Collection Growing

The dream of having a complete set of Danish Christmas Plates on permanent exhibit at Dana is slowly beginning to come true.

REVIEW readers will recall that early last year it was announced that an initial gift of 37 Christmas Plates had been received as a memorial to the late George P. Christiansen, Sr., of Omaha. It was also announced that the plates would be on display in the Heritage Room of the new Library.

The new Library was dedicated in October but unfortunately, the Heritage Room was not completed until after that date. Now the permanent display cases have been installed and the "George P. Christiansen, Sr., Memorial Collection" is officially open.

Mr. Paul E. Strand, Associate Director of Development, is in charge of the Christmas Plate project and reports that a total of 61 plates are now included in the Collection. Response to the search for additional plates has

been gratifying but there are still many gaps to fill. Friends of Dana throughout the country have been alerted to the need for "missing plates" and it is hoped the collection can be completed in the near future. If you are interested in assisting in this project by presenting the College with a missing plate or plates, you are invited to contact Mr. Strand directly in care of the Development Office at Dana.

2. Decide also how you want your property divided after your death.
3. Consult a lawyer. He will write your will as you want it and will also make certain that all legal requirements of your state are met. Without the help of a lawyer, your wishes may not be met.
4. If you wish to include Dana in your will, the legal name of your college is Dana College. The College is incorporated under the laws of Nebraska as a non-profit educational corporation.

Students Voice Gets Seat On Regents' Side

Editor's Note: The following article is reprinted from the front page of the Omaha World-Herald, November 13, 1969.

To friends in Omaha's Arthur Andersen & Co. office, where she works as a staff accountant, 22-year-old Margaret Haszard is better known as Maggie.

That was the name she answered to most frequently at Dana College in Blair, Neb., where she was graduated cum laude last May.

On the rolls of the 17-member Dana College Board of Regents she is listed by her formal name.

Named to the Board last month, Maggie Haszard is the youngest college regent in Nebraska, according to a spokesman for the Nebraska Independent College Foundation, Inc., and one of the youngest regents in the United States.

Miss Haszard, who grew up in Anita, Ia., where her father operates a service station, had a fairly average high school career. A National Honor Society student, she worked on the school paper and the yearbook, was a Dana Club member, went to football and basketball games.

She took "mostly business" courses although she intended to attend the University of Iowa where she planned to study medical technology.

But she wanted to start in a smaller school and because a cousin had attended Dana, she enrolled there, aided by a couple of scholarships.

She planned to stay two years. But as a freshman she took an accounting course and liked it and by the time she was a sophomore she decided she liked Dana too much to leave.

Campus Editor

She worked on the campus newspaper and was editor her senior year. She also participated in a variety of other activities, including intramural athletics, enroute to her bachelor of science degree in accounting.

And as editor of the school paper, she became actively involved in school government. She editorialized that the regents never had met formally with students and complained in print that students were not granted enough rights.

She sent questionnaires to regents asking if they would be willing to meet one afternoon with students. She received a favorable response. Informal meetings were held during the regents' semi-annual meeting last March.

Among the students who came to express opinions: senior Maggie Haszard. "I was scared," she recalled. "I had no idea what kind of people regents were."



Other Side

The meeting, however, was so successful, it will be repeated by the regents next March. And this time Maggie will be "on the other side of the fence."

Maggie, whose only brother is a senior at Dana, learned of her election to the board during homecoming last month. Board members said her election was evidence of their interest and confidence in the ideas and concerns of the "now generation."

Maggie's reaction? "I was surprised but was proud and happy, too. I think students need a voice in how they are governed. They shouldn't rule, but their opinions should at least be heard and considered.

"In so many places students come up with good ideas but they're set aside because some people don't think student opinions merit consideration."

Students, said Maggie, want to be "viewed objectively." She said in her senior year she noticed students "becoming more involved, not only in

things happening at school but in politics and other national issues."

Now, as a regent, she thinks she can present the student viewpoint. "The main thing students want," she said, "is to express themselves and to be listened to seriously."

That being true, she feels students have a right to participate in the Vietnam war moratorium. "I'm against the war," she said, "but I'm not against President Nixon's policies. I can't say I'm against people showing that they don't like war."

What about taking class time to discuss Vietnam pros and cons? "College is a learning experience," she said. "You learn through discussion and finding out how your fellow man feels."

Many Interests

Maggie, who dates frequently, likes to dance and is fond of contemporary music. Among favorite groups: The Fifth Dimension and Three Dog Night.

She enjoys swimming and horseback riding and goes to shows and football games and she feels she's a part of the "now generation."

She looks forward to her first session as a Dana regent next March. She concedes she may not be "as scared" as last spring but she admits she may be a little shy.

"But I'll give my opinions," she said. "If I don't I'd be defeating the purpose of having a younger person on the board."

2nd Semester Evening Classes Scheduled

Twenty-two courses will be offered for regular college credit during the second semester Evening Class Program scheduled to begin February 3-4, 1970. Tuition charges for evening classes have been set at \$28.00 per credit hour.

Students planning to attend evening classes are to meet at 7 p.m. on the registration evenings in the C. A. Dana Hall of Science. Classes will begin immediately thereafter.
