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# Dana Players, Band, and Choir to Tour

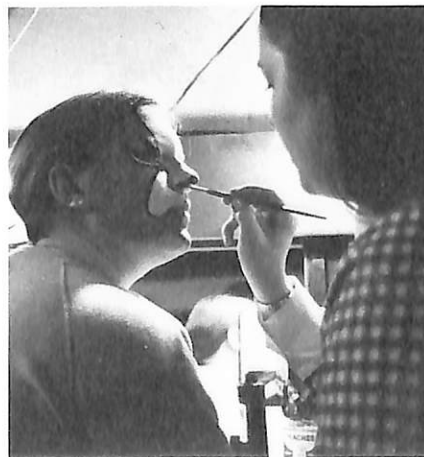
Provided the energy crisis doesn't curtail charter transportation, three performing groups from Dana will be taking to the road in February and March of 1974.

The veteran traveling group of them all, the Dana Choir, will make its fiftieth annual concert tour from February 16 through February 24. The golden anniversary tour by the Choir is also the 30th anniversary of the director, Dr. Paul E. Neve. The choir will present nine concerts in Iowa, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio and Pennsylvania.

Dr. Wayne Wise and the members of the Dana Band will hit the concert trail on Saturday March 9 for an unbelievably busy five-day tour which includes thirteen concerts in Iowa and Wisconsin. The itinerary of the band listed below shows only the evening concerts scheduled but, in addition, they will be appearing twice daily in area high schools.

Dana's newest touring group will be taking a special Lenten drama into the chancels of several American Lutheran Churches in Illinois and Ohio between March 23 and March 31. Under the direction of Mr. Dennis Henneman, the Dana Players have been presenting drama as an aid to worship through a touring drama for the past six years. The troupe of 24 players will make some fourteen performances during their eight day tour.

# Accounting Regulation— The Danish Experience

Hans Hermansen spent an interim semester in Copenhagen as part of his accounting program at Dana College. Dr. Dean was his project advisor. This article reflects highlights of their study of Danish accounting practice as revealed in current literature and Mr. Hermansen's personal observations as a student in Denmark.

As Denmark advances economically and technologically, the Danish accounting profession continues to provide timely and accurate management information. Unfortunately, the advancement has not exerted significant pressure for reforms in external reports. The desire of the Danish businessman to share information with shareholders and creditors has not been stimulated adequately by the professional groups, although some recent attempts have been made.

In October, 1970, the Advisory Committee of the Association of State Authorized Accountants of Denmark (Foreningen af Statsautoriserede Revisorer or FSR) published *Arsregnskabet* (Financial Statements)<sup>1</sup> with the hope that Danish practitioners would use it as a guide to better accounting practice. The concluding statement of the foreword could have been written by the AICPA: "It is the Association's hope that this publication will help toward . . . clearer and better statements, and will work toward a more trustworthy relationship between investors and management . . ."<sup>2</sup>

## Similarities and Differences

While there are many similarities between the development of Danish practices and ours, the differences probably concern the relationship of the professional organizations to their governments. The degree of government control is greater in Denmark than in America. In order to have an accounting practice changed in Denmark, it has been necessary (ultimately) that legislation be passed in Parliament. This procedure is, as might be expected, slow.

Even State Authorized Public Accountants are under no obligation to report more than is legally required, and many companies are not required to utilize the services of State Authorized Public Accountants.<sup>3</sup> With management reluctant to provide more information than is legally required, and the legislature slow in requiring changes in reporting requirements, the accounting profession has struggled to

overcome the obstacles of accelerating change without the tools with which to do the job.

Most decisions concerning the reporting of financial information in the United States are made by management, not government. This freedom carries with it a management responsibility. Broadly speaking, American practitioners monitor managements selections from acceptable procedures. The result of the choice management makes can be deceptive. In Denmark, management is less likely to attempt to deceive, but by merely adhering to laws which fail to provide for adequate disclosure of significant information, deception occurs. With less freedom to choose, less responsibility is felt concerning what information is to be furnished to the investor.

## Procedure for Change

In America, the professional association takes the first step toward changing an accounting procedure; government agencies may then accept or refuse to accept that change for their purposes. In Denmark, the professional association must prove to the government that a proposed change is important enough to be debated in Parliament; the fact that only a substantial change will be considered tends to prohibit the gradual evolutionary process so desirable in the development of viable accounting principles.<sup>4</sup>

Where the United States accountants can attack, for example, the flexibility/uniformity controversy by issuing a research study listing acceptable accounting principles and then follow with attempts to narrow the choice, the Danish accountants choice is, by law, already narrow. American accountants wonder if legislation might be a suitable way to attain uniformity; Danish accountants wonder if an unshackling from government control might lead to some flexibility.

For example, most Danish accountants would have preferred delaying the new Danish Companies Act until ECC directives were more clear. However, government and industry forces joined to accomplish its passage on June 4, 1973, to become effective January 1, 1974. Although Danish accountants participated in its wording, many feel that a large number of amendments will be needed as Denmark's entry into the Common Market produces new situations.

Some Danish academicians have encouraged the FSR to circumvent the traditional procedure of introducing legislation.<sup>5</sup> Since any other avenue would not have the blessing

of the Parliament and would not enjoy the weight of government authority, many FSR members feel that there is no positive benefit to be derived from attempting to change the current approach.

Of crucial importance also is the fact that Denmark is moving in a direction which suggests that it will not continue to rely heavily upon internally generated funds for industrial expansion. By understating inventories and accelerating depreciation, substantial "secret reserves" have been created by many of the larger Danish firms.<sup>6</sup> This is permitted by tax authorities and is seldom reported to shareholders. In the future when the bulk of new funds for expansion will have to come from the capital markets, it is doubtful that potential investors will accept external financial reports which do not provide a sound basis for investment decisions.

### Historical Lessons

Interesting historical similarities and contrasts can be noted here. As Denmark moves toward wider ownership of industrial capability, better external reporting is desired. The Danish systems for furnishing information to management evolved naturally. Public accountants in Denmark have, therefore, a stable base of information which can be used to generate external reports. In contrast, American accountants quickly were forced to turn their attentions to external reporting when events of the 1930s threatened the future of the accounting profession. It will be interesting to see, as the Danish accounting profession matures, if the advantage of this stable information base will offset the disadvantage of governmental control.

Perhaps we in America should look to the current Danish experience with an eye to self-enlightenment. As our society becomes increasingly socialistic we find our government agencies beginning to dictate, sometimes capriciously, our accounting practices. The "unseen hand" of the S.E.C., for example, can be detected in many APB Opinions.

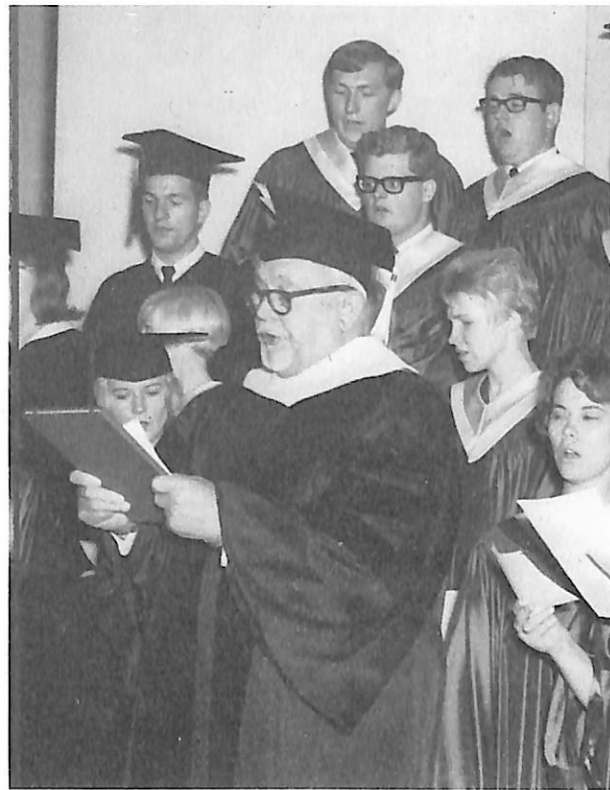
American accountants however are not as concerned with a shift of power away from the AICPA as we are convinced that the accounting profession, rather than the government, is in a better position to know what changes should be made. The AICPA has the power to enforce changes in accounting practice subject to, and tempered by, the desires of the government and the majority of practitioners.

The Danish counterpart to our AICPA is forced into a posture wherein they must *persuade* the law-makers that a change is needed, or persuade practitioners to adhere to standards exceeding those required by law. The change they propose must be politically acceptable, whereas in America the AICPA can propose and initiate a change without much consideration to possible political ramifications. Danish accountants are struggling to initiate change via the mechanics of government, and we in America are trying to avoid government encroachment.

The profession of accounting in both the United States and Denmark is being tested to see whether or not it can justify its role of providing useful information in a changing society.

## Dana Remembered in Melchior Will

Music lovers throughout the world were saddened earlier this year when it was announced that the Great Dane himself, Lauritz Melchior, was dead. And, while the world had lost a great talent, Danes and Danish-Americans had lost an even greater friend.

Lauritz Melchior was well-known and highly respected by many Danians. He appeared in concert at Dana on several occasions and as soloist with the Dana Choir. For a number of years a special campus music festival was named in his honor. And, in 1968, the College further honored him by conferring upon him an honorary Doctor of Music degree.

Mr. Melchior must have shared Dana's admiration because he generously remembered the College in his will. Word has been received that Dana will receive a number of highly prized trophies from Melchior's personal collection. Even more important, his entire music library will be permanently housed on the Dana campus.

Although details are not complete at this point, tentative plans call for the creation of a special Melchior Memorial room in the C. A. Dana-LIFE Library which will become the permanent home of the Melchior collection. Included will be music scores, tapes, recordings and a complete collection of clippings tracing his entire musical career. In future years scholars doing research on his life and accomplishments will find the Melchior Memorial at Dana the only place in the world where these materials are available.

Plans for the opening of the Melchior Memorial will be announced in the next issue of the REVIEW.

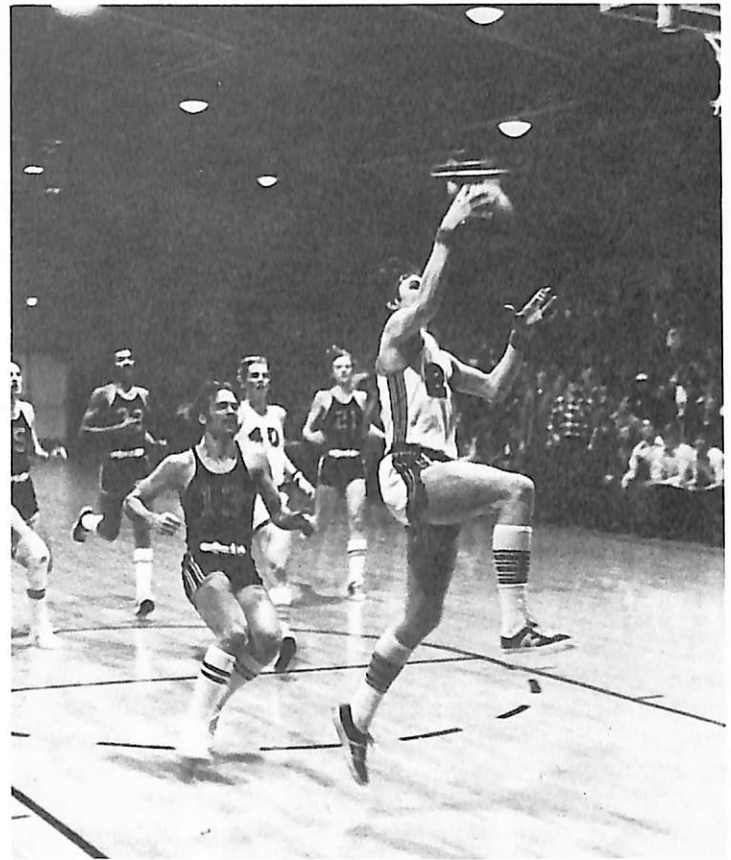
## Peterson to Coach Basketball

With the opening of the 1973-74 basketball season a familiar figure returns to the head coach's spot on the Dana Vikings bench. Paul "Pete" Peterson, Dana's veteran athletic director, has returned to the head basketball coaching spot replacing Jerry Rainforth who resigned earlier this year to return to high school coaching. Pete will be assisted by head baseball coach, Dale Lemon.

In his season outlook, Pete pointed out that lack of height will be one of the Vikings major problems this year. Several 6'6 players were lost through graduation and the only returning letterman of significant size is 6'6 Jim Huseman, a junior from Alta, Iowa. Other returning players include Bryan Traylor, a senior from Council Bluffs, Iowa; Ed Johnson, a senior from Plattsmouth, Nebraska; Dennis Riley, a junior from Omaha; Jerry Wilson, a senior from Persia, Iowa and Steve Woitock, a senior from Racine, Wisconsin. These men will have to improve their defensive play as well as their shooting skills if the season is to be at all successful.

Last year's freshman team enjoyed a successful season and five players from that squad will move to the varsity this year. They include Steve Probst, a sophomore from Syracuse, Nebraska; Barry Olson, a sophomore from Minnetonka, Minnesota; Jim Larsen, a sophomore from Shendoah, Iowa; Gary Damkroger, a sophomore from Clatonia, Nebraska and Bill Kruder, a sophomore from Home-town, Illinois. Probst and Olson are 6'3 and 6'4 respectively and will have to play "tall" in order to provide the badly needed overall team height. All five demonstrated considerable shooting skill in last season's play.

There are several new players who will be seeing action with the Vikings this fall. Included are Bill Davies from Euclid, Ohio; John Hibbing from Paullina, Iowa; Jeff Gilpin from Macy, Nebraska and Mike Runyon from Ralston, Nebraska and Mal Noyes from Westbrook, Maine. Mike Runyon is the tallest of the new crop, 6'7, but according to



Pete, may need further training before he becomes a regular on the squad.

The major emphasis in practice so far has been on speed and defense resulting in significant improvement in these skills. Only through quickness, good shooting and excellent defense can the team's height deficiencies be offset.

The Vikings have not had a winning basketball season for several years and the team and the coaching staff are hard at work to reverse that fact.

The 73-74 season opened on November 26 with the Vikings hosting Bellevue College. Conference play does not begin until January 19 with a game against Concordia of Seward.

## WRESTLING

The 1973 Viking wrestling program, including the most extensive schedule in Dana's history, opened in early December.

According to coach Bob Simpson, the squad has six returning veterans and several promising freshmen. The list of veterans is led by Lee Kerndt, 134 pound conference champ from Lansing, Iowa; Dave Jones, 118 pounds, a sophomore from Monroeville, Ohio, who placed second in the conference last year at 126 pounds; Stan Johnson, a junior from Exira, Iowa, who will wrestle at 167 pounds this year; Don Newman, a senior from Stuart, Iowa, who was last year's second place finisher at 190 pounds and Bob Coffey, a junior from Fargo, North Dakota, who will wrestle at 150 pounds this year. Returning to the team after a year's absence because of injury is Doug Nasland, a 150 pound junior from Schaller, Iowa.

Promising freshmen candidates include: Steve LaFabre from Minden, Iowa at 126 pounds; Kevin Wengg, 177 pounder from Parlin, New Jersey; Bob Sparling, heavy-weight from Guthrie Center, Iowa and trying wrestling for the first time will be Tim Talmadge of Omaha, Marty Baker of Denver and John Rice of Paris, Ohio.

## FOOTBALL

The Vikings closed their 1973 football season on a disappointing note as their only chance to avoid a winless season was spoiled by the Concordia Bulldogs.

Thirty-two team members have been awarded football letters for their participation in the '73 season. Team honors have been voted to several Viking players including Rick Mewhirter, a senior from Atlantic, Iowa who was named outstanding offensive player of the year. Mike Herbert, a freshman from North Wales, Pennsylvania was named outstanding defensive player of the year and also outstanding freshman player of the year. Co-captains for the 1974 season will be Terry Jensen, a junior from Schaller, Iowa and Dave Larson, a junior from Primghar, Iowa.

The only team record broken during the '73 season was a 98 yard kick off return by senior Rick Mewhirter.

If you are an alumnus of Dana College or Trinity Seminary and if you were enrolled for more than two years, you may expect to receive a telephone call from a fellow-alum sometime between February 16 and February 22, 1974.

Those are the dates set for the 1973-74 Phone-O-Rama — the once-a-year request for alumni financial support of the College. It goes without saying that your personal gift is needed in order to help continue the enviable record Dana has established of operating in the "black" for the past twenty years. To insure that fact, the 1973-74 Phone-O-Rama must be even more successful than the 1972-73 telephone campaign which produced a total of \$20,856.00.

Increased living and operating expenses have undoubtedly been felt in your own household and, translated into the same terms on the College level, you can well imagine the budget gap facing Dana this year. ## Madsen President Emeritus

Dr. C. C. Madsen, who retired as the eleventh president of Dana College in 1971, was named President Emeritus of the College by action of the Board of Regents during the annual fall meeting held on campus last month. The Board's action makes Madsen the first Dana president to be accorded this high honor.

Emeritus status is an honorary one reserved for those few persons who have served the College faithfully and well for a long period of time. Madsen's record of service to Dana includes serving as a member of the teaching faculty from 1946 to 1956 and as president from 1956 to 1971. During his tenure in office, Dana experienced her most dramatic growth both in student enrollment and campus expansion. A total of nine buildings were completed during his administration.

Since retiring from the presidency, Madsen has served the College as a Consultant. He will continue in that capacity with the title of President Emeritus. He will also represent the College at official functions and continue to be involved in the College's on-going fund raising programs.

Dr. Earl R. Mezoff, who replaced Madsen as president of Dana College, commented on the Board action by saying: "Dana College has been most fortunate to have been blessed with dedicated and outstanding leadership throughout its history. President Madsen has given unstintingly of himself and is the epitome of Dana College leadership. He is recognized throughout the State and The American Lutheran Church as one of the finest educational leaders in the decade of the 1950's and 1960's. President Madsen is most worthy of this recognition by his Alma Mater and his colleagues."

## Nominations for Distinguished Alumnus

Nominations are now being accepted by the Alumni Council for 1974 Distinguished Alumnus candidates.

According to the Council, the awards are presented to alumni who, in the opinion of the selection committee, have made significant contributions to their profession, their community and/or their church. ## Learn to Speak Danish

The Danish Brotherhood in America is now offering a Danish language kit entitled, "It's Fun to Speak Danish". The package includes five professionally produced tape cassettes, a read-along script and a Danish-English dictionary.

For the convenience of beginners, both English and Danish are used on all tapes with words and phrases spoken three times — slow enough to allow the person to repeat each phrase. The tape titles include "How to Speak Danish", "Putting Words Together", "What Did I Say?", "As We Say in Danish" and "Sing it, Say It."

As an added feature, one of the first semester LARP books was *O Pioneers* by Cather.

Miss Sue Zabel, a Dana sophomore from Loveland, Colorado, is presently serving as President of the Student Education Association of Nebraska. Miss Zabel is majoring in Education at Dana.

### Richard S. Jorgensen, Promoted

Richard S. Jorgensen (Dana '64) an instructor in history at Dana, has been promoted to the rank of Assistant Professor of History as a result of his completing requirements for the Ph.D. degree at Duke University.

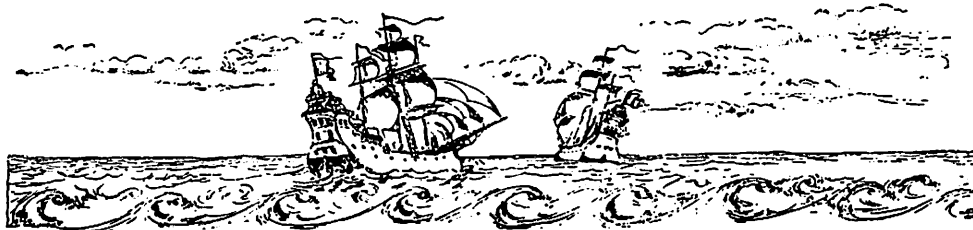
## 72-73 Fiscal Year Closed With Balanced Budget

Thanks in large measure to the increased financial support the College received from alumni and other friends, the 1972-73 fiscal year was closed with a balanced budget. It was Dana's 20th consecutive year of operating in the black.

President Mezoff commented on this enviable record by saying; "While careful budgeting and sound financial management principles have been utilized at Dana for the past twenty years, the major factor in our ability to operate in the black again this year has been the increased financial support we have received from our alumni and other friends of the College. Without their personal financial involvement, this could not have happened."

He went on to explain that the College realized one of its best fund-raising years last year - with the exception of those periods when the College was involved in a major capital gifts campaign. A total of \$545,282.74 was realized in gifts and grants during 1972-73, including the annual subsidy from The American Lutheran Church, compared to \$423,319.27 received from the same sources the previous year.

In addition to showing an operating surplus of approximately fifteen hundred dollars in 1972-73, President Mezoff also announced that the College's endowment fund had been increased by \$53,178.23 and its continuing fund for physical expansion by \$80,044.02. The additions to the endowment and expansion funds were made possible by two restricted gifts earmarked for those purposes.

## Dana Day in Washington County

Tuesday, October 9, 1973, was "Dana Day" throughout Washington County. Under the leadership of Co-chairmen Bob Krogh (Dana '56) and Kayo Vinton, some forty volunteers undertook the task of calling on business and professional people throughout the County for personal financial support of the College.

According to official reports from the Development Office, calls are now 90% completed and the Appeal has to date produced some \$28,000 in unrestricted gifts to the College. Although incomplete at this point, the 1973 Appeal has already surpassed last year's record breaking total of \$25,000.

The Washington County Appeal is only four years old but, according to President Mezoff, it has become one of the College's most relied on fund raising projects. He commended the

co-chairmen, the volunteer workers and the donors for their enthusiastic and generous support of the 1973 Appeal.

## Total Enrollment Down

The enrollment squeeze now being felt by most private colleges in the United States was felt again this fall at Dana as a total of 579 students registered for first semester classes. This compares to 662 registered at the opening of the 1972-73 academic year.

Although disappointed in the total figure, College officials expressed optimism over the fact that for the first time in five years, the number of freshmen students registering was not smaller than it had been the previous year. Hopefully the downward trend in freshman enrollment has now been halted. All-out efforts are being exerted by the Admissions staff to secure that trend.

Included in the 576 figure are 120 seniors, 117 juniors, 136 sophomores, 148 freshmen, 4 special students, 3 post-graduate students and 41 part-time students. Also represented are twenty-eight states, six foreign countries and fifteen religious denominations.

## Omaha Meeting

A combined Alumni-Admissions Office program designed to introduce prospective students to members of the Dana faculty and staff was held in Omaha on Sunday, November 11. Prospective students and their parents had an opportunity to become better acquainted with Dana through the informal afternoon program and by meeting successful Dana alumni from various business and professional fields in the Omaha area.

## Alumni Association European Charter Flight Planned

During the past several months the Dana Alumni Association has been trying to secure a firm commitment from an established airline for a charter trip to Denmark in the summer of 1974. Because of the world wide fuel shortage, such a commitment has not yet been received. Plans are being continued, however, and final details will be announced in the near future.

Provided a charter is granted, Civil Aeronautics Board regulations state that Dana Alumni, current Dana students, members of the faculty and staff, parents of current Dana students and honorary members of the Alumni Association will be eligible for the special charter rates. (Anyone who has made a gift to the College between June 1, 1973 and December 1, 1973, may be considered an honorary member of the Alumni Association and is therefore eligible for the charter.)

Regulations also include members of the immediate families of these groups.

Persons who have already indicated interest in the proposed charter flight, by returning the original charter information questionnaire, will be notified by direct mail as quickly as firm departure dates have been fixed. Others who have not yet indicated interest to the Alumni Office are urged to complete and return the form at the bottom of this page.

The charter request includes a departure from Chicago for Copenhagen between June 15 and June 22, 1974, with a return from Copenhagen three weeks later. The anticipated round-trip fare is something between \$250.00 and \$275.00 per person.
