Choir and Band will tour Central District in March

The Dana Choir and Band will be making separate concert tours through Nebraska, Colorado, Kansas and Missouri during the month of March, 1975. Alumni, parents and other friends of the College are invited to attend any of the performances listed below.

The 45-piece Dana Band, directed by Dr. Wayne Wise, will present a program entitled "Celebration in Sound." The presentation is a worship-concert, designed to be performed in the church sanctuary and featuring sacred music by the band, a dramatic sermonette and congregational singing.

Dr. Paul Neve and the 52 members of the Dana Choir are scheduled to present eight concerts of sacred music and several high school concerts of lighter music during their 7-day tour in mid-March.

Dana Featured in County Historical Booklet

Portal to the Plains, a historical booklet and tour guide to Washington County, Nebraska, has recently been published. Written by Dr. Niel Johnson, formerly of the Dana faculty and now teaching at the University of Nebraska at Omaha, with original paintings and drawings by artist and farmer ALTON LARSEN ('42) of rural Blair, the 52-page booklet describes and illustrates various historic, cultural, and scenic events and places of interest in Washington County. One chapter is devoted to the county's Danish heritage and Dana College; the cover features a picture of the Dana Folk Dancers.

Sites and events mentioned in the booklet, which has a circle-tour map with Blair at its hub, include the Bertrand steamboat excavation and museum at DeSoto Bend, Fort Atkinson outside of Fort Calhoun, the Lewis and Clark Council Bluff, the location of Nebraska's first college, a former stage-coach lodging house, an area the Mormon emigrants farmed in 1847, the Engineer Cantonment of Major Stephen Long, and the period of dominance by the Omaha Indians.

Among the 80 illustrations in the booklet are paintings by Mr. Larsen of a panoramic scene of Fort Atkinson in its heyday and the Lewis and Clark council with the Otoe and Missouri Indians, and photographs of a centennial re-enactment of Fort Atkinson's founding in 1819, the railroad ferry used before the bridge was built, the Dana campus, and Dana's Heritage Room.

Chancel Drama Group Tours Nebraska and Colorado

Eighteen drama students toured Nebraska and Colorado from January 31 to February 7, presenting "Salvation," a chancel drama, to Central District congregations of the American Lutheran Church. Dana theater director Dennis Henneman adapted the play from the Wakefield Cycle of medieval religious mystery plays, and Alan Brandes of the music faculty composed special music for the production. Workshops in the theater were also given at several high schools.

The tour, which was partially funded by a grant from the Nebraska Arts Council, included Grand Island and Cozad in Nebraska, and Greeley, Denver, Windsor, and Aurora in Colorado. One of the performances was sponsored by the Denver Dana Club.

The students were all members of an Interim class taught by Mr. Henneman on "Ritual, Religion, and Response: A Chancel Drama Worship Experience."

Round-Robin Letters Circulated for 30 and 40 Years

Business Internship Program Earns Enthusiastic Response

Eleven Dana students enrolled in the Business/Accounting Internship Program during this year's Interim gained practical business experience and earned college credit as well as salaries during the four-week period between January 13 and February 7. Since it was established five years ago under the supervision of Dr. Gary Dean, Program Director of Business at Dana, more than 60 students and an equal number of firms have participated in the highly successful program.

Like their predecessors, the students this year worked in a variety of assignments according to their areas of interest, from management training programs to personnel, internal and public accounting, auditing, and marketing research.

The typical student's response has been that "An internship of this sort is a tremendous experience. There is certainly

no better or faster way to learn than by watching the real thing in action." Participating firms have been equally enthusiastic, with supervisors commenting that "We received more value than the cost," "We profited by a fresh viewpoint being focused on our problems," and "It gives the student an excellent insight into the business world before graduation."

Thanks — From The Dana Library

Many alumni will remember that for three consecutive years, from 1967-68 to 1969-70, the annual Alumni Appeal solicited funds for books for the Dana Library.

How have students and faculty benefited from these appeals, and how are they continuing to benefit, even though the last appeal was conducted more than four years ago?

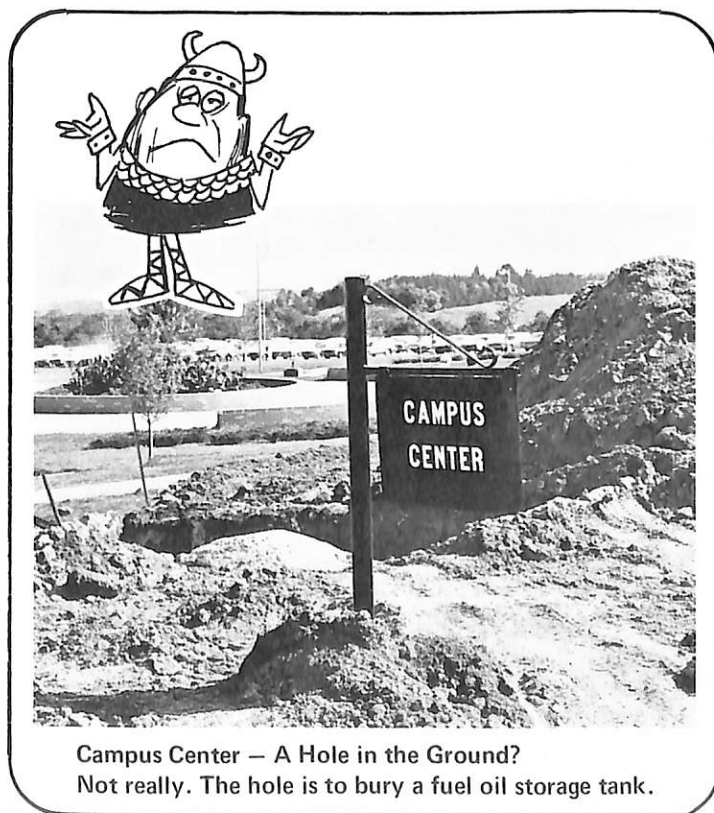
The obvious answer is that there are more books in the library for research and study. Enthusiastic about the chance to improve library holdings, faculty members selected and ordered valuable additions to the collection. Library accession figures reveal what happened. On June 1, 1967, there were 49,419 volumes in the library. On June 1, 1974, there were 82,781. Of course, the regular budget and special gifts bought some of these, but a large number were purchased either with alumni funds or with matching government grants made available because of alumni giving. A small amount of the money from alumni remains and is still being used to provide a basis when necessary for matching grants and to supplement departmental budgets.

Mr. RONALD JOHNSON ('61), Head Librarian, emphasizes that alumni giving for those three years filled a real need, a need that of course continues. He thanks the alumni for their generosity.

Phonorama Volunteers Place 2500 Calls

Seventy alumni placed some 2500 calls within the continental United States between February 7 and 12 for this year's Phonorama, the Alumni Association's annual fund-raising drive. With several hundred calls yet to be made, the Development Office reports a total of \$23,788.50 pledged by alumni to the 1975 campaign.

The calls were made from Mutual of Omaha, the Huntel Systems office in Blair, and Central Telephone and Utilities in Lincoln.

Baseball Preview

Coach Dale Lemon is optimistic about the 1975 Dana baseball season. In fact, quite a few folks are optimistic at this point.

The Vikings hope to improve on last year's 23-14 campaign which was climaxed by participation in NAIA District Playoffs — their sixth straight year.

Four pitchers head a list of returning lettermen. Barry Olson, a junior from Minnetonka, Minnesota, compiled the finest mound slate (11-4), and Walt Schacht, a senior from Neligh, Nebraska, was more than respectable with a 7-4 mark. Paul Haack, a senior from Henderson, Iowa and Rod Jasa, a junior from St. Edward, Nebraska, also return to aid the mound corps.

Among the top hitters returning for the 1975 campaign are catchers Mike Giovanni of Whitehall, Pennsylvania and Dan Hult of Omaha, Nebraska and infielders Mike Urdahl of Schnecksville, Pennsylvania, Terry Price of Omaha and Bob Leach of Hatboro, Pennsylvania. Giovanni and Urdahl were named to the all-conference team last year, while Price and Hult received honorable mention.

Reserve outfielders who are returning include Ed Spicer, of Lambertville, New Jersey; Jeff Maliszewski of Parlin, New Jersey; and Terry Peetz of Omaha, Nebraska. A host of talented freshmen with considerable high school experience will fill the remaining gaps.

Dana's 1975 season includes a 42-game schedule beginning with a doubleheader at Creighton University on March 22. The annual southern tour into Oklahoma will account for 16 contests. As far as the conference race is concerned, Nebraska Wesleyan and Concordia rate as the top contenders. Overall, Creighton, UNO, and Wayne State are probably the strongest of the scheduled opponents.

It is obvious the Vikes have the material. But that's only the start. Lemon's "guarded" optimism will be tested come March 22.

Three Dana Gridders Named to All-Lutheran Squad

Three players from Dana, Bob Jones, John Hibbing and Dave Larson, have been named to the 1974 All-Lutheran College Football Squad.

Jones, a junior from Mineola, Iowa was named to the second team; Hibbing, a junior from Paullina, Iowa and Larson, a senior from Primghar, Iowa were both given honorable mention.

The selections are announced in the January issue of the Lutheran Brotherhood Bond, monthly publication of the Minneapolis-based fraternal insurance society. They have been made annually for the Bond since 1965 by Bud Thies, St. Louis Globe-Democrat sportswriter.

Concordia College invaded Borup Coliseum. The Bulldogs scurried in, anxious for a victory themselves after going 0-11 this season. It was nip-and-tuck for awhile. Then Paul Peterson's Vikings took command; they dominated. The domination paid off, as the hosts walked away with a 102-80 decision.

Five Dana cagers hit double figures to pace the romp. Barry Olson, a 6-4 junior from Minnetonka, Minnesota, pumped in 21 points, while Steve Williams, a 6-3 junior from Edina, Minnesota, finished with 20 counters. 6-4 junior Steve Probst, from Syracuse, Nebraska, notched 18 points. And both Bill Davies and Jerry Haas managed 10 points on the evening. Davies is a 5-10 sophomore from Euclid, Ohio, while Haas is a 6-2 freshman from Harlan, Iowa.

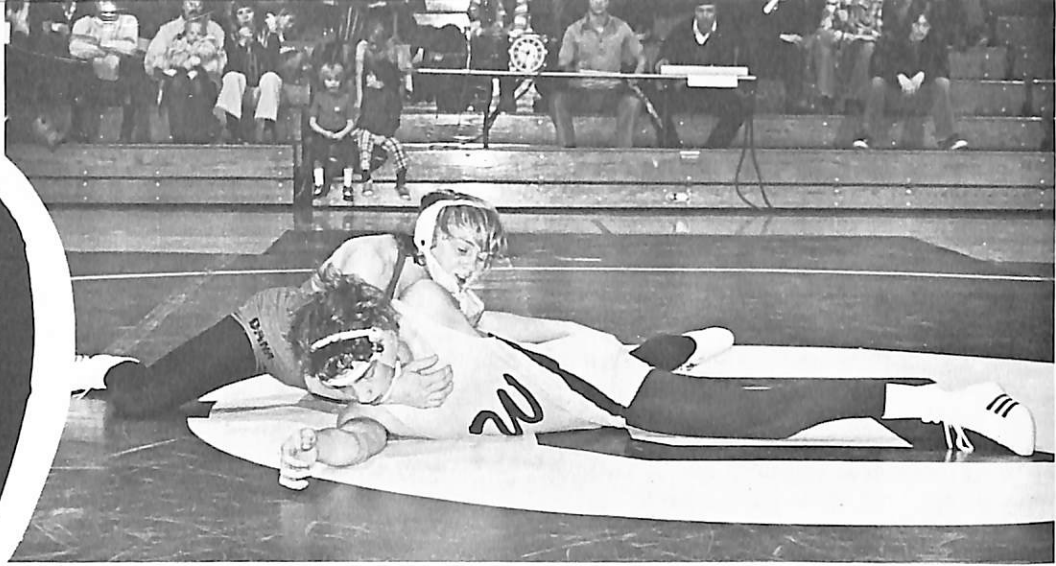
It was the first NIAC encounter for both teams. Thus, the Vikes advanced to a 1-0 and 1-7 overall. After defeating Bellevue on January 21, Dana will journey to Hastings on January 25 and will host Nebraska Wesleyan on January 28. Both Hastings and Wesleyan are conference foes.

Sights and Sounds of '74-'75

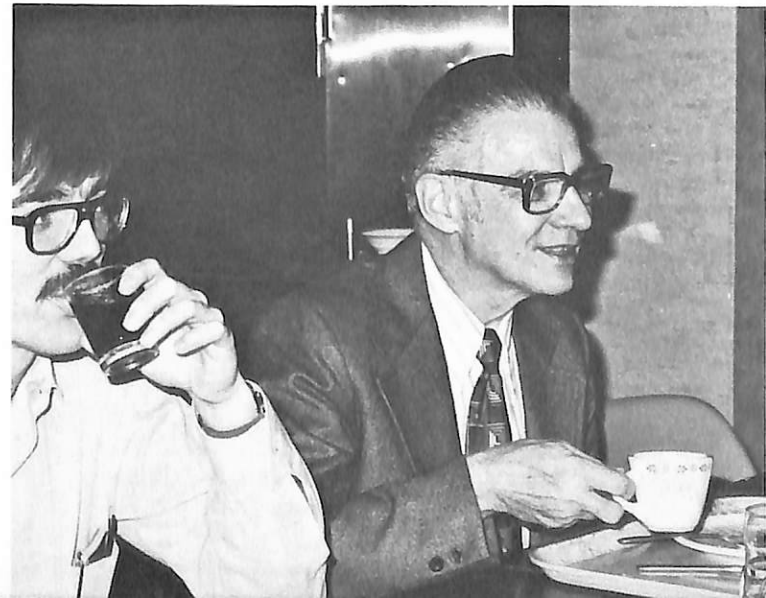

CAMPUS NOTES



Dana has received an "Outdoor Recreation Achievement Award" from the U.S. Department of the Interior, Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, for its recent provision of 40 acres of land to be used in developing the Black Elk-Neihardt Park described in the 1974 Spring Review.

Signed by Rogers B. Morton, Secretary of the Interior, the award is "in recognition of outstanding contributions to the preservation and enhancement of America's outdoor recreation heritage for present and future generations." It is the fourth such award to be given in the Midwest.

Development of the park is being accelerated by the receipt of a \$131,000 federal grant approved by the U.S. Bureau of Recreation, with the money to be used to purchase land. Plans for the park and monument designed by Professor F. W. Thomsen of Dana have brought Washington County recognition as a Bicentennial county.

The Dana chapter of the Society for the Advancement of Management (SAM) has received a sixth place National Achievement Award. More than 200 SAM college and university chapters compete for the awards each year, with selection based on a set of objectives for which the chapters are awarded points. The award is the fifth the local chapter has received since its founding in 1961.

Poet Joseph Langland, a former faculty member now teaching at the University of Massachusetts, recently gave a public poetry reading on the Dana campus. 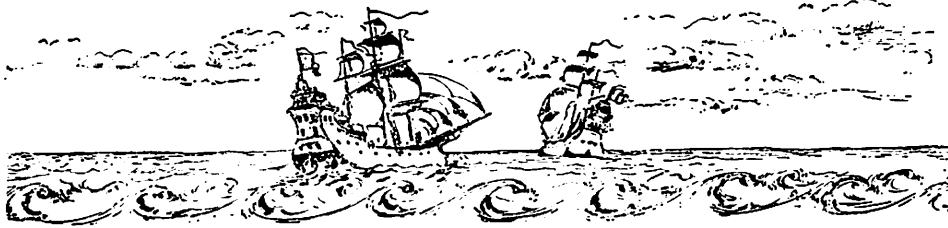

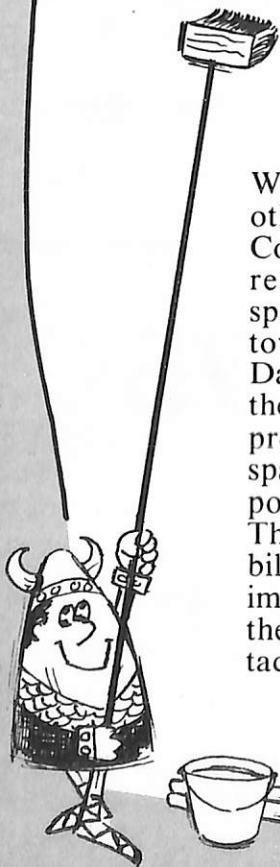
