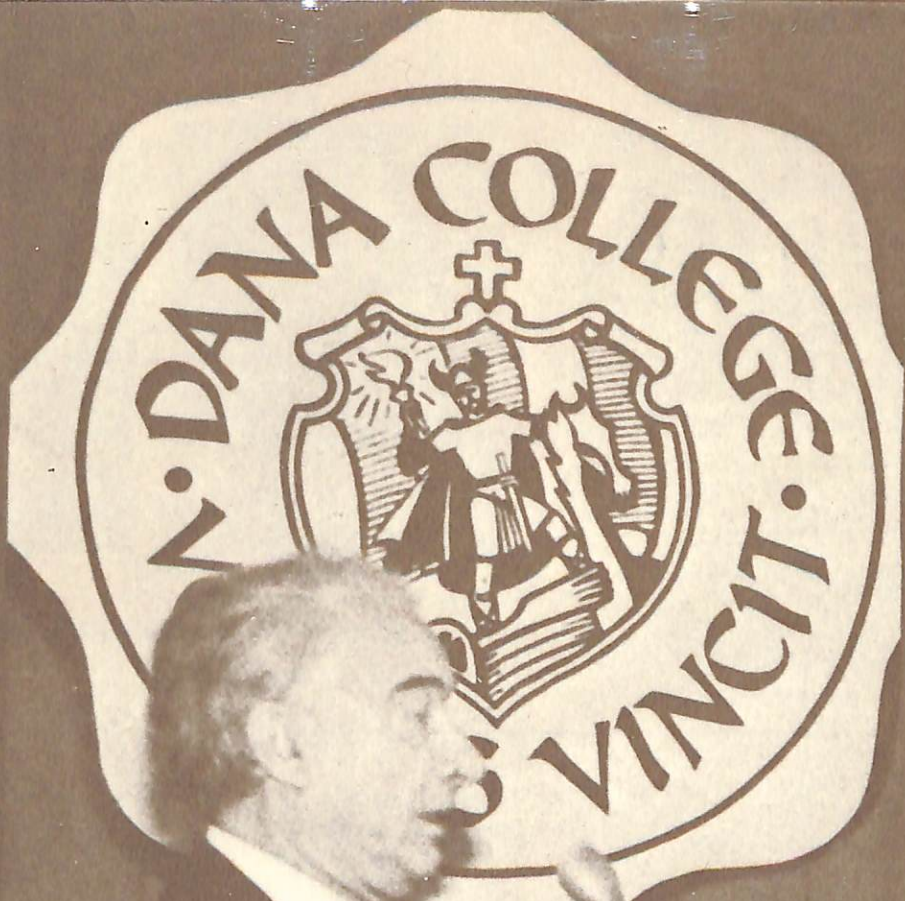

FROM THE PRESIDENT

A few days ago it was my pleasure to visit with an alumnus and his wife in my office. I knew that he was coming to see me, for he had been named a co-trustee of a trust established by a woman who had never attended Dana. Would you believe that her home was not in Nebraska but rather Michigan? It is almost incredible to believe that a person who had never attended Dana College and who lived 800 miles away could make that kind of decision. But she knew and believed in Dana. Why? Because people on Dana's staff had cultivated her interest over the years. But after meeting the alumnus who is the co-trustee and knowing her former pastor who was also an alumnus, I am all the more convinced that her respect for and the loving human interest exhibited by those alumni gave her tangible evidence of the quality of the Dana Experience. She knew Dana College and benefited directly by her long-standing warm relationship with Dana alumni. And so she made a decision which will be a significant contribution to quality education at Dana for years to come. That trust will be valued at approximately \$350,000 and should produce approximately \$15,000 a year. The income from that trust will be used primarily for support of music and religion.

Is it worthwhile to send young people to Dana when on the surface it appears that the costs of that education are much higher than in the public institution? Those who have attended Dana in the past are probably in the best position to evaluate whether that cost differential is offset by the quality of the value-oriented education received. Obviously our alumni think so — for 16 percent of the entering class this fall are children of alumni.

What do these two seemingly disconnected illustrations have to do in the notes from a college president and how do they relate to you, the reader? All colleges need what has been aptly stated by others, "Friends, Funds and Freshmen." I can hear many of you thinking, "But I don't know any generous little old ladies, or men for that matter, who can give \$350,000 and I certainly don't have any children of college age!" But without realizing it, you do know and can influence others who could give, regardless of the amount. And it is conceivable that your grandchild or the youngster down

the block or in your church would be just right for Dana and Dana would be right for them. Think about it! It just might work and your efforts could make another significant impact in addition to your own giving to Dana.

There are many of you who could rightfully say, "Mr. President, I have already done those things and will continue to do so, but what else can I do?"

For those of you who live in Nebraska, you have a golden opportunity on November 2, 1976. There will be a Constitutional Amendment, Amendment 6, Part 2, placed before the voters that, if passed, would directly affect students who are residents of Nebraska and who elect to go to the independent colleges of the state such as Dana. That amendment, if passed, would give students at Nebraska's independent colleges the same opportunity as students at the public colleges and universities to share in a financial aid program sponsored by the Federal government and matched by State funds.

It is my conviction that passage of that amendment would correct an injustice and give students who attend independent colleges a right which is now denied them.

Those in opposition to this amendment are trying to cloud the issue by declaring that it would violate the principle of separation of Church and State. Nothing could be further from the truth. It is not a "Church-State" issue, but rather clearly a student aid issue. It would not provide grants to church colleges, but rather to students attending independent colleges, comparable to the GI bills that have operated successfully for 30 years. A state agency would determine the recipients of the aid, for the student would apply directly to that state agency for the aid and not to the colleges. The student would determine whether he or she would use that financial aid at either a public or an independent college. At the present time, the student does not have that free choice.

Please read and study the article on page 7 in this issue of the *Review*. If you agree with me after thinking the matter over, please vote Yes on Amendment 6, Part 2, and encourage others to do likewise.

I have tried to share with you some ways you can help Dana and how you can give young people a greater opportunity to benefit from the same value-oriented, high quality education which has maintained your interest in Dana.

"Friends, Funds and Freshmen" — a simple but profound alliteration.

Dana Enters 92nd Year

Nine Join Faculty and Staff

New faculty and staff members this year are from several states, but some have had previous ties with the College.

One is Dr. Verlan J. Hanson, new registrar and assistant to the dean of the College. He and his wife Helga (Jessen) are both 1951 graduates, and their son Alan graduated from Dana last spring.

Hanson's M.Ed. and Ed.D. are both from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, the former in history and the latter in secondary education in counseling and guidance. Listed in *Leaders in Education*, he was a member of the Phi Delta Kappa— sponsored Comparative Education Seminar to the USSR in 1973.

He has served as a line officer in the U.S. Navy and has taught at Augustana College, Rock Island, Illinois, and Buena Vista College, Storm Lake, Iowa. He has also taught and been a counselor in secondary schools.

New to Dana is Dr. John F. Bienz, assistant professor of English, who received his Ph.D. in English literature this year from Indiana University in Bloomington. His M.A. is also from Indiana, his B.A. is from the University of Michigan, and his A.A. from Concordia Lutheran Junior College in Ann Arbor.

Bienz has taught on the secondary, college, and university levels. In Bloomington he was a deacon of University Lutheran Church and directed that congregation's tutoring program for children in low-income neighborhoods.

Rosemary Bienz, his wife, teaches Dana's reading and study skills class. Her M.A. in reading education is from Indiana University.

Dr. Richard Sieling of Omaha is a part-time instructor in German literature. His B.A. is from Midland College; his M.A. and Ph.D. are from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. He has taught at Creighton University in Omaha.

The professional staff of the Dana library has been enlarged with the addition of Nancy Dodd as assistant librarian

and instructor in library science. She has her M.A. in library science from the University of Denver and her M.A. in German from the University of California, Santa Barbara.

Jennifer Johnson also fills a newly created position as assistant dean of students. Her responsibilities include selecting, training, and directing the residence hall staff, advising the Student Activities Board, coordinating student organizations, and developing women's awareness programs. She will also assist the dean of students in student government, activities, counseling, discipline, and other student personnel-related programs.

She comes to Dana from Findlay College, Findlay, Ohio, where she was assistant to the vice president of student affairs and area coordinator of the Women's Residence Hall. Her B.S. in elementary education and her M.A. in college student personnel are both from Ohio's Bowling Green State University.

Admissions counselor Paul Dana Johnson is a 1976 Dana graduate. As a student Johnson was active in many campus activities and was one of eight seniors to receive a Campus Service Award. He is the son of Pastor and Mrs. Oscar Johnson, who are Dana alumni. His recruiting area will include southern Nebraska, suburban Omaha, Kansas, and Oklahoma.

Mrs. Marjorie Johnson, new head resident at Rasmussen Hall, is from Lincoln. She has a B.A. from the University of Nebraska there and has also studied at the University of Nebraska at Omaha. Mrs. Johnson has taught special education classes in Ashland and North Bend and social studies at the Nebraska Men's Reformatory. She has also been a medical social worker at St. Joseph Hospital in Omaha and a case worker for Lutheran Family Service.

Mrs. Richard (Mary Jo Andrews) Kubie of Blair is the new assistant to the director of teacher placement. She is a 1959 Dana graduate and has taught elementary school in Omaha.

First Semester Enrollment is 536

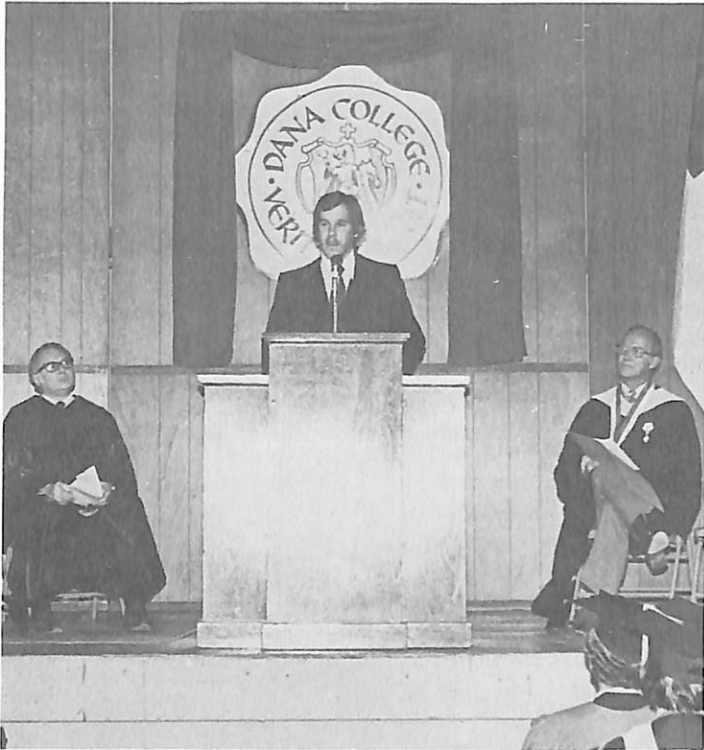
The number of students registered for the first semester is 536, with 505 full-time and 31 part-time students. Last year 567 were registered for the first semester. Evening school enrollment is not included in these figures.

Full-time enrollment includes 191 freshmen (166 are first-time freshmen), 109 sophomores, 111 juniors, 82 seniors, 11 post graduates, and one special student.

In spite of national concern over declining ACT scores, the ACT Composite Score of this year's freshman class is almost a point higher than that of last year's class: this year's average is 21.7, compared to last year's 20.8 (the national average is 18.3). Ten percent of the freshmen ranked first, second, or third scholastically in their high school class; 25 percent ranked in the top 10 percent of their class, and 49 percent ranked in the top 25 percent.

The 536 students come from 28 states and six foreign countries. States leading the enrollment are Nebraska, with 204 students, and Iowa, with 166. The foreign countries represented are Ethiopia, Japan, Kenya, New Guinea, Nigeria, and Rhodesia.

Of the 505 full-time students, 215 belong to the American Lutheran Church, 40 to the Lutheran Church in America, and 40 to the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod.

Art Collection Grows

Original etchings, lithographs, and woodcuts by such artists as Buffet, Renoir, Kollwitz, and Roualt enhance Dana's growing art collection.

The collection, which includes graphic art, ceramics, watercolors, Japanese calligraphy, sculpture, and work by alumni who became artists, has made "remarkable strides within the last five years," according to Dr. John W. Nielsen ('47), director of the humanities program and the Parnassus Room.

The collection has grown partly through gifts from artists who have exhibited in Parnassus, artists like Tom Bartek, Jerry Horning, and Marie Christian (a former faculty member) of Omaha. It has grown through purchase gifts by Dana students. Last spring, for example, former student assistants in Parnassus purchased original prints by Siegel, Chagall, and Daumier for the collection, and two other students purchased ceramic pieces by Omaha potter Stephen Polchert. Several years ago students raised \$2400 for a sculpture by Paul Granlund of Minneapolis.

The collection has also grown through gifts from alumni and parents of students, including examples of Japanese calligraphy, signed by the artists, given to Dana by former missionary Paul C. Johnsen ('49) and by the parents of Akira Okada ('73) of Kobe, Japan.

Much of the growth, however, is the direct result of successful print exhibits and sales held in Parnassus for the last five years by Roten Galleries of Baltimore, Maryland, a highly reputable firm that deals in original graphic art.

These sales attract not only students and members of the faculty and staff, but also people from the surrounding area.

Purchases totaling more than \$2000 were made at the most recent sale in March; the Roten dealer said that Dana's was the best he had had between Chicago and San Francisco.

The success of these sales has benefited the College, for Dana is given a 20 percent reduction on the purchase price of prints for every \$100 worth of prints sold. Faculty members in the humanities and art departments after the last sale were therefore able to buy prints valued at more than \$400 for the school's collection.

Members of these two departments work together in selecting prints that will (1) introduce freshmen and sophomore humanities students to original work representative of artists and periods, and (2) provide art students with illustrations of various techniques.

The oldest of the many prints selected in recent years is "The Image of All the Saints of the Year," an etching by Jacques Callot (1592-1635), who is considered the father of etching. Probably the most valuable is an engraving by Hogarth, the eighteenth century English artist who portrayed the society of his day. Twentieth century artists represented in the collection include Motherwell, Sister Mary Corita, Kirchner, and Marini.

The collection also has work by several former students who became artists, including prints and oils by the late Frank Jespersen ('54), given to the College by his family. Jespersen's work hangs in several museums and galleries. Prints by John Elling ('74), a gift, and by Marian Christensen ('54), who has had two shows in Parnassus, are also in the collection. Christensen has won several awards in print shows.

Photography as an art form is illustrated by the work of Dr. James Coffey ('50), who gave the school several of his photographs after an exhibit in Parnassus.

Works from the collection are displayed periodically in Parnassus, and Nielsen is developing a loan program so that some pieces can hang in faculty and staff offices.

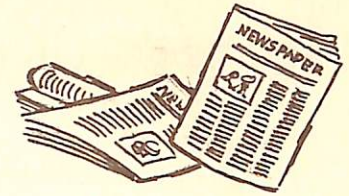
Has the collection helped Dana students learn about art? A comment by the Roten Galleries representative last March to Dr. Nielsen shows that it has. This letter to the editor from Nielsen appeared in the March 12, 1976, issue of the *Hermes*, the campus newspaper:

"The Roten Galleries representative commented upon the extent of student knowledge of graphics and of art in general at Dana. He stated that Dana was the first college where he had found such a high degree of knowledge and artistic discrimination. The fact that he covers so-called 'name' schools of the East as well as colleges of the Midwest makes the compliment even greater. My congratulations to you, the students of Dana."

Danish Press Reports on Queen Margrethe's Visit



Twenty-five Danish journalists were with Queen Margrethe II when she visited the campus May 20 and spoke at commencement ceremonies. Her address and Dana's commencement were given extensive and immediate coverage on Danish television, and newspapers within a day or so carried stories on the event. Students taking Danish under Mrs. Bodil (Strøm) Johnson ('64) have translated excerpts from several articles that appeared in the Danish press.

Omaha: Queen Margrethe II of Denmark is now an honorary doctor at Dana College in Blair, Nebraska. In the baking sun, the Queen received the honorary doctorate degree in her hot robe along with the other graduates of the College.

It was a ceremony which was worth the hot car trip from Omaha — both because the Queen received the distinction with cordial remarks from the College's president and because in her speech to the approximately 2000 listeners, she was able to say something about the country from which a major part of Blair's 7000 residents originated.

The Queen's Roses and the King's Oak

Dana College in Blair was founded in 1884 by Danish Lutheran pioneers. Many of the professors are of Danish ancestry and they teach the Danish language and literature along with the many other courses. The graduates who received their degrees while the Queen looked on don't come only from the Danish families here but also from 25 states in the USA and from Denmark, Japan, New Guinea, Nigeria and Rhodesia. In 1939, the Queen's parents, then Crown Prince and Princess Frederik and Ingrid, visited this place which is in so many ways in continuous connection with Denmark. In October last year, Dana opened a special memorial room for the great Dane, Lauritz Melchior. When the Queen's parents were here they planted an oak tree which is growing well. This time a special rose garden was planted which now bears Queen Margrethe's name.

The Queen's speech to the gathering began with a greeting from the country in which all the Hansens, Larsens, Jakobsens, Niensens and Andersens in the crowd have family roots. She also gave a modern picture of the land since she would like the living generations to know that Denmark is something more than it was when the emigrants left.

The College's 49-year-old president, Earl R. Mezzoff, invited the Queen to come over to the microphone and there the solemn declaration was read aloud (the degree conferred). Dr. Mezzoff cited many reasons for the Queen's receiving the degree: her education in Denmark, France and England; her interest in archaeology and political science; her desire for the education of the princes to know three languages and the Queen's personal design of the royal monogram and also of the Christmas seal for the country which first used Christmas seals.

New Scholarship for Exchange

An important event on the program was the establishment of a Queen Margrethe II Scholarship. The Danish Consul in Kansas City, Missouri, Alfred F. Parmelee, has given \$15,000 to the scholarship fund. He has given the money to show his great respect for Denmark and its citizens but also in gratitude

that for so many years he has been able to serve Denmark as a consul.

The scholarship will be given every year to two students, one Dana student who will study at the University of Copenhagen and one Danish student who will study at Dana College.

Dana Ran Out of Danish Flags

The setting for the ceremony was festive. Here, as in all the places the Queen has been, the Danish national anthem, "King Christian," was performed superbly but unlike other places, the Dana choir joined the band and sang the anthem in Danish. Perhaps it surprised the Queen a little that the drive up to the College was decorated with Austrian flags, but perhaps after decorating the platform they ran out of Danish flags and you can't blame them for using the red and white Austrian flags.

Queen Margrethe and Prince Henrik continued Friday their tour of America at a breathless pace. During their 24-hour stay in Omaha, Nebraska, in the heart of the U.S.A., the reigning couple inspected the headquarters of the Strategic Air Command and visited Dana College in Blair. Queen Margrethe also received an honorary doctorate, and the royal pair participated as honorary guests at a Danish Brotherhood banquet, after which the royal party proceeded on to Seattle, Washington.

Thus far all those in the royal party think that the Queen and Prince look as if they are enjoying every single moment of the trip.

The most exciting and picturesque part of Thursday's visit to Nebraska took place at Dana College in Blair, about one hour's drive from Omaha, where the Queen received an honorary doctorate of letters. Under a baking sun on Dana's Viking Field, the Queen addressed the students on the history of the Danish emigration. After her address she was attired in the traditional black cap and gown.

The attire of the honorary doctor's cap and gown was no secret for Queen Margrethe, who long ago received a letter from Dana College requesting the correct hat size and gown length.

Queen Margrethe was honored on Dana College's Viking Field, where, in the fall, the Viking football team, in red jerseys and white pants, plays football.

Yesterday some of the Vikings were attired in the black gowns which mean that they have passed their exams. They received diplomas under royal Danish favor, which did not make the day less meaningful for the graduates, about half of whom have Danish names such as Knudsen and Hansen.

Dana College, beautifully situated in a soft, hilly landscape, has instruction in Danish. The names on the dormitories show that Danish-Americans have been generous.

Kaj Munk's *The Word* is in the repertoire of the theater students and is used as a touring play.

The College has created a Lauritz Melchior Memorial Room, the library has a Danish look, and the college store carries Danish merchandise such as toys by Kay Bojesen.

All the same, year by year there are fewer students with Danish names who can speak Danish. But Danish-Americans still give large contributions to the support of education. Yesterday the Queen Margrethe II Scholarship joined the list.

In her formal address the Queen indirectly mentioned how difficult it can be to preserve the Danish heritage in the U.S.A. The Danes became Americans quickly. Among other things, she said, "They have never tried to recreate Denmark in the U.S.A."

Therefore, Denmark seems like something far away for most of the students that have Danish names. Fewer and fewer speak with pride and emotion about "Old Denmark." Now many come with newspaper clippings from King Frederik and Queen Ingrid's visit to the same place in the U.S.A. in 1939. But will their children travel far to see the ruling couple's sons when they visit the U.S.A.? One doubts it, for in spite of all the Danish influence, Dana College still seems to be typically American.

Constitutional Amendment Promises Nebraska Students "Equality Before The Law"*

Nebraskans on November 2 will vote on several amendments to the State Constitution. One of these, Amendment 6, Part 2, directly affects Nebraska students.

Present interpretation of the State Constitution is far more restrictive than that of the U.S. Constitution regarding the granting of tax money for non-sectarian purposes to college and university students attending non-public institutions.

The Nebraska Constitution (1) prohibits financial aid to non-public institutions, but (2) is silent about aid to students attending those institutions. This silence has led to an interpretation by the Nebraska Supreme Court that currently prevents many Nebraska students, out of financial necessity, from exercising freedom of choice in deciding whether they want to attend a public or non-public college or university. (This problem is described in the answer to the first question below.)

Amendment 6, Part 2, resolves the conflict over interpretation. It (1) *continues to prohibit* financial aid to non-public institutions, but (2) *allows direct aid* to students *who may then choose to attend either public or non-public colleges or universities.*

This is the amendment: "Constitutional amendment to permit financial aid for non-sectarian purposes to students attending post-secondary educational institutions not wholly owned and controlled by the state or a political sub-division thereof; and to prohibit the expenditure of public funds, added to funds received from the federal government, for sectarian purposes."

Question: How are Nebraska students currently being prevented on economic grounds from exercising freedom of choice in deciding whether they want to attend a public or non-public college or university?

Answer: The State Student Incentive Grant Program (SSIG) is a Federal program in which the Federal government matches State funds (dollar for dollar up to \$750) to help deserving, qualified students pay tuition at either public or non-public colleges and universities. It resembles the G.I. Bill, in that it allows the recipient to attend either a public or non-public college or university, as long as that institution has quality standards.

All states, including Nebraska, receive these Federal funds, but if an eligible Nebraska student chooses to attend a non-public college, the State funds (and consequently the Federal funds) are denied him or her because the Nebraska Supreme Court has ruled that State aid to students attending independent colleges or universities is unconstitutional.

Thus, in Nebraska the Federal SSIG funds earmarked by the Federal government for students in public and non-public colleges and universities alike have gone *only* to students attending public institutions. Recently the Nebraska Attorney General has said that non-public college students could receive the Federal share if the non-public colleges would pay the State's share. This recommendation clearly goes around the Federal guidelines, which say that the Federal matching funds are to be added to State funds as an incentive to the State to develop its own educational programs. Even the title of the Federal program — the "State Student Incentive Grant Program" — makes the intent of the Federal government quite clear.

In addition, the procedure recommended by the Nebraska Attorney General is unfair because it throws an additional, involuntary burden on the non-public college which already is

offering education to Nebraska students at below cost and without tax funds.

It costs Nebraska taxpayers (including of course the parents of Dana students) more than \$2000 each year to support an undergraduate at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln or the University of Nebraska at Omaha. These taxpayers also support out-of-state students at these universities and state colleges once they have established residence in Nebraska.

Question: Will passage of Amendment 6, Part 2, violate the principle of separation of Church and State? Will it open the door for tax support of private institutions?

The answer is "definitely not" to both questions. The Amendment specifically prohibits any type of aid to privately funded institutions. It clarifies the Nebraska Constitution by forcing it to speak where it is now silent and open to interpretation. The G.I. Bill neither violated the principle of separation of church and state nor opened the door for tax support of private institutions. Neither will Amendment 6, Part 2.

A vote for this Amendment will allow Nebraska students to choose the type of educational institution they want to attend without being penalized or discriminated against on economic grounds.

RECENT GIFTS

- The works of Western historian Oscar Osburn Winther, given to the library by his brother Sophus Keith Winther. At the time of his death in 1970 Oscar Osburn Winther was University Professor at Indiana University and president of the Oral History Association. He had been editor of the *Journal of American History* and was co-founder and past president of the Western History Association. A colleague writes that the purpose of Winther's scholarship "was to tell the complete story of land transportation in the West prior to the age of steam" and that his books are "viewed as classics." The collection is from the personal library of Sophus Keith Winther (see Summer 1976 *Review*).

- Books on the language, literature, architecture, and cultural history of Denmark, given to the library by the Danish Bicentennial Committee through the Royal Danish Embassy in Washington, D.C. Title selection was based on recommendations by the Royal Library in Copenhagen. The gift, which includes the 27-volume *Danish Dictionary*, has an approximate value of \$3000.

- *The Recorded Anthology of American Music*, given to KDCV/FM, Dana's radio station, by New World Records under a grant from the Rockefeller Foundation. The 100 records, which will be issued over a three-year period, trace the history of the U.S. through its music. According to New World Records, "the major portion of this material — covering the span from classical to popular music, from folk music to jazz, from religious and patriotic music to so-called salon music — will be specifically recorded . . . with the foremost American forces available; the remainder will be culled from existing recording materials, often out of print."

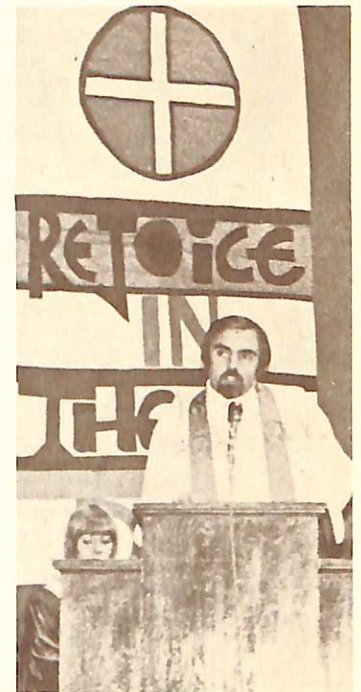

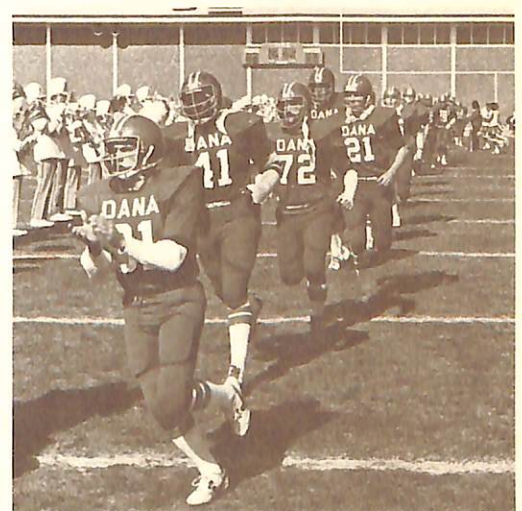

Vikings Open Football Season Right . . . By Winning

The 1976 football season opened on a new and encouraging note for the Dana Vikings — for the first time in a number of years they began the season right . . . by winning. The last time the Vikings won an opening game was in 1968 against Tarkio of Missouri.

The season opened on September 18 with the Vikings ripping Martin Luther College of Minnesota by 42-26. Dana ran up 469 yards in total offense, turned the ball over only once, and held Martin Luther to 91 yards rushing. Doug Meggison, a sophomore from Red Oak, Iowa, and Dana's top quarterback, threw for 155 yards and one touchdown. He also scored on a four-yard run. Todd Roecker, a junior from Harlan, Iowa, and one of the ruggedest running backs in the league, scored twice in a 120-yard rushing day that helped Dana total 314 yards on the ground.

The Vikings met Westmar College on Viking Field on September 28 and racked up their second straight victory of the season, 27-8. After four plays and only 1:35 minutes into the game, Bill Rock, a sophomore from Avoca, Iowa, scampered fifteen yards for the first score, and the Vikings were on their way to another victory. The defense was led by Mike Herbert, a senior from North Wales, Pa., and the offense by Bill Rock and Doug Meggison.

On Saturday, October 2, the Vikings journeyed to South Dakota for their second game in a single week. It turned out to be a disappointing day for the Vikings, as they were defeated by Dakota Wesleyan, 28-14. The big play of the afternoon for the Vikings came when Greg Ilcken, a junior from Grinnell, Iowa, returned the Wesleyan kickoff for a 97-yard run and the score. The Dana defense kept Wesleyan scoreless during the fourth quarter but the offense could not muster anything substantial and Wesleyan went on to victory.

A combination of mistakes and sluggishness led to the Vikings' second defeat of the season at the hands of Hastings College, 48-0, on October 9. Hastings, nationally ranked, took control of the game from the outset and just kept going — rushing, passing and kicking. The Vikings fumbled the ball six times during the afternoon and failed to recover four of them. Of the fumbles lost, three were inside their own 30-yard line and Hastings was quick to capitalize on all of them. And if that weren't enough, four Viking passes were intercepted.

Regardless of the score, Dana is not a 48-0 team and as the Vikings prepare for the last half of the season — Concordia on October 16, Nebraska Wesleyan on October 23, Midland on October 30 and Doane on November 6 — they are working hard to correct their mistakes and get back into the winning column.

Library Seeks Civil War Volume

History buffs who frequent used bookstores and auctions are asked to join in the search for the one book that would complete the library's 156-volume set of the *Official Records of the Union and Confederate Armies and Navies*.

Still missing is Volume VII, Series I, of the Army set.

The Civil War records contain invaluable primary source material, including correspondence, reports on battles, and statistics. The set has grown to 155 volumes through the addition of books from the library of the late Dr. Donald Lehmer, professor of sociology at Dana, and through contacts with book jobbers and bookstores.

However, until the missing volume is placed between Volumes VI and VIII of Series I of the Army records, the set remains broken and far less valuable and useful than a complete set.

Anyone locating the volume who does not care to donate it to the library will be reimbursed at a reasonable rate. (Volumes purchased recently have cost between \$10 and \$15.) The book should be sent to the Dana College library addressed to the attention of head librarian Ronald Johnson.

The Dana and Midland College faculties met again at the start of the school year to discuss areas of cooperation. Speaker for the workshop at Midland in Fremont was Dr. Edward Lindell, president of Gustavus Adolphus College, St. Peter, Minnesota.

The Blair Kiwanis Club has established a \$100 Dana scholarship, which will be matched by the College, for a Washington County resident who has graduated from any of the Washington County high schools.

Dr. RAY WECKMULLER ('52), education, in September briefed the Nebraska State Board on his role as chairman of the College Approval Team. The team makes accreditation visits to all Nebraska colleges and universities with accredited programs of teacher education. He has been team chairman for six years.

Selections for the liberal arts reading program (LARP) for the first semester are *The Bell Jar* by Sylvia Plath; *The Scarlet Letter* by Nathaniel Hawthorne; *A Precocious Autobiography* by Yevgeny Yevtushenko; and *Brave New World*, by Aldous Huxley.

First pastor in residence this year was the Rev. Loren Kniep, Bethel Lutheran Church in Aurora, Colorado. The program is now in its third year.

Dana is again cooperating with Memorial Community Hospital and Clarkson Hospital School of Nursing in Omaha by providing housing for several groups of student nurses training at Blair's Memorial Community Hospital.

Sixty-three Nebraska high school speech and drama teachers participated in a workshop on the campus September 21. Sponsored by the College's speech and theater department, the workshop, called "Quest for Quality," assisted the teachers in preparing for high school speech and drama contests.

Workshop faculty included Robert Mallary, Joliet, Illinois, a nationally known teacher, coach, and judge of competitive speech and drama; and Melissa Beall, a teacher at Lincoln's Southeast High School and chairperson of the Rules Committee of the Nebraska Speech Communication Association which governs the Nebraska speech and drama contests.

Dr. Dennis Henneman, Darrell Dibben, and Lawrence Shotts of the Dana speech and theater department were also on the workshop faculty.

The Dana Folk Dancers joined Celeste Holm and Mrs. Olson of coffee-making fame as featured attractions in Omaha at Lutheran Medical Center's "Yumpin Yimminy Ball" September 26.

The second of two lay academies scheduled for the first semester will be held at the Elk Horn Hall Conference-Retreat Center from December 2 to 5. The first was in September. At the academies laymen have an opportunity to discuss such topics as faith and the family and the Lutheran heritage with theologians, pastors, and one another. The program is directed by Dr. John Northwall, Director of Church Relations and Continuing Education.

Dr. Signe Betsinger, Melchior Room consultant and formerly at the University of Vermont, is now assistant dean of the College of Home Economics at the University of Minnesota. Her address there is McNeal Hall, University of Minnesota, St. Paul (55108).

American Indian author and lawyer Vine Deloria spoke at the College on October 21 under the sponsorship of the student body's Human Rights and Concerns Committee. Deloria's books include *Custer Died for Your Sins* and *God is Red*.

Weckmuller comments that "While the teacher education department is pleased that Dana teachers are rated this well, we must continue to alter our program to keep pace with the continually shifting demands of our schools."

Teacher Grads Rate High

Dr. Ray Weckmuller ('52), chairman of Dana's department of teacher education, has announced the results of an evaluation by school principals of Dana education graduates in their first year of teaching. The graduates are all members of the class of 1975.

The evaluation form sent to the principals included 45 items covering personal, social, professional, and teaching qualifications. The results below are based on a 78 percent return of the forms. Rating categories were superior, above average, average, below average, and poor.

Washington County Appeal Begins October 26

Co-chairmen for the 1976 Washington County Appeal for Dana College are Kermit Andrews of Nebraska-Iowa Supply Company and Dick Charleston of Blair West Pharmacy. Both were also co-chairmen in the 1975 campaign.

Kick-off this year will be Tuesday, October 26. For the first time, new divisions will be added to the Appeal by combining the faculty-staff drive and a Washington County alumni drive with the general appeal to businesses and community residents. Goal for the entire drive is \$38,000.

Tall Grass Prairie-Pioneer Cemetery Is Deeded To College

The Cuming City Cemetery, a tract of never-cultivated tall grass prairie, has been deeded to the College on the condition that it remain forever in its natural state.

Located two miles north of Blair on a windswept hill overlooking the Missouri River valley, the 11-acre pioneer cemetery was administered for more than a century by a board whose most recent chairman has been Richard J. Lippincott, a descendant of Cuming City settlers. Several years ago Lippincott, board secretary Raymond Wilson, and other board members decided to seek assistance in protecting the tract as one of the few remaining stands of prairie grasses in eastern Nebraska.

In response to the board's decision, 29 area residents met at Dana to organize The Eastern Nebraska Nature Conservancy Committee, a branch of The Nature Conservancy, a national non-profit organization concerned with the preservation of natural areas. The initial objective of the local group was to assist the cemetery board. Gene Solomon of Blair, District Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service, was elected chairman; Professor George Grube of Dana's biology department succeeded him last October.

After several legal difficulties had been solved, the board transferred the cemetery title to The Nature Conservancy, and then, last December, the Conservancy transferred it to Dana, with the restrictive covenant that the tract be preserved in perpetuity. According to Grube, the national organization "prefers to have local owners of small tracts for economic as well as managerial reasons."

The title transfers and other legal matters were handled by Blair attorney Robert Martin, who donated his services.

How will Dana use the property? Grube sees it as an outdoor laboratory, a place "where biologists or botanists may become familiar with native upland prairie plants of the tall grass biome; where history buffs may get a glimpse of the local environment of pre-pioneer days; where anyone can enjoy a bit of pioneer nostalgia." Grube adds that "the few remaining virgin prairie tracts may serve the future as sources of seeds of plants whose values remain to be discovered. In good seasons they present a continually changing display of wild flowers, a few of which have been lost to the onslaught of civilization in other environments."

The site, which has a wrought-iron entrance gate with "Cuming City Cemetery" across its arch, is the only evidence that a community once thrived in the neighborhood.

Cuming City, named for acting territorial governor Thomas B. Cuming, was founded in the mid-1850's. Records show that by 1857 it had 53 homes, three stores, three hotels, several boarding houses and the "usual order of saloons." That year it was the "third city in importance to Omaha." (Recently state highway department employees working in the area uncovered foundations and artifacts used by the settlers.)

Plans for a school to be called "Washington College" were even drawn up, but they did not materialize.

Then in 1869 railroad tycoon John I. Blair decided to have the railroad cross the Missouri River two miles south of Cuming City in order to take advantage of an easy passage through the hills skirting the west side of the Missouri valley. The passage and area were known then as "Carter Valley" after a family living there. John I. Blair purchased lots, and the new settlement was named for him.

Cuming City residents had hoped that the railroad would pass through their community. Realizing that the newer town had a more promising future, they moved themselves, churches, and some of their homes into Blair.

Cuming City vanished, but its cemetery continued to be used into the early 1930's by families descended from the early settlers.

One of the town's most prominent citizens during its brief existence was Lewis Mines Kline. A nurseryman and early mayor of Council Bluffs, Iowa, Kline bought property in the Cuming City area and in 1856 moved there with his family. He became publisher of *The Nebraska Pioneer*, one of Nebraska's earliest newspapers, and served in the territorial legislature.

Lippincott notes that the names of members of the Kline family open and close the cemetery records: George Kline was buried there in 1856, and Marvin Kline, a former mayor of Minneapolis, in May 1974 — the only burial in recent years. (In spite of the title transfer to Dana, families with plots will still be able to use the cemetery if they wish.)

The Kline family is also associated with the history of the College. John C. Wright Kline, a son of Lewis M. Kline, was one of three Blair residents who in 1885 gave land to the new school for a campus. He was a civil engineer and Washington County surveyor from 1873 to 1881. J. C. W. Kline is buried in the Cuming City Cemetery.

And many alumni will remember the Kline House, a large farmhouse located where the Dana Hall of Science now stands. In 1921 Dana purchased the house and adjoining property from the family. Kline House was at first a faculty residence and in its last years an auxiliary dormitory for women students. It was razed in the early 1960's to make way for the science hall.

Several Dana students and alumni are descendants of the pioneering Lippincott family.

The Eastern Nebraska Nature Conservancy Committee did not disband after preservation of the tall grass tract was assured. Grube explains that its members will be available to Dana for "technical and physical assistance in performing the school's obligation to retain the 11 acres as prairie." And, he adds, committee members are continuing their efforts to seek out and preserve other natural areas in east-central Nebraska.

First African Alumnus Visits Campus

Ndewirwa N. Kitomari ('64) of Tanzania, Dana's first African student, visited the campus September 23. He is commissioner for planning in the Ministry of Finance and Planning in the Tanzanian government.

After leaving Blair in June 1964, Kitomari studied economics at Syracuse University in Syracuse, New York, receiving his M.A. in 1966. He, his wife, and 14-month-old daughter live in Dar es Salaam, the capital of Tanzania.

He had attended a conference in Mexico City earlier in September, and then traveled to Lawrence, Kansas, to meet his former Dana roommate, pastor Arden Dorn ('63). Both then drove to Blair. For Kitomari it was his first visit since 1964.

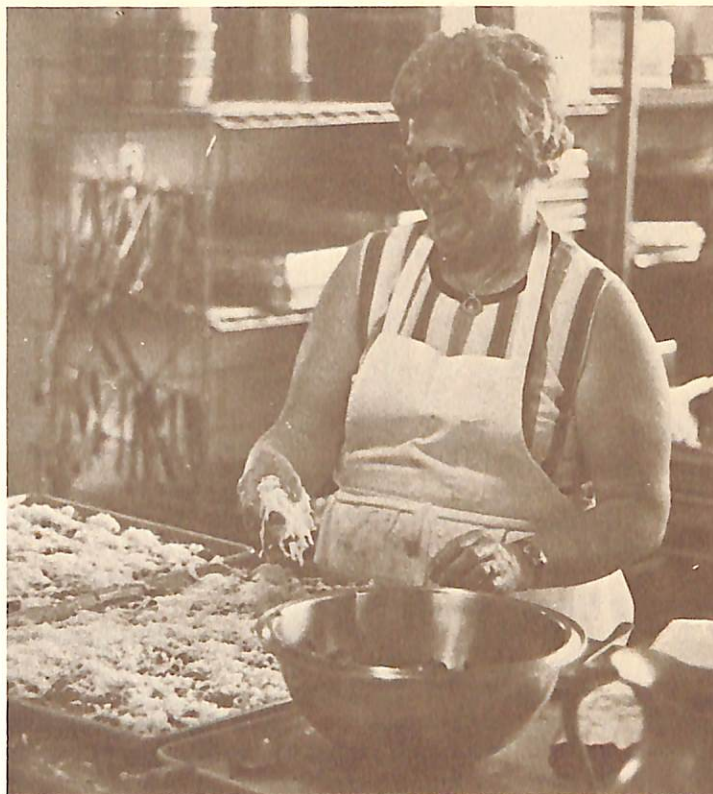
His return, he said, was a sentimental one, for "Dana was a part of me for four years, and seeing the campus again means much to me." He recalled the closeness of students and faculty, and although his visit was brief, he was able to renew acquaintances with many faculty and staff members still at the College.

He also brought news of two other alumni living in Dar es Salaam. Elimweka Mshiu ('65) is chief pharmacist in the Ministry of Health, and John Lawko ('65) is a tutor. (Addresses of all three men are in "Destiny's Deep Sea.")

When Kitomari left the campus early the next morning for his return trip to Tanzania, he had with him several souvenirs of the College — including "Explore Dana" bumper stickers for himself, Mshiu, and Lawko.

Marie Nielsen Welch writes from Paradise, California:

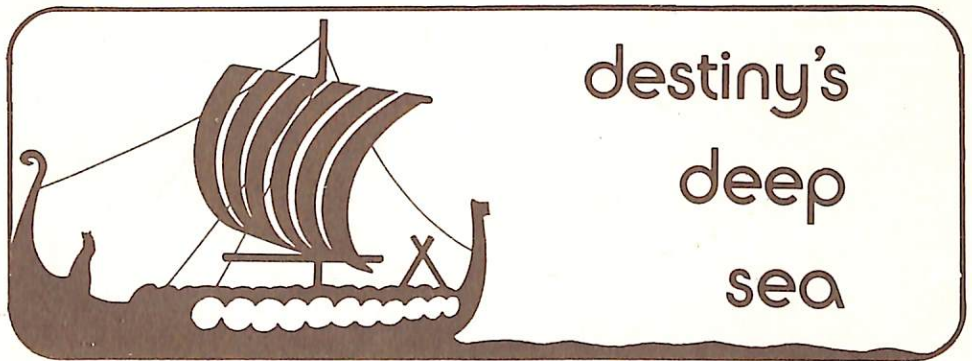

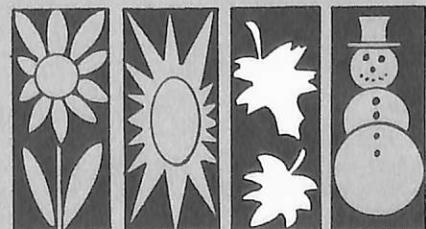

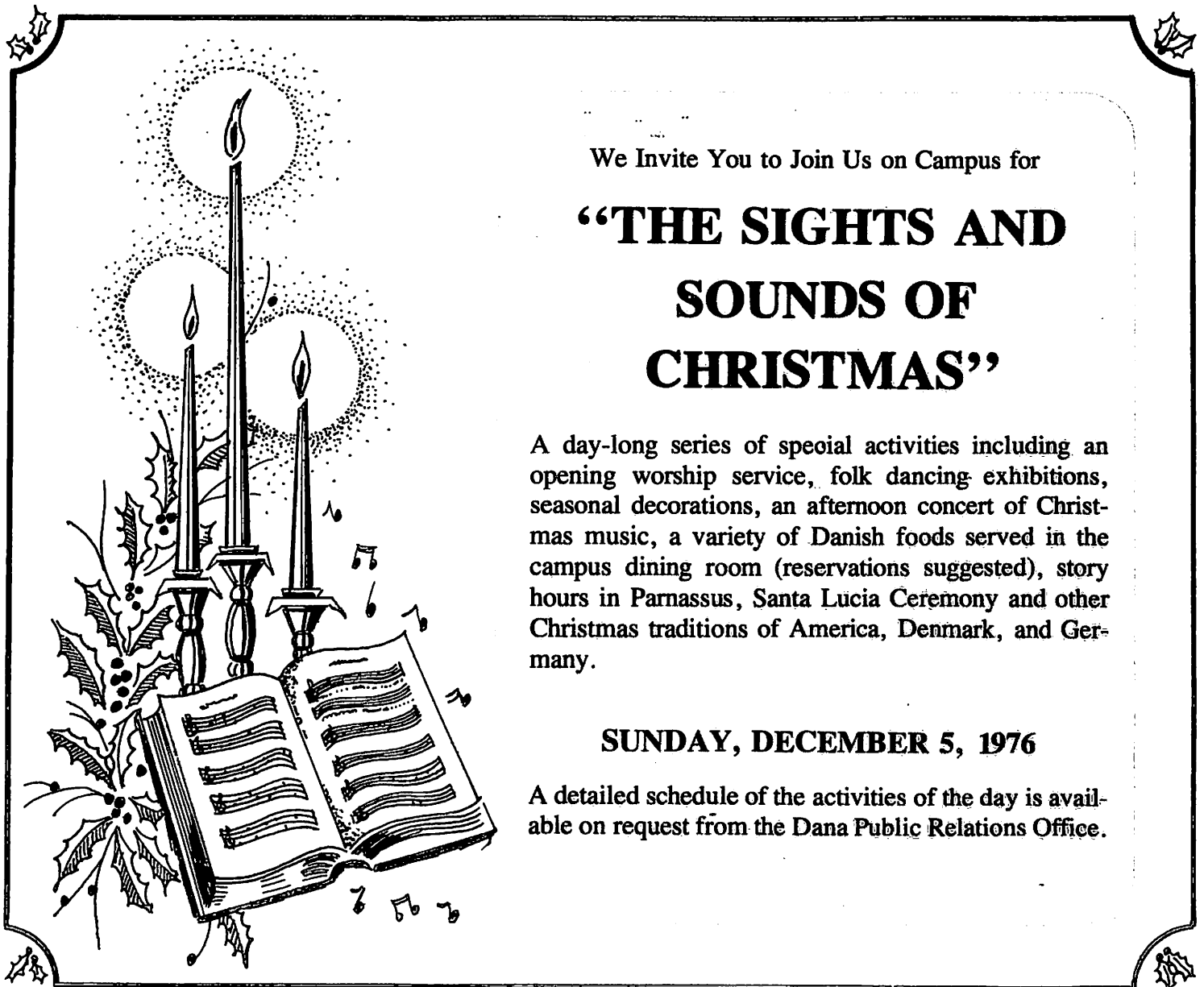

REPORT

To All Dana College Investors, 1976

The following pages contain the names of individuals, corporations, congregations, organizations and foundations who make up the 1975-76 honor role of Dana donors. All of us at Dana, faculty, staff, students and Board of Regents, express our very deep gratitude and appreciation for the faith which your gifts to Dana represent.

Since my arrival at Dana in 1971, I have shared with you the fact that the decade of the 1970's is and would be one in which the climate would be much more challenging for all institutions of higher education. There are a host of reasons which have affected enrollments, operating costs and credibility of value of the collegiate experience. Any recital of those factors would sound like rationalization or a case of "self-pity." And so I will refrain from doing so, other than to simply underscore the fact that this era is a difficult and perplexing one and I would predict that it will be much worse for educational institutions before it becomes better.

Your financial support of Dana, as indicated in the enclosed report, was truly outstanding. Gifts and grants to Dana during this past year established a new record high of \$544,000.00 for a noncapital-campaign year. The total gifts and grants for this year exceeded our receipts of last year by \$160,000. That increase is excellent and has added to the resources of the college. Unfortunately, as far as the operating budget was concerned, only \$20,000 of the \$160,000 in new money was available to apply against our fixed operational costs, such as utilities, maintenance, personnel, supplies, etc.

In my report of last year, I indicated that we had been able in past years to build up an operating surplus, but I was concerned that the rate of growth in that surplus had dropped dramatically in the previous year.

Because of our desire to improve the quality of the experience at Dana, coupled with unanticipated expenditures, we experienced a short-fall in the relation of revenues versus expenditures. The Board made a courageous decision in the fall of 1975, not to adjust the budget or to increase charges to students during the year, both of which would have drastically affected the College. But rather it determined that should there be a short-fall, we would cover that short-fall with the operating surplus which had been accrued. As indicated above, we did have a short-fall and it was covered by those resources. However, the surplus which remains would not be sufficient to cover a comparable deficit in another year.

While this report serves to give you information about the success in gift and grant raising this past year, it must also serve as a stimulus for increased giving during the current year. The challenge exists and we need your assistance by increasing your own gifts to Dana College as well as interesting others in going to Dana.

We do appreciate and thank God for your loyal support in the past. But our faith and prayers are filled also with the hope that you will go the extra mile this year.
