FROM THE PRESIDENT

On March 17 and 18, the Board of Regents spent considerable time in serious discussion of the many issues which face Dana College and all of private higher education today. Despite the spiralling costs to the College for almost all services, including utilities, and the prospects of deficit spending this year, they acted with faith, determination and belief in Dana, not only for the present but also for its future.

While costs for utilities alone have increased from \$65,000 per year in 1970 to \$155,000 for the current year, an increase of approximately 150 percent, and despite an increase of 20 percent in electricity rates this year and a 50 percent increase in charges for water, the Board set the increased charge for tuition at \$250, room at \$10, and board at \$35 for next year. This represents an increase of 8.5 percent over charges for the current year.

Because of their faith in Dana and their belief in the future, they approved a feasibility study for a major fund-raising campaign to be conducted during the late spring and early summer to determine the advisability of moving ahead on a major campaign. At the same time the Chairman of the Board will appoint a subcommittee of the Board to meet with the consulting architect to complete the feasibility study for chapel-fine arts facilities. These two studies will proceed simultaneously and are to be completed for Board consideration in late summer or early fall.

Other actions taken provide for representation to the Board of Regents from the Alumni Association, the faculty, and the student body. These representatives, who will serve

in an advisory capacity, will be the president of the Alumni Association, the chairman of the Faculty Senate and the president of the student body.

The Board also adopted a budget calling for expenditures of \$2,485,824, an increase of \$17,434 over the current year, but a deficit budget of \$57,556. Further, they took action that commits Dana to a zero-accumulated deficit by May 31, 1980.

These actions, along with many others, were reached only after many hours of thoughtful, serious discussion and deliberation. It is heartwarming to any college president to have such a dedicated, conscientious board. This Board recognizes, as I have indicated before, that the times are not the most favorable for the private colleges, and that the decade ahead will present even greater challenges. At the same time, this Board has the confidence and the determination that Dana will enter the decade of the eighties in a position of strength.

Earlier I indicated that we have had inordinate increases in utilities. I realize that most people expect a college president to seek financial support for the college's academic program, for faculty salaries, for its library, and for financial aid for students. Why? Because these are appealing and, quite frankly, much more glamorous than requests for help in paying for water, sewer use, electricity and fuel oil. While costs for operating the academic programs have increased significantly, it is the 300 percent rise in fuel oil costs in three years, the 50 percent increase in water costs overnight with a comparable rise in sewer use fees, and the 20 percent rise in electricity costs in a year's time which drain badly needed dollars away from improving academic programs. With these inordinate rises in costs for externally controlled services and supplies, Dana College faces its second year with a deficit, unless it experiences a significant increase in gifts by May 31, 1977.

I urge each of you who believe in Dana--alumni, parents, friends and students--to go the extra mile, to respond with your prayers and your gifts. In doing so, you will not only ease the immediate financial problem, but you will also be joining the Board of Regents in expressing your belief in the future of Dana College.

Dana Folk Dancers Go To Washington

To viewers of the January 19 *Today Show's* coverage of inauguration festivities in Washington, D.C.: Yes, those dancers in Danish folk costumes were Dana students.

Seventeen of the Dana Folk Dancers and public relations director Phillip Pagel '56 spent inauguration week in Washington as guests of Elmer Carlson of Audubon, Iowa. A farmer, Carlson invited the Dancers to perform twice each night--January 18, 19, and 20--at his three "Farmers for Carter" parties, where the Duke Ellington and Tommy Dorsey orchestras played.

Carlson, who had been looking for an ethnic group from the Midwest to perform at the parties, invited the Dancers on the recommendation of a friend. The Dancers shared the spotlight each night with the Oley Valley Hoedowners of Pennsylvania, who were also Carlson's guests.

The students filled their days with sightseeing, visiting art galleries and museums, and attending concerts, but there were other special events as well.

On Tuesday morning, January 18, they attended the traditional Nebraska congressional delegation breakfast in the Capitol's Senate Dining Room. There they danced--not only for Nebraskans but also for two Dana alumni: Illinois Congressman Paul Simon '50 and Rod Wead '57 of Chicago, a former Omahan.

The next afternoon the Dancers visited the Royal Danish Embassy, where they were greeted by Niels Toft, Danish Cultural Counselor.

And, of course, on Thursday morning there was the inauguration. Here are senior Renae Johnson's impressions of that day from her account in the January 24 *Hermes*, the student newspaper:

"People, many people, thousands of faces and jillions of warm bodies massed together in a designated area. O boy, do I know what a sardine feels like!

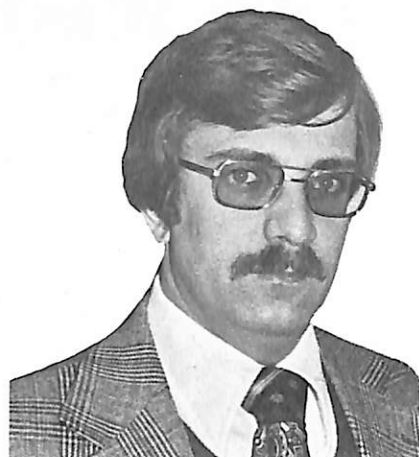
Mail Brings \$10,000 Check

"Wouldn't it be great if there were more letters like this one!" was the reaction of Dana president Earl R. Mezoff after he opened the mail one morning in February to find a pleasant surprise--a cashier's check for \$10,000.

Mezoff said that the gift was from a friend of the College who wished to remain anonymous. The donor placed no restrictions on the gift, so it will be used for Dana's current operating budget.

"Attracting unrestricted gifts such as this one," Mezoff said, "is one of the most difficult yet important tasks facing private colleges like Dana. We have an urgent need for gifts to help the current operating budget, but too few donors are willing to help in this way."

New Director Joins Admissions

Richard Phalunas, former assistant director of admissions at Wheeling College, West Virginia, became director of admissions at Dana in February. Phalunas has also taught biology and has worked with student affairs, co-curricular activities, and student residence life.

Johnson Associates, Inc., of Oak Brook, Illinois, a professional admissions firm, assumed responsibility for Dana's admissions program in early December, and Phalunas is an employee of that organization.

In announcing the appointment, Henry Erwin, Johnson Associates vice-president, told the Dana faculty and staff that Phalunas' "commitment to the liberal arts, the Dana philosophy, and the church-related college is strong. He is pleased and excited about Dana, his new position, and working with all of you."

Erwin and Robert Bergin, also of Johnson Associates, remained on the campus through Phalunas' orientation period.

They and Phalunas have been developing recruiting procedures to reach qualified and highly motivated students who are looking for the "Dana difference" in a college education. Assisting Phalunas in his duties are admissions counselors Robert Arnold, Craig Green and Paul Johnson '76.

The Johnson Associates concept provides for the management of the Admissions Office. However, the College through its Academic Standards Committee maintains complete control over actual decisions with regard to the acceptance or rejection of individual students.

Dana Offers Semester In Denmark

Next year Dana is again offering students an opportunity to earn 15 hours of credit by attending spring semester classes taught in English at the University of Copenhagen.

In Europe the program is administered by Denmark's International Student Committee (DIS), which is subsidized by the University of Copenhagen and the Danish Ministry of Education.

Classes, all with a Scandinavian or European emphasis, are offered in art, economics, education, literature, drama, philosophy, music, political science, anthropology, sociology, and the Danish language.

Students at other colleges and universities can also participate, with credits they earn in Denmark transferable from Dana to their schools. Dana recommends the program especially for juniors. A grade average of 6 (a B) is required for acceptance into the program.

The College's application deadline for the spring 1978 semester is October 15, 1977. Details can be obtained from Dr. Robert Glass, Dana's dean of the college. (A form for this purpose is on page 15.)

College Receives NEH Grant

Dana has been awarded a \$4300 six-month consultation grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities.

Under the grant Dr. Edward Lindell, who developed a highly successful humanities program at the University of Denver several years ago, is serving as a consultant to Dana in art, English, French, German, history, music, philosophy, religion, speech-theater, and the humanities major. He is now president of Gustavus Adolphus College in St. Peter, Minnesota.

Dana president Earl R. Mezoff, in announcing the award, said that "While we believe we have good programs in the 'humanities' as defined by the Endowment, we requested consultant assistance to help make those programs more effective and to have an even greater impact on students. Further, it was suggested by Dr. Lindell that we might be able to develop a model for other colleges of our size as well as for larger institutions."

Phonorama Calls; Alumni Answer

When the calls were completed, the 1977 Phonorama had received cash and commitments of more than \$48,700 toward the goal of \$50,000, a substantial increase over the \$42,200 raised from alumni in 1976.

Almost 50 percent of the alumni reached made a commitment to the drive, and another 20 percent said that they would send something. The Development Office reports that it has even received gifts from alumni who had earlier refused. If the trend continues, by the close of the fiscal year on May 31 the goal should be surpassed.

Phonorama chairman Phil Wittig '56 is pleased with the results; he noted in a letter to the volunteer captains that "This increasing participation by alumni in the future of Dana is encouraging."

Steel Executive:

"Industry Has Place For Liberal Arts Graduate"

"Industry today is looking for people with imagination, enthusiasm, and background; it is looking for people who are willing to go that extra mile," Bethlehem Steel executive Richard M. Hurd told an audience of Dana students and faculty on March 3, when he spoke on "What Are the Opportunities for the Liberal Arts Graduate in History?"

At Dana the week of February 28 as a Woodrow Wilson Visiting Fellow, Hurd told his audience that an applicant for a job in industry needs both an educational background and the willingness to continue to learn.

He said, however, that students should regard their degrees as more than just a "passport to a job," for (quoting an address to freshmen by the president of Harvard) "society needs people with breadth of knowledge, judgment, sensitivity, and taste."

Vice-president for engineering at Bethlehem, Hurd is himself a graduate of a liberal arts college--Swarthmore-- and his four children are either liberal arts graduates or attending liberal arts schools.

Hurd cited the results of a Kiplinger survey asking industries about the kind of graduates they hire. The survey found that industries ranked liberal arts graduates fourth (after business marketing, engineering, and accounting), but that 30 percent of those companies nevertheless actively sought liberal arts graduates.

Hurd said that Bethlehem Steel has 1800 employees who have graduated from liberal arts schools. These employees, who have majors in diverse areas, hold many types of positions. In hiring, Bethlehem considers an applicant's grades, work experience (such as summer jobs), career goals, extra-curricular activities, and the ability to communicate both in speaking and writing.

He offered this practical advice to students: "Begin to think about jobs now. Ask yourself what you want to do with your life. Find out where the graduates are who took your course of study. Look in the college library for information on companies and their needs.

"Then, before approaching a company, find out all you can about it. Settle on a career plan. Prepare a concise and informative resume. Write, showing a specific interest, and ask for an interview.

"If this approach is unsuccessful, consider your objectives further, and look for training programs in particular skills to complement your education."

Hurd noted that once employed, a college graduate "must often start from the bottom up, doing things even a high school graduate could do, in order to learn about the company. If he or she perseveres and does a good job, that person should soon be promoted to a more challenging position."

Dana District Task Force Meets

In December 1973, representatives from the Central District of the American Lutheran Church (ALC) and Dana College met for the first time to discuss ways to develop a closer working relationship between the College and the District, which includes Nebraska, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, and Oklahoma. Dana is the only college of the ALC in the District.

Called the "Dana District Task Force," the group has met regularly ever since. Its most recent meeting was on the campus last January 28 and 29.

Mutual concerns discussed at that meeting included college costs, ways to interest Central District high school students in church colleges, congregational support of the College, visits to congregations by Dana students and faculty members, participation by the College in District area conferences, and reports from Dana to District congregations.

Dr. John Northwall, director of church relations and continuing education at Dana, says that the Task Force has been "of real significance in exploring ways in which Dana College and the Central District, ALC, can support and serve one another. This is an open approach to the tasks that we mutually share in our work of ministry."

Of the 21 Task Force members, four have been appointed by the Central District Council since the January meeting. They are: Mary Jane Anthony, Talmage, Nebraska; Pastor Will Haygean, Grand Island, Nebraska; Pastor Robert Schaff, Omaha; and Pastor John Sorenson '71, Ruskin, Nebraska.

Other representatives from the Central District include: Dr. Archie Madsen '49, president of the Central District, Denver; Mr. Dennis Barnum, Jefferson City, Missouri; Mrs. Dan Berke, Cozad, Nebraska; Mrs. Herb Doubek, Belleville, Kansas; Mr. Kenneth Hansen, Lincoln, Nebraska; Pastor Lowell Hemken, Fort Collins, Colorado; Mrs. Alvina Hjortsvang '48, Fremont, Nebraska; Pastor Frank Reisinger, Denver; and Pastor James Wagner, Shawnee Mission, Kansas.

Teachers: Keep Credentials Current

Dana's Placement Office wishes to remind teachers who are applying for another teaching position this spring to write to that office for credential revision forms. A teaching experience reference should be added to a teacher's file whenever he or she leaves a teaching position, and his or her credentials should be revised every three years.

The Placement Office asks that correspondence include the teacher's complete name (including maiden name, if applicable), current address (including zip code), and telephone number (including area code).

Alumnus Aids Stargazers

Paul Mengers '50, San Carlos, California, is president of Quantex Corporation, a high technology company which manufactures advanced electronic imaging equipment and systems for industrial applications and for medical and scientific research. Among the company's customers are many of the world's astronomers.

Mengers writes that "The two main types of products manufactured, and which are usually sold as an integrated system, are extremely sensitive television cameras and Digital Image Memory Processors. When operated together, the resulting system is literally the most sensitive image detection, recording and display system available on the market. Using only the same wavelength of light we see with our eyes but with better efficiency, longer time exposures, and sophisticated computer controlled digital signal processing, this system can present on a conventional TV monitor, bright, clear images under unusually dim viewing conditions. In a room too dark for you to see your hand in front of your face, our system would produce an excellent quality TV image in just a few seconds."

He adds that "Our first customers were astronomers trying to detect stars one hundred times fainter than their dark-adapted eyes could see. Our equipment achieves this with a delay of only five seconds. Most of the largest telescopes throughout the world now use our equipment."

Quantex has recently expanded its sales into new applications and has equipment being used in cancer research, energy research, laser engineering, spectroscopy, and high-speed industrial inspection.

Mengers founded the company three years ago after managing a division of another company with similar products. Before that, he was an engineering manager with several high technology companies.

Readers in Nebraska and western Iowa are invited to join the Dana chapter, which promotes cultural understanding of the Scandinavian countries. The chapter sponsors at least one speaker each year: in September Dr. Francis Bowman, professor emeritus at the University of Southern California, spoke on "Better Left Unsaid--Scandinavian Historians and Sensitive Subjects"; last year Diane Wolkstein, New York City's official storyteller, related many of the tales of Hans Christian Andersen to audiences of children and adults. Last year the chapter also presented the Sophus Keith Winther marker and cottonwood tree to the College (see summer *Review*).

The annual dues of \$20 will place members on the mailing list for two national ASF publications--the *Scandinavian Review* and *SCAN*.

High School Juniors and Seniors



Wondering how well you'll do in college? Worried about expenses? Dana's Early Start Program can help you.

If you're a high school junior or senior in the upper half of your class and if you live within commuting distance of the Dana campus, you can take one or two courses in the morning for six weeks this summer at half the regular tuition rate.

By taking advantage of this Early Start opportunity, you'll earn credits that can apply toward graduation from Dana or can be transferred to other colleges and universities. And by finding out what a college class is like, you'll be ahead of other freshmen when you enter college, not only in credits earned, but in self-assurance.

The classes that you can take under the Early Start Program, which runs from June 6 through July 15, include child psychology, introduction to education, introduction to geography, child literature, basic mathematics, college algebra, life science, physical science, introduction to sociology, fundamentals of speech, and psychology of adolescence (offered for three weeks, from July 18 to August 5).

Instead of the regular \$195 tuition charge for a three-credit course, you'll pay half that--\$97.50.

Summer Students Will Visit Nebraska Literary Sites

"A Thousand Miles of Nebraska Literature and History" will be logged by students who enroll in this two-week summer course offered for three credit hours by English professor Norman C. Bansen. The course is scheduled for June 6 to 17.

Students will be on the road for all but the first and last days of the class. Enroute they will combine reading and discussion of the works of these Nebraska authors with visits to their locales: Sophus Keith Winther--Weeping Water; Willa Cather--Red Cloud; Mari Sandoz--Gordon; Wright Morris--Central City; and John G. Neihardt--Bancroft.

The group will also stop at other major historic sites, including Arbor Lodge, Brownville, the Homestead National Monument, Massacre Canyon, Chimney Rock, Scottsbluff and the Agate Fossil Beds, Fort Niobrara, and the Stuhr Museum.

Bansen has limited enrollment to eleven.

In addition to tuition, a charge of \$160 will cover admission fees, travel, and lodging (double occupancy of twin-bed rooms; single occupancy is an additional \$60). Meals are not included in this charge. A special 50 percent tuition reduction is available to teachers.

Bansen must receive all applications by June 1, together with a non-refundable deposit of \$15, if the applicant is accepted. The balance of the additional fee and tuition is payable June 6.

Students Given Close-Up On American Corporation

During the January Interim five Dana students and a faculty member had a unique opportunity to look closely at the operations --and the human side--of a large corporation.

Sponsored by the Dana Corporation (no relationship to the College), whose World Headquarters are in Toledo, Ohio, and the Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation of Princeton, New Jersey, the innovative program in which they participated brought together 67 liberal arts college and university students, 14 of their faculty members, and the Dana Corporation's chairman, president, and other senior management personnel, who were the instructors for the three-credit course. The Dana Corporation and its subsidiaries primarily manufacture products used in the transmission and control of mechanical power.

The Wilson Foundation selected Dana and seven other colleges and universities to participate in the program. Students from Dana were Dennis Lee, Moorhead, Iowa; David McClanahan, Fort Calhoun, Nebraska; Jane Matthies, Omaha; Bruce Ramage, Plattsmouth, Nebraska; and John Philip Romer, Dallas, Texas. Dr. R. Gary Dean, business administration, accompanied the group.

For a week prior to their visit to the Dana Corporation, participants met at Denison University in Granville, Ohio, for briefing sessions on business in general and on the Dana Corporation in particular.

The next week, at Corporation headquarters in Toledo, they attended presentations by senior management personnel on the operations and problems of a corporation functioning under the American free enterprise system. The discussion periods were candid and free-wheeling, the Dana students report.

Participants returned to the Denison campus the third week for discussion, analysis, and summarizing, and to their home campuses the fourth week to write research papers and reports.

How successful was the program? When Dr. Dean was asked this question, he replied that "I regard this type of straightforward interaction between businessmen and students to be one of the most effective and efficient ways to overcome the widespread misunderstanding which exists concerning the realities of the corporate environment."

Dean added that "The way the Dana Corporation executives conducted themselves--no indoctrination, no side-stepping of any issue, saying 'Yes, we know we have to do more in that area'--brought out the humanness which is business, and which makes business exciting."

ANTONY R. DaCRUZ **International Executive,** **Eastman Kodak Company**

Antony R. DaCruz received his B.S. in chemistry and mathematics from Dana in 1950 and his M.S. in chemical engineering from the University of Minnesota in 1953.

DaCruz is assistant director, marketing planning, the International Division, at Eastman Kodak in Rochester, New York. Several of his previous assignments with Kodak have been in other countries: in Brazil, where he was technical operations manager for Kodak Brasileira; in Colombia, where he was general manager for Kodak Colombiana; in Argentina, where he was technical operations manager and director of Kodak Argentina; and in England, where he was management consultant to Kodak Subsidiary Companies in the United Kingdom.

It was while DaCruz was in Argentina in 1973 that he was kidnapped by a leftist political group; he was the first American to be kidnapped in that country. Kodak paid \$1.5 million for his ransom before he was released unharmed.

His father, the late Dr. Antony DaCruz, taught languages at Dana for five years before retiring in 1953. He and his family had emigrated from Portugal in the late 1940's because Professor DaCruz was dissatisfied with the Salazar regime.

Professor DaCruz's wife Sara and their daughter Mrs. Peter (Elisa '50) Merkl live in Goleta, California.

DaCruz is a member of the American Chemical Society and of Phi Lambda Upsilon, an honorary graduate fraternity. He has won two International Bronze Medals from the International Salon of Photography and is listed in *Who's Who in Finance and Industry*.

He and his wife Helen live in Rochester at 174 Oak Lane (14610). They have one son.

JURI TAHT **Musician**

Cellist Juri Taht received his B.A. degree in music from Dana College in 1952 and his Master of Music degree from the Manhattan School of Music in 1958.

He is a member of the Don Shirley Trio, plays for recording sessions with Andre Kostelanetz, and is a member of the Orchestra da Camera, a chamber orchestra which gives concerts in Long Island public schools.

It was a wonderful experience which has had a profound effect on my outlook on life, on what I think of Americans and on how much I love this country. Thus I cannot thank enough the faculty and the student body . . . and, if I may mention one name, Mr. Paul Neve, who did so much for me."

C. A. VAMMEN **Retired Pastor** **Superintendent,** **Cherokee Indian Mission (1924-58)**

The Rev. C. A. Vammen, who emigrated from Denmark in 1909, was graduated from Dana College in 1914 and from Trinity Seminary in Blair in 1917. He has also attended Chicago Lutheran Seminary, Maywood, Illinois; State Teachers College, Tahlequah, Oklahoma; and the University of Oklahoma, where he received an M.Ed. in 1940.

From 1924 until his retirement in 1958, Vammen served in Oaks, Oklahoma, as superintendent of the Cherokee Indian Mission, which was founded by the former United Evangelical Lutheran Church (UELCL).

Early in his ministry Vammen served parishes in Osakis, Minnesota, and Staplehurst, Nebraska. He has also been editor of the UELCL's *Christmas Chimes* and a frequent contributor to that synod's *Ansgar Lutheran* and the *Luthersk Ugeblad*.

Dr. Robert Glass, dean of the College, is director of the Metropolitan Area Arts Council, a non-profit organization funded by the National Endowment for the Arts, the Iowa State Arts Council, and the Nebraska Arts Council, and supported by private contributions and membership dues.

The College is developing a resource center and play-lending library for high school drama departments and community theaters in the area. Two plaster casts of plaques by Danish artist Bertel Thorvaldsen (1768-1844) identical to the two that once hung in the former Old Main Chapel are on permanent exhibit in Parnassus. A gift to the College, the large plaques--called *Morning* and *Evening*--were salvaged by Blair residents from the town's Central School when it was remodeled several years ago.

Dr. Paul Neve, music, was guest organist at the dedication of a new organ at Mt. Olivet Lutheran Church in Perry, Iowa, on February 20.

The late Lauritz Melchior's personal score of Meyerbeer's *The Prophet* has been given to the College for the Melchior Memorial Room by the late heroic tenor's secretary, Miss Marianne Tegner.

Dr. Bernard Matthies, education and psychology, has been elected chairman of the board for the Martin Luther Home in Beatrice, Nebraska. He has previously served on the board as secretary of the executive committee.

Six graphics by Danish artist Inge-Lise Koefoed have been given to the College by the Danish Bicentennial Committee. The prints convey aspects of Koefoed's five-panel white unglazed porcelain relief "Vibrations," which has been given by the Committee to the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, D.C. The artist pulled and signed 50 sets of the prints; Dana has the eighteenth pulling. The work was exhibited in Parnassus from February 27 to March 18.

Pastor Robert Schaff of Omaha's Lutheran Church of the Master was pastor-in-residence from February 1 to 9.

Twenty-five student couples together raised \$4,759 in pledges at a Muscular Dystrophy Dance Marathon at Dana March 4 and 5. As we look back on the wrestling season, one that started at Homecoming '76 and ended at the National Tournament in Cheney, Washington, we ask, was it worth it? I believe the overall experience was a great one for Dana and the wrestlers.

However, the injuries the team picked up as the season progressed affected it psychologically. We should have had our best season this year, since we had more talents on the mats than ever before. But we never once wrestled at full strength. Nevertheless, there were some great matches scattered throughout the year.

Wayne Driver led the team early in the season, winning two tournaments and placing quite high in the Orange Bowl Classic in Miami, Florida.

By the time Dana headed into the conference tourney hosted on the campus, the team had lost the services of Pete Gantnier (defending NIAC champ), Jeff Volcek (first place finisher North-west Missouri tournament), Wayne Driver (defending NIAC champ), and Henry Barber (third place NIAC winner).

At the conference meet, Dana placed four in the finals and came away with three first place finishers: Steve Lefeber, Gordon Rasmussen, and Al Pedersen. Bob Murtaugh was leading in his 118-pound match 6-1 before he was caught in a pinning combination.

Bub Murtaugh and Gordon Rasmussen, both runner-up finishers in the District II tournament at Concordia, qualified for the National Tournament at East Washington State.

As a finale to the entire season, the team officiated at the first Dana Old Timers' Tournament on April 1 and 2. Although some former Dana greats were involved, it was an open tournament. In the senior division, the highlight of the first night was the 160-pound match which featured Dana alumni Ron Hough '65 and Jim Prouty '73. Ron pinned Jim to walk off with top honors. The tournament was a success financially, and the 76-77 wrestlers gained experience through officiating at a tournament of this caliber.

The Dana chapter of Alpha Chi, a national college honor scholarship society with 153 active chapters across the country, is 17 years old this April.

Rasmussen is the chapter's only honorary member. 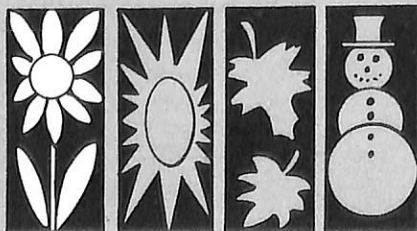
