Beck said that cash received from alumni from June 1, 1978, to May 31, 1979, totaled \$101,766. The 1977-78 total was \$48,172; 1976-77, \$48,221; 1975-76, \$42,095; and 1974-75, \$41,214.

Leading Theologians Will Speak at Dana

Four outstanding Christian leaders will each give a series of lectures at Dana during the 1979-80 school year as participants in the College's new Visiting Theologians Program.

Funded by gifts from the Board of Regents, the annual program will bring to the campus "a continuing stream of the most distinguished scholars of the entire Christian world," President James Kallas said.

Lecturing at Dana from September 17-21 will be Dr. Mat-

thew Black, Emeritus Professor of Biblical Criticism, University of St. Andrews, Scotland. Educated at the Universities of Glasgow and Bonn, Black taught at the Universities of Glasgow, Manchester, Aberdeen, Leeds, and Edinburgh before becoming Professor of Divinity and Biblical Criticism and Principal of St. Mary's College at St. Andrews. He retired last year.

Black, the author of many books, will speak on "Modern Christological Thought" at his first three lectures and on "The New Testament Today" at his last two.

The three other speakers are Dr. Nils Dahl, Professor of New Testament, Yale University Divinity School, at Dana January 7-11; Dr. Donn Moomaw, Pastor, Bel Air Presbyterian Church, Los Angeles, February 10-14; and Dr. John Macquarrie, Lady Margaret Professor of Divinity and Canon of Christ Church, Oxford University, England, April 14-18.

Brochures on the free public lectures, all scheduled for 8 p.m. in the Dana Hall Auditorium, are available from Dana's Office of Public Relations.

Phonorama '79 Reaches \$116,000

This year's Phonorama exceeded even the most optimistic expectations as gifts from friends, parents, and alumni coupled with matching gifts to reach a total of \$116,000 for Dana. Pledges totaled about \$80,000 and matching gifts another \$36,000. The matching gifts, for the most part, are from Lutheran Brotherhood's new IMPACT, a matching gift program to support Lutheran higher education.

It looked good from the beginning when Judy Rueter Brehm '67 agreed to be the first volunteer and the national chairperson. And as we planned the year it was clear that the Brotherhood's IMPACT would be the "plus" needed to exceed last year's Phonorama, which had increased pledges by over 50 percent and had reached the \$48,000 mark.

An expanded Phonorama was planned to include three times as much activity, with 23 Phonorama functions. Most of the area chairpersons did double duty, planning and working on two evenings.

Judy recruited city and area chairpersons: Lincoln, Phil Wittig '56; Denver, Gary Bates '66; Chicago, Dave Snowbeck '63; Los Angeles, Mel Bollesen '52; Minneapolis, Bob Hansen '64; Blair, Bob Krogh '56; Omaha, Erling Schultz '55 and Richard Link '73; Alaska, Herb Knudsen '63; Hawaii, Norris Michelsen '49; Parents, Ned and Marcia Shipley and Arnold and Lorene Heistand; Students, Tom Kendall '80 and Karla Bergstraesser '79; and "clean-up," Bob Krogh and Ken Anderson '63.

Records were set everywhere! Volunteers participated in a record 23 nights of calling. A record 16 Danians called on a single night from Mutual of Omaha telephones. A record number of over 160 volunteers gave at least one evening to call for Dana. And, of course, the dollar record was raised much higher:

Performing Arts Major is New

A performing arts major has been added to the Dana curriculum. Students choosing the new major will take a minimum of 48 semester hours in speech and theater and in music.

Classes in speech and theater will include voice and diction, play production, stage movement, theater dance, oral interpretation, acting techniques, and components of performance.

Those in music will include harmony and ear training, English and Italian diction, French and German diction, advanced harmony and ear training, history of music, applied music, and ensembles.

Professor Darrell Dibben of the speech and theater department said that the major "is designed so that the student can acquire training and develop his or her talents in dance, theater, and music for use beyond college, either in graduate work or at special schools in music or acting, or in advertising and sales, public relations, religious education, and recreation."

Carol Weckmuller '80 of Blair has received a scholarship from the National Science Foundation for participation this summer in a research program at Creighton University.

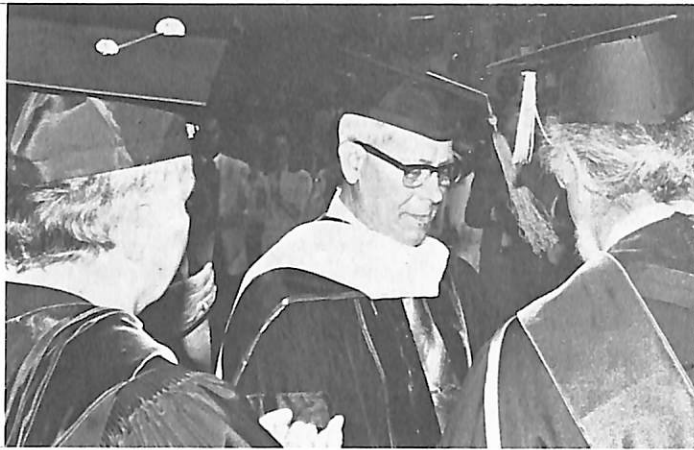

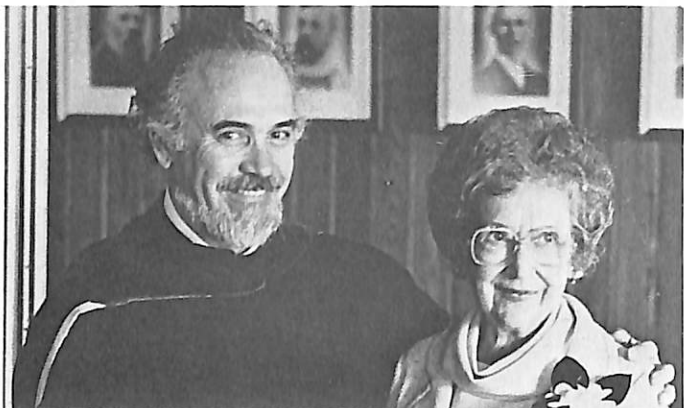

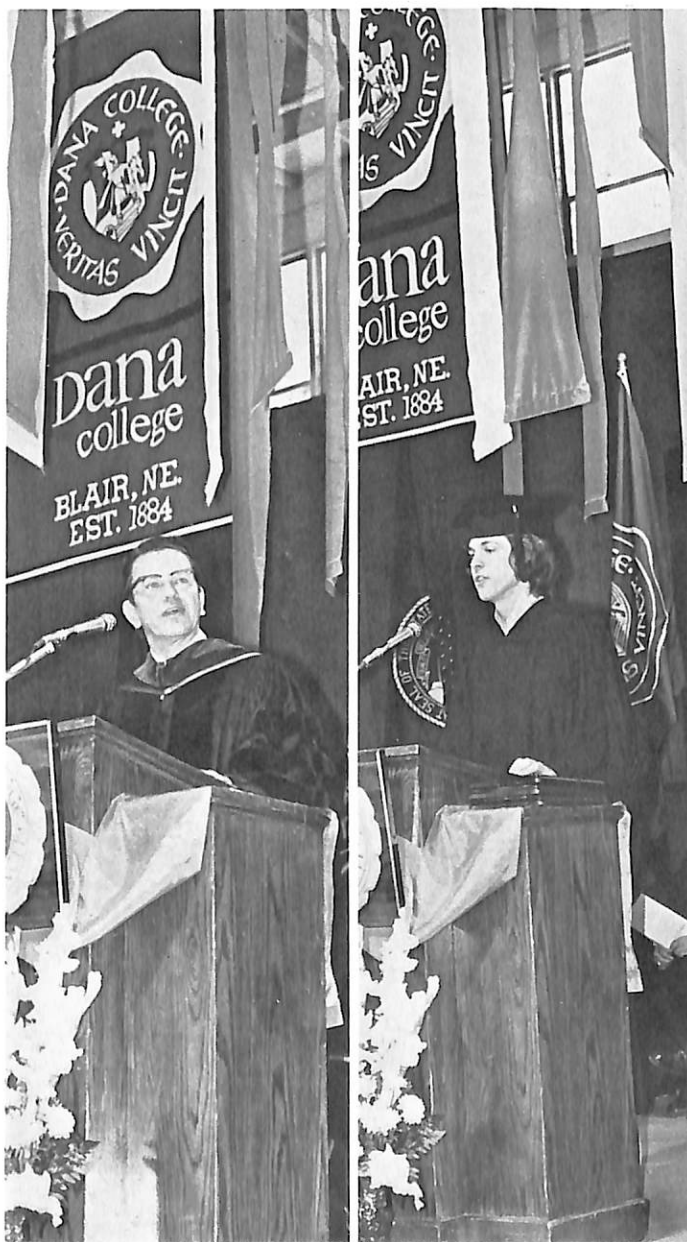

Baseball: NIAC Champs — Again!

At the end of the baseball season, Coach Dale Lemon had good news and bad news.

The good: For the fifth time in the ten-year history of the Nebraska Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, the Vikings — with a 10-2 record — had won the conference championship.

The bad: They were again unable to capture the district play-off title of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics.

Lemon reported that of the 33 conference and nonconference games played, the Vikings won 18 and lost 15. Six of those were lost on a spring trip to Oklahoma, but after those defeats, the team returned home to win 18 and lose nine. Two of the losses were to the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, two to Kearney State, and two to Nebraska Wesleyan. "Considering the competition down south and here in Nebraska," Lemon said, "it was a good year."

Helping was the fact that Dana's pitching — with an earned run average lowered to 4.76 from last year's 7.39 — had greatly improved. Sophomore Scott Simms of Nebraska City won seven and lost two with an ERA of 3.23, and senior Bob Andrews of Emerald, Pennsylvania, won five and lost three with an ERA of 3.88.

And, for the second year in a row, the offense batted .283. Senior Steve Daeges of Harlan, Iowa, set a school record of .478 (see accompanying story), and Omaha freshman third sacker Dan Prusha followed him at .321.

The Vikings' defense, however, should have been stronger. Lemon said that their "fielding average was not terrible at .927, but they seemed to make errors when it hurt the most." And he noted that they executed only 15 double plays, far below the usual Viking total.

Many players are returning, and Lemon is looking forward to a good season next year.

Softball: A New Women's Sport

A women's softball team was organized this spring as a nonconference sport to test interest and talent, and in spite of a two win-seven loss record, the 19 players showed ample evidence of both qualities.

Stressing of fundamentals by Coaches Mike Urdahl '76 (Admissions Office), Lee Ahrens (Business Administration), and George Schuler (Admissions Office) paid off, with team members playing their best ball late in the season.

The team batted a very respectable .260 and averaged seven runs in each game. Seven players batted over .300, and Ronda Newman '82 (Omaha) led the way with a .370 average. Heidi Larson '80 (Milford, Iowa) had 13 runs, the most for the season, and Newman had 12.

Next year could be a good one, the coaches say, with the addition of some talented freshmen and an increase in the number of games scheduled.

Track: Four Set New School Records

Four track members — three women and one man — broke or established school records for six events over the past season.

Women setting new records were: Laurel Biffar '82 (Blair) — long jump, 16'7 $\frac{3}{4}$ "; 880-yard run, 2:29.4; mile run, 5:23.7; Teresa Michelsen '81 (Omaha) — javelin, 111'9 $\frac{1}{2}$ "; and Kayla Walsh '82 (Ashland, Nebraska) — high jump, 5'4".

On the men's team, Doug Lemon '81 (Blair) set a new triple jump record at 46'6 $\frac{3}{4}$ ".

Carol Haussermann '69 was the women's coach; Gary Seevers, the men's.

Golf: A Successful Season

Led by Mike Anderson '80 (Elkhorn, Nebraska), Tim Barber '82 (Oak Park, Illinois), and Kevin Rasmussen '80 (Scranton, Iowa), the golf team placed fifth in the NAIA match with ten colleges and fourth in the NIAC.

Barber placed fifth in the former and tied for third in the latter.

Golf Coach Paul Peterson '41 said that "The team's continued success is enhanced by the fact that all of the golfers are returning next year."

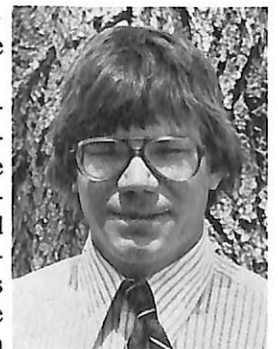

According to his baseball teammates, this season's Most Valuable Player was shortstop Steve Daeges.

Coach Dale Lemon agrees. He reports that Daeges, a senior from Harlan, Iowa, "had an amazing year at the plate." Daeges shattered Dana's batting average record by 50 points, and statistics released by the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) show that he finished as the fourth best hitter in the nation with a batting average of .478. He was also ninth in doubles per game, hitting 13 in 33 games.

His record has won him honorable mention in the NAIA All-America selections. Daeges was also an all-conference choice again this year and a two-year all-NAIA District #11 performer.

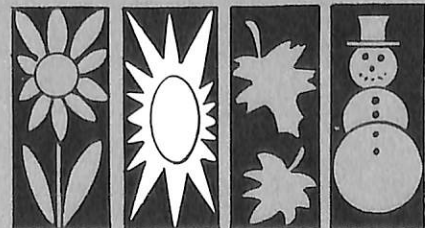
