CHOIR PROGRAM**

Sunday, May 3rd, the choir broadcasted their program from W. O. A. W. Radio Station at Omaha from 6 — 7:30 P. M. At this time a reading was also given by Maye Pedersen and a short talk on Dana, its history and its purpose, by Dr. C. X. Hansen.

It was a great pleasure to the choir together with its director and to Dana College to note the number of our people who made an effort to listen to the first program ever broadcasted by our school. And especially was it interesting to note the number of alumni and former Danaites who listened. From the reports received the program came in very well and especially was Dr. Hansen's talk appreciated. Quite a number of telegrams and congratulations have been received from Dana friends. From former Dana students we received a telegram from four that were together at a mission meeting at Minden, Nebr., Rev. Nye-gaard of Minden, Rev. Harold Jensen of Brush, Colo., Rev. Niels B. Hansen of Hampton, and Chris. Zander of Blair. Out of these, three were graduates from our school last year. A letter of congratulation was received from Alice and Eva Petersen, St. Paul, Nebr., who also were here last year, and who esteemed it a great pleasure to hear the well known voices of Dr. Hansen and Maye Pedersen over radio.

DANISH DECLAMATORY CONTEST**

**DANA COLLEGE CHOIR TOUR
A GREAT SUCCESS**

**The Choir Covered a Distance of
1000 Miles Giving 12 Concerts**

On Thursday afternoon April 23 at about 5:30 the choir left by auto for Council Bluffs, where the first concert was to be given that same evening, on its extensive tour through Iowa, Minnesota, South Dakota, and Nebraska visiting twelve of our congregations, and returned here Saturday evening, May 2nd, at about ten o'clock after having covered a distance of one thousand miles. The greatest part of this distance was covered in two busses, one of these was a Studebaker 12 passenger coach and the other a long safety coach capable of carrying 32 passengers. The first part of the trip from Blair to Audubon was made by automobiles with the exception of the jump from Underwood to Harlan, which was by train.

The tour as a whole proved to be a great success, and that almost beyond expectation. Everywhere that the choir came, a great work had been done by the local people to advertise about the concert, so as to get people interested that they might come to hear the choir sing. This was not the only thing which characterized the efforts of our people. Everywhere the choir was met with great

hospitality which the members of the choir appreciated very much. Besides this the weather and road conditions were exceptionally good making it possible for the choir to render the concerts on the scheduled time.

The program rendered by the choir

was an entirely sacred program. Some of the songs were old chorales well known to our people. Of these two were Danish, "Aand over Aander" and "Solen er slukket". The music for these had been arranged by Prof. Nielsen, the director of the choir. Some of the numbers, which especially had been commented upon as having been rendered very well, were "Solen er slukket", "Deep River", a negro spiritual, and "Beautiful Savior". To give diversion to the program a piano duet was given by Cornelia Johnsen and Prof. Nielsen, two violin solos by Emerald Nielsen, and a Danish reading, "Et Møde", by Esther Johson.

By the reports and newspaper clippings, that we have received from friends that heard the choir sing, we feel assured, that the concerts have been appreciated by a great number of our people. Everywhere there was a great attendance. Some places some of our people neighboring congregations would drive great distances that they might hear the choir sing. This was especially true at Audnbon and Cedar Falls.

Splendid Music. The numbers rendered by the choir consisted almost wholly of church and old time music. Perhaps the most pleasing part of the work of the choir was the manner in which the various types of voices blended into an harmonious whole.

Another Harlan paper commented thus:

What a bliss to listen to truth, solemn, and sanctifying, such as was contained in the choicest selection of the best literature set to music, yet sung without music. And how consoling and how sanctifying and yet how cheering it was to listen to these words of life and beauty.

The Cedar Falls Record reports:

A Capella Choir makes hit here. The choir which sings a capella was well balanced. The voices blended beautifully in every number rendered. "Deep River", a negro spiritual, was presented with rare feeling.

The Albert Lea local paper writes:

Those who did not attend missed one of the best concerts that had been rendered in Albert Lea this season. Every number was so well done that it would be hard to pick out any outstanding numbers on the program. All numbers were sung a capella and the blending of voices with their crescendos and diminuendos showed that the choir had spent many hours in the preparation of this program. Too much credit cannot be given to the director, Waldo B. Nielsen.

From the local paper at Beresford the following remark was taken:

The choir is under the direction of Prof. Nielsen, and the outstanding features was the complete training given the members. Though there was not a finished voice, for they were college students, yet the harmony was perfect and the singing high class in every way.

And the Viborg local paper comments:

Two numbers of special beauty were "Solen er slukket", the music of which has been arranged by Prof. Nielsen, and "Beautiful Savior". The delicate shading of all numbers served to enhance their beauty. The choir reflected the ability of the director. They sang with precision and attach under his able leadership.

Besides these twelve concerts given on the tour the choir has given two concerts in churches in Omaha, one at the Calvary Baptist and another at the First Methodist. One concert was given here in the Danish Church in Blair, and on Sunday, May 17th, two in Fremont, one of these was in the church on the Bluffs and the other in Fremont.

It has been the aim and desire of the choir to sing such songs, and to sing them in such a manner that they might bring a blessing to those listening, to the glory and praise to our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. May this continue to be the aim of the choir in the future, and that with the spirit as it is portrayed in a stanza sung by the 'Girl's Glee Club:

"Now sing we, now rejoice,
Now raise to heaven our voice;
Lo! He from whom joy streameth,
Poor in the manger lies;
Yet not so brightly beameth
The sun in yonder skies!
Thou my Savior art!
Thou my Savior art."

NEED OF A SCIENTIFIC TRAINING

Prof. T. W. Andersen

Unlike Bacon's jesting Pilate, a student or person professing educational training cannot ask, "What is the truth", and then not tarry for an answer. No, his business is to probe into the unexplored realm, ever try to lift the veil and see what lies beyond.

The primary object of a scientific training should be that of ever searching for the truth. The use made of the knowledge obtained is of a dual

character, one we may term as professional, that is using the scientific knowledge as a means for obtaining definite material ends. The other and by no means a minor one is that of using the knowledge obtained for philosophical speculation. The latter should at no time be offered as an excuse for having a scientific training but, should in itself be considered a necessity.

Why should it be considered a necessity. Let us briefly draw the veil and see what may lie within the realm of science that may be of speculative value. We study the cell, the unit structure in which life is found, how it is composed, how it functions, its relations to tissue, organs, systems, and if you please to the entire body. Science teaches us that there is a fundamental system in accordance to which a cell functions and this system permeates

through all cells where life is found. Cells perform the function necessary to life in their own way as far only as it is a destined way. They cannot of their own accord change nor alter their function for it is in accordance with a definite and divine system instilled by the Ruler and Master of the system. Beyond the cell lies the molecule, the knowledge of which makes one marvel. The molecule like the cell acts and conducts itself in certain ways in accordance with a definite system.

The above is but a meager picture of what science can and will reveal to the student. 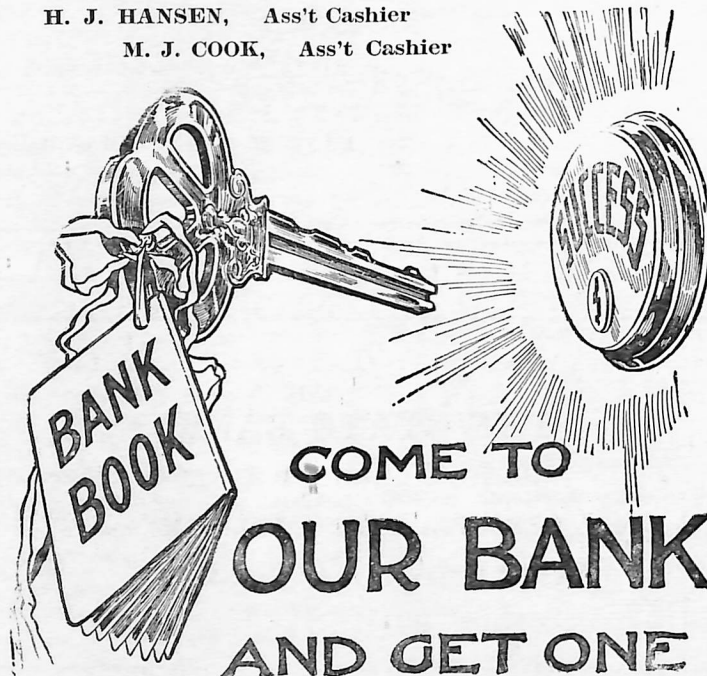
