**REGISTRATION REACHES A
MARK OF 120**

Already at the close of the second day of registration a great number of students had been enrolled. By the number of old and new faces then seen on the campus assembled from east and west, from north and south, the prospects for the coming

school year looked very favorable. There has been students dropping in now and then during these three first weeks of school. Those, who were late, were mostly old students, who wanted to stay with their work as long as they were able that they might have enough cash for the winter. By Saturday, Oct. 3rd, the enrollment had reached the number of 120 which also includes those in the seminary, which opened Tuesday, Sept. 29. This year class room C has been left entirely to the disposal of the Seminary class and its use. light and fresh air has become so scarce that it is daily causing the death of hundreds of individuals. Doctors tell us that more people are suffering from worry than from pure physical ailments. Too many of us pay no attention to what we eat, we are overloading our stomach, taxing our digestive organs at all hours of the day and still wonder why we have troubles, indigestion tops all diseases to-day. What is the cause of it all? **Inactivity**—people do no work in our time. Too many have no work to do that requires the use of large muscle groups. Not only does this inactivity have a degenerate influence physically but fully as much mentally. Inactivity is death. As a substitute for this inactivity we must use artificial exercise.

Our problem in college is to create in each individual a habit of exercise and to teach him all the

things relative to an efficient life.

Among animals those are the smartest and the happiest that give themselves to play. The same is true of man. At the same time that our work is work it should also be play. What activities can we use, considering our limited conditions at Dana, to get the best results? First we want to be sure of the needs of every student, therefore a physical examination; secondly plan as much work as possible to meet the individual needs; third attempt to instill in each individual a love for the outdoors. Christ was an outdoor man, if we want to be like Him let us also live part of our lives in the free open spaces that are so plentiful around our college—even if we spend this time in play; fourth we hope to create in each individual consciousness of posture. The shortest cut to good posture or a good carriage is found in the activities

we call gymnastics, it is the most scientific of all activities, along this line the best known American and Danish methods will be used. We are fortunate to have access to the most revolutionizing system known. Space does not permit me to dwell at length upon "the Bukh system". Its results will speak for itself. Fifth, we do not want to emphasize physical work to such an extent that men become all physical. If physical activity does not make us better mentally and spiritually, then we had better discard physical activity. A few years hence the world does not ask for our athletic record, but there is someone interested in knowing what kind of men we are and where are we now "on the world's broad field of battle"? I believe that Schiller is right in saying that: "Man is human only when he plays, and he has reached full humanity only when he plays." There are certain moral lessons that can best be taught through play. By play we mean all forms of free activity—we call most free activities sport.

There are also many physical benefits obtained in sports to which gymnastics can lay no claim. It is highly undesirable to have students leave the college without a love for some outdoor activity. Through a system of intramural contests we hope to reach our goal in this particular field.

To analyze what we are aiming for would look somewhat as follows:

- 1) To instill in each individual a conscious and subconscious habit of good posture. (Character can be seen in posture.)
- 2) To teach some forms of play that will have both spiritual and physical values.
- 3) To help as many as possible to realize that nature has a time for rest and a time for activity. (There is no advantage in being like a doughnut on a hairpin.)
- 4) That "complete living" cannot be realized unless we obey nature's laws. ("Nature seldom presents its bill on the same day that we violate its laws.")
- 5) That we may also be able to win in contests against other schools without boasting and that we may

be able to take defeat like true gentlemen.

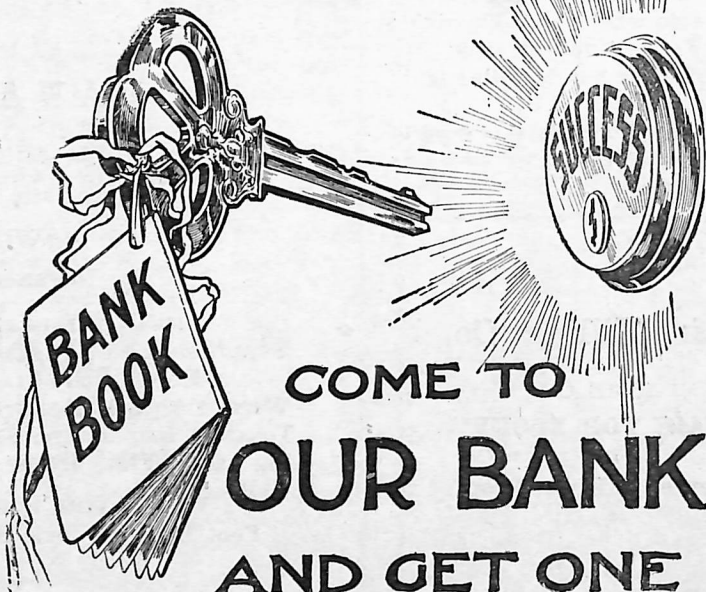
