### "Work Of Ministry" Topic Discussed By Dr. Gullixon

During the days of February 1-2, the students of Dana College and Trinity Seminary were privileged to hear Dr. T. F. Gullixon, President of Luther Seminary, St. Paul, Minn. deliver a series of lectures in the College Chapel.

The main subject of these lectures was "The Work of the Christian Ministry." The speaker especially emphasized the practical side of this great work. As Dr. Gullixon has spent almost a quarter of a century in the active service as a pastor, he is well acquainted with the many serious problems with which a pastor is confronted.

In his first lecture, Dr. Gullixon spoke on "The tidings and the talents" of the pastor. The pastor must first of all be sure that he has a "tiding" for the people. He must have his "tiding" ready, and he must have it from God. "Wherefore wilt thou run, my son, seeing that thou hast no tidings ready?" And for the bringing of this "tiding" no "talent is too good." The speaker said that so many people think that they are too talented for such a simple task as being a pastor. But that is a grave mistake.

#### "Zealous Work-Man"

As a theme for his second lecture, Dr. Gullixon had chosen "The zealous work-man." In order to become a zealous "work-man," the Holy Spirit must be the inner urge in the heart of the pastor. A pastor must have a passion for the winning of souls. He must have a spirit of confidence and boldness, a spirit of fellowship and cooperation; a spirit of patient persistency.

Having shown what should be the motivating force in a pastor's life, Dr. Gullixon, in his third lecture, dwelt on the subject, "The Work of the Pastor." It is a glorious task, said the speaker; but many people underestimate its value. As a messenger from the most high God, St. Paul magnified his office; likewise the pastor of to-day should magnify his office. The speaker then pointed to the great moments in a pastor's life, such as the administration of the Holy Sacraments, in the pulpit, with the catechumen classes, and at the sick-beds. These are great moments in the life of a pastor, when he is allowed to serve in the name of the living God.

#### Successful in Age

And then in his final lecture, Dr. Gullixon spoke on the subject, "How to grow older successfully." A pastor should never grow old in spirit. In our days there is an ever increasing tendency to shelve a man of middle age, and let a young man get his position. But such procedure should never be necessary with respect to the pastor. As a man of middle age, the pastor should be at his best as far as pastoral work is concerned. Many pastors, however, cause themselves great troubles by neglecting to look ahead and prepare themselves to meet legitimate changes and developments in the social life.

These lectures were delivered especially to the Seminary students, however, most of the College students attended, and several neighboring pastors and Dana friends availed themselves of this opportunity.

### Board Decides To Discontinue The Academy Next Year

The Board of Directors considered a number of stringent measures designed to conserve the funds and property of the Institution through the depression. Because of the small enrollment and the high cost of operation, the Dana Academy is to be discontinued.

#### New Student Loan Fund

Due to the increasing need for student loan funds, the two funds now in the possession of our School were definitely designated in order that donors may know exactly the use to which their gifts are put. The comparatively large fund in the hands of our Church Treasurer was definitely designated as a Seminary Loan Fund. It is hoped that this present fund will serve only as a nucleus for a much larger fund. The small fund at the College which has accumulated from repayments by students was designated as a College Loan fund. It is hoped that with this new designation of the funds that both funds may grow and increase in usefulness.

A gift of \$90 has already been made to the new College Loan Fund. Said the donor in his letter: "It is evident to all that it is no longer possible for a college student to earn enough money during his three months' summer vacation to pay for his nine months of schooling. Those students who do not have any means or who are not able to get financial backing from relatives or friends are therefore unable to attend college for lack of credit. This should not be a charity fund, but a fund that extends credit on the basis of good character and ambition rather than upon financial worth."

### Danish Folk School Presented On Radio

The second of the series of radio programs aiming to present various phases of the life and culture of Denmark was broadcast Wednesday, February 3. This program, which was a brief visit to a Danish Folk High School, was arranged by Prof. Stub and Mr. Skov Nielsen.

As the visitor, Erhardt Nielsen, entered the school, the song, "Der er et yndigt Land," was being sung, after which Mr. Stub, who acted as one of the professors, gave a lecture on the aims and ideals of the Danish Folk High School. The chief aim of these schools is to arouse a desire for knowledge and more rich and complete living. A great number of Danish national and community leaders have been students of these small schools, which have inspired them and given them a purpose.

Since every lecture and class period began with singing, the songs, "I alle Riger og Lande" and "De, som over Vandet," were sung before a very interesting lecture by Prof. G. J. Malmin on the Danish co-operative movement.

The program closed by the class singing "Du Danske."

#### Basketeers in Sixth Consecutive Win

The Vikings gained undisputed leadership in the Nebraska Junior Conference by downing Hebron 22 to 18, Friday, February 5. The first half of the fray was slow because each team was afraid of the other and their defense featured the play. Dana countered first but Hebron came right back with a tally. However, the Vikings made good most of their shots, while Hebron could not connect. The half ended 9 to 5 in favor of Dana.

In the second half the Dana Cagers came back with an offensive drive that for a few minutes swept the Hebronites off their feet, but Sittler and Brewer of Hebron "steamed up" and made it a real house warming party by almost sewing up the count. Things began to look dark and the more nervous members of the audience began chewing their fingernails. Then Christensen was rejected on fouls, but Porter, a substitute, came through and tossed a gift shot and a field goal before the whistle blew, giving Dana the game. M. Jensen was outstanding for Dana in that he was in the thickest of the fray, passing and dribbling with equal effect, while Hofgaard and Christensen played a fine game, although they were sick with colds. Sittler and Brewer were Hebron's best bets.

### ALWAYS AT WORK

"And he said unto them, How is it that ye sought me? knew ye not that I must be about my Father's business?" Luke 2:49.

When Mary, the mother of Jesus said, "Thy father and I have sought thee" she meant Joseph, but when Jesus said, "Knew ye not I must be about my Father's business?" He did not mean Joseph, for he was not about Joseph's business when in the Temple, questioning and being questioned by the doctors. He had reference to God, His Divine Father. It was His business He was about when in the Temple, not Joseph's.

"My Father." This was Jesus' name for God. When He spoke to God He always called Him "Father." When He was successful in His work He said, "Father, I thank Thee." When He was overcome by grief He cried, "Father, if it be possible, let this cup pass." On the cross He prayed, "Father, forgive them."

Jesus said, "I must be about my Father's business." We will notice that all through His life there was a sense of Divine necessity laid upon Him. "I must" was one of Jesus' earliest words, and He used it to the end. He was not ashamed to say that there was something He was obliged to do. No one should ever hesitate to say, "I must." Many a man's life has been wrecked because he never learned to speak the words, "I must." Jesus early learned the lesson and so at thirty He could say, "I must preach the gospel."

If we are in the right relation to "our Father" there is a Divine necessity moulding and forming our will. In Christ Jesus the "must" was not an external one, but He "must be about His Father's business" because His whole inclination and will was submitted to the Father's authority. And that is what will make any life sweet, calm, noble. "The love of Christ constraineth us." There is a necessity which presses upon men like iron fetters; there is a necessity which wells up within a man a fountain of life and does not so much drive as sweetly incline the will, so that it is impossible for him to be other than a loving obedient child.

When Jesus said, "Knew ye not that I must be about my Father's business," we may wonder, what is this business? In one word it is redemption to bring lost humanity into a savable condition, and to provide for the restoration of purity, blessedness and immortality to men who have forfeited all by transgressions.

This business of the father may be performed in the treatment we give to current questions. Every age has its problems. We cannot close our eyes to these things, nor push them aside as of no consequence. They are here and demand consideration. But however we act and wherever we go, we must not lose sight of the fact that we are all the time in the presence of the living God. We may be dwelling in a world of sense, but we are also in a world of spirit. God's power is manifested in the universe, and His spirit pervades it. We cannot go where He is not. That is the thought which is given to sober us and to impart steadiness to all our aims. That is the thought to remind us, "Know ye not that ye must be in your Father's business."

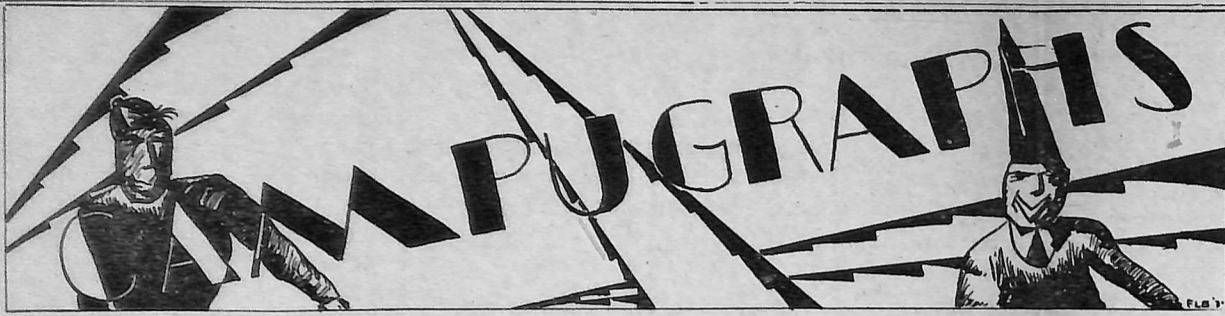
