Registrars Meet In Convention

MEETING HELD AT
CHICAGO

The 20th Convention of the American Association of Collegiate Registrars was held at Hotel Stevens, Chicago, April 19-21. The Nebraska delegation included: University of Nebraska, Dana, Midland, Omaha University, and Peru.

Naturally the co-operative testing program sponsored by the American Council on Education came in for a large share of attention. Dr. W. S. Learned of the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching reported at length regarding the findings in the Pennsylvania Study. It was found, for instance, that the highest student in one college ranked lower than the lowest student in another college. Great variation was shown in the average scholastic standing of the various institutions of that state. Engineering student ranked high in mathematics, but received low average ratings on the entire set of tests. In general, the various professional groups were lower than the liberal arts people. The writer suggests that at least part of this variation is due to the type and content of the tests given. One college found, to its amazement, that the student receiving highest standing on the mathematics test had received a "failure" in his mathematics class. Irregularity in class attendance and negligence in handing in written work had caused the failure of a natural mathematical genius according to the report of the investigation which followed. The study is this year continued on a nation-wide scale in which Dana College is co-operating.

Test Plan Presented

The plan of giving comprehensive examinations at the end of the sophomore year and at the end of the senior year and basing graduation on the student's success in these examinations, was again presented by officials from the University of Chicago. Since "credits" no longer count at that university, it was discovered that several hundred students were attending classes there regularly without having registered at all, thus avoiding the payment of tuition. A system of class checking has therefore been inaugurated in order, not to give credit, but to secure necessary tuition fees.

Among the unusual suggestions offered at the sectional meetings was the one that the college year should be changed so that the first semester began about the middle of August and ended at Christmas time. The second semester should begin at the same time as it now does, giving the student at least a month's vacation during the holidays which would provide for the outside reading for which he finds so little time during the regular year. Faculty members could use this time for special study and planning of the next semester's work. Coal would be saved the institutions. Other interesting arguments were presented for and against such a change. Perhaps the most forceful argument against such a plan would be the heat of a Nebraska August.

The national Association will meet at Chicago again next year.

Seniors Prepare For Graduation

The school year is rapidly drawing to a close, and the Seniors, especially, have been looking forward to graduation, and even beyond that, wondering what the future has in store for them, when they enter upon the field of work they have been preparing themselves for during their many years of study at school.

The Senior Class, this year as well as former classes, has been busy with its various class meetings and activities. There are twenty-nine members in the class. It is perhaps not the largest class ever having been graduated from Dana College and Trinity Seminary, but on the other hand, it ranks well among the largest classes.

The staff of the class annual has been working faithfully, and hope to have the book printed and ready for distribution in good season before school closes.

At a recent meeting of the class, they chose as their motto: "The influence of virtuous acts never perish." As their class color: Green and White, and the Lilies of the Valley, as class flower.

On May 3 and 4 Dana College will for the first time partake in the National College Testing Program of the American Council on Education.

College To Award Eight Scholarships

Dana college will offer next year the attractive list of scholarships. SOLDIERS AND SAILORS MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP—

To commemorate the soldiers and sailors of the late war, a sum of two thousand dollars has been set aside by our Church, the income of which shall be awarded as scholarships to Lutheran students, under the direction of the faculty of Dana College and Trinity Seminary.

HONOR SCHOLARSHIP—

A scholarship of one hundred fifty dollars is offered to any student who has graduated as valedictorian from any standard high school or academy. The scholarship is to apply on tuition at the rate of one-fourth of the total amount yearly for four years.

NEW STUDENT SCHOLARSHIP—

A scholarship consisting of one semester's free tuition is offered to any student of our church who comes from one of our congregations from which Dana College has not had a student the last three years.

JUNIOR SCHOLARSHIPS—

Five scholarships of fifty dollars each applicable on senior year's tuition is awarded five Dana College juniors.

NORTH DAKOTA DISTRICT SCHOLARSHIP—

A scholarship of \$75 to apply on tuition, awarded each year to the student at Dana from this district with the highest scholarship honors recipient to attend Dana for at least two years.

PASTORS' DISCOUNT—

Children of pastors of our church and of professors connected with our school receive fifty per cent discount on tuition.

In addition to these, Dana College is offering a new scholarship this year. It has been decided that a fifty dollar scholarship be given to the highest honor student, that is the student having the highest scholastic standing at Dana College from the Wisconsin League.

ALPHA SIGMA PHI SENDS BOOK TO FRANCE

The Alpha Sigma Phi forensic society reports that they have received an order for two of their hand books from the "Societe De L'histoire De La Guene" located at Vincennes, France.

The books ordered are: *Shall the Nations Disarm*, and *Shall the Nations Adopt Free Trade*. The Alpha Sigma Phi are happy to comply with their request for these books. These debate hand-books have been sent to six foreign countries; Canada, Great Britain, Mexico, India, Japan, and Denmark.

Dana To Offer New Courses

There have been some changes made in the departments of chemistry, physics and mathematics. A few substitutions of courses have been made, and several new courses have been added with a view toward the formation of strong major and minor series in these subjects. Whenever changes have been made, closer conformity with the University of Nebraska has been the result. In these departments, it will be noted, the first year's work in each case fulfills group requirements, the second year's work provides a minor in that subject, and the third year of work completes the major in that field.

Mathematics. Intermediate Algebra has been dropped, leaving College Algebra and Trigonometry as the first year courses. Analytic Geometry and Differential Calculus constitute the second year. Third year mathematics consists of Integral Calculus and Theory of Equations. The last named course is the only one added.

Physics. A course in recent developments of physics has been substituted for the one dealing with the theory of heat.

Chemistry. Second semester of organic chemistry has been replaced by a semester of Physical Chemistry. Under the new arrangements, the second year of chemistry will be the courses in Qualitative Analysis and Organic Chemistry, while the third year offers Quantitative Analysis and Physical Chemistry.

Choir To Give Home Concert

The Monday Afternoon Club of Blair, the oldest cultural club in the State of Nebraska will sponsor a home concert for the Dana College A Cappella Choir on the evening of May the sixth. The concert will be held at the local High School Auditorium the use of which hall has been granted through the cooperation of the High School authorities. The Monday Afternoon Club has selected a committee of eight energetic members who are working towards making this concert a success in every way.

Arrangements are being made to have representatives from the city of Blair to give short talks preceding the concert. The choir will render its full program, with all the selections that were used on the spring tour this year.

Carlsen Addresses Student Body

FOUR LECTURES
PRESENTED

During the days of April 26-27 Dr. N. C. Carlsen addressed the students in a series of four lectures.

Tuesday morning Dr. Carlsen spoke on the subject "Personal Mission Work." That work is not the pastor's only, it is obligatory on every Christian. If a Christian is not interested in the salvation of others, his Christianity is a contradiction. That type of work has always in the history of the Church proved to be most successful. Christ Himself used that method of work. And since His days all the leading men of His Church have engaged in personal mission work.—It is a difficult work, and therefore requires all the ability, wisdom and tactfulness that a person may possess. It requires a strong faith in the Word of God and in the power of the Holy Spirit.

In the afternoon, Dr. Carlsen addressed the students of the Seminary on the subject, "The Pastor and His Young People."—This is one side of a pastor's work which needs special emphasis, because it is of greatest importance with reference to the future. If a pastor fails here, the Church will suffer in the future. In order to work successfully among young people, a pastor must have a youthful spirit.—A pastor should especially direct his attention toward his newly confirmed young people, otherwise they might drift away from the Church. The speaker pointed to a number of ways through which it may be possible not only to keep the young people, but also make their interest in church work grow as well as strengthen their faith.

Youth and Christianity

Wednesday morning Dr. Carlsen, in continuation of his lectures, spoke on the subject, "The Religious Consciousness of the Young."—When does it begin? In a way it is not different from any other human faculty or characteristic. If a child is properly cared for physically, mentally and spiritually, this religious consciousness will unfold itself together with its other faculties.—The age of adolescence is a period of great changes, physically, mentally and spiritually. It is a period of self-examination, self-consciousness, and self-determination. And therefore, it is during this time that parents and pastors should pay special attention to the young people—should be their friends and companions.

The theme of Dr. Carlsen's closing lecture was "Church Management."—This was addressed to the students of the Seminary. In this lecture, the speaker dealt with the various problems, confronting a congregation and its pastor, and also suggested ways in which difficulties may be solved to the greatest possible expediency of all concerned and to the glory of God's Kingdom.—In all his work the pastor should first of all seek the approval of Christ. Christ should be at the head of all church work, and blessed is the pastor who can thus lead a congregation.

We take this opportunity to thank the faculty for arranging these meetings as well as Dr. Carlsen for his instructive and inspiring message.

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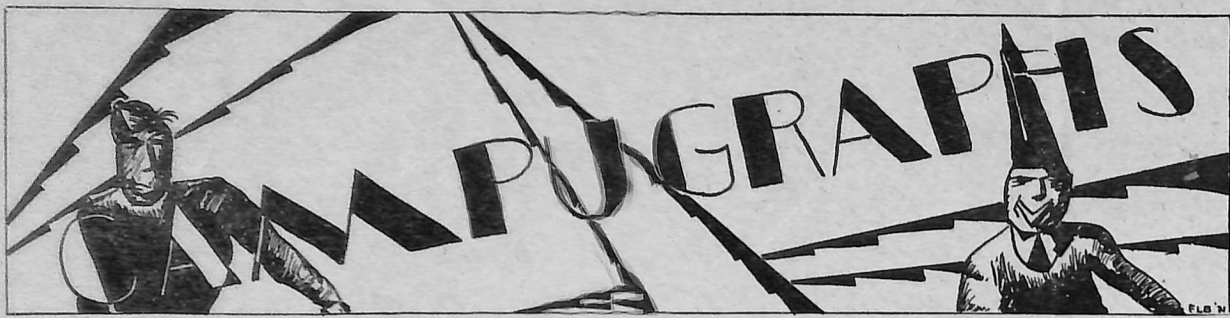
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THE DANA CO-ED
