

President Nelson Attends Three College Conventions

Lutheran College Association, Liberal Arts Movements, and Am. Ass. Meet At Atlantic City

The Conventions of the Liberal Arts College Movement, the National Lutheran Education Association, the the American Association of Colleges, were attended by President Erland Nelson during the week of January 10-17 at Atlantic City, New Jersey. The Hotels Ludy and Chelsea at which the conventions were held are situated near the famous Atlantic City board walk. An interesting feature of the convention was the sight of negroes wheeling invalids along the miles of board walk, and well-known men in the educational field enjoying the invigorating ocean breezes.

At the convention of the National Lutheran Education Association, President Nelson's special committee on research gave a report on its findings. Besides President Nelson's survey of reasons why students attend Lutheran colleges, reports were given by the other committee members on educational standings of Lutheran college faculties and on balancing college budgets. A report was given by Dr. H. J. Arnold of Wittenberg College on a survey of relative standings of sophomores and seniors. Dana participated in this survey last spring.

President Nelson reported that the conventions were highly inspirational and thought-provoking in character.

DEBATERS SKIRMISH WITH MORNINGSIDE

The Dana debaters journeyed to Sioux City on January 27th and met the Morningside College debate squad on the War Debts question. The Dana affirmative, upheld by Dolliver Thogerson and Verner Carlsson, opposed the Morningside negative in the afternoon session, while the Dana negative, composed of Emil Pedersen and Edward Anderson, clashed with the Morningside affirmative in the evening encounter. Both were non-decision debates.

The Dana debate squad continues its schedule with a home-and-home dual debate with Omaha University on February 7th.

Spring Term Opens With New Students

Seven students entered Dana at the beginning of the second semester. One, Edward Larsen, attended Dana last year; the others are all new students. The new students are: Pauline Nohremberg, White River, South Dakota; Agnes Nielsen, Viborg, South Dakota; Esther Haals, Audubon, Iowa; and William Langley, Spalding, Nebraska. All these are in the freshman class. Frederic Ehlert of Woodbine, Iowa, is a sophomore, a former student at the University of Nebraska.

Three students left Dana at the end of the last semester. They are Bernice Hansen of Ruskin, Nebraska, and Emma and Henry Mickelsen of Minneapolis, Minnesota. The latter two students expect to attend Macalaster College at St. Paul, Minnesota.

New courses are offered this semester, one by Professor Swanson, a three credit course in History of the West; the other by Professor (Continued on page 3)

Professor Jersild Speaks On Hymns At Luther League

Congregational singing as one of the finest opportunities for true Christian fellowship in worship was one of the thoughts emphasized by Professor Jersild of the Trinity Seminary faculty when he addressed the Luther League on the subject, "The Beginning and Purpose of our Christian Hymns," on Wednesday evening.

With respect to the beginnings of Christian hymnody, the speaker pointed out that our hymn-singing is purely scriptural in origin. Four considerations were presented as to the purpose of Christian hymns and hymn-singing. First, they are a means of teaching the fundamental doctrines of Christianity. In this respect they wield an influence second only to the Bible in the lives of many believers, since the best hymns (Continued on page 3)

Miss Harder Is Guest Of Dana Mission Society

Japanese Worker Tells of Social Political, Economic, and Religious Unrest

Miss Helen Harder, worker of the Lutheran Mission in Japan, featured the monthly program of the Dana Foreign Mission Society Friday evening, Jan. 27.

Appearing in a beautiful silk gown, the type worn by young Japanese ladies, Miss Harder spoke of the difficulty in bringing the gospel of Christ to the Japanese people. She pointed out that they charge the missionaries with preaching the gospel of love, but do not practice it. Likewise they are charged with bringing too many Western traditions with them to Japan.

At present there is much political and social unrest in the Orient. The young people are going western or modern. They want to live as they imagine the American youth do. This is probably due to the influence of Western movies.

In regard to the Japanese Lutheran Church she told us that Rev. Inadomi, at one time a student at Dana, was in charge of the large boy's school. Miss Harder has been working with Maya Winther at Agi and Saya, Japan. She intends to return next fall to do kindergarten and evangelistic work in Fukuoka, Japan.

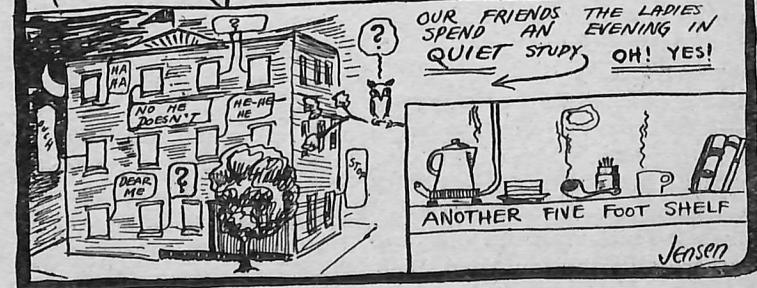
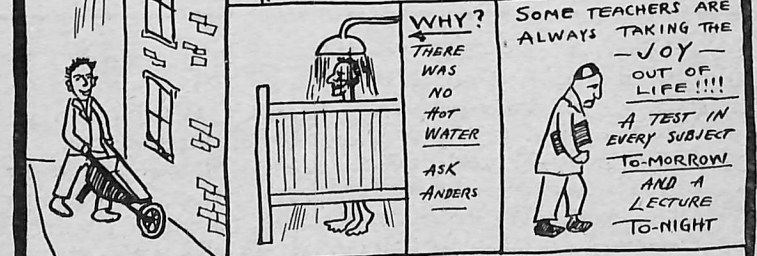
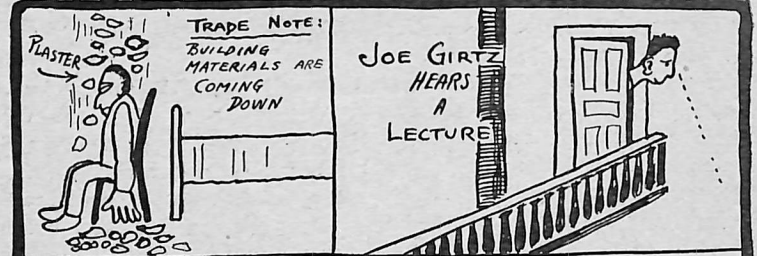

are "the gospel translated in terms of human experience." They also help toward living a true Christian life by drawing men upward to God and closer to one another. Thirdly, they constitute a most effective medium for the Christian congregation to take an active part in the worship. Lastly, the Christian hymns cultivate a spirit of tolerance and put all believers on a common ground. We are reminded of this when we realize that the best hymns are sung and treasured by men the world over regardless of race, color, or creed.

In keeping with the theme of the meeting, the audience joined in singing some of our most spiritual and highly treasured hymns. "Now Found Is the Fairest of Roses" by Brorson, the Danish poet of Christmas; "Rock of Ages" by Toplady; and at the close of the meeting, the hymn most widely known and used of any in Christendom, Martin Luther's "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God."

At the opening of the meeting Dolliver Thogerson led in devotion, and Bernice Hansen rendered a piano selection.

First one forward would get away, then the other, and then the center; a guard by the name of Scotten tossed baskets with reckless abandon. Gradually pulling up on Dana they climaxed their tremendous rally when they tied the score with but a few minutes to go. Clarinda dropped in a free throw to go in the lead 26-25, which was the only stage of the game where they were ahead. For a few short seconds it looked like the invaders were to go home with the victory but a quick piece of work on the part of Clown Vig and L. Hancock saved the day for Dana. With only a minute and a half to go, Dana was given the ball out of bounds. L. Hancock quickly slipped down under the basket and C. Vig, sensing that the Clarinda guards were "sleeping," shot the ball in and a victory was on ice.

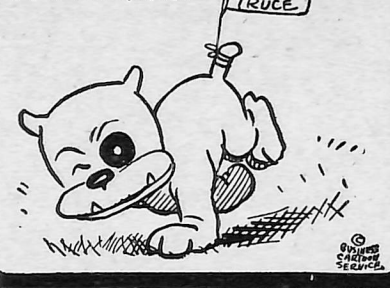
