Offering a well balanced program of surprising and humorous stunts, the various Dana organizations entertained a large and appreciative audience on the evening of April 20th with the third annual presentation of Varsity Nite.

Officiating as judges, Miss Petersen, Director of Dramatics at Blair High School; Mr. Montgomery, Superintendent of Blair Schools; and Prof. Swanson of Dana College, awarded first place to the Town Boys who presented "He Done 'Em Wrong," a clever satirical skit depicting the trial of a wrong-doer in the days of the pilgrims.

Second place went to the Town Girls who offered "Secrets of Long Ago," a quaint portrayal of various famous figures in history.

Alpha Sigma Phi took third honors with "The O-Limp-Icks of 1904," a slap-stick athletic stunt depicting aged athletes in strenuous competition.

Three places were visited Sunday: Abdal, Red Cloud, and Minden. Monday a concert was given in Comstock where President Nelson was Superintendent of schools at one time. Monday Ord and Wolbach were entertained. From the latter place the Choir journeyed to Cushing and to Hampton. Thursday concerts were given in Genoa and Lindsay.

Friday the concert was given at Creighton. In the evening some of the choir entertained at Plainview and some at Winnetoon with short speeches and musical numbers.

One special stop was at the State Hospital for the Insane at Norfolk. After a delicious dinner in the sun parlor of Dr. and Mrs. Juul Nielsen, the venerable Doctor, a former Dana student, told of his interesting work and headed a tour of inspection through the plant.

Sunday afternoon a large crowd greeted the singers at Laurel. Following this the final concert was given before a packed house in Sioux City. Then the Dana Acappella Choir turned their weary eyes homeward towards Blair after completing a successful tour in a season of adverse conditions.

After completing the regular tour of the season, the Dana Choir sang at Harlan and Woodbine April 23. Sunday, April 30, they sang at Moorhead and Soldier, Iowa.

Scholarships Will Be Awarded Soon

Eleven Awards To Be Given Commencement Night. Minnesota Offers New Scholarship.

Besides the institutional scholarships which will be awarded commencement night, there is offered four Luther League scholarships.

The Iowa Luther League offers a fifty dollar reward to a member of its group. The Wisconsin District League and the North Dakota Luther League have the same offer, but the latter has no eligible person enrolled.

For the first time, the Minnesota District offers a thirty dollar donation to be applied on tuition open to Freshmen, Sophomores, and Juniors.

The institutional awards consist of three groups. Five Juniors will be given tuition certificates valued at fifty dollars. These are awarded to the high ranking members of the Liberal Arts division. The Soldiers' and Sailors' Memorial Scholarships go to one man and one woman each valued at fifty dollars. Besides these there is usually given to the high ranking Academy graduate a scholarship worth one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150) applicable on four years of college work.

ATTENTION JUNIORS!

Now that the year is drawing to a close and the Juniors have organized would it not be a good idea for them to select their Editor-in-Chief for next year's Danian? It is the common practice of many schools to select their Editors the spring preceding the year in which they are to function. If the Editor were chosen now, he could make many of his plans during the summer. Also he would not have to wait for slow Senior action in the fall when time is precious. Those who have had experience in the editorship of an annual will agree to what has been advanced, generally speaking.

Juniors, think it over. Further, the business staff would have a much better chance to make an annual practicable if they were selected in time so that they could begin work immediately upon their return to school. At least elect a staff which could proceed with plans and then if conditions warrant the cancellation of the project, nothing would be lost; but much would be gained.

SUGGESTIONS

Now that the year is drawing to a close the question of next fall's election comes to my mind. It has been the practice that all of the Hermes staff be elected by the student body. Personally, without casting any reflections, I feel that that system has been an utter failure. We depend upon luck to the greatest extent in our democratic method of choosing our staff. From the standpoint of journalism, Hermes has not been up to the standard that it should be.

Of course the Editorship is pretty much a thankless job. So are the other positions on the staff. In other schools the general practice is to make selection from applications for the editorship. The other positions are chosen in the same manner or are selected by the editor. Another proposal—is it not better to elect at the beginning of the fall term instead of the spring semester? I know the idea in practice here has been to have elections in the middle of the year. Would it not be better to elect in the spring or in the fall? Furthermore, offices should not be open to Freshmen. Only upperclassmen should be eligible. Many of these proposals may seem radical, but I feel that they at least merit consideration.

Another proposal which may seem radical—Elect a student council and bestow some power upon it. Let the faculty select one or two members of the council and let the student body select the other three members of the group. All right, students—let's hear your opinion!

THE OPPORTUNITY IS OURS!

With the hope of the dawn of a new day somewhat fulfilled (at least some people feel that it has arrived) and in conjunction with the new forward movement of colleges included in the work of the Commission on Higher Education of the American Lutheran Conference let us look forward to the future—considering what the new year may have in store for Dana College—look forward with renewed hope, vision, and vigor. We can and we must!

Quoting from a letter from the Commission on Higher Education: "Greatness, character, strength, the right to live and grow lies in the ability to turn difficulties into victories, to see in the hour of defeat the doors opening for greater advance and to march on. It would be a stupendous blunder if we did not at this time rally about our higher schools to turn our youth into them in ever larger numbers, to give them our confidence and encouragement so that they will be strong again in their great central task of educating Christian men and women. The opportunity is theirs and ours."

Current Campus Comment

Will we ever grow up? Or are we getting more crazy? Judging from the performances at Varsity Nite, it seems to me that we are just about ready for the "crazy-house."—Some time ago several students were discussing our literary societies which seem to be "on the rocks" for lack of interest. If we go back a few years in history, we find that these societies regularly presented literary programs of various types. These programs were interesting, entertaining, instructive and in general of a cultural value both to the audience and performers. But it is maintained that such programs are out of date—below par today. However, if we compare those literary programs of old with the "stuff" presented at the Varsity Nite it certainly should make us shed tears of sorrow and shame. Where is our common sense? Where is our sense of propriety? Where is our sense of humor? Where is our sense of beauty? Does it really require so crude means to entertain an audience? I think not. I am more inclined to think that we are making ourselves the laughing-stock of our community. Where are we going?

I Am Not Ashamed Of The Gospel Of Christ

Exerpts from the speech of Dr. Walter A. Maier before the Lutheran Club of the University of Chicago. Clipped from "Alma Mater," Concordia Seminary, St. Louis—

"We have been dazzled by the claims of our new philosophies and our new psychology. But has psycho-analysis or behaviorism wrought a new morality? We glory in our unprecedented advance of scientific achievement. But has the creation of our vast reservoirs of energy endowed us with the dynamics of a deeper spirituality? We have developed the greatest and most accessible system of higher education ever known to man. But with seven students in our colleges and universities for every one in ancient and cultured Europe, have we shown corresponding progress in the highest culture, the discipline of our desires, and the personal, reverent approach to God?

"Nor is the panacea for our multiplied needs to be found in any political or legislative programs. A Reconstruction Finance Corporation may or may not salvage financial wrecks but it cannot save human

souls. An understanding with our debtor nations may bolster up our anaemic commercial relations, but a steady flow of European gold into our national treasuries would not bring us an inch closer to God.

"In this new day when we have broken abruptly with much of the finest and best of the past and cultivated a new generation like that subsequent to Moses and Joshua 'which knew not the Lord, nor yet the works which he had done for Israel,' a self-satisfied, sophisticated generation that prides itself on its skepticism, places a premium on doubt and rewards scurrility with Nobel Prizes, we must be done with all dilettante pastimes that play around on the periphery. The times plead for the voice of one who will cry in our modern wilderness, 'Repent ye!' We need, with an unparalleled imperativeness, a national and individual inventory and a listing of our moral liabilities, the sins that shriek to the high heavens. We must have, I believe with all my heart, the divinely energizing, life-creating power implied in the resolution of Paul of Tarsus: 'I Am Not Ashamed Of The Gospel Of Christ.'"

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO

Reflections by C. B. Larsen, Co-editor of first Hermes—published February, 1918—

"Virility is a rare quality. Two thousand years ago the noted philosopher walked in the streets of Athens with a lantern in his hand by daylight, and when asked what he was looking for, cried out that he was looking for a man. The streets of Athens were full of people, but there were no men there. I trust that the conditions have improved since that time, and yet I sometimes wonder if one still needs a lantern to find a man.

"If you want to be a man you must face the world with the convictions of your soul. You must

stand alone if circumstances demand it. The man who is a man, is not in every respect governed by the prevalent opinion. He does not follow the demagogue. This does not mean that one has to be stubborn in order to be a man. The true man yields when he sees that he is mistaken.

"By acquiescing and following the crowd, one can avoid much unpleasantness; and it is the sure road to popularity. But that should not be the aim in life. The man should follow the convictions of his heart in spite of opposition and prevalent opinion."

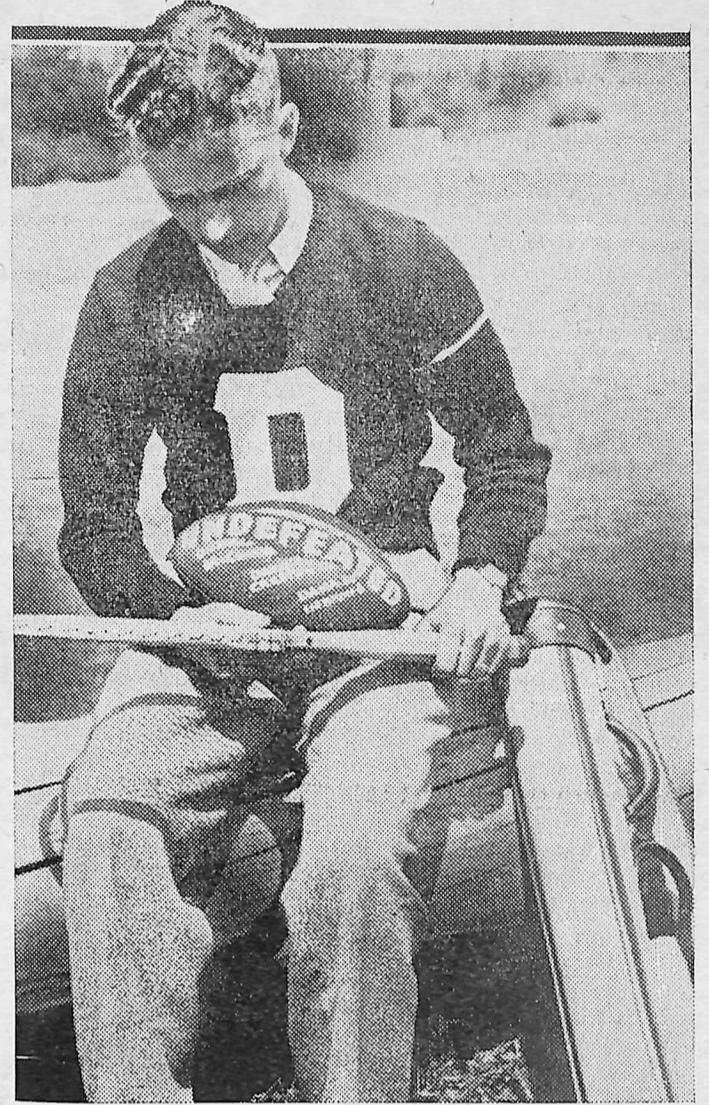
M. Jensen was the hitting star of the series—five for eight is a good day's work. He covered third base in great style.
