Vikings Beat Luther 41-33 In Final Game of Season; Danians Cut Short Late Luther Rally

Senior Bob Hogzett Plays Last Game for Dana

In a very fitting climactic finale to the 41-42 basketball season here at Dana the Vikings handed a well balanced Luther team a 41-33 lacing as they scored their second straight win of the week.

The game started very slowly with neither team being able to break through opposition defense lines for shots at the basket. Only 11 points were scored during the entire initial period. Even though Dana had the decided edge during the game, twice in the final period the Wahoo cagers came from behind to tie up the ball game. With only about 3 minutes remaining in the game the Vikings finally cut loose and poured in 4 baskets in rapid succession to put the clinchers on the ball game.

Patrick led the Red and White scorers with a total of 13 points. Consistently throughout the fourth and final period Pat would fake his guard out of position and pivot in from the center post and pepper the hoop. With monotonous regularity Kling of Luther scored on one handed push shots which gave him scoring honors for the evening with a total of 17 counters.

For three quarters Dana used a fast breaking offense in an effort to obtain a safe lead. Time and time again Luther defense men broke up Viking passes and forced the Danians to settle down to a slower pace in the final period which netted much better results. Dana led at half time 16-12.

Senior Bob Hogzett played his last game as a Viking cager. Bob has been a main spring in the Viking machine for the past four

Even the youngsters were delighted by his stories, and before the week had ended he had become their favorite speaker.

The dramatic presentation of

the former missionary enlivened the thoughts and vividly portrayed characters. His lectures revealed that the speaker was a keen observer and possessed a lively imagination. But coupled with his natural abilities and pervading them was his humble and earnest spirit, commending his message of Christ to young and old alike.

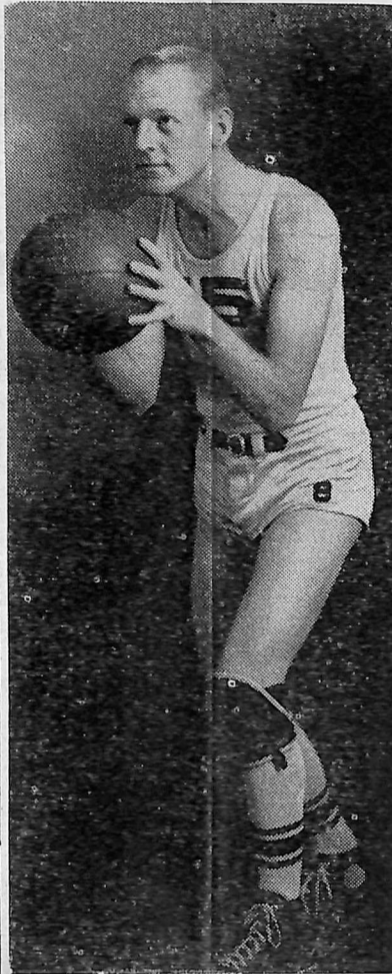
"I believe you have been brought face to face with the gospel, with the Christ of Calvary and the Resurrection," he said in parting.

First Semester Honor Roll Is Announced

Danians Open Jubilee Banks, Contribute \$70.62 to Fund

Students contributed \$70.62 to the Jubilee Fund of the synod through the self-denial banks, collected last week. The total will be increased since a number of students have asked to keep the banks a few weeks more.

Dana women contributed \$39.09 of the amount, the men \$31.53. A large number of the students have pledged to the jubilee funds of their home congregations in addition to these contributions.

The committee in charge of this student body project was Rodney Hansen, Betty Jane Wolff, Nola Johnson, Stanley Carlsen and Paul Larsen.

The Jubilee Appeal has already received nearly \$55,000 in cash. Pledges exceed the halfway mark in this synodical drive that will bring a \$150,000 administration building to the campus.

More than twenty per cent of the college student body maintained scholastic averages high enough to merit positions on the first semester honor roll. In order to be eligible for the honor roll, the student must have maintained an average grade in all academic subjects of not less than 90, with no grade less than 80.

Some compromisers, on the other hand, believe that unity can be achieved by a smooching over of the differences so that when a couple of students meet on the campus they can smile at each other, say hello, and each go his way thinking about the wonderful family spirit at Dana when perhaps the only reason why there is this feeling of unity is that they have not dared to air their opinions. They have merely tried to agree with each other for the sake of being agreeable. Neither this lawgiving nor compromising will erase the division. When we come to Christ with this spirit, we can be one; and our petty differences will disappear. In this spirit the ideal of Dana as a Christian institution can begin to be realized, and we can grow together in sanctification. Psychology Professor Maintains "Swing Is an Art"

Swing is art, and it is recently becoming great art. "The difference between Beethoven's Fifth symphony and Benny Goodman's Opus 1/2" concludes Dr. J. F. Brown, psychology professor at the University of Kansas, "is one of degree, and not one of kind."

Art, he explains in a textbook, "The Psychodynamics of Abnormal Behavior," is the expression in more or less disguise of conflicts or problems that are a part of life.

Songs are popular when the problems which are their content are easily recognized—when the disguise is thin. Usually the lyrics of swing music speak of unrequited love, a problem of deep concern to boys and girls of college and high school age. And they speak pretty frankly.

As art disguises its content, uses technically difficult and distorted expression forms, and requires more competence of the performers, it becomes "great" art.

If you want to satisfy yourself that popular music is becoming "greater" art, just listen to records made in the early twenties and compare these with the latest recordings of the same songs.

From the old records you will hear a thinly orchestrated and purely melodic recording of the verse followed by as many identical repetitions of the chorus as space would allow. The monotony is tiring to the ear.

Some of Benny Goodman's and Bob Crosby's and Count Basie's widely swung choruses represent variations as complex, Dr. Brown insists, as some of Brahms's. You can even listen to modern swing in a concert or "jam session."

As swing gets farther away from the simple love-making of the dance, fewer individuals will be able to follow it, it will become esoteric and no longer popular, he predicts.

Swing, according to Dr. Brown's analysis, is not only art, it is good psychology—or psychoanalysis. Freud himself would have approved a title like "You Remind Me of My Mother" or the use in love songs of "Mama" and "Daddy."

The song writer, like the psychoanalyst, recognizes the significance of dreams—"You Can't Stop Me from Dreaming," "I'll See You in My Dreams," or "I Wake Up Smiling."

"Fall in love, fall in love, says my heart... but each time that I'm almost in your arms, this old school teacher brain of mine starts ringing false alarms." These words form a recent popular song might be translated into technical language and find their place in a psychology textbook.

Hate, Dr. Brown says, is seldom expressed in popular songs except in war time. For hostility, go to the comic strip or the animated cartoon.
