### Dr. Mellby Chosen Commencement Speaker

#### Music, Sports, L L Day Compose "Lilac Time"

Lilac Time at Dana opened this year on April 30 minus the lilacs. They hadn't blossomed yet because of an unusually cold Spring.

Culminating an active year the String Ensemble, under the direction of Miss Mildred Brannon, music instructor, presented a concert Friday evening, April 30, composed of numbers from the 17th, 18th, and 19th centuries.

A Maypole Dance and folk dancing demonstration were presented on the quadrangle Saturday afternoon. Eva Ruth Anderson directed the dancing and Miss Brannon assisted with the music. Two Swedish dances, "Hi, Little Lassie" and "Gustav's Toast"; three Danish dances, "Ole Sat on a Clod," "Min Gaedebukke," and "The Shoemaker" were presented.

Saturday evening, a banquet was held in the college dining hall, resplendent in Mayday decorations, with Maybaskets hanging from the lights and streamers forming an arch over the entrance. Dinner music was furnished by the ensemble, which was seated in a large Maybasket. Following the banquet (chicken furnished by Mr. and Mrs. Dan Greeno) an impromptu program was given. John Schultz was toastmaster, and eliminating all speeches, he called upon the students to furnish the entertainment.

The "Three Dots and a Dash Quartet," composed of Philip Larsen, Nels Carlsen, Warren Jenkins and Martin Kuhr, then presented a group of numbers to the guests in the auditorium. They were handicapped because Nels Carlsen had the measles and was unable to be there. The Dana College Dramatics Club then gave a skit of Gilbert and Sullivan selections.

The Dana College choir presented its annual home concert Sunday evening at 8:00 in the auditorium.

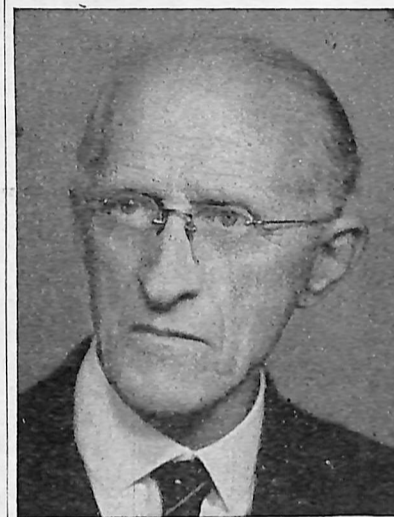
#### H. Johnson Is First Alumnus War Casualty

Lt. Howard B. Johnson, '38-'39, Dana's first alumnus serviceman casualty from Denmark, Wis., was killed in an air collision of two twin-motored training planes at Randolph Field, San Antonio, Texas, Tuesday night at 8:55. Lt. Don Graves, 27, of Green Bay, pilot of the other plane was also killed.

He enlisted as a member of a class of student officers and aviation cadets and completed an 18-months' course at King Center and Chico, California. He graduated from the Air Force Advanced Flying School at Stockton Field, Calif., March 10, and was commissioned 2nd Lt. in the Air Force Reserve and received the coveted wings, symbol of the aeronautical rating as pilot.

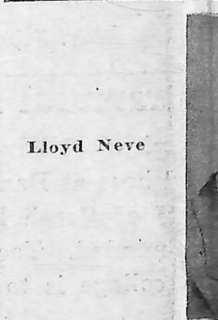
#### Lloyd Neve As Prexy; Stanley Carlsen Hermes Editor

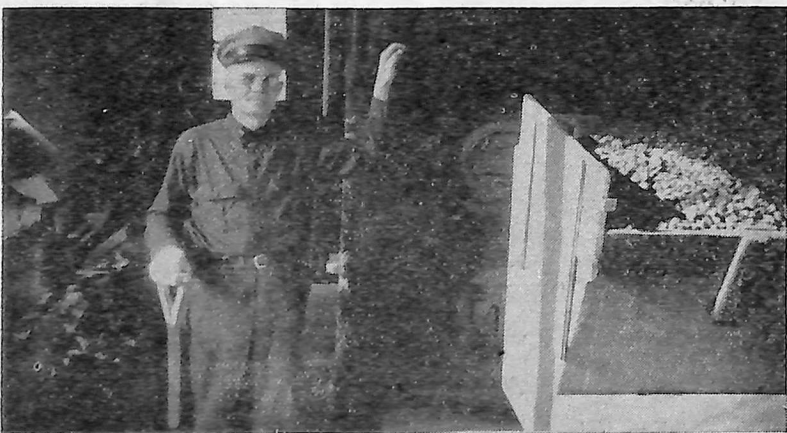

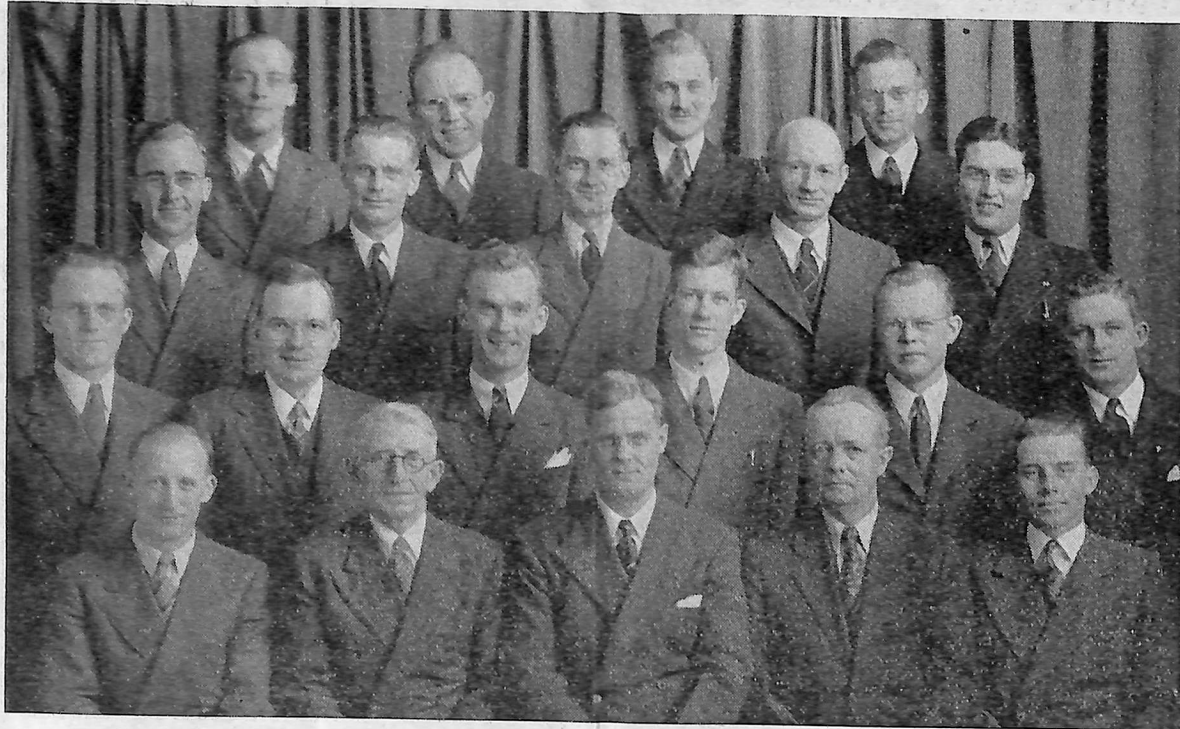
### Mr. Goldbeck and His Stoker
