Augsburg College Choir

Prof. Opseth Directs Visiting Augsburg Choir

The Augsburg College Choir of Minneapolis, under the direction of Prof. Henry P. Opseth will be heard in concert Sunday evening at 7:30 in the Auditorium.

The Augsburg College a cappella group is on its annual winter concert tour of seven middle-western states, including 19 cities. This choir, ranked as one of the nation's best, is credited with a new departure in choral presentations. The group's work completely eliminates the usual stamp of "glee club" standards so often found in college singing organizations.

Prof. Opseth has welded together a choral unit from a student body of 750 students that has been acclaimed as one of the foremost college choirs in the country.

Much of the honor bestowed upon the Augsburg Choir rightfully belongs to Prof. Opseth. He has been director of music at Augsburg College since 1922. Opseth has had intimate contact with such world renowned musicians as Dr. F. Melius Christiansen and Eugene Ormandy while studying under them. During the World War I Opseth directed the famous 364th Infantry band in France. Since 1922 Prof. Opseth has performed a remarkable feat in bringing the Augsburg College Choir to the front rank among the nation's leading college musical organizations.

Limjocos Arrive From Philippines

Dana College now not only has a representation from seventeen states of the United States but also a representation of two from one of its past possessions, the Philippine Islands.

On Thursday, January 23, Benjamin Limjoco and his sister Aida arrived at Dana College to take up studies in the second semester. Ben is studying a commercial course and Aida is specializing in art.

Ben is studying commerce for preparation to entering his father's business house. Aida has plans of becoming a dress designer.

Ben and Aida are from the suburbs of Manila, San Juan. They left Manila on December 28. From there they sailed to Hong Kong, then on to Shanghai. Finally they arrived at San Francisco on January 17. On January 23, they arrived in Blair.

Since there was no snow on the ground, Ben and Aida were surprised to see that the Nebraska winter had a touch of spring to it. They had never seen snow before and so were anxious to experience the sensation. By January 30, after a typical Nebraska blizzard, Ben and Aida resigned themselves to the warmer climate.

During the war, Ben and Aida lived in the

Badangas Province, south of Manila. Of their war experiences, Ben relates that in their house they kept a short wave radio and also rifles. He also tells of a Japanese colonel who wanted the Limjoco's car which was on blocks since tires could not be bought. Ben's father told the colonel he could have the car but the Japanese colonel, after seeing the position of the car, left it since the car would have to be carried to Manila.

Concerning the behavior of the Japanese military forces in the Philippines, Ben said that at first the Japanese did not do much harm. They sent out propaganda to the natives, telling them that Japan would protect them from the Occidental influence. The natives did not absorb this. The Japanese then issued a general amnesty that allowed liberation of guerillas who would surrender. Suspicious at first, some guerillas surrendered, only to be killed four months later. The Japanese resorted to the "iron hand" at the end of the war.

Dana College will have more opportunity to hear of Ben's and Aida's experiences during the war. It will be not only a new experience for Ben and Aida to be in a foreign land, but also for Dana to have first-hand information on the Philippines.

News of the Day

Summarized by Stone

Prices have begun to take a slight tumble the last few weeks. As is usual the farmer felt the first shock of a price break. Butter, corn, meat, and poultry took substantial falls. Many other products seemed to be in a half and half state. Such a picture is found in the clothing industry. Here some prices are dropping, while others are rising, but this is expected to result in a substantial drop, in the long run. It seems that people are no longer willing to get products at any price. This attitude, coupled with increased production is expected to result in a general price reduction on all basic commodities. Most of us will be more than happy to see such a reduction of prices take place.

Labor, too, seems to be more reasonable. Phil Murray's CIO Steel Workers agreed to extend their contract to April 30, 1947. It was due to go out of effect on Feb. 15, 1947. Such an attitude by labor will probably make congress think twice before taking any drastic steps to cut the powers of labor.

Ruther's CIO United Auto Workers are angling for a pay raise. The UAW were the ones that started the industry wide strike last year. But, according to many people they will not try this method this year. The auto industry is expected to settle peaceably for a slight pay raise.

The only labor leader, who might cause trouble is John L. Lewis. The legal trouble that Lewis got into last year has not been settled by the Supreme court. How long Lewis is willing to wait for a decision is impossible to know, but he has it within his power to turn the US economy topsy-turvy, if he chooses to do so.

The U. S. is trying to enlist the aid of Russia and England in protesting the recent Polish election. The election was obviously fixed by the Communist dominated Government bloc. England has expressed herself favoring an investigation, while Russia has not commented upon the situation. The Yalta agreement signed by the leaders of these three countries is supposed to guarantee a "free and unfettered" election. It remains to be seen whether this agreement will become just another scrap of paper, or a binding agreement.
