## Sadie Hawkins Day Party Opens New Rec. Room Tomorrow Night

With an overall expenditure of approximately \$4,000 Dana's long-awaited recreation room has been completed and will be officially opened by a brief dedication service tomorrow evening at the Sadie Hawkins Party, which is to be held in the gymnasium, and is sponsored by the Freshman class.

For the past fifteen months committees have carefully planned, assisted by the entire student body and the administration. Under the direction of Coach Peterson, the present committee, consisting of Dean Madsen, May Skobo, Lyle Morgensen and Darryl Wilson, has transformed the once idle basement of the gymnasium into a modern recreational lounge, artistically decorated in harmonious furnishings. Norman Winter was in charge of the construction work.

The southwest corner has been arranged as a lounge with divans, chairs, a radio-phonograph combination and reading materials, while the remaining space has been equipped with game tables, ping pong tables, a billiard table and a shuffleboard court.

The Sadie Hawkins party will be carried on in "good old Dogpatch" style. It will begin at 7:30 p.m. and only those in costume will be admitted. The entire evening is planned by a six-man committee of freshmen, consisting of Russell Eckert, Ruby Christensen, Virginia Clark, Letha Sorensen, Allan Nyegaard and Fred Leary.

## Lyceum Program Features Herman Berg, Violinist

Herman Berg, widely known violinist, will appear on Monday evening, March 8, at 8 o'clock at the Dana auditorium as another in a series of scheduled lyceum programs.

Mr. Berg has been soloist with such well known groups as the Rochester Civic Orchestra, Indianapolis Symphony and the DePauw University Symphony. He was concert-master and soloist with the Eastman School of Music for the Brahms Concerto! At DePauw University Mr. Berg became the conductor of the university symphony and string symphony.

The noted violinist received his B.S. degree from Kansas State College; B.M. from Eastman School of Music; M.M. from DePauw University; and has had many years of private study with Louis Persinger.

Mr. Berg received a full scholarship at the Eastman School of Music and also the George Eastman Honorary scholarship for scholastic achievement at the Eastman school. In recognition of his outstanding concert and solo work he became a member of the Kappa Delta Pi, national honorary scholastic fraternity and the Pi Kappa Lambda which is also a professional musical fraternity.

The main ambition of the thirty-three year old Mr. Berg is directed toward concert work.

## 'Pee Wee' Sorensen to Lead Discussion at Creighton, Mar. 20

Ewald "Pee Wee" Sorensen, Dana senior, was among five discussion leaders chosen for the March 20th meeting at Creighton of the Nebraska Association of Church Colleges. ## Dana Student Body Sponsors Address by Cornhusker Executive

Governor Val Peterson will give an address at the Dana auditorium this coming Thursday at a program sponsored by the Student Body. The program will begin at 8 p.m.

The Nebraska governor is a candidate to succeed himself in this year's election. He recently received the unanimous support of the state Republican convention for what was termed his "positive and progressive program."

Peterson's father was born in Denmark, later coming to Nebraska where he worked as a railroad agent. The Cornhusker executive was born in Oakland, Nebraska.

The Governor obtained his Bachelor of Arts degree at Wayne State Teachers College, later receiving his Master of Arts degree from the University of Nebraska. He has also served as an instructor there.

Peterson also served in the Army Air Forces for almost four years, two years of which were spent in the China-Burma-India theatre in an executive capacity.

Other experiences of Governor Peterson's include editing and publishing the "Elgin (Nebraska) Review" and serving as secretary to Nebraska's former governor, Dwight Griswold.

Also included on the program will be a number by the quartet composed of Ardis Gramps, Florence Hansen, Arthur Sorensen, and Hal Jersild, and a solo by Paul Johnsen.

Forrest "Red" Leighton, junior from Maine, is in charge of publicity and seating arrangements for Governor Peterson's appearance.

## "I'd Like to Go to Dana, but . . ."

Dana College is a Christian college. As such Dana endeavors to provide sound Christian guidance at the same time that it attempts to provide a liberal education for its students. Having in mind this spirit we obligate ourselves to try to bring as many students to Dana as possible in order that we may acquaint them with Christian principles.

We might say that one of the purposes in building the new building, now in process of construction, was to lure more students to our campus. Discussion concerning the possibilities of building a new dormitory and other campus buildings is based upon the same idea.

The question arises, "How many prospective students do we still fail to draw to Dana?" The conscientious young person who wants an education in order that he may be better fit to hold responsible jobs will not decide to go to any school because of its beautiful campus, modern buildings or homely atmosphere. The prospective student who is after an education in the real sense of the word is more concerned about whether or not Dana offers courses which coincide with his major fields of interest. Many prospective students do not choose Dana as their school because they cannot pursue the course of their major interest.

Apparently we are waiting until our student enrollment increases before we broaden the curriculum of Dana. Actually we should be working from the angle that if we broaden our curriculum by offering more courses, many more students will feel that Dana is the school they would like to attend.

It is like the man who is in the market to buy a suit of clothes. He is more apt to buy from the store which offers for sale a large variety of suits in many styles, colors and sizes, than he is from a store which offers a limited number of suits. The same basic idea can be applied to the person who is trying to decide which college he should attend. If, for example, a student is interested in becoming a newspaper worker he will look for the school which has the most complete journalism department.

Too many students are attending Dana for only one or two years because they are not able to pursue courses of study which they wish to major in. Too many students do not come to Dana at all for the same reason. We exist in name as a four year liberal arts college. We should exist as a four year liberal arts college also in the sense that we offer many possibilities for the four year major.

The courses which are offered at present are excellent and the credits received for them are recognized by all other educational institutions as transferable without question. We are asking that more courses be added to the curriculum.

We are placing the cart before the horse in waiting for a larger student body in order that it may be economical to offer additional courses. We must be able to offer a complete curriculum in order to bring more students here. In doing such we are at the same time acting as missionaries for Christian principles and ideals.

*"Now therefore fear Jehovah, and serve him in sincerity and in truth; and put away the gods which your fathers served beyond the River, and in Egypt; and serve ye Jehovah. And if it seem evil unto you to serve Jehovah, choose you this day whom ye will serve; whether the gods which your fathers served that were beyond the River, or the gods of the Amorites, in whose land ye dwell: but as for me and my house, we will serve Jehovah."* Joshua 24:14-15.

The plea of Joshua with his people to serve Jehovah in sincerity and in truth is one which should challenge us today just as it did the children of Israel in his day. Joshua in his farewell address recounted for the people how down through history the hand of God had directed their lives. He pointed out how God had delivered them from the oppression of the Egyptians and had led them to the promised land. In view of these many undeserved blessings which God had showered upon them, Joshua pleads with them to fear Jehovah and serve Him in sincerity and in truth.

We today have an even greater revelation of God's goodness and grace than did these children of Israel, for we have seen the fulfilment of His great plan of salvation for us in Jesus. During this season of Lent in which we are reminded in a special way of the suffering Savior, we see what God in His undying mercy has done for us and we are invited anew to respond with a choice either one way or the other. Joshua was evidently disturbed by the halfheartedness of his people, and as we view ourselves and the world in which we live I am sure that we must conclude in humility that there is much of this halfheartedness also in our lives today.

We need to accept the challenge of Joshua to be positive in our spiritual living. Anything short of complete dedication of our lives to God is not sufficient. The secret to real satisfaction and happiness in this life does not come from halfheartedness, but it rather depends upon the positive crowning of Christ as King in our lives. If Christ truly reigns in our hearts then and only then will we have the conviction to say with Joshua, "As for me and my house, we will serve Jehovah."

Coach Peterson has already acquired most of the necessary equipment so it remains up to the student body to provide a winning team and the interest to make it successful.

Also on the spring program for the first time will be a golf team and for the second year a tennis squad.

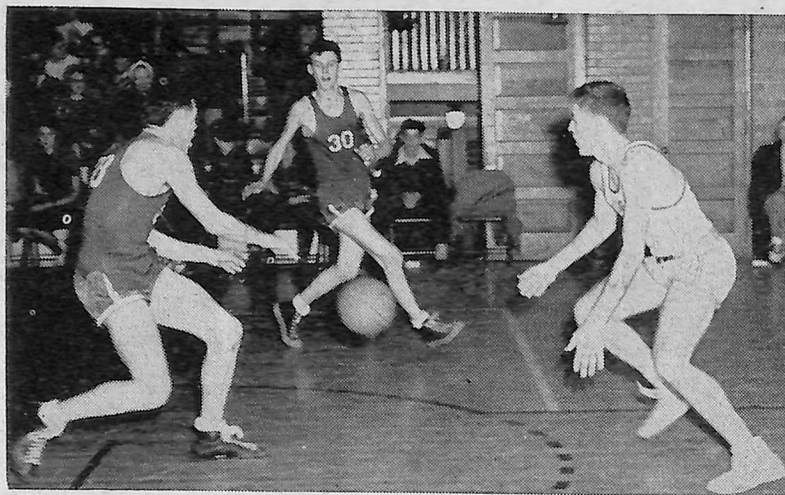
## WAA Representatives To Attend Conference At Doane College

## Dana's Red Hot Vikings Roll Over Creighton 'B'

Dana's cagers established a 63-41 win over Creighton's "B" team on February 19 to make their first home game after six games away a victorious one.

Creighton took the initial tip-off and put it through for "two" before five seconds had gone by. The bewildered Dana five, not to be outdone, soon tied the score and by the end of the first quarter Dana had a six-point lead. From there it was Dana's game all the way.

Led by Bud Robinson, who was high point man with 20 points, Dana outscored Creighton in every period.

The Vikings concentrated on passing the ball around and by the end of the first half the score was 32-18.

During the third period Coach Peterson replaced the starting five with the reserves who showed that they too knew how to hit the hoop for points. By the end of the third period the Vikings had increased their lead to 20 points.

When the game was over the entire Dana team had seen action on the court.

## Dana on Short End After Hard Fought Battle with Tarkio

Dana managed to stay in the ball game for the first half at Tarkio, Missouri, on the 21st of February, but couldn't keep pace with the Missourians the final twenty minutes. The half time score was 33-24 and the game looked as though it might be a hard fought one throughout the full four periods. Dana's defense fell apart in the second half, however, and the men from Tarkio walked off the floor with a 68-49 victory.

The Viking's usual potent fast break didn't click and the squad as a whole had considerable trouble in finding the hoop from the floor.

If it weren't for the fact that the team made its best showing of the year from the foul line, the margin of victory would have been much greater. Dana converted 17 out of 25 gift shots, while only garnering 15 field goals. Jim Youmans and Bud Robinson were high point men for the 'Redmen' with 11 and 10 points respectively.

## Intramural Teams Started Tournament Yesterday Afternoon

Dana's "A Feudin' and a Fightin'" intramural teams started their elimination tournament yesterday afternoon when the first rounds were played.

Last year's champions, the Bjtdangs, met the Slip Shots for the first defense of their title in the tournament. In other games played yesterday the Woolybuggers met the winner of the league's regular schedule, the Town Terrors, the Green Gophers tangled with the Royal Gizmos and the Fourth Floor Flyers battled it out with the Sic'ems.

Tonight the winners of last night's tilts will resume action on the local court. The winners of these two games will then take a rest until next Tuesday, March 9, when the championship of the intramural teams for the '47-'48 season will be decided. The first game on March ninth will find the two losers of tonight's games fighting for the consolation honors.

The regular intramural schedule ended on Monday, March 1, when the Woolybuggers met the Slip Shots and the Sic'ems played the Royal Gizmos to determine who would be in fourth place.

## Creighton Junior Jays "Rough-up" Vikings

In one of the roughest games of basketball this writer has ever witnessed, Dana lost a 57-32 decision to Creighton 'B' on February 28th. It was a preliminary game to the Creighton University-Oklahoma A & M game and was treated as such. The officiating left much to be desired and resulted in the game turning into an exhibition of a combination football-icehockey game. A total of only eight fouls were called on the Vikings while Creighton was penalized no less than 23 times.

Dana led momentarily in the early minutes of the game, but the Junior Jays from Omaha soon erased this lead, holding a 15 to 9 advantage at first period time and a 33 to 14 lead at half time.

Third quarter time saw Creighton holding a twenty-seven point lead, 50 to 23. It was the first game of the season that the Vikings have been held to less than forty points. (This writer still maintains that one would have to use his imagination to classify it as a basketball however.) Jim Youmans got three baskets and six gift shots to lead Dana's scoring with 12 points.

## Fairbury Downs Dana In Conference Tilt

Dropping the final conference game to Fairbury 56-51 on Wednesday, February 25, gave the Dana Vikings basketball team a 3 win-9 loss conference record for the '47-'48 season.

The outcome of the Dana-Fairbury game might have been different if the game would have consisted of two second halves instead of one. It wasn't until the second half, it seemed, until Dana realized that they were in a basketball game.

When the Vikings returned to the floor after the half time period they were a revised team. With sharp and smart passing and all around good playing the half time score of 29-16 Fairbury was soon changed to a 36 all score by the end of the third period.

During the fourth period Dana stayed right on the heels of Fairbury and at one point held a 41-40 advantage. Lyle Morgensen, who was high point man for Dana with 14, left the game via the five foul route. The game remained a nip-and-tuck battle until the final minutes when Fairbury pulled away with two field goals and a free throw.

Jim Youmans made a free throw for the initial point at the beginning of the game to put Dana in the lead. The starting five was unable to organize and keep this lead, but managed to keep within four points by the end of the first quarter.

Led by Leland Smith, who was high for Fairbury with 22, the junior college five was able to gain a 13 point lead by half time. During the second period Coach Peterson replaced the entire starting Dana five with substitutes.

# Regional LSA President Was Dana Campus Guest

Kenneth Wilson, Midwest Regional LSA President, was a guest of Dana on Sunday, February 29. He is a junior student of Electrical Engineering at the University of Nebraska, and a member of the UELC from Minden, Nebraska. With him was Robert Florell, who is a junior student of Vocational Education at NU.

Wilson spoke to the student body at dinner Sunday. He particularly referred to the Big Little Ashram of the Midwest region which is to be at Hebron, Nebraska, April 23-25. The registration is to be unlimited, and he urged students to begin now to plan to attend.

He spoke again at the evening service in the First Lutheran church. Here he dealt with the work of the LSA. He said that the local chapters are the most important part of LSA, even though each is but "a drop in the bucket." He went on to explain the part played by the regional officers and the national officers. "The LSA," he said, "is the body which carries the Church to the more than 80,000 Lutheran students on non-Lutheran or secular campuses." He told also about the National Ashram, which is to be held this year at Camp Interlochen, Michigan.

Bob Florell told about the proposed plan to charter several buses to take students to Interlochen from the midwest region. Then Ken Wilson concluded the speeches by saying:

"We are all running in that eternal race whose goal is the Kingdom of Christ. We must learn to run that race well, leading well-balanced lives, as Christ taught us, in order that we may render Him greater service. . . . For the secular man must get down to molding a personality full of love, kindness, and charity, rather than applying himself to physical things. Our counter-weapon to this way of life is moral."

Mr. Antonio da Cruz, professor of modern languages, presented the topic, "United States Relations with Europe" at the History Club meeting Friday evening, February 27, in the women's reception room.
