19 States and 3 Nations Send Students

College Sees Increase in Upper Class Enrollment

Registration at Dana College and Trinity Seminary has reached the figure of 263. Although that is still less than the total enrollment for the first semester last year, the upper class enrollment of 157 is the largest in the history of the institution.

The out-of-state enrollment is as varied as last year with 19 states, as well as two Canadian Provinces and two foreign countries represented. Enrollment from local Blair-Herman-Kennard area is up to 47 as compared with last year's first semester total of 39.

According to information from the Registrar's office, a number of students cancelled reservations late in the summer after securing positions in the teaching profession and in other fields. The draft had only slight effect on the enrollment this year.

The home addresses of students indicate that almost two-thirds of the students are from out of state. The Canadian provinces of Alberta and Manitoba are represented. One student's home address is India, another claims Denmark as his home. Later this year two students from Lisbon, Portugal, will increase the size of Dana's international group.

State totals are as follows: Nebraska 92, Iowa 53, Wisconsin 30, Minnesota 13, Illinois 12, California 10, Colorado 10, Maine 7, New York 5, North Dakota 5, Oregon 5, Michigan 3, South Dakota 3, Oklahoma 3, Kansas 2, Massachusetts 1, Missouri 1, and Wyoming 1.

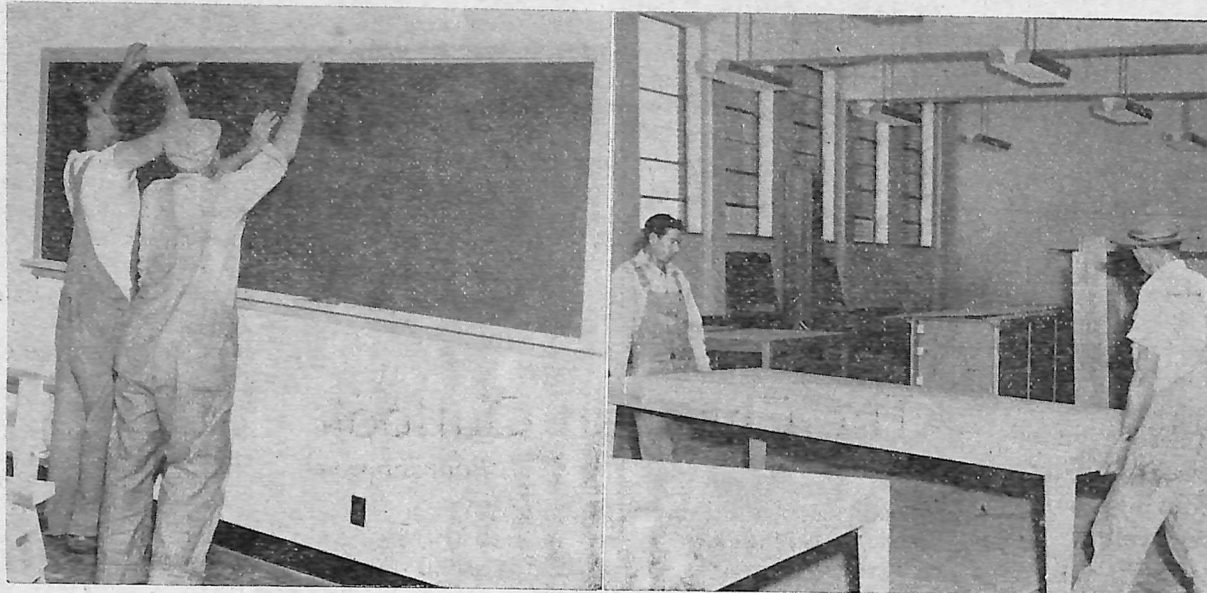
Dana-Trinity Professor Back from Europe, Reports 'Unity in Essentials' at World Assembly

At the Assembly of World Council of Churches, which met several weeks ago in Amsterdam, there was a "remarkable freedom of expression and a willingness to set forth honestly and frankly variant views, but at the same time a most remarkable unity in the essentials," according to Rev. Paul C. Nyholm, who was the official representative of the United Evangelical Lutheran Church.

The World Council of Churches was a colorful gathering, with representatives from all over the world, and outstanding church leaders from many different churches, dressed in the distinctive vestments of their denominations. The fact that so large a group would assemble is in itself a remarkable indication of the desire for unity that is to a large extent prompted by crucial world conditions, the Dana-Trinity professor stated.

Administration-Library Building Dedication Set for October 31

Library Is Now Complete

The new Library-Administration building is receiving the finishing touches in painting, lighting, and furnishing and will be ready for occupation, Mr. Larry Apker informed, by mid-October, although the building will not be formally dedicated until October 31. The library staff is working now re-classifying the books in preparation for moving into the new building this week.

From the library entrance the stairway leads up into the tower, and is equipped with a black wrought-iron railing in gracious modernistic lines. Across the ceiling of the "tower room" two massive smoked beams will support a large decorative chandelier.

The library itself will be a model room for study and reading pleasure. Natural-finish light oak tables and chairs of modern design will match the reference book shelves lining the walls. Acousti-fibre covers the ceiling, and the floor is laid with brown and tan rubber tiles, patterned after the design in a public building in Copenhagen. These furnishings will make the room as quiet as possible even when filled to its capacity of one hundred students. Tall windows and modern fluorescent lighting will furnish excellent lighting by day and night. The all-metal shelves in the stack-rooms have recently been assembled, and are now ready for use.

The main hallway, where the flooring is of a design in black and green rubber tile, leads to the thoroughly modern administration and faculty offices. The furnishings in the registrar's and president's offices are also in natural oak finish, and the rooms are well-lighted with large windows overlooking the campus.

Choir Members Elect Krogh President; Rehearsals Begin

The 1948-49 Dana College Choir has been chosen and rehearsals have begun in preparation for the spring tour to Oregon and California.

Lind Resigns; Nielsen Heads Temporary Editorial Staff

Veteran Chaplain Stresses High Goals at Opening Convocation

The convocation held in the Dana College auditorium Sunday, September 19th, at 8:00 p.m. formally opened the 1948-49 school year. Rev. A. S. Petersen of Our Saviour's Lutheran Church, Omaha, was the guest speaker. There was a large attendance, including many guests from this vicinity and out of state.

An organ prelude played by Mr. Paul Neve opened the service. Other musical selections were offered by Mr. Lyle Jacobsen, Coon Rapids, Ia., and Mr. John Lassen, Brush, Colo.

Rev. Petersen, a veteran of five and one-half years in the Army Chaplain's Corps, delivered an inspiring message, stressing the importance of high goals, which he held to be even more important than great achievement.

Dana Granted Title To Vets' Apartments On Lower Campus

The ten veterans apartments, located on the lower campus, officially became the property of Dana this summer, as the Public Housing Administration, under Public Law 796, signed over the title. Dana was the first college in this region to apply for transfer of title after the bill became effective.

Plans for improvement of the temporary buildings such as siding of white asbestos shingles, are being considered. At the present time, there is an ever-growing waiting list for the apartments.

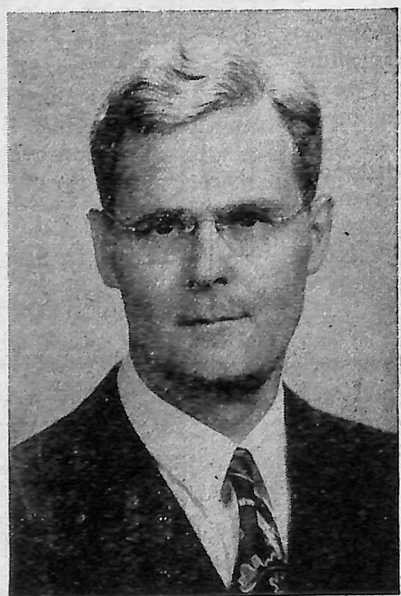
Election Bulletin

There is despair and hopelessness on the part of the vast majority of German people, who consider their nation little more than a vast concentration camp. In the Russian zone, especially among German professional people and intelligentsia, there is a spirit of defeat, according to reports from refugees. Pastor Nyholm spoke to a number of refugees from the Russian zone, and learned that behind the Iron Curtain there is a feeling that another war would be almost desirable, for the conditions there could hardly be worse. Against this background the church is working out an energetic program, and is meeting with an encouraging response.

After the first World War, the German cities were intact, and there was a longing for revenge; everywhere one sensed the attitude of a superior race. But today the average German looks defeated, dejected, apologetic, and though fearing war with Russia, still hopes for peace.

Dana Tops Tarkio 6-0 in the Season's Opener

Art Sorensen Tallies In Second Quarter For Viking Victory

The Dana College Vikings got off to a successful start in the 1948 football season last Friday night at Veterans Field by defeating the Tarkio Owls, 6-0.

Sparkling defensive play held the Owls throughout the game. The Dana victory avenged last year's stinging defeat at the hands of the Owls, and established the Vikings as a grave threat in the Nebraska Inter-collegiate Athletic Association.

The Vikings, capitalizing on a fumble midway in the second quarter, scored easily. Graham, the Owl quarterback, fumbled on the Purple and White 31 yard line; K. Christensen recovered for the Red and White. On the next play Sorensen went the remaining distance for a touchdown. Some clever faking by the other backs made this play successful, as the opponents were baffled until Sorensen was in the clear. The attempted conversion was blocked and the score stood, 6-0.

The rest of the second quarter was mostly defensive work on the part of Dana. Sorensen kicked off to Lawless, who returned the ball from Tarkio's 27 to the Owl's 42. After a series of ground plays, an exchange of punts, plus a fumble that gave the Owls the ball on Dana's 32 yard line, Tarkio threatened the Vikings for the first and last time. The Owls were on the Vikings 5 yard line at the half.

The third and final quarters were played mostly in mid-field. Not until the last quarter was almost over did the Vikings start to roll again. Starting on their own 38 yard line, the Red and White began to move with K. Christensen and Sorensen carrying the ball. Robinson brought the ball to the Tarkio 3 yard line on a pass. With three yards to go and time running out, Sorensen hit the center of the line, but was stopped about 2 feet from the goal line as the game ended.

The brilliant defensive play on the part of Pace, M. Andersen and Robinson was outstanding. Some of the newcomers to the Viking line-up showing great promise were Oberhofer, Bradley, Eriksen, and Connealy. The old stand-by Sorensen played his usual heads up ball game, as did Poh, Schou, Neary, Parker, and the rest of the team. Wilson's punting pulled the Vikings out of several holes.

Vikings Journey To Meet Fairbury In N. I. A. A. Tilt

Seeking their second victory in their eight game schedule, the Dana Vikings will journey today to meet the Fairbury Bombers under the lights at Fairbury. This will be the first conference tilt of the season for the Red and White gridders.

The probable starting line-up for tonight's game will be Laursen, left end; Pace, left tackle; A. Hansen, left guard; Schou, center; M. Andersen, right guard; Bradley, right tackle; Robinson, right end; Neary, quarterback; Connealy, left halfback; Madsen, right halfback; and Sorensen, fullback.

Coach "Red" Grovert's Bombers encountered the Concordia aggregation last Friday night, in a conference game, and defeated their opponents 19 to 12. Lavern Hadden, John Snyder, and Wayne Walsh racked up the tallies, for the Bombers.

Last Friday evening the Red and White, paced by a thrilling touchdown run by fullback Art Sorensen in the second quarter, broke a precedent by defeating the powerful Tarkio Owls at the Viking's home field in Blair, by the margin of 6-0.

Coach Peterson Announces Athletic Program

According to Coach Paul Peterson, Viking mentor, Dana College athletes will be able to participate in six major sports this year.

Besides the Tarkio game which has already taken place, and the one slated for tonight, the Red and White team have seven additional tilts on this fall's gridiron roster. The game which will take place next Thursday with Luther College marks a new test for Viking supremacy, as it is the first time in the school's history that a Dana College "B" team will face an opponent.

When the last helmets and shoulder pads are turned in after the Nebraska Central game and "Coach" issues the call to this year's Viking cagers, there will be a gruelling eighteen game schedule awaiting them. The season opener will take place with one of the Viking's oldest foes, the Midland Warriors, on the Frimont's home court. The lid will close on the season after the Dana-Nebraska Central tilt, which will take place on the Viking's home court.

Although the track, tennis, and golf meets are as yet unscheduled, it is likely that the Viking thinclads will participate in six

or seven meets. These meets will include dual and triangular contests and this season's conference matches which will be held in Norfolk with the cinderman of Norfolk Junior College as hosts.

Including the conference matches the Dana "racketeers" will have four or five tennis meets before them. Due to the absence of tennis courts on the campus there will be no home games.

After a successful season last year, the Viking baseball squad will have eight to ten games on this year's agenda. The home games will probably take place at Veteran's Field in Blair.

The most uncertain portion of this year's sports calendar concerns the golf team; as yet the situation is indefinite.

National Ashram Attracts Students From Dana

The 1948 LSAA National Ashram met at the National Music Camp in Interlochen, Michigan, from August 30 to September 5. Over 1100 students from every part of North America and from a dozen foreign countries including Sweden, Norway, Germany, Finland, Australia and China, made up the great Christian community.

Dana College was represented at the Ashram by Harriet Mortensen and Marvin Jensen, students from last year, and Paul Johnson and Norlan Hanson. The Dana LSA will hear more about the Ashram and will also have the theme, "If We Obey Him," as their guide for the school year.

Miss Irma L. Ihrke will be instructor of piano and professor of music education. After her graduation from the State Teachers College at Milwaukee, Wisconsin, Miss Ihrke completed graduate work at Northwestern University and a summer session at the Eastman School of Music.

Professor of sociology, Mr. Robert R. Jones, has received his M.A. degree in sociology and economics from the University of Iowa. He has also studied at Carroll College, The University of Chicago, and Iowa State Teachers College. Mr. Jones is a member of Alpha Kappa Delta, honorary sociological fraternity, and the Advisory Council of the Wisconsin State Archaeological Society.

Mr. George J. Lemmon, in addition to his work as professor of psychology, serves as Dean of Men. A native of Pennsylvania, Mr. Lemmon is a graduate of the University of Alabama and holds the M.A. degree from Northwestern University. Since 1946 he has been an instructor in the psychology department of the University of Arkansas.

Dana's new dean of women, Mrs. Stephanie Segard, has a background of experience as house mother at International House, University of Nebraska, which position she held last year, and a similar position at Mills College, Oakland, California. Her alma mater is the University of Nebraska.

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
