Late Pastor Wills 1200 Volumes to College and Seminary Libraries

The late Rev. Niels Hansen has willed more than 1200 volumes from his private library to the Dana College and Trinity Seminary Library. In the collection are rare old Bibles, books that are a study in the development of the art of printing; travel books describing the scores of nations visited by this Dana alumnus; books on the history of art, and books of fine steel etchings. Other volumes on the subjects of literature, theology, and Scandinavian history make this a fine addition to the campus libraries.

Assistant Instructor In Music Department Receives Degree

On the basis of a thesis entitled "Music in a Liberal Arts College," Melvin Widman has been granted a degree of Master of Music from De Paul University in Chicago, Illinois. This presentation was made February 13, at St. Vincents Church in Chicago at the time of their annual winter commencement.

Mr. Widman's greatest interest lies in advancement of Music in Liberal Arts Colleges, as his thesis states. He has had experience in teaching in all grade levels, having taught music in elementary, junior, and senior high schools.

Mr. Widman has been teaching at Dana since 1946. He is instructor in voice and director of the College A Cappella chorus which originated last year. He also directs the church choir at First Covenant Church in Omaha.

Dana Places Three In Who's Who on College Campuses

Three Dana seniors, Alice Rome, Paul Johnson, and Ray Johnson, appear in this year's *Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges*. They were chosen on the basis of scholarship, cooperation and leadership in academic and extracurricular activities, general citizenship and their promise of future usefulness after leaving school. Dana was allotted the nomination of one student for each one-hundred enrollees.

In 1885, Niels Hansen, a 19 year old Danish student arrived at Trinity Seminary. He was graduated from Trinity Seminary in 1888. Later he served as a pioneer pastor among Danish immigrants on the West Coast. For several years he was a pastor in his native Denmark, but later returned to America after spending some time in Italy.

Pastor Hansen died on June 24, 1946, at Blair, Nebr., where he was attending the Jubilee Convention of the synod and had delivered a sermon in the Dana Auditorium the preceding day. Interment was in Los Angeles, where he was making his home. Dana College and Trinity gratefully acknowledge a generous gift from a man whose life in America began and ended on College Hill.

Eleven Dana LSA's Attend Mid-Winter Training Conference

One hundred and twenty-five college students from the mid-West were present at the mid-winter training conference at Kearney, Nebraska. Of this group, Dana College was represented by eleven students. The theme of the conference was "Thy Will Be Done." The aim of the conference was to orientate LSA's to various projects being carried on by the LSA. Bob Larsen, the national LSA president, was the main speaker. His topic for the banquet speech Saturday night was, "Thy Will Be Done In and Through Me." Rev. Paul Bierstedt, secretary of the Student Service Commission, was also one of the main speakers. Sunday morning Rev. Bierstedt spoke on "New Obedience".

Miss Aldersen Speaks On Ancient Rome To History Club

On Friday evening, February 25, the History Club held its regular meeting in the Women's Reception Room. Miss Alderson of the Classical Language Department, showed the group her slides of Italy, with special emphasis upon the ruins of the Roman Forums. Included in the film *Dana and Trinity* are air views of the Missouri River as it flows through a curving channel near the Blair Bridge, views of Blair and the college campus. Back on earth again the camera records a journey through Blair showing some of the beautiful and comfortable homes which are so prevalent in this small city.

In addition to numerous scenes of the physical plant, scenes of the 1948 Homecoming are shown—the parade of floats to Veterans Field, the football game, and the dedication ceremonies of the new Administration-Library building.

In the past the Choir has sung concerts from coast to coast in the United States and once before, in 1936, visited many of the West Coast cities that are included in this year's itinerary. The Dana College Choir has also made two concert tours to northern Europe.

The concert program includes selections from the richest and deepest compositions of Bach, Palestrina, and their contemporaries and choral music from the liturgy of the Russian Church. Special arrangements of several familiar Danish hymns and selections from recent American composers of choral music complete the program.

Last year R. P. Keigwin, British poet known for his translations of Danish drama and poetry, prepared a translation of Grundtvig's hymn "The Church Bell" especially for the Dana College Choir. This year the choir sings Professor Neve's arrangement of the hymn both in English and in the original Danish.

Biology. During his student days, in the summer of 1939, he played professional baseball at Jamestown, New York.

After his graduation, he coached athletics at Craig High School, Craig, Nebraska, for one year. Then in 1942 he came to Dana as Coach of Athletics and Professor of Physical Education. During the war, from 1943 to 1945, he coached at Blair High as well.

In 1942 he married Ruth Hansen of Blair. The Petersons have two sons, Brian and Brent.

In summing up his philosophy of the teaching of athletics, Coach Peterson said:

"I have one pet peeve—I am waiting for the day when athletics will be promoted and conducted on a high moral plane so that it will be accepted as a vital part of our culture. Through fair play, sportsmanship, character development, and so forth, we can teach and learn the essentials of a democracy—the Christian philosophy of law and government.

"Athletics at Dana is almost up to the standard we want it to be. We would like to see an increase in the number of students participating, both on the inter-collegiate and intramural basis and here at Dana we do need greater facilities in order to increase this participation.

"One objective at Dana is to work for the development of a well rounded individual,—in athletics, in music, in the humanities. This is why we'd like to see every student participating in and supporting every activity in our college program."

A Christian Challenge

Here is our chance to give these students the education they desire, an education in a democratic nation.

Can we on this campus meet this Christian challenge? It is our duty. Remember: "Inasmuch as you have done it unto the least of these . . ."

A patriarch of the church is the Rev. Laurits Herman Kjoller. Born in 1868 in Nekso, Bornholm, Denmark, he came here to college in 1890 after a year in Chicago. He stayed at the Blair College until 1893, going to Weidner Theological Seminary during 1894. From 1895 to 1899 he was a student here at Trinity Seminary from which he was ordained in 1899; serving in the active ministry in Illinois, Minnesota, North Dakota, Iowa, Alberta, Canada, and Blair, until his retirement in 1939. After this he did work among the Indians at Oaks, Oklahoma, before coming as a guest in 1948 to the Good Shepherd Lutheran home in Blair. Married in 1894 the Kjollers had six children and today 80-year-old Rev. Kjoller has many grandchildren. This May the pastor is going to visit his home in Denmark for the third time. A gracious host, Rev. Kjoller recited memories of a lifetime during his interview with this columnist. Probably the most significant remembrance of his days at Dana was his study of U. S. History. Being fresh from Denmark he had to spend two to three hours at a time translating his American history lessons from English into Danish. He grew to love this course and knew it thoroughly. He especially likes to tell of the incident of the Civil War when Gen. Sheridan after a long hard ride by horseback, found his Union troops without a leader, retreating before a Confederate onslaught, cried, "Turn, turn boys! We are going back to win the battle." Christians should take heed of this deed of Sheridan's said Rev. Kjoller. All men of good faith must say when hard pressed by the foes of Christendom as today—"Turn, turn Christians! we are going back to win the good fight for Jesus."

An outscored, but not outfought, Dana basketball team was handed their third straight defeat of the year Monday night by the score of 51 to 47.

While Paul Laursen, who scored 14 points, was the high point man for the Vikes, it was lanky Jim Youmans who kept Dana in the ball game until the last half-minute. Bob Nelson (whose shoulder was still bothering him) played his dependable ball game in spite of his injury scoring 9 points.

Dana started the game by being colder than the weather. The fighting Vikings could scrape together only 7 points in the first quarter. Despite the fact that Dana began to play their usual aggressive ball in the second quarter, the Vikes remained behind by the count of 31 to 23 at the half.

Dana fans were given new hope in the third quarter as the home cagers began to tighten the Warriors' lead. The fact that Dana evened the count four times in the last quarter indicates the tightness of the game. The score was tied at 39-39, 40-40, 44-44, and 46-46.

Vikes Suffer First NIAA Defeat

Concordia's Bull-dogs handed the Dana Vikings their first N.I.A.A. conference defeat of the current season 42-40, Febr. 18 at Seward. Slim Doehrman, lanky Bull-dog center, sent the game into overtime with a free-throw in the last four seconds of play.

Concordia took an early lead, only to have it erased by the Vikings in the first quarter, and never took the lead again until the overtime period. The score seesawed during the first quarter with the Teachers opening the game with two quick baskets, to take a 4-0 lead. The Vikings came back with buckets by Bud Robinson, Paul Laursen, and Jim Youmans, to move ahead 6-4. The Teachers fought back and tied the score up 9-9 at the end of the first quarter. The second quarter was slow and sluggish with neither team doing much scoring. The Vikes pushed through six points, while holding the Bull-dogs to one goal. At the end of the first half, Dana held a 17-11 advantage.

The second half saw the Vikings build up a quick 13 point lead, with Jim Youmans and Har-McKercher leading the way. Then the Teachers led by Meyer closed the gap to 4 points; the score at the three quarter mark was 28-24 in favor of the Vikings.

The last stanza saw each team match shot for shot for the first nine minutes. The Vikings were leading 36-33 with less than a minute to play when Doehrman pushed in a two-pointer to make it 36-35, and then added a free throw to make the score 36-40 when the final buzzer sounded.

In the overtime period, Doehrman put the Teachers in the lead with a bucket in the first few seconds. Jim Youmans, lanky Dana center, tied the game up with a set-shot, and Bud Robinson added two more points with a pair of free throws, to give Dana the lead. Two quick clinchers, one by Hiemann, and another by Cloeter gave the Bull-dogs the tying and winning points.

Slim Doehrman led the Bull-dogs with 15 points. Jim Youmans was high point man for the Vikings, with 14 points.

Dana College cagers worked back into the victory column last Saturday night, by beating Milford Trade School 55-41. The victory ended the Danes three game losing streak and gave them their thirteenth win of the season.

The two teams seemed about even in the early minutes of the game, with the score being tied four times in the first six minutes of the game. Then the smooth working offense of the Danes began to work and the Trade School cagers were left behind. Paul Laursen dumped in twelve points in the first quarter to give the Vikes a 21-11 lead as the quarter ended.

The second quarter was marred by slow and sluggish play on both sides. The Vikings managed to push through ten points, while holding the visitors to six. This gave the Danes a 31-17 half-time advantage.

The second half saw both teams match basket for basket, with Jim Youmans contributing 11 points for the local team. Bob Hendrick led the way for the visitors with 8 points in the second half.

Paul Laursen, Viking forward, was high scorer of the evening, with 18 points; Bob Hendrick led the Milford attack with 16 points. Jim Youmans and Bud Robinson each contributed 13 points to the Viking victory.

Bob Nelson, regular starting guard was out most of the game because of a shoulder injury. Harry Conklin started in his place.

Coach Paul Peterson's Viking cagers clinched the N.I.A.A. conference title last Monday night at Central City, with a decisive 53-30 victory over the Central five. This victory gave the Vikes their first conference crown in the school's basketball history.

The Danes took an early lead on a push shot by Wilbur Clements in the opening minute of the game. John Andersen, the Quaker forward then tied the game up with a hook shot. At this point, baskets by Paul Laursen, Bob Nelson, and Clements gave the Vikings a lead that they held the rest of the game. The Danes led 13-3 at the end of the first quarter.

The Vikings continued their scoring in the second period and built up a quick 19-4 lead. As the half ended the "boys from the hill" held a 23-11 lead.

In the last half the Vikings, led by Bud Robinson, widened the gap to 36-21 at the end of the three quarter mark. Continuing on their scoring parade, the Danes ran the count up to 48-27 midway in the last stanza. At this point Coach Peterson sent in the reserves, who continued the scoring.

Bud Robinson was high point man for the Vikings with 17 points. John Andersen, Central's high scoring forward, who is leading the conference, led the Quakers, with 14 points.

Increased Competition For Positions Seen by Bureau of Labor

Record-breaking college enrollments since the end of the war will, in the next few years, result in increased competition for professional and administrative jobs, a Bureau of Labor Statistics report, prepared for Veterans Administration, revealed.

Vocational advisers and appraisers in VA guidance centers use the report as an aid in counseling disabled veterans planning to take courses of education or training.

Those who plan to go into office occupations, the report continued, should "consider specific training in this field, as many employers prefer workers with well-rounded business school or college business administration training to those with college degrees in liberal arts."

A veteran seeking advisement and guidance from VA "should be made aware of the competition which he is likely to meet in many fields," the report said. "He will be well-advised to consider more of the less-crowded though perhaps less-glamorous fields, and to take courses which will enable him to qualify for more than one type of job."
