## Chemistry Department Adds New Advanced Facilities

Parallel with Dana's growth has been the conversion of the former library reading room in Old Main into a physics classroom, laboratory, storeroom, and an office for the instructor, Mr. Lindberg. Included in the renovation is the complete replastering of the walls with a sand-finish surface. The ceiling is finished with color-fast Nu-Wood in variegated shades of tan. The entire laboratory has been rewired and a fluorescent lighting system installed.

Green "eye-ease" Transite chalkboards, illumined with Slimline fluorescent lamps, are an interesting and novel installation in the new laboratory. These chalkboards were manufactured in Dana's maintenance department.

Additional facilities include gas and electrical outlets and new laboratory work tables. Thermostatically controlled Unit Modine heaters have also been installed in the physics laboratory and in the entrance hall of Old Main. Suspended from the ceiling, and occupying only one square foot, this type of radiator is a space saver. Mr. Gerhardt Carlsen, head of the maintenance department, and Mr. Philip Larsen, a University of Nebraska graduate and former Dana student, were in charge of the remodeling work.

Further improvements have also been made in the chemistry department. A new quantitative analysis and physical chemistry laboratory, providing an individual locker and storage space for each student, now occupies the former office of Mr. Hengeveld. A fume hood and an electrophotometer have also been added here to the equipment in the quantitative analysis division.

During the summer, in addition to these improvements in the science divisions of Old Main, the walls and woodwork of the central hallways from first to fourth floor have been painted. Refinishing of the walls and ceilings and installation of new light fixtures is expected soon in the music practice rooms.

## Years of Research Go Into Biography

Fifteen years of research lie behind Dr. H. F. Swansen's new biography, "The Founder of St. Ansgar." Published during the summer the writing provides a detailed account of the life of Claus Laurits Clausen. Research was started by Dr. Swansen in connection with work on his doctor's degree at the University of Iowa. Many trips and visits were required to gather all the necessary material. Of great assistance was a visit to Rev. Svein Strand, a son-in-law of Clausen. Other material was obtained from historical societies, old newspaper files, and various diaries and journals from all over the country.

Dr. Swansen has been a history professor at Dana since 1932. His teaching career has been in the field of Christian education in the states of Minnesota, Wisconsin, Iowa, and Nebraska.

Claus Laurits Clausen, a Dane, did the major part of his work among the Norwegian immigrants, acting as their pastor, doctor, business advisor and friend.

## Students From 5 Nations and Nielsen Heads Public Relations; 19 States Enroll for Classes Hansen Added to Faculty

The hectic Freshman Week was completed without noticeable mishap, and the 1949-1950 school year is in full swing. Taking a look at the registration list it is apparent that the women will have "field day" this year. The fellows outnumber the women a little more than two to one. A count reveals the total standing at 166 fellows and 85 girls.

Especially unusual is the freshman class with the boys numbering 57, while the girls almost match them with a total of 55.

The fairer sex becomes more scarce with age, it seems. Forty-seven boys are enrolled as sophomores, while the girls failed miserably with a mere 15.

Thirty-one boys and 10 girls make up the junior class, while the graduating class of 1950 is composed also of 31 boys, but only five girls.

Two new personalities took their place on the Dana College staff with the opening of school here.

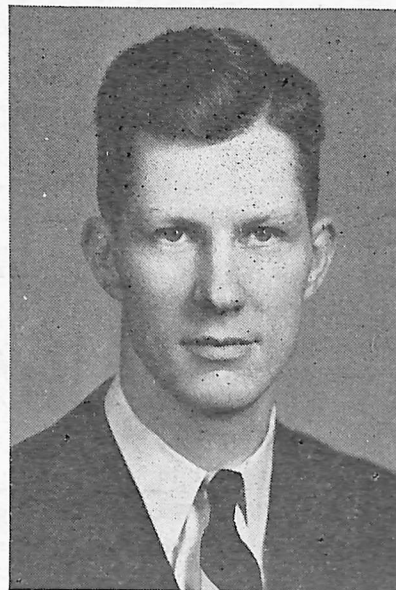
Mr. Homer Nielsen has assumed the position of Director of Public Relations. Coming from

## Students Join under L. W. F. Build Church for Germans

Twenty-three students from ten different countries worked together for two months this summer in southern Germany, helping to construct a church under the sponsorship of the Lutheran World Federation. There were six German students, six American students, one from Norway, Finland, France and Denmark, and six D.P. students; three from Latvia, one from Lithuania, Estonia, and Hungary.

The American students were selected by the Student Service Commission and each student financed his own trip to Europe. Norlan Hanson, seminary junior, was selected to work in the camp in Southern Germany, about 50 miles from Munich.

The purpose of this camp, in addition to building the church, was to help strengthen international understanding and cooperation between the Lutheran Student Christian Movements of these various countries. The project was centered around a spiritual emphasis and the forenoons were spent in Bible study, discussions and lectures by various men of the German church.

Two other such camps were also sponsored by the Lutheran World Federation in Germany this summer; one near Heidelberg helped to build a young people's camp from former slave-labor barracks and one in Lubeck helped re-lay part of the floor in the great Marienkirche. There were six Americans in each camp.

After the work camps, the students spent three weeks traveling in other European countries. Norlan visited Denmark, France and England. He plans to speak of his experiences at various meetings in the future.

## Glittering Generalities

This year we hope to maintain *Hermes* on the same high level of quality and character exhibited in this publication during the previous school year. In effect this means that our policy has not changed. ### Beanies or Buffs . . .

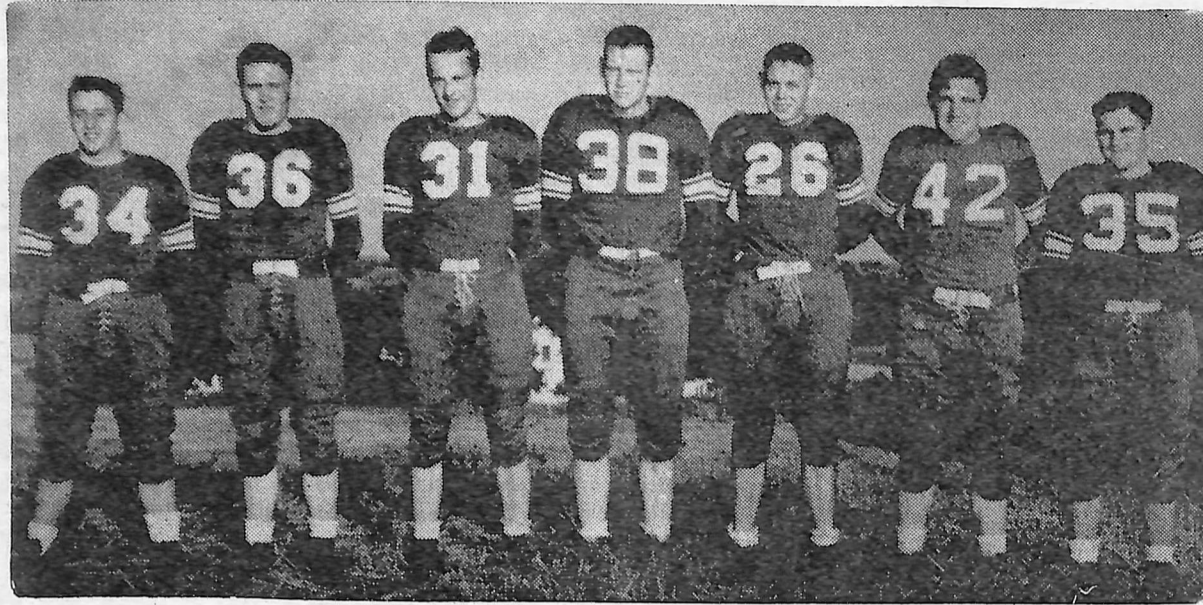

## Mark Thompson Scores In First Period For Vikings

Last Friday night the strong Tarkio eleven ran over the Dana Vikings 27-7 in the opening game of the season for both teams, at Tarkio, Missouri.

The Vikings drew first blood by pushing over their only touchdown in the early minutes of the first period. After recovering a Tarkio fumble on the Tarkio 33 yd. line, the Vikings began to roll. Mal Quick picked up 5 yards through the line, Ralph Fabricius added 9 more and the Mark Thompson skirted around right end for 19 yards for the Viking tally. Thompson plunged for the extra point and the Danes led 7-0.

The rest of the game was a Tarkio show of strength and superiority in both the offensive and defensive departments. The Owls pushed over two quick touchdowns in the first period. Dick Enz plunged over from One yard line for the first Owl score, and Doc Eaten went through from the seven yard line for the other tally. Both the extra points were made from placement.

Tarkio scored once more in the second quarter on an end run by Dick Flanagan. The extra point was missed. The fourth and final touchdown for the Owls was scored by Enz on a line plunge. The extra point was booted from placement to make the score 27-7.
