Lutheran Faculties Meet at Augustana

"Toward a Philosophy of Lutheran Higher Education" was the theme of the 13th Annual Conference of the Association of Lutheran College Faculties, which was held at Augustana College, Rock Island, Illinois, October 7-9.

Members of the Dana faculty who attended the Conference were Mr. Arthur C. Ranheim, Mr. Robert R. Jones, Dr. H. F. Swansen, Miss Lydia Hermann, Miss Irma Ihrke, Miss Nellie Falk, and Pres. R. E. Morton.

At an informal discussion it was found there was a decrease in enrollment at most of the schools whereas Dana had a 5% increase in enrollment. The 15% increase in enrollment of the freshman class at Dana was the outstanding increase of any of the schools represented at the Conference.

Bishop Lectures to Seminary; Banquet Honors Danish Couple

Bishop H. Fuglsang-Damgaard and his wife spent Wednesday, Oct. 12, on Dana's campus. Bishop Fuglsang-Damgaard gave two theological lectures in the Chapel on the topics, "The Church in the World Today" and "Christian Realism." The bishop also spoke in chapel on Friday morning and in the First Lutheran Church on Sunday morning.

Honoring Bishop and Mrs. Fuglsang-Damgaard, a banquet was given in the dining hall on Tuesday evening. In a brief after-dinner speech, the bishop emphasized the need for prayer and reading of the Bible. Mrs. Fuglsang-Damgaard, in her charming manner, sang a Danish song.

Dr. Fuglsang-Damgaard was elected bishop of the diocese of Copenhagen, Denmark, in 1934. The bishop of Copenhagen is the Primate of the Church of Denmark. Bishop Fuglsang-Damgaard is well known through a number of books, which he has written, and through his activity in international church organizations. During the occupation of Denmark, he remained faithful to his country's cause and, as a result of his activity, was compelled three times to go underground.

From Dana the Bishop and his wife will visit some of our churches in Iowa, as part of their trans-continental good-will tour to Danish-Americans in the United States and Canada.

Dana's D.P. Student, Brunonas Timpa, Arrives on Campus

On board October 4, when the "General C. C. Ballou" dropped anchor in New York, was Brunonas Timpa, Dana's Lithuanian D. P. student. He had finally arrived in the states after a difficult and tedious procedure. Smiling, fair-haired Brunonas was to have been at Dana in September for the opening of the fall term, but due to the course of action for immigrants his arrival was detained.

"Bruno" lived in the western section of Lithuania in the District of Taurage. It was here that he attended grade school for six years and one year at a Lithuanian high school. Following this he spent four years in a German secondary school while in exile there. "Bruno" is now enrolled as a Dana freshman taking a pre-seminary course.

And Then Comes Winter

In spite of continued efforts on the part of the administration to solve the parking problem, we still believe that parking on the campus is a horrible mess. We have many times observed instances of triple parking north of the heating plant; some continue to park by the corner of the Men's Hall at the entrance to the Quadrangle. Just as frequently cars are parked west of the prescribed parking lot before Pioneer Memorial.

We definitely do not advocate the drastic measure of assigning parking spaces, as we believe the students should be able to solve the parking problem themselves. On the contrary, we propose:

1. That the area west of the parking lot before Pioneer Memorial be fenced off to exclude parking;
2. That a traffic court be set up by the student council to deal with parking violators;
3. That we put teeth in the court's decisions by authorizing the court to impose on the violators a fine to be paid to a student body fund.

With the coming of winter, the parking problem will become even more acute unless definite action is taken immediately.

Why has President Truman refused to use the power of injunction granted him under the Taft-Hartley Act to prevent the strike in the steel industry? His answer is that he had done all he could to stop the strike and now he was through with it. Perhaps that is right, but isn't there just a bare possibility that he was afraid of offending labor with 1950 election coming up? Well, in any case a settlement must be found soon or lack of steel production will affect thousands of workers throughout the country.

President Truman seems to have a knack for filling his diplomatic posts with people who have had no training or experience for the work. First it was free-spending, party-throwing Perle Mesta, whom the President chose as minister to Luxembourg. Perle Mesta, is completely unqualified for the post, but that seems to make no difference to the president who insists upon rewarding and backing up his friends. One bad appointment, however, would be all right if it would stop there. But now he has picked Mrs. Eugenie Anderson, a Minnesota farm woman, as ambassador to Denmark. Look to Other Lands

How is the Church to live in the world of today? This is a question which confronts Christians in all continents. This is a question which must be answered by Christian students in every country. And the purpose of the international student work-study projects sponsored by Lutheran World Federation in Germany last summer was to help our Lutheran student Christian movements gain a clearer insight into the problem of helping and cooperating with each other in this great task.

When twenty-three students from ten countries come together for a common experience under the title of a work-project, there must be a motive stronger than a desire for adventure, cultural interchange or international friendship. The uniting force of such a project must be a common faith in Christ and fellowship which He alone can give. It was the desire for Christian fellowship which motivated those who took part in our camp. Regardless of our nationality or cultural background, we felt a common searching for the truth which would make our Christian living more meaningful.

In a work-camp you can not merely talk, study, work and pray together without experiencing and living the concepts of Christianity which you discuss. Because camp lasts only a couple months, you become a closely knit group quite quickly. The problems of your own Christian life are the problems of a German student or a Hungarian student and your intimate conversations bind you into close friendships.

A work-project is built on the idea of Christian service, not only in spiritual matters, but also in a physical capacity. As one of our group said, "I wanted to give my help. I have no money, but I can offer my labor." It was during the hours of hard digging that we learned to know each other better, and talked of conditions in our various countries.

The theme of our camp was "ora et labora"—pray and work and in that order, putting first things first. Our main scripture passage, which was put on the document for the corner stone, was I Cor. 3:11: "For no other foundation can any one lay than that which is laid, which is Jesus Christ."

Plans are being made for similar camps in Germany again next year, and anyone interested should contact Dr. Ruth Wick, Student Service Commission, Chicago, or see this writer for further information. The benefits far exceed anything you can imagine and more than makeup for the time and money which it takes.

We must be concerned about the life of the Church in our day, and as the future leaders of our Church we must not overlook the needs and problems of those in other lands.

Seminary and Visitors Hear Bishop Fuglsang-Damgaard

Speaking to seminary faculty and students and to visiting pastors Oct. 12, Bishop H. Fuglsang-Damgaard presented two papers, one on "The State of the Church in Denmark and Europe Today," the other on "Christian Realism."

In his first paper, "The State of the Church in Denmark and Europe Today," he contrasted the church in Denmark and Sweden, which enjoyed peaceable conditions, with the church in much of the rest of Europe during unprecedented times of catastrophe. The bishop outlined several reasons for the empty churches in Denmark and Sweden. Among these are the mechanistic philosophies which are still prominent in Europe; a newly awakened interest in sports and secular activities which uses Sunday forenoon for many of its functions; rationalism has emptied the churches, and the ground has not been regained; people do not use the activities of the church; and the prevailing de-Christianizing influence of the day. He suggested that there are areas in which an awakening seems forthcoming, for example, the increase of lay witness in Denmark.

Other reasons for de-emphasis of Christianity in general are that materialistic and naturalistic influences say that the Christian concepts are imaginary; that the European mind has no longer any conception of sin and the Ten Commandments; that the real tragedy of the church is that it has become worldly; that the Protestant Church has never had the courage to resist modernism as has the Roman Catholic Church. Further the Bishop suggested that a remedy for the worldliness of the church is to realize that Christianity is above the age, must rule the age, and not give in to it. **A new spirituality should be coming which means not a retreat, not condemnation of the world, but which will share and enter into the social life of the people. He went on to apply the great commandment so that love of God will result in love of man which will save the world by inspiring a creative love.**

In his second lecture "Christian Realism," the Bishop stated that his purpose was to present Christian realism in a Christian view on the background of the church today. He said that realism is a counter-movement against rationalism; that Christianity is a way of life, not merely a teaching; that Christianity is an approach to conformity; and that works are necessary. He quoted Kirkegaard who said that love of neighbor and works are necessary outcomes of Christian faith.

The Bishop stated three basic elements for Christian realism; the world is the creation of God, Christianity as a religion is an incarnation, and Christianity is based in the resurrection and carries messages of the new heaven and earth to come.

An important purpose of Christian realism is to get secular-minded people to apply Christianity to the social and political problems of today, said the Bishop. Further, Christian realism tries to confess the humanity of Jesus Christ. Christ is not an idea but a living contemporary reality. Christ binds us to himself in order to bind us to our fellowmen. Also, according to Kirkegaard, faith and love belong inseparably together. Telling of the Christian realism in the Greek Orthodox and Roman Catholic churches, he pointed out that it should also find fertile ground in the Lutheran church. To quote the Bishop: "If Christianity is to make any contribution to this world, it must be just as active as the world of hate." **"Christianity is not just a phase or part of life, but it is the life; only if it is accepted as real, can Christianity be a reality."**

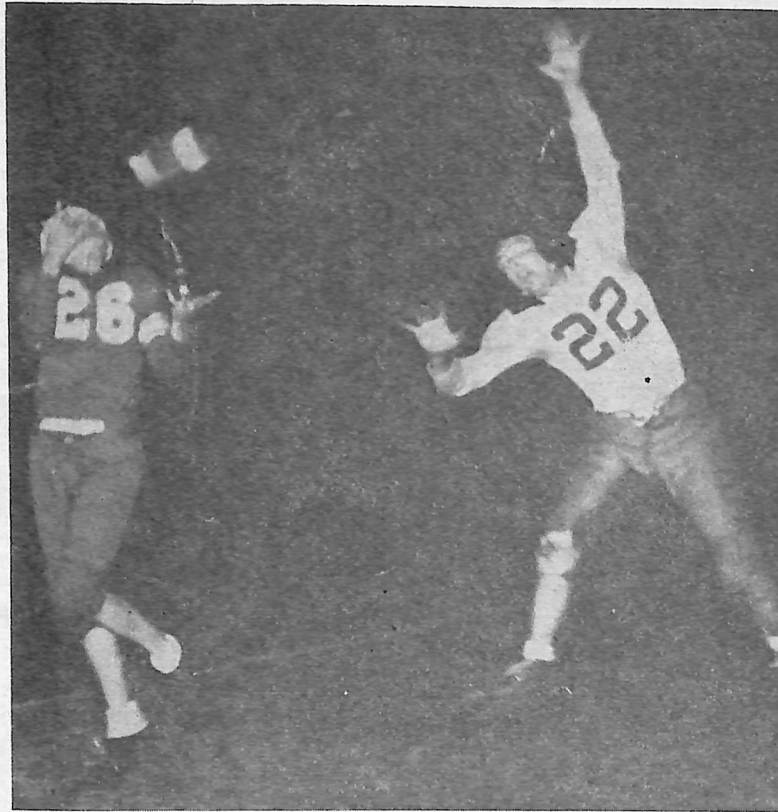

Playing their first conference game of the season, the Dana football squad posted a decisive 21-6 victory over Luther College at Wahoo, Nebraska. **Luther scored their only touchdown early in the first period on a recovered fumble, after which the Dana team bounced back fighting and scored two times before the quarter ended.** The other tally came in the third quarter on a pass from Mark Thompson to Bud Robinson. A bus load of Dana students traveled to Wahoo for the game and cheered the team on to their first win of the season. This game set the pattern of things to come in the way of aerial strategy by the Dana squad. Of 13 passes attempted, 4 were completed for an average of 15 yards per pass with one interception.

Vikings Break Norfolk's Streak

The Dana Vikings snapped the Norfolk Blackhawks 14 game winning streak at Norfolk, September 21. This victory gave the Vikes their second conference win in as many starts this season, and labeled them as a strong contender for the NIAA grid title.

The Danes lost no time in scoring their first touchdown of the game. They scored early in the first quarter on a 44 yard aerial from Mark Thompson to Paul Laursen. Thompson's plunge for the extra point was good and the Vikes led 7-0 at the end of the first quarter.

The Blackhawks came fighting back in the second quarter, and scored on Don Kellogg's eight yard pass to Bob Brockhaus. The try for the extra point failed and the Vikings led 7-6 at the half.
