Queen Jeanette is one of our "returnee" students, having been here in '45-'47. She then left Dana to do secretarial work, but has returned to join the class of '51. This bark-brown haired, green-eyed Miss is a commercial arts major and takes an avid interest in sports, being an especially ardent basketball enthusiast. The greater part of her twenty-one years has been spent in Nebraska; but most important, we think, is that she decided to spend four of them at Dana.

Marilyn, in the class of '51, is a psychology major and because of her love for children intends to teach upon graduation. She spent her first year at Lewis and Clark College in Portland, Oregon, but came to Dana at the beginning of her sophomore year and has held scholastic honors ever since. Delivering the main Homecoming address tomorrow evening at the third annual Homecoming banquet in the auditorium will be the Rev. Adolph Kloth. A graduate of Dana College and Trinity Theological Seminary, the Rev. Kloth is now serving the parish of the First Lutheran Church in Fremont, Nebr. The banquet program and the address will center about this year's Homecoming theme,

Immediately following the program, an informal social hour has been arranged in the Women's Reception Room.

Leading the parade of floats Saturday afternoon will be the Queen of Homecoming and her two attendants. Leaving Dana hill at 1:30, the parade will wend its way through town to Veterans' Field for the Viking battle with Fairbury Junior College at 2:30. Freshmen are eagerly looking forward to half-time when they will be allowed to discard their beanies and become full-fledged Danians.

Worship services will be held Sunday morning in the College Auditorium with Dr. C. C. Madson of the seminary faculty as speaker and the Rev. R. E. Morton, l'turgist. In the afternoon, climaxing the reunion of alumni and friends, will be the visiting of the various campus buildings, including the men's and women's residences.

Final preparations have been made to receive the five hundred expected guests including alumni, faculty, students, and friends of Dana. Marie Hurdum, Dining Hall hostess, and her staff are preparing the meal which will be served buffet style in the Recreation Room. Later the guests will be seated upstairs. The serving will be done by the Lutheran Guild of First Lutheran Church assisted by girls from the high school.

The program will include a speech by the Secretary of the Alumni Association, Mr. Homer Nielsen, Director of Public Relations, and a vocal solo by an alumna from Mapleton, Ia., Mrs. Viggo Carlsen. A piano solo by

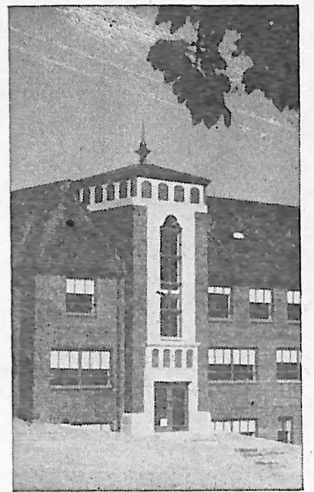
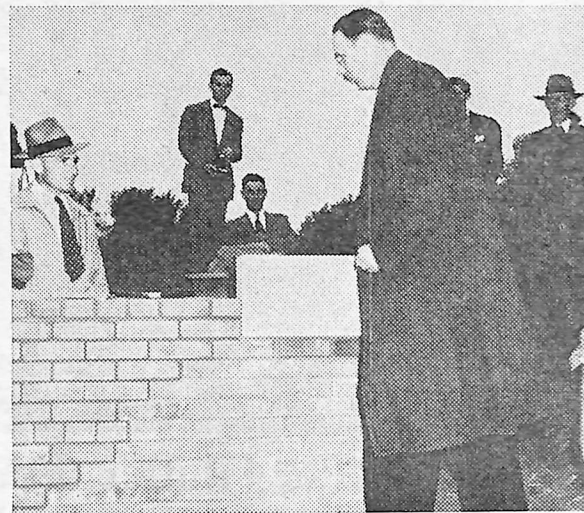

Present Day Homecoming Has Developed From Annual Spring Society Festival

We today have our Homecoming weekends of happy reunion, fun, and sleepless nights as a result of the efforts of two literary societies, the Dannevirke and the Hesperian Literary Society. For these two literary societies, one Danish and the other English, it was customary to have an annual festival each spring. A program was held in the chapel and guest speakers were invited. These programs were followed by refreshments and entertainment in the gymnasium. As years passed on, the celebration gained in prominence; alumni and friends all made an effort to take part. From this festivity developed the plan to organize an official Homecoming celebration for all former and present Dana students. Basketball games, programs, and banquets were planned.

One of the first prominent homecomings to be remembered opened on Friday evening, February 25, 1927, featuring a lyceum artist. Saturday events were a basketball game, weiner roast and banquet.

Another milestone in the history of Dana had been reached when, in 1923, the new gymnasium was dedicated. The cherished hopes of the Alumni Association to erect some worthy memorial to express its love for and continued interest in its alma mater had been attained. Upon their return to Dana in 1931 the alumni were happy to hear that a new pipe organ had been recently purchased by our school. This was made possible by the liberal financial gift of Mr. Moeller, the manufacturer of the organ.

In later years it was decided that it would be better to have our Homecoming celebration in the fall, thus permitting a greater number of alumni to be present. Due to this change in season, football was

taken up instead of basketball at these annual games.

The total eclipse of the moon following the victorious football game with Hebron was not soon forgotten from the 1939 festivities. This does not necessarily indicate the relationship of cause and effect. The next year proved to be equally as interesting when homecomers were privileged to have excerpts from the classical opera "Mignon," presented in English by the Omaha Association for Opera.

The formal banquets previous to this year had been dinners in the Dining Hall, but in 1946, because of lack of space and scarcity of food a buffet luncheon was served in the College Gymnasium.

The 1947 Homecoming weekend proved to be an-

other notable one in Viking history. Ruth "Pinkie" Solevad was crowned "Queen" at a half-time ceremony during the football game on Saturday. This was the first year Dana had her "Queen of Homecoming," but it was to become an annual event in the future. An added attraction at the half was a feminine version of a football game. The laying of the cornerstone of the new library-administration building, Pioneer Memorial, on Sunday was a thrill to students, alumni, and friends, for this progressive step was for them a dream come true.

In 1948, Alice Romer reigned as Queen, having been crowned at a coronation ceremony on Friday evening. On Sunday afternoon, 2060 Dana friends attended the dedication of Pioneer Memorial, now ready for use only one year after the laying of the cornerstone.

So through the years of Dana's history, the celebration of Homecoming has grown with the institution, until it has become an established tradition and one of the most prominent features on the present college calendar.

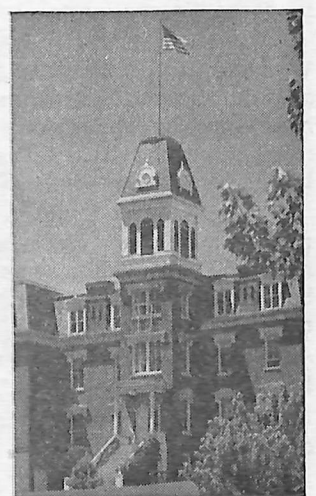

Vikes Undefeated in Conference Play

Vikings Tie For Conference Lead, Beat McCook 26-6

Coach Peterson's Vikings from Dana Hill showed their ability to bounce back as they unleashed a devastating attack to administer a sound 26 to 6 thrashing to the McCook Indians. It was Dana's third conference win in as many starts.

Dana laid the pattern for the rest of the game midway in the first quarter. A McCook fumble was recovered by Dana on the Indian's 35 yard line. On the next play, Mark Thompson, the Viking's "mercury-footed" half-back, slashed over tackle to go all the way for the first touchdown of the game.

Dana tallied twice in the second period, once on a flat pass from Jackson, the Dana quarterback, to Thompson and again on a pass from Thompson to Bud Robinson. Ralph Fabricius and Leonard Jackson added the two extra points via the plunge route.

Dana came back strong in the third quarter by taking the kick-off and marching in a sustained drive from their own 25 yard line. This drive was capped by Thompson's 11 yard caper for the Viking's final tally.

McCook's score came late in the final quarter. Aman, an Indian halfback, pirated a Thompson pass on the Viking 43 yard line and chased it back to Dana's six yard stripe. A penalty set the Vikings back to their own one yard line and Aman crashed over from there. The attempt for extra point from placement was blocked by Dana's Lenny Christensen.

The McCook running attack which had baffled the Dana team in the 1948 contest, did not puzzle Dana in this year's contest. Dana's line held the McCook backs well in check for the entire game.

The victory, sweet as it was, also left a sour taste in many of the Viking followers. Ray "Garbone" Christensen, the bruising tackle from Racine, Wis., aggravated an old knee injury and will not be available for the important Homecoming contest against Fairbury.

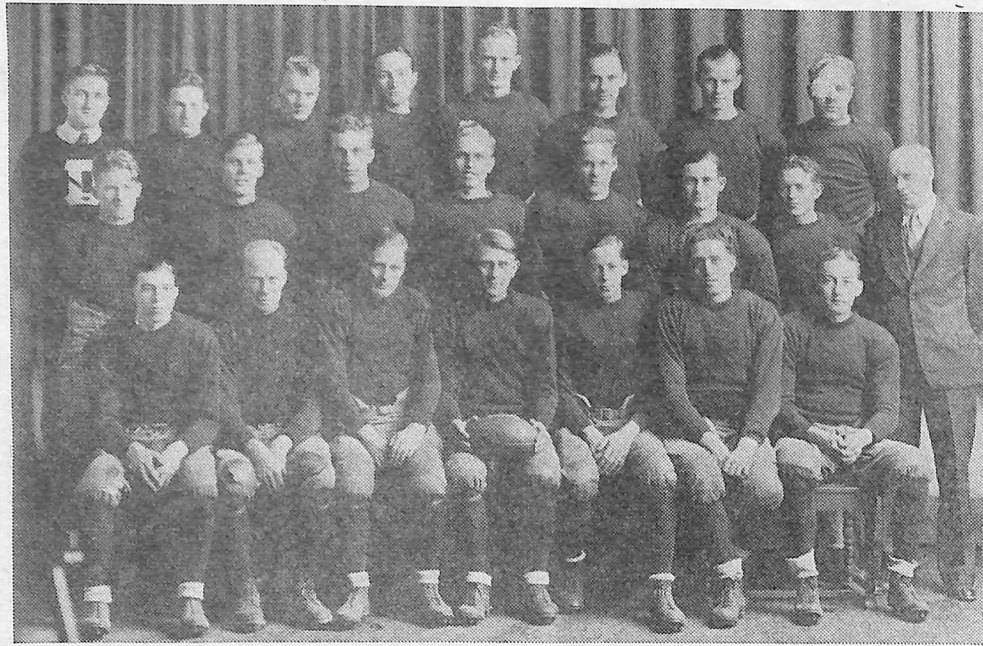

Vikings in Review

In keeping with the Homecoming theme for this issue your editors have chosen to take a peek into the past. For the majority of our material prior to 1934 we must give credit to a publication published for the 1934 Homecoming. This pamphlet was published by the Athletic Department at the time that Rufus Olson was the Dana Coach. Much of the material was collected by Einar Vig, Charles Gaydou, and Marcus Beck.

Some Firsts at Dana . . .

Mert Jensen, now residing near Blair, is given credit for being the first Viking to cross the opponent's goal line in inter-collegiate competition . . . in 1928.

The first Football game here on the Hill was played in 1897. The tilt occurred on Christmas day with Blair YMCA. Dr. C. X. Hansen served as coach for the group.

Basketball was introduced to the campus in 1900. Much blood flowed. For further information consult Charlie Gaydou, Blair hatchery-man.

The first inter-collegiate BB game was four years later against Boyles College of Omaha. Dana won, but the score is unknown.

The year 1911 was the first year that spectators were not privileged to watch basket-ball games here at Dana while standing on the playing floor . . . then seats were provided.

Rev. A. M. Andersen, the founder of Dana College witnessed his first basketball game in 1911. Dana tromped Woodbine, Ia., 67-12. He picked the right game. . .

Dana College won its first and only conference football championship in 1930 while they were a member of a four team conference. This conference was composed of Luther, Concordia, and Hebron. Dana defeated Hebron 13-7, Concordia 7-0, and lost to Luther 6-0 in conference play.

The first of the Fairbury-Dana clashes was played at Blair in 1941, the final score. . . 0-0. Since then the Vikings and the Bombers have met four times; the Bombers won 7-0 in '42, in 1946 after a war-time recess the Vikes played them to a 20-20 tie, Fairbury took the 47 contest 6-0, and last year the Vikings won 21-0. What about this year?

Track made its first appearance as college sport on the Dana Campus in the spring of 1946. Since then this sport has grown to a major activity with more and more athletes taking part every year. Last year the Vikings participated in the first annual Doane Relays at Doane College, Crete, Nebraska, and brought home two first, three seconds and a third.

Here's Some Things to Think About . . .

We have heard that during the years 1910-14 the Vikings lost only five BB games. We want your help. If any of you Alumni are able to furnish any additional information on this matter it would be appreciated. This would have been a terrific record, and we would like more dope on it.

Harold Hurd scampered 82 yards for a touchdown in a game against Concordia. In 1937, Elden Farrens ran 82 yards against York. To our knowledge this is the school record . . .

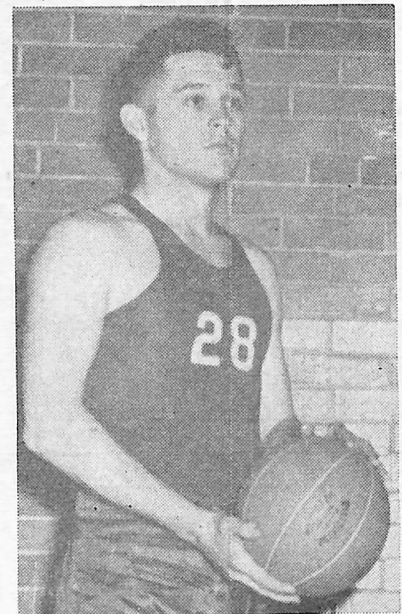
However, Mert Jensen once intercepted a pass and trotted nearly the length of the field—92 yards—but the play was called back because of a penalty.

In 1937, in the Dana-Globe Trotter game, there were no personal fouls called. Two of the present faculty members played on the foul-free Vikes—Paul "Pete" Petersen and Homer "Hot-shot" Nielsen. Pete scored six points, while Homer came shooting through with four. No hard feelings. . . .

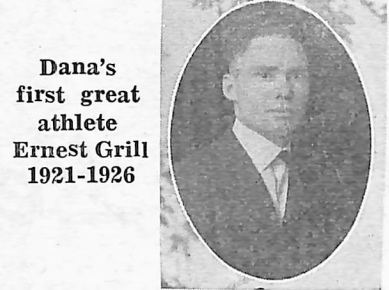
When the coming BB season begins and Kenny Christensen dons the Red and White—Will he be the tallest Viking athlete in the school's history? Kenny stands at 6' 10.

In passing we noticed this comment in the 1934 Homecoming publication: "Sy Andersen played two years on the Dana varsity and attempted one field goal, missing."

Here's something to argue about? Who has been Dana's outstanding athlete? In 1934 the votes seemed to be for Rev. Ernest Grill, but what do you think? Let us in on it too! We have some others to submit. How about Rev. Wes Andersen, who played 23 consecutive football games without leaving the games? Or . . . our present Coach—Pete Peterson—who's record is a good one? Or . . . in more recent years—Art "Scatback" Sorensen? Or . . . Bud Robinson, who has won 11 letters here at Dana, and has a year of competition left—which should add four more to the list?



Bud Robinson 1946-



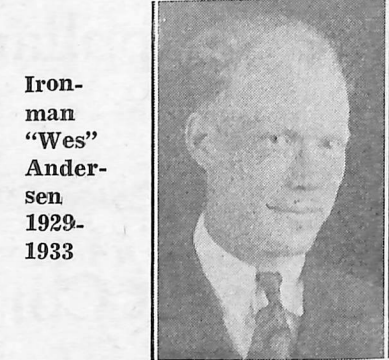
Dana's first great athlete Ernest Grill 1921-1926
