Planting Begins at "Old Main" on Alumni Landscape Project

Work has begun on the landscaping of the area around "Old Main." This project is being sponsored and financed by the Dana College and Trinity Seminary Alumni Association.

Evidence of the undertaking is seen by the planting of shrubs and bushes on three sides of the building. Trees have also been planted at intervals on the lawn, and they also line the east side of the drive-way behind Old Main. Of major interest is a 20-year-old pin oak tree which was planted in the square between the wings of the building. The work has been done by Marshall Nursery.

The Alumni Association has launched a three-year project, planning to spend \$500 per year. This has been delayed so far, but the progress should be on schedule from now on.

Students were watching the beautification with interest and anticipation; appreciative of this alumni contribution.

Changes in Faculty For 1950-51 School Year Announced

A number of changes in faculty personnel will take place when the 1950-51 school year opens Sept. 5. Two professors, Mr. Frank Hengeveld and Mr. Arthur Lindberg, have been granted a year's leave of absence to carry on graduate work at the University of Nebraska. They will return to Dana in September, 1951. No one has yet been elected to fill their places for the next school year. On the Trinity Seminary staff Prof. Paul Nyholm has been granted a semester's leave of absence. He will spend the first semester at the University of Chicago and do research work to complete requirements for his Ph.D. degree.

Three of the present faculty members will not return to Dana next fall. For a number of years the demand for courses in Latin has decreased steadily, until the Board of Education considered it necessary to drop Latin from the curriculum. This elimination of Latin is the reason Miss Alderson will not be on the staff next year. Greek will be taught by Mr. Hanson who has also taught Greek before.

The music staff will be reduced to two members as a part of an economy measure adopted by the Board of Trustees. Mr. Widman will be absent from the voice department when school opens next fall. A Dana alumnus, of the class of 1948, Mr. Richard Videbeck, who received his master's degree from Nebraska in June, 1949, and who will have completed the course work for a Ph.D. degree at Michigan by Sept. 1, will teach sociology and assist Mr. Rasmussen in psychology.

One department long unmanned will receive assistance next year. A major in physical education will be inaugurated beginning next fall, and to carry out this program and to assist Coach Peterson in athletic and intramural activities, an assistant coach will be added to the staff.

Beck and T. Cruz Are Winners of Langland Award

With the distribution this week of the 1950 Sower, the names of the winners of the annual Langland Award were revealed.

John T. Beck, senior, of Fremont, Nebr., received the twenty-five dollar award in prose for his stories "Korean Christmas," "The Searching Eyes," and "Swan Swanson's Revenge."

Tony R. Cruz, senior, of Blair, received the twenty-five dollar poetry award with his "Gods of Today," "That is You," "Innocence," "That is Easy" and "Blues." On the basis of his prose and poetry selections appearing in the Sower, Tony has been offered a summer scholarship to the Creative Writers Workshop at the University of Wyoming.

The current edition of the Sower is the largest in size thus far and contains 72 pages. The works of 19 students appear in this issue.

Responsible for this year's issue were Peter L. Thorslev, Jr., editor; John T. Beck and Herbert A. Hjortsvang, associate editors; Paul Skovlund, business manager; Ann Thomsen and Helen Dell Halstead, typists. Faculty advisors were Miss Viola M. Thiel and Miss Nellie F. Falk.

Choir Plans Tour of Northeastern U. S. This Fall

(JS)—The Dana College a Cappella choir is planning to break precedent by making its annual tour this coming fall rather than in the spring as has been the procedure in the past. Plans for the tour, which will take the choir to more than 14 states and Canada, are well under way and the tentative itinerary is very impressive.

Professor Neve has been working with the choir on the new numbers to be included in the fall program.

The choir will leave Dana on Nov. 9, and by the time it returns Nov. 29, it will have toured a major portion of northeastern United States.

The 48 members together with Director Paul Neve and Public Relations Director Homer Nielsen will make their first stop at West Branch, Ia. From there on the tentative schedule looks like this: St. Louis (or vicinity); Terre Haute, Ind.; Indianapolis; Capital University at Columbus, Ohio (ALC college); Washington D. C.; New York; Boston; Portland, Me.; Troy, N. Y.; Penn Yan, N. Y.; Toronto, Canada; Detroit; Greenville, Mich.; Chicago; Augustana College at Rock Island, Ill.; and finally Des Moines, Ia.

11 Danians Receive Certificates; 5 Seminarians Graduate

Fifty-four students will receive degrees or terminal certificates at the commencement exercises to be held in the college auditorium, Sunday, May 28, at 3 P.M. Forty seniors will receive the B.A. degree, and three, the B.S. degree.

Eleven other Danians have completed work for the Two-year Teacher's Certificate, and the One-year Secretarial Certificate.

Nine states and one foreign country are represented by this largest graduating class in Dana's history—Nebraska, 19 seniors; Iowa and Wisconsin, six each; Colorado, three; California, Illinois and Maine, two each; Michigan and Minnesota, one each; Colombia, South America, one.

The largest class of four-year graduates in Dana's history will hear the Rev. Edward Nervig, Director of Publicity of Augustana College, Sioux Falls, S. Dak., give the afternoon Commencement address in the college auditorium, Sunday, May 28, at 3 P.M. The Rev. E. R. Andersen of Racine will be the speaker at the 11 A.M. Baccalaureate service, also to be held in the auditorium.

After his graduation from Luther Theological Seminary, St. Paul, Minn., in 1942, before coming to Augustana, Nervig served a parish in Colorado Springs, Colo., until 1945.

He is at present the president of the Lutheran Faculties Association and the South Dakota Public Relations Association, executive secretary of the Greater Augustana Association, and public relations advisor for the South Dakota Educational Association.

The Rev. E. R. Andersen is now serving as Lutheran Welfare Chaplain and City Mission Pastor in Racine.

Pre-Med Students Advised to Maintain High Standards

Students planning a career in medicine are advised not to rely on a "last minute spurt" in their college days to get themselves into medical school. According to recent observations gleaned by Prof. Frank Hengeveld from the Admission's Committee of the U. of N. Medical School, the committee is interested in maintaining the higher standards set by the more mature students who have attended during recent years.

They will consider closely the student's previous scholastic standings to determine if his record shows what might be called a "last minute spurt" of high grades during his last or last two previous years, rather than a sustained high record. The former "does not impress the committee."

The "Pre-Med" should have the fundamental concepts of mathematics well in mind and usable rather than a great knowledge of higher mathematics.

He should also be sure that he wants a career in medicine when he applies for medical school. It is not the place to "shop around." That should be done previously on the undergraduate level.

After hearing recorded excerpts from some of President Truman's speeches one wonders how he has become president. Actually I guess there isn't too much to wonder about. Practically every informed person should know by now the twisted political path he has followed in order to get where he is. There are so many indictments against him and his administration that I for one as an American citizen am ashamed to admit it. **However, if the Republican Party is to make advances against the present administration it will do well not to harp so much on its shortcomings but rather come up with a strong vital program which will meet the needs of this country and the world.**

After weeks of charges that communists dominate the State Department, counter charges, and committee hearings most of the American public is somewhat confused about the whole matter. It is difficult to know who and what to believe. Even many of those who disagree with Senator McCarthy's methods still feel that there is some truth in his charges. With all the fuss being made over this matter the real threat to our way of life is being overlooked, viz., the dangers of an unbalanced budget and increasing socialism. In my opinion Truman insults the intelligence of the people when he classes all opponents of his Fair Deal socialism with reactionaries of yesterday who resisted all reform programs and measures some of which were admittedly desirable. Socialism with its attendant evils of high taxation, bureaucracy and waste is only a whistle stop on the road to a totalitarian state.

However, let us place the blame where it belongs and that is with the American people. We have the means and prerogative to improve the quality of our government but how many exercise that right? Especially we seniors who are soon to take our place in various communities should feel a special obligation as leaders to actively participate in local, state and federal government.

All Lutheran Spanish Literature Conference Meets

An all-Lutheran Conference on Spanish Literature and Publication met in Puerto Rico May 1-5, 1950, under the auspices of the Continuing Committee on Spanish Publication of the ULCA.

Delegates from the Missouri Synod, the ULCA, the ALC, and the ELC-UELC mission fields and boards participated. The World Mission Prayer League had planned to send Miss Ruth Temple as its delegate, but much to our regret we received word that she and her colleagues had been forced to flee out of Mexico due to a wave of persecution, and consequently could not attend. At the time of writing, Miss Temple was in Los Angeles. Special prayer was offered at the Puerto Rico Conference for this mission and also for our Colombia Mission.

An unusual spirit of unanimity and purposeful enthusiasm was sensed among this so varied a group of delegates from all of the Synods working among Spanish-speaking people from New York to Buenos Aires, who for the first time in history met to consider the urgent need for more effective coordination of effort in the production and circulation of Spanish Christian literature. Papers were presented by delegates on the various aspects of Christian literature, radio, audio-visual aids, etc. The needs and possible ways of meeting them were considered in free discussion. We submit here only a summary of the findings and resolutions of the Conference.

A resolution was prepared to be submitted to the American Bible Society requesting the revision of the widely-used Spanish Reina-Valera version of the Bible and the preparation of a version in modern speech of the Old Testament to accompany in one volume the excellent Spanish American version of the New Testament already in use.

The desirability of a common Lutheran hymnal for Latin America was also discussed with great interest, and recognized by all delegates.

The Conference also recognized "as a desirable ultimate goal the establishment and maintenance of a joint Spanish editorial office by the several Lutheran bodies conducting missionary work among Spanish Americans . . . coordinating the program of Lutheran publication in this field and overcoming effectively the duplication of effort and the other shortcomings that characterize the present situation."

Furthermore, until this can be attained, immediate coordination in the way of inter-mission consultation and the circulation of manuscripts for critical reading before publication will eliminate much of the duplication of effort and insure wider distribution of publications.
