Noted Theologian Discusses Communism vs. Christianity

Dr. Sverre Norborg, noted theologian, writer and lecturer, spoke to the students and faculty of Dana College and Trinity Seminary on Monday, September 19th and Wednesday, Sept. 21st. Wednesday afternoon he gave a lecture in Pioneer Memorial entitled "The Coming Clash Between Atheistic Communism and Prophetic Christianity."

In his speech on Wednesday afternoon, Dr. Norborg said that our State Department has the American people fooled four ways. They want us to believe that Great Britain is a first rate power, that the Vatican is an important power, that the Marshall Plan is aiding European countries to combat Communism, and finally, that the Atlantic Pact is a necessary link in our defense against the spread of Communism. He predicted that there will eventually be a general revolution in Europe, after which the Soviet Union and the Vatican will fall.

Dr. Norborg stated that we must not underestimate the strength of Russia. He saw many Russian prisoners of war, and they all had pride in the fact that they were going home to the motherland. The outstanding characteristic of each of them was their primitive strength. Dr. Norborg said, "It is of primitive strength that empires are built."

He said, "It is foolish for us to fight Korean Wars in various areas of the world when we can end the war in forty-eight hours by dropping Atomic Bombs on the Russian oil fields." This would cripple Russia and at the same time it could not be called a brutal attack.

Most of the European countries lack initiative. "The United States is the only strong power left in the world outside of the Soviet Union because we are the only people who still have a desire to work."

One of the reasons for the decay of Europe is the turning away from religion by its people. Many of the large churches in Europe have only a small group attending their services. In Stockholm 94 per cent of the population did not attend church on Christmas. The people must turn to God for a rebirth.

Dr. George Aus to Be Homecoming Speaker

Speaker at the Saturday night banquet will be Dr. George Aus, professor of theology at Luther Seminary in St. Paul. Dr. Aus, who has been tabbed "the silver-tongued orator of the E. L. C.," will speak on the homecoming theme.

Official activities begin when the Viking gridders tackle traditional rival, Midland, at Veterans Field Friday night. The 1950 Homecoming Queen will be crowned during half-time ceremonies.

An alumni meeting, open house, athletic field dedication and a choir concert are on the agenda for Saturday morning and afternoon. The day will be climaxed by the banquet in the evening.

The Homecoming committee urges students to inform their homecoming guests to send reservations in by October 15, because of the anticipated crowd.

Four New Members Join Faculty Staff

Four new teachers have been added to the faculty of Dana College. They are Mr. Milton Brostrom, Mr. Keith Skogman, Mr. Richard Videbeck, and Miss Helen Williams.

Mr. Brostrom, who is filling Mr. Lindberg's place while he is on a leave of absence, is the mathematics and physics teacher. He received his college education at Gustavus Adolphus College in St. Peter, Minnesota, where he received his B.A. in 1949. His Master's degree was acquired at the University of Minnesota.

Another graduate of Gustavus Adolphus is Mr. Skogman. He is the new assistant coach and physical education professor. After graduating from Gustavus Adolphus, he went on to receive his Master's degree at the University of Iowa.

Mr. Videbeck is an old-timer at Dana. He received his B.A. from Dana in 1948. His graduate work was done at the University of Nebraska, where he received his Master's and he also did graduate work at the University of Michigan. He is now teaching sociology and psychology.

Last of all comes the only new teacher of the fairer sex. She is Miss Williams, our chemistry teacher, who is filling Mr. Hengeveld's vacancy while he is on a leave of absence. After graduating from St. Olaf College, where she received her B.S., she went on with her graduate work at the University of Minnesota.

Trinity Seminary Opens New Term

Monday evening, Sept. 11, at First Lutheran Church was the official opening of the '50-51 school year of Trinity Seminary. In this consecration service Dean Theodore I. Jensen brought a message from God's Holy Word on His call for workers in His Kingdom. (John 15:16). The climax of the service was the reception of Holy Communion.

On Wednesday afternoon, Sept. 13, the seminary gathered to hear Rev. S. S. Akl Dahl from Harlan, Iowa. He presented a talk on some of his experiences during twenty-five years in the full-time service of our Lord.

On Friday of the same week, the seminary sponsored a program at First Lutheran Church

for all students or Leaguers interested in full-time Christian service. As guest speaker for the evening, Dr. Cyrenius, an Augustana Lutheran Pastor, who is now head of the Immanuel Lutheran Deaconess Home in Omaha, spoke on the topic of God's will.

This year finds a total of eighty-two students enrolled at Trinity. The junior class of ten is the largest post-war class to enter our seminary. There are five in the middle class and three in the senior class. The faculty and students, welcome the return of Jo Andersen who was injured in an auto accident last year. He will continue his studies in the seminary.

During the summer the seminarians were not idle. Here is just a brief account of their work: Cliff Paulsen served at Staplehurst and Cordova, Nebr.; Ried Neve, at Scranton and Coon Rapids, Iowa; Eugene Levine, at Fresno, Calif., at a home mission congregation; Carl Shattauer, at Des Moines, Exira, and Coulter, Iowa; Holger Nielsen, at Dannebrog and Dry Creek, Nebr.; Jerry Lund, at Shelby, Iowa; Mortimer Nielsen, at Brooklyn, Wis.; and Jo Andersen did some preaching at the Vets Hospital in Lincoln, Nebr., while he was confined there. Some of the juniors did work in parishes this summer also.

Pastor Petersen from Ruskin, Guest Speaker

"Mandates for Our Day" will be the general theme of a series of topics by the Rev. Immanuel Petersen when he comes to Dana for Spiritual Emphasis Days, October 8-11. These meetings which are an annual tradition at Dana will be held each morning at 9:50 and each evening at 7:30 in the Pioneer Memorial Chapel. Classes will be arranged so that an hour's chapel can be held each morning.

Large Selection Of New Books Swell Library Stacks

New books added to the Dana College and Trinity Seminary library during the past summer totaled 386. Breaking this figure down there were added 81 books in the field of fine arts, 79 in literature, 58 in sociology, 43 in history, 25 reference works, 25 general works, and the rest distributed in the fields of philosophy, psychology, religion, language, science, useful arts and fiction.

Thirty-four of the new books were gifts, including an autographed set of Jean Hersholt's translation of the works of Hans Christian Andersen.

Other gift books have been presented by a library friend from Chicago, Mr. Charles A. Heinze, and a number by various members of the faculty.

Also, almost ready for use, are a number of history books, including a twenty-two volume set of "Historians' History of the World," presented to the college library by one of the seniors, Russell Eckert.

Through the efforts of Mr. Norman Bansen, the library is adding a number of volumes to the Danish-American collection. Some of these books are published abroad and some here in the United States.

He is also at present, president of the Luther League in the Nebraska District.

They see on the cross, Jesus Christ, their substitute, carrying in His body the sins of all the world. They also see the empty cross, for Christ was taken down and buried and is now risen for their justification and is interceding for them at the right hand of God.

The word of the cross becomes the glory, hope, joy and power of every christian. The word of the cross is the good news—the gospel of Jesus Christ.

Search your own heart as you face Calvary's cross. How do you react to it? Is it foolishness to you, or is it the very power of God? The word of the cross will become the power of God to you when you accept the crucified and risen Christ and trust with all your heart that He died on the cross for you.

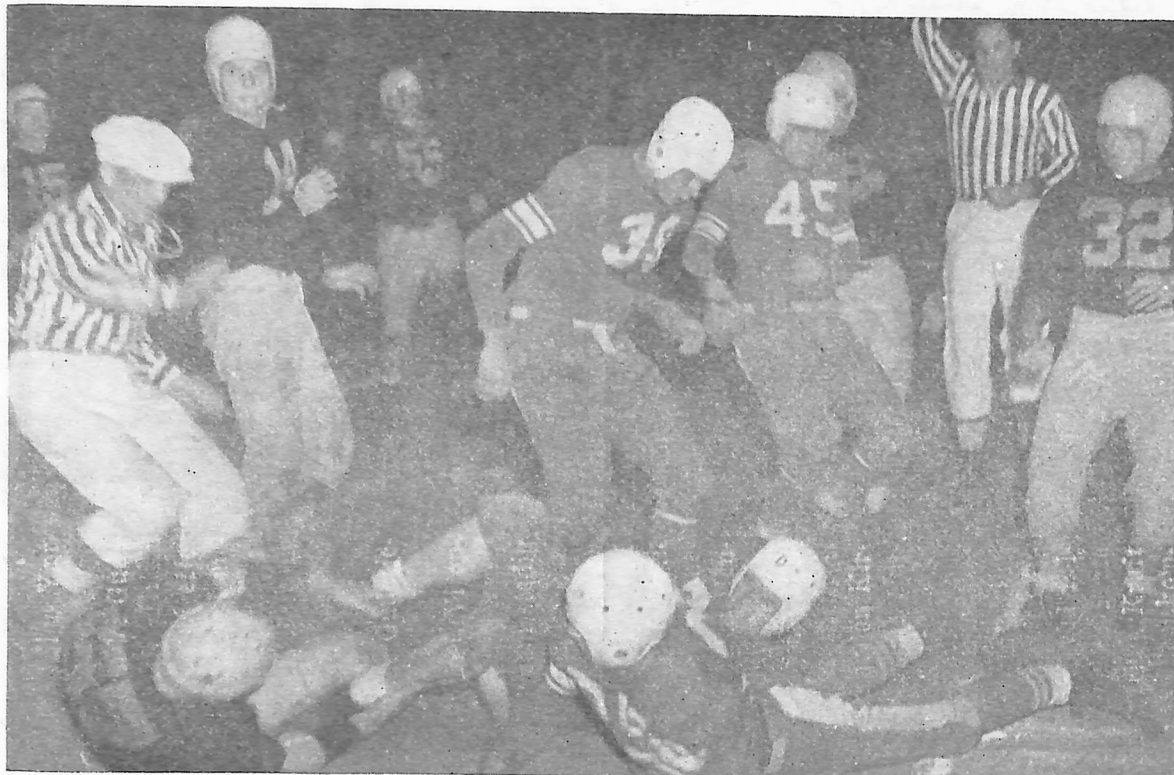

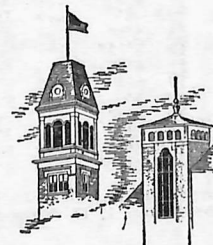
