Dana Choir Enjoys Successful Tour

The Dana College A Capella Choir has returned from its 27th annual concert tour which took the 48 singers through 4500 miles of 12 Eastern Coast states and Canada in three weeks. Seventeen complete concerts were sung besides numerous appearances in which the choir sang only part of its program. Prof. Paul E. Neve conducted the choir for his 8th season.

Impressive comments and praises from music critics, civic music conductors, and appreciative audiences again emphasize the fact that the Dana Choir is one of the nation's first rank choirs. Mr. Otis C. Williams, Jr., eminent music critic of the Portland Maine PRESS HERALD, summarized the expressions of many music lovers who heard the Dana Choir when he wrote, "The Dana Choir is an excellent one, as good or better than any chorus to appear here in recent years. There was not a single unmusical moment during the program. The choir sings with a fresh liquid tone which is a credit to both their voices and their director. It is a strongly-balanced organization with good soloists and everything that it did vocally was clearly executed. Neve directs with precision and feeling and his choir is exceptionally well disciplined for one which sings with such freedom of expression and apparent lack of effort."

Conductors of college choirs at Capital University and Augustana

College were amazed at the ability of the Dana Choir to take a tour so early in the school year. Because of the high degree of success attained on this autumn tour, the Dana Choir is planning next year to again take its tour in the fall of the year rather than in the spring as has been the custom in the past, according to Conductor Paul E. Neve.

The head of the department of organ at Butler University, Indianapolis, and the director of the civic men's chorus of Indianapolis expressed highest praises for the choir. Especially striking to them was the good diction and phrasing with which the choir sings. Neve's own number included on the program, "Hold High the Torch", was greatly lauded by these critics.

A Lutheran pastor expressed his opinion in this way: "People will forget a sermon in a few days or weeks, but a concert like the one given by the Dana Choir will last for years."

"From the standpoint of the people reached, this tour was one of the most successful tours and it has been a real pleasure to accompany such a fine group," stated James R. Hansen, tour manager.

Conductor Paul E. Neve expressed that, "From the musical standpoint, this Dana Choir is the best musical representation Dana has ever had in my time. The choir displayed the best singing throughout the tour of any

Dana Choir I have directed."

In Chicago, recordings were made by the Dana Choir for RCA Victor Records. These records will be released in an album at a time to be announced later. The recording engineer at RCA commented that the choir has one of the finest young soprano and alto sections he has heard. He felt that their ability to blend is unusual.

The choir appeared personally over several radio broadcasts originating from St. Louis, Chicago, and New York City. The St. Louis station (KFUD), a leading music station in St. Louis requested recordings of the choir to be used in further broadcasting after hearing the choir sing. The New York City appearance was over the American Broadcasting Company (ABC) network and was released over a nationwide hookup on Thanksgiving Day.

In addition to the concerts, the choir enjoyed escorted tours in Washington, D.C. and New York City. Highlights of the tour also were the visits and concerts at sister Lutheran Colleges in Columbus, Ohio (Capital University), Oneonta, N. Y. (Hartwick College), Rock Island, Ill. (Augustana College), and Des Moines, Iowa (Grandview College).

Other concerts are being planned for Omaha, Council Bluffs, and other points in the midwest early next spring.

With the present emphasis on war production we notice that there is an ever growing shortage of civilian products and some factory shut downs (Ford Automotive Works, 5,000 men laid off). The reason for this is a steel shortage, a steel shortage when we are far from all-out mobilization.

Benjamin Fairless says that there is no shortage. If this is the case, why is the average consumer paying 300 dollars a ton over the list price for steel? This would seem to be a foolish business practice if there were sufficient steel to meet the demand.

At the beginning of the year the government asked United States Steel to expand forty per cent. Mr. Fairless refused to even consider any expansion (government domination, you know). We could certainly use a little of that steel now, but we must all fight tooth and nail for "free enterprise" (National Association of Manufacturers style) even if it means cutting off our noses to spite our faces.

I would like to quote Charles E. Wilson, president of General Motors, when he commented on the steel situation. Said he, "The steel industry has expanded its capacity by only eight times since 1900, while the oil industry has expanded thirty times, the electric power industry about seventy times, the automotive industry about two thousand times. . . . (steel executives) ought to get the dust out of their eyes and go ahead with the rest of industry."

The election was a bitter pill for the democratic party to swallow, but it should point out very clearly to the party that the people do not want a cheap politician of extremely small intelligence as the President of the United States.

We notice lately that the State Department has been under considerable fire from the Senate. Especially intense in crying for Acheson's head are our two old friends, Taft and Wherry. Why the vehement shouting by these two over Acheson's failure in the Far East? If you want the answer just investigate their voting records on aid to Europe. Both of these two gentlemen were in favor of selling Europe down the river by voting against aid to our allies over there. Without this aid Western Europe would be under Moscow's screws right now. Perhaps their shouting is designed to disguise their own record of lack of foresight.
